THE RED CROSS

The Expedition of Miss Barton and Her Associates to Armenia.

Before sailing on the steamship New York, in briefly discussing her plans, Miss Clara Barton, President of the Red Cross Society, said:

"We expect to reach Constantinople within three weeks. This will allow for delay and transfer in London, Paris and Geneva. I have no definite plans as yet, but I shall mature plans when I reach the field of operation."

Miss Barton's departure to give relief to the suffering Armenians is the result of a conference held in New York recently with representatives of the various relief committees at work throughout the country, when she consented to embark the moment a preliminary guarantee fund of \$50,000 was raised.

Miss Barton claims the Red Cross never begs for a cent. It is the people who have collected the money to undertake a task. If the funds are forthcoming, the society does the work; if not, it knows how to wait.
