SHAKING TO PIECES.

HON. GEORGE BROWN RESIGNED

CHARLOTTETOWN, Dec. 21, 1865.
(By Telegraph from Ottawa.)

To Hon. Mr. Forth.
Mr. Brown has resigned for causes mentioned in my letter of this date. The policy of the Government remains unchanged. Mr. Brown continues to sustain the Ministry in all their course respecting Confederation and his party continues represented by three members of the Government. The change is a personal one merely, which we all regret.

FROM THE STATES.

New York, Dec. 15.

Great activity prevails at both the Headquarters of the Fenians in this City. Anathemas from each party denouncing the other continue to be issued. Last night the usual meeting of the Manhattan Lodge was so largely attended that the floor began to give way, and the meeting adjourned to the 99th Regt. Armory. SALT LAKE, Dec. 20.

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.

A tremendous gale is raging here. It commenced about 6 o'clock this morning. The ferry boats in the river are making long passages, and many vessels in the harbor are dragging their anchors. A schooner was totally wrecked at Sandy Hook this morning, crew saved. The French brig Prosper is ashore there also. An unknown schooner was totally wrecked this morning at Long Branch. Captain and three of the crew were lost; two of the crew were saved. Another schooner is also ashore two miles from Long Branch, and is full of water. No one on board.

CHARLOTTETOWN, Dec. 22.

A Washington despatch says that while the President was preparing his message, the French Minister emphatically stated that the Emperor would regret any expression in the message which would make it impossible to recede from his Mexican schemes without humiliation. The Minister also asserted Mr. Seward that the French troops would be withdrawn from Mexico in a little while, and asked for patience on the part of our Government.

It is reported Logan is satisfied there would be no difficulty, and that the Republic of Mexico will soon be peaceably reinstated.—Senators of the "Alabama," was arrested on the 16th inst., in Montgomery, Alabama, by orders from Washington, and on way North.—Gold 146 1/4. THE ESCAPE OF STEPHENS.

(From the London Times.)

The Head Constable of all the Fenians in Ireland, Mr. James Stephens, alias Power, who was apprehended only a fortnight ago, has just escaped from Richmond Prison, probably by the connivance of some of the prison officials.

We have as yet no means of knowing how he made his escape, and how far any one at the Richmond prison is connected with it.

It is related that on the night of the seizure of the "Irish People," he changed his appearance with peculiar readiness, and procuring a pair of crutches made his way to a place of shelter.

It had been furnished with much elegance, no doubt out of Fenian funds, the garden and green-house were complete, and £12 worth of plants were purchased from a neighboring nursery on the very day of the capture.

The preparations of the police for catching him and his companions were very elaborate, but it turned out that the work was much easier than they expected.

Some three years ago, the Emperor of Russia vailed upon Poland, after a rest of seven years, to furnish his share to the conscription.

The conscription as such appears to have lasted only a day, although the pursuit and the executions covered several days more.

From two to four hundred insurgents were killed in a closer approximation to the number is difficult, because of the impossibility of determining how many were slain by the Maroons, whom the Government

called to its aid. These savage allies came in their war-paint, for a war of extermination. A colonial paper says that at an execution they assembled round the gallows, where they had a war-dance, the statement of which was truly grand.

For every man required there will be called upon to draw lots, so that the excitement of gambling in the highest possible stake will not be wanting in this human game of chance.

The whole story of the manner in which the insurrection was stamped out is one of which several of the English journals profess to be heartily ashamed. The white colonists, it is averred, have shown themselves as incapable of self-control and of reasonable conduct as have the blacks.

ENLISTING A LAWYER.

Well, mind yourself now, for this is as true as the gospel. It was on the 11th of May, 1830, I listed a recruit in Dublin, give him the shilling, glory be to God, and walked him to the barracks as due as a fiddle.

'Did you put the questions to him rightly?' says he. 'I did,' says I.

'By the virtue of your oath now,' says he, 'just as me the questions, for I don't believe you axed him.'

'Why not?' says he. 'Why not?' says I; 'why, shure I can't take it back till ye go before a magistrate and pay the smart money.'

'You be hanged,' says he, and he puts the moosey in his pocket, and I called to his lordship on the bench for a witness that I had listed him.
