



LETTER WILL SAVE HEAD TAX

The head tax for men and women passing between the United States and Canada, which has caused much delay and confusion among vacationists, and much bitter feeling and complaint from those who have been obliged to pay \$8 in passing over the border, was explained last night by United States Immigration Commissioner Henry J. Skeffington.

"No man or woman who is a real resident or citizen of the United States or Canada, and who wishes to visit either country for a vacation or on a business trip, need pay any tax," said Commissioner Skeffington "All that is necessary is a letter of identification to be shown to the inspectors." It was also explained that this letter can be obtained from a clerk of any court or from any city town or State official who knows

or town or State official. "A letter of identification issued by such officials costs nothing," said mmissioner Skeffington "and with it there will be no trouble with any official or inspector."-Boston Post.


