





The houses are occupied by fishermen, boatmen, and others, who depend directly or indirectly upon the water for a living. Between these houses and the Blackwell canal, railroads, and lumber yards occupy the space. No one would have recognized this scene, however, during the progress of today's gale. The entire

with water to depth of three or four feet. The waves were beating against the seawall with a swash that sent the spray flying 100 feet in the air and effectually soaking everything. The line of frail houses was broken ; here and there a house was uninjured, but most were twisted around by the mad rush and the occupants were escaping in boats. John Ford and Mrs. Me-Namara lived in a house which was not strong enough to stand the attack, and the rear part was wrecked, the stove, bedding, clothing and what other supplies could be hastily gathered, were thrown into the front room, which remained standing. Wm. Dusler and Michael Hoolihan lost their kitchen in the same way, and the rear of M. Boardman's house was broken to kindling wood. Further on toward Louisina st., the houses had suffered less, though all were soaked with water. Furniture and atensils had been thrown out and were floating around in a huge pond that had formed on the railroad tracks. It is the worst storm ever known on the island. The lumber yards have suffered to the extent of many thousands of dollars, but the loss cannot now be estimated
