

The Evening Chit-Chat

By RUTH CAMERON



Planning to do any papering in the immediate future? If you are, you may be interested in a few suggestions I have gained from some very long and arduous sessions at the paperhangers.

If not, you are excused from further perusal of my chat to-night because that's what it's about.

In the first place, when you are going to paper, consider which way your room faces.

Never put a cold color like gray or green on a north room. Yellow, gold, brown, bronze and golden effects are the proper thing for a room with a north exposure.

For a west room something in blue, rose or pink tone is pretty.

For an east or south room gray or green, greenish blue or red, or any of the colors that need a good deal of light may be used.

For a room that you wish to lighten up, any of the colors recommended for a north room will be desirable, as they attract the light into the room, and yet do not absorb it as green or blue or red do.

Woodwork is also a very important and very much neglected consideration. Do not use light colors like gray or light green with a natural color woodwork. Dark browns and reds go best with that. With white woodwork the light colors look best, although the darker can be used, as white is all right with anything.

Be careful not to use stripes in a high studded room, unless you break the height by the use of a plate rail, wainscoting or some sort of decorative effect.

Take a piece of the carpet with you

when you go paper hunting, but do not to try to match it. Be satisfied to get the color to harmonize. A harmony is better than a match because the match cannot be perfect, as colors in cloth and paper cannot be exactly the same.

Do not be attracted by flowers so lifelike that you feel you could pick them off the wall. That is not an artistic paper. The best papers are flat rather than in relief, and are conventionalized rather than lifelike designs.

Do not put plain paper on a hall both because it will soil quickly and also because there are usually no pictures to relieve it.

Never fail to have in mind that any paper will look just about four shades darker when hung than it does at the shop.

Also, if possible, insist upon seeing two rolls side by side before you purchase. In a figured paper it is almost impossible to get the effect of the figure without seeing at least two breadths.

If there is so much sun in your room that you fear fading, keep away from blues and pinks, unless you are buying a high priced paper.

Don't forget to ask about arsenic if you buy a green paper.

And now a "do" to balance all these "don'ts."

When in doubt, trust the salesman. By the nature of his occupation it is inevitable that his taste in paper should be better cultivated than yours. If you go to a reliable firm you can depend upon his honesty, so why not put up to him just what you want, and what you want to pay, and then be guided by his taste.

I don't believe you'll regret it, and anyway, if the paper isn't quite satisfactory you will have the great joy of having someone besides yourself to blame.

Homes in Tree Stumps

Hollow Out the Stump, Cut Holes for Doors and Windows.

The fine furs of the Pacific northwest are so colossal that after the trees are hewed down the stumps are used for children's playgrounds, houses for families to live in or for dancing platforms.

To make a stump house, the material from the interior is removed, leaving only enough to form walls of suitable thickness. A roof of boards or shingles is put over the top of the stump, holes are cut for windows and doors, and a family of five can often doze make it their dwelling. The stump houses are sometimes used by settlers until they can build larger and more convenient homes.

After the stump home has been vacated it is turned into a stable for the horses, or sometimes into an enclosure for chickens or hogs.

Next to the big tree of California the fir or sequoia of Washington and Oregon has the largest diameter. As they decay rapidly the hollowing out is easy. Sometimes they are used for dance platforms, some of them accommodating as many as four couples.

Another custom is to turn the big stumps into playgrounds for the children. The children reach the top by pieces of wood nailed against the sides or by ladders. A beautiful use of the large stumps is making them into flower beds and covered over with trailing vines.—Chicago Tribune.

Municipal Matters.

A regrettable feature of the present civic situation is the voluntary retirement of so many members of the Municipal Council.

One of the best forms of public life in England is Municipal Government, and so desirable is experience held by the constitution of the old Municipalities provides for the retention of a considerable amount of experience gained in these local government bodies. Although we have dwelt on this subject before, the lesson it conveys at the juncture justifies further emphasis. That lesson is the value of experience in Municipal administration. Not only in the Old Municipal Council, but in the new County Councils, it is impossible for the whole of the membership of the Council to be changed at one fell swoop. The constitutions arrange that all the members do not retire at once. This is to obviate the possibility of a Council of Municipal apprentices being elected all at once. The law arranges for the retention of old heads as well as for the infusion of new blood. Under our Municipality the Mayor and all the Councillors retire at the same time. For experience we are thus dependent on the good nature of old Councillors offering themselves voluntarily for re-election, and on the latter finding favour with the electorate, otherwise we may be confronted with the chance of a body of men absolutely ignorant of everything which Councillors can learn by actual administration of the affairs of the city. An infusion of new blood is desirable, but a retention

of a number of old heads is at least as important. It is therefore regrettable that so few of the old members are allowing themselves to be put in nomination.

Under these circumstances it would not be wise to press the Torphy case too much against Councillors Ellis and Martin. They are not alone on the present Council. Neither of them is the Mayor. If any blame is attributable to either, it attaches also to Mayor Gibbs and others, and it is not just to strike Ellis and Martin because they happen to be in the field and Gibbs and others are not. It is unfortunate that permission was ever granted to Mrs. Torphy to rebuild on the present site.

The crux of that case appears to be the compensation for what the widening of the road would destroy. Not only would the premises be destroyed, but the license would appear to be extinguished with it. As a consequence compensation ought to be made not only for the premises, but for the value of the license to the holder. This sum might be too burdensome to be entertained. Indeed, we understand a value of \$20,000 is put on the property and license.

Under the Licensing Act there is provision for the transfer of a license where the lease of the licensee expires, ought not the law to be amended to allow a transfer of a license where the premises are appropriated for public purposes?

A difficulty exists. How it is to be surmounted is not clear. The roads at Torphy's should be widened in the interest of the public, but we protest in the interest of the public, also, of this case being used to discriminate at the Municipal Election against Councillors Ellis and Martin.

It should not be used to deprive the public of the eight years experience of Councillor Ellis, nor of the four years experience of Councillor Martin.

The Ssu Here. A Fine Ship.

The s.s. Ssu, Capt. Jones, arrived here at 4 o'clock this morning to Crosbie & Co. after a run of 10 days from Londonderry, Ireland. The ship left Leth on the 16th April and met very heavy weather which compelled her to put into Stornaway on the 21st April. Having been detained there by stress of weather and to coal she again continued on her voyage. Shortly after leaving she again had rough weather, gales succeeding gales, and for 3 days she was hove to and was badly buffeted. The ship in the rolling and straining, caused by the mountainous sea, received much damage, and as water was making in the hold the ship had to run back to Londonderry and had to be docked for repairs. She left again last Sunday week and had a fairly good run coming out. The chief officer, Mr. Yule, kindly showed a Telegram reporter through the ship this morning. She is a three masted vessel of pretty lines. The saloon, a very handsome apartment, is situated amidships, is snugly fitted up, painted with white enamel and panelled with satin wood. It is nicely ventilated and airy and is fitted with every modern convenience. A vestibule leads to the saloon and is used for people afflicted with mal de mer. The state rooms are comfortable and excellently fitted up and 30 saloon passengers can be accommodated. The steerage also takes 200 passengers. A smoking room neatly furnished is under the bridge, and the kitchen, officers and engineers' quarters and other apartments are in keeping with the general excellence of the vessel. The ship was built at Port Glasgow in 1893, is 280 tons gross, 132 net, and steams 12 knots. She sails north at 4 p.m. to-morrow in charge of Capt. Barbour. Most of the crew (14 men) who arrived in her will remain in this country to seek employment. Two of these are fishermen. Mr. Yule was here as captain of the s.s. Tremona after the fire of 1892. He and some of the other officers will return home.

Money For Newfoundlanders.

Some time ago, it will be remembered, the German cruiser Freya ran down and sank an American vessel, the fishing schooner Maggie and May, off Halifax. Nine of the crew were saved but four of the poor fellows went to bottom. Among the latter was a Newfoundland, named "Batt" (Bartholomew) English, of Job's Cove, North Shore, Conception Bay. We understand that the sum of \$2,000 was apportioned to the surviving relatives of each of the men by the German Government. In some manner English's name was given as Pat. instead of "Batt," and there was some difficulty in identifying the relatives of the drowned man. U. S. Consul Benedict now has the matter in hand and has written Rev. Jno. Lynch, P.P. of Northern Bay, to get particulars about English with a view to having the money handed over to his friends.

The Checkers sailed for Figueira to-day, taking 2,500 qts of fish for Bishop & Sons, Capt. Ramsey, is in charge.

The Bella Rosa sailed to-day for Cporto taking 3,000 qts of fish, Capt. Fitzgerald in command.



THE ROYAL TOMBS AT WINDSOR.

No burial place perhaps has been so strictly preserved from the public eye as the sacred vault at Windsor where so many members of our Royal Families lie at rest. St. George's Chapel, in which Henry VI., Edward VI., Henry VIII., and Charles I. are buried, dates from Edward IV., though the present building owes its size and beauty to Henry VII. and Henry VIII., by whom it was completed. But the royal tomb-house was not built till the time of George III., and only occasionally is a privileged visitor admitted within its precincts. This crypt, 70ft. long and 28ft. wide, has an entrance at the east end of St. George's Chapel, and runs under the Albert Memorial Chapel, an appendage at the east end of the larger chapel. In the centre of the crypt are twelve low stone tables, designed to receive the remains of Sovereigns, and round the walls are niches to receive sixty-nine others. George III. and his two successors, George IV. and William IV., lie buried there.

The chapel did not, however, gain its right to be regarded as "one of the most beautiful in the world" till Queen Victoria had it restored as a memorial of her beloved husband. On its small area, 68ft. by 28ft., was lavished all the splendour of marble and mosaic that the greatest artists of the time could devise. Even the floor was inlaid with richly coloured marbles, and the seats round the walls are of green marble.

The vaulted roof was made splendid with the glowing Venetian mosaics of Salvati, whose method for brilliance and permanency has never been surpassed. Venetian enamel mosaics were also used for the full length portraits which occupy the blank west window of twenty-eight persons connected with the chapel, including Henry III., whose chapel stood on the same site, Edward III., Henry VI., Edward IV., Henry VII., Henry VIII., Charles I., and George III.

King Edward's Medallion.

The windows on the north and south sides represent ancestors of the Prince Consort with their heraldic bearings, including Witekind the Great A.D. 803. The beautiful marble mosaics of Baron Triquet which decorate the walls of the chapel represent in etched and coloured marble various Biblical scenes typifying certain qualities of the Prince Consort. Above each is a medallion representing various members of the Royal Family, that nearest the chancel on the left and above the deanery door representing King Edward when Prince of Wales.

Immediately before the altar is the cenotaph of the Prince Consort, a beautiful monument of black and white marble. At the corners are angels, and at the sides are marble panels representing Truth, Honour, Justice, Charity, Piety, and Hope. At the ends are figures of the praying widow and of Science, weeping. A white marble figure representing the Prince Consort in chain armour with his favourite dog Eos at his feet lies on the top of the monument, with two angels beding above the head.

Next to the cenotaph of the Prince Consort is the tomb of the Duke of Clarence, the eldest son of King Edward, and beyond is the tomb of the Duke of Albany, Queen Victoria's youngest son.

The Albert Memorial Chapel above the royal tomb-house lies behind the east end of St. George's Chapel, and must not be confused with the Prince Consort's Mausoleum at Frogmore, where the remains of Queen Victoria were laid beside those of the Prince Consort.

Given to Wolsey.

The Memorial Chapel was restored and beautified by Queen Victoria and renamed the Albert Chapel in 1874, but the building dates from the fifteenth century.

It was first begun by Henry VII., it is recorded, but left unfinished when he decided to erect the chapel named after him at Westminster Abbey. Cardinal Wolsey subsequently obtained it as a gift from Henry VIII., and proceeded with the work, but it was left incomplete on his disgrace, and though Charles I. made some progress, it was ravaged by the Parliamentarians and the movable decorations sold. The black marble sarcophagus made for Wolsey, however, survived and was removed to St. Paul's Cathedral by George III., where it was used as a tomb for Nelson.

James II. restored the chapel and had it fitted up for the services of the Roman Catholic Church, but after his reign it again fell into disuse, till revived by George III.

Bishop in a Donkey Cart

One of the best stories told regarding Bishop Barry, whose death was announced recently, shows how on one occasion he had a good distance to travel in order to keep an appointment at Brentford, but for some time he failed to find a vehicle to convey him to the place of meeting. Then a costermonger appeared in sight, and, learning of the bishop's difficulty, modestly offered him a lift. With equal modesty the prelate accepted, and the sight of a past Primate of Australia riding in the humblest vehicle known filled many persons with astonishment as the barrow and its strangely-contracted occupants neared its destination. One of the bishop's first tasks was publicly to express his thanks to the costermonger for enabling him to fulfill his engagement.

Freshwater Notes.

Freshwater was not behind in paying its tribute of respect to the departed monarch King Edward VII. The Church was draped and a Memorial Service arranged. This circuit has two Orange Lodges working within its boundaries. Anglo-Saxon Lodge, Freshwater, and Edward VII., Ferry's Cove. Could there be a better combination? On Memorial Day the bell tolled for one hour, and at 1.30 the Orange brethren, loyal to flag and country, walked solemnly into the Church while the "Dead March in Saul" was played. All the Burial Service was read except the committal and intercessory prayers. The pastor, Rev. C. Lench, delivered a panegyric emphasizing the salient characteristics of Britain's Peacemaker, based on the good and great King Hezekiah. The service was very impressive.

At the request of Anglo-Saxon Lodge, Mr. Lench lectured in their hall in the evening taking as subject: "Our New King and Britain's Expectations." The life of George V. was reviewed and what the nation expected from its new King clearly set forth. "The King is dead, God Save the King."

Sabbath was a high day in Freshwater, it being Sunday School Anniversary, the young people's day of the year. About 1,000 people, old and young, were packed in the church from towns and villages miles away. The singing by the choir and Sunday School, and the recitations, dialogues, etc., were splendidly rendered as the result of long and faithful drilling. A very pleasing feature of the Anniversary was the presentation to the popular Superintendent, Mr. Augustus Noel, of an address of appreciation and a large Family Bible, subscribed by the teachers and adult class. For eleven years Mr. Noel has rendered efficient and faithful service as Superintendent and many years as teacher. All concerned had kept their secret and Mr. Noel was greatly affected, but his reply spoke volumes for "real worth from humble life," and the men who are doing the bulk of the world's work for the benefit of the coming generation.

The people of this busy and independent village and surrounding hamlets are all astir. Gardening this season a specialty. Traps ready for the water to-morrow. Preparations complete for Labrador. Tuesday and Thursdays — days of farewells, as crowds leave for Grand Falls, Sydney Mines, Chelsea, Boston and other American cities, where men are needed, labour abundant and wages certain. They will turn up towards Xmas with pockets lined and families well provided for. Freshwater and surrounding villages are enjoying a succession of years of unbroken prosperity, and there is a most unique condition of things, an entire absence of poverty and want.

Carthaginian Arrived.

The Allan Liner Carthaginian, Capt. Bamber, got in here at 7 p.m. yesterday. Leaving Philadelphia at 2 p.m. Thursday last the ship had a fine run down until she was about 12 miles east of Cape Race when she had thick weather and her speed had to be decreased incurring a delay. The fog is very thick in that section of the coast and greatly impedes navigation. She had 150 tons cargo and her passengers were—Mr. and Mrs. Frank Rendell, Mrs. Croucher and child, and a steersman.

Wet and Dry Moons.

There is an old superstition, which dies hard, that the position of the horns of the new moon tells what the weather will be; if the horns of the crescent are on the same level, it will hold water, and hence it is dry moon; but if it is tipped up, then the water will run out, and it is a wet moon.

One thing has helped keep this belief alive; the moon is "dry" in the part of the spring that is usually fair, while it is "wet" during the season of autumn rains.

If this were a sure sign of the weather we could have our predictions years in advance; for an astronomer can predict the exact position of the moon at any time in the future.

The cause for the different positions of the crescent is simple: The moon is south of the sun in the autumn and north of it in the spring. The crescent is formed by the light of the sun falling on the moon, and the horns are naturally in a line perpendicular to the direction of the sun from the moon. That is all there is to it.

Reciprocity Not Popular in Canada.

BOSTON, Mass., May 24.

"The movement in the U. S. for reciprocity will not, in my opinion, strike a responsive chord in the heart of the Canadians," said Douglas Hazen, Premier of New Brunswick, at the annual Victoria Day banquet of the Intercolonial Club here to-day. Premier Hazen declared that Canada has developed her British markets so enormously and has become so imbued with the idea of Imperial Preference, that there was now in the Dominion little sentiment for reciprocity with the U. S. At the present time, he said, no Canadian public or business man or party speaks in favor of reciprocity except with large restrictions that will protect our industries and will favor the British Empire, conserve our natural resources and protect our public domain. Referring to the agreement recently made by President Taft with the Canadian Government, Premier Hazen said: "That treaty will not cause the Canadian people to put forth greater efforts to re-open the treaty question with their neighbors. In regard to this agreement, some Canadians felt like the wife who disputed with her husband concerning the dinner hour. She wanted the meal at one and he at six. They compromised on six. Twenty years ago both Canadian parties declared for reciprocity; to-day if a Cabinet official did so he could not remain in office five minutes. No man who values his public life would dare propose discrimination now against the Motherland."

Newfoundland Earl Dead in England.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, May 24.

The Earl of Stamford died to-day. He was born in St. John's, Nfld., April 19th, 1850. A son, Lord Grety Grobey, and a daughter, Lady Jane, survive him. In politics the Earl was a Liberal Unionist. His home was Dunham, Massey Hall, near Altricham in Cheshire. William Grey, ninth Earl of Stamford, was the only member of the House of Lords who was a native of Newfoundland. The peerages held by him date from the beginning of the 17th century. King James conferred the Barony of Grey of Groby in 1602 upon Sir Henry Grey, son of Lord John Grey and only nephew of the Marquis of Dorset and Duke of Suffolk, who was the father of Lady Jane Grey, for a few days Queen of England. The Earl of Stamford was confirmed on Lord Grey, Groby's grandson, in spite of the fact that he had been a parliamentary commander during the Civil War, and one of the judges to sign the warrant for the execution of King Charles the 1st.

The Carlos Conspiracy

Special to Evening Telegram.

LISBON, May 24.

The Government is awaiting the completion of investigation of the statements made by an anarchist named Ramirez before taking action against those named as the conspirators in the assassination of King Carlos and the Crown Prince in 1908. Ramirez escaped to Brazil following the assassination, but was recently arrested and brought back here. Subsequently he made a confession and gave the police the names of 1,148 persons, including several prominent men in politics, who, he said, shared in the conspiracy. According to Ramirez, those selected for the killing were divided into four groups and placed at many points along the route of the Royal carriages, in order that if any one group failed the others would be prepared to execute the deed.

China Adopts Decimal Coinage.

PEKIN, May 24.

An edict promulgated to-day establishes national decimal coinage throughout China and orders the cessation of all coinage by provincial mints. This is in compliance with the treaty designed, following the Boxer troubles and according to the terms of which the Chinese Government pledged itself to adopt universal decimal coinage.

22 Persons Drowned.

Special to Evening Telegram.

COWES, Isle of Wight, May 24.

Twenty-two persons were drowned as a result of a collision between the steamer Skerryvore and the German bark J. C. Vinnon in the English Channel. The Skerryvore sank. Only two of the crew of the steamer were rescued, one of whom died a short time afterwards.

POLICE COURT NEWS.

To-day a drunk, also charged with indecent exposure, was fined \$2 or 7 days.

Four drunks were released and two disorderlies discharged.

The case against a boy charged with the larceny of \$10 from Mr. Waite of Barter's Hill on the 25th inst. was dismissed.

J. Moore (14) pleaded guilty to stealing a cow hide valued at \$3 from Mr. John Bambrick, and 12 out of 30 oat sacks, the whole valued at \$5, from Arthur Parsons on the 23rd. Thos Peddle (16) pleaded guilty to the same charges and also to breaking into P. Waddon's fruit store and taking therefrom \$1. Inspector General Sullivan here asked Judge Knight to remand the youths for 8 days, as he will endeavor to so dispose of them as to save them from a possible after life of crime. None of those from whom they stole appeared against them.

A drunk who assaulted a man named Hill was fined \$1 or 3 days for the former offence and \$5 or 14 days for the latter.

Bell-ringing records have previously all been held by teams of sturdy men, but Miss Lillian A. Wilson, a young lady of only sixteen years of age, has just performed an extraordinary feat, which entitles her to the honor of being the world's champion lady bell-ringer.

The other day she entered the steeple of Gilmerton Church and assisted in "opening" the bells by ringing the first peal. This unique peal numbered 5,040 changes, and meant continual ringing for over three hours, without a moment's pause for food or rest! This is Lillian's third long performance, but every week she rings the royal memorial bells of St. John the Divine, Leicester.

The physical endurance involved in bell-ringing of this character, let alone the necessary skill, is prodigious.

Miss Wilson received her training under the guidance of her father, who, five years ago, conducted the then world's record peal of 17,104 changes, which occupied nearly eleven hours. Hereditary may therefore have something to do with this, as other matters.

A King of Preachers.

Dr. Alexander McLaren, Says the London Times, "Will Take His Place With the Comparatively Small Company of the Great Preachers of the World."

A King of preachers has died in Alexander McLaren, who made his pulpit in Manchester famous throughout the world. Two of the finest appreciations of his unique life appeared in the Times and the Manchester Guardian.

"Alexander McLaren," said the Times, "is a notable instance of the power which the pulpit, and the Non-conformist pulpit, is still able to exercise in the modern world. He was, and he desired to be, nothing but a preacher."

One of the World's Great Preachers.

"He was," adds the Times, "by the confession of those who had the best opportunity of judging, the greatest preacher in any of the Free Churches, and worthy to be ranked with the great preachers of the Established Church whom this century has produced. If his pulpit had been in St. Mary's, Oxford, or in St. Paul's, his fame would have been as great, as his influence already has been wide, as Newman's or Liddon's. If, as Schleiermacher said, good preaching ought to combine perfect moral but not to combine independence of thought, a profound sense of sin with respect for criticism and a passion for truth, Alexander McLaren will take his place among the comparatively small company of the great preachers of the world."

His Spiritual Influence.

"In a period of unrest and rapid change, especially among the Non-conformists, he presented a fine example of constancy," continues the Times. "And perhaps his long continuance in one place, with spirit unquenched and eye undimmed, and his refusal to quit the task of expounding the Bible to one of the most exigent communities in the world, was not the least of the lessons which he gave to his age."

"It must be profoundly touching to the multitudes of people who have received their best spiritual impulses from Dr. McLaren's ministry to know that his noble service was rendered at the cost of intense mental agony. As Robertson of Brighton had to bear the double burden of physical pain

and domestic trouble in order to become the most influential preacher of our century, and as Spurgeon had to learn in constant illness the humility which brilliant and unbroken success might easily have impaired, so the cross came to McLaren in the form of a mental depression and discouragement which to his friends appeared unaccountable.

His Electrical Power.

"Although," says the Times, "he devoted himself exclusively to the work of the pulpit, refused to visit, and eschewed all outside engagements, his influence was felt throughout Manchester; and the influence became more penetrating and more widely diffused every year. The substance of his preaching he himself described: 'I have tried to preach Christ as if I believed in Him, not as if I had hesitations and preadventures and limitations. And I have tried to preach Him as if I lived on Him; and that is the bottom of it all, that we shall ourselves feed on the truth that we proclaim to others.' But of the numerous preachers who could say as much as that, only one here and there possesses McLaren's electrical power, which made the congregation unable to be inattentive, because it gave to the hearer the sense of being under a spell."

"On Sunday he was unable, or unwilling, to say a word to anyone out of the pulpit. In quiet meditation or inward wrestling, his spirit concentrated itself on his great task; and the delivery of the discourse, not written, but thoroughly thought out and digested, was a sustained utterance of pent-up power."

Characteristics of His Sermons.

"The characteristics of these sermons, which have been heard for forty years in Manchester by thronging congregations, and in their published form have gone all over the world, are mainly these: There was a most careful and often felicitous exposition of the text, which implied, though it seldom betrayed, an exact scholarship in Greek and Hebrew. There followed a perfectly natural division of the subject under two or three heads. Each head was then carefully elaborated, and clothed in language which was formed by a very intimate acquaintance with our best literature. And the application was sure to come in the form of a personal appeal to repentance, or to righteousness, or to service. Illustrations were rare, but always singularly apt, and drawn by preference, not from daily life, but from literary or scientific sources."

The Times says that McLaren's long series of printed sermons "are now the treasured possession of the Church, a library of homiletical literature, and fairly challenge comparison with the publications of the greatest preachers."

His Impressive Delivery.

"The most sympathetic critic of Dr. McLaren's printed sermons could have but a very inadequate conception of his power as a preacher unless he had heard them from his own lips," says a writer in the Manchester Guardian. "His delivery was measured, deliberate, and never impassioned, but strikingly effective; his voice, though not resonant, and at times even harsh, was skillfully modulated, and

when it sank almost into a whisper, however, which carried into the furthest corner of his own large church—was thrillingly impressive. The personal magnetism of the orator, wielding all the resources of his art with a boldness and a skill which were never allowed to obtrude themselves for a moment, and losing every thought of himself in the greatness of his theme, conveyed it with irresistible force to his hearers. He was an admirable but wholly unconventional reader, and it has often been said that it was well worth attending a service if only to hear him read the lessons.

Binney Taught Him to Preach.

"To Dr. McLaren's printed sermons no juster or more well-considered tribute has been paid than in the words used by the then Bishop of Manchester on the occasion of the presentation of his portrait: 'In an age which has been charmed and inspired by the sermons of Newman and Robertson of Brighton (the combination was characteristic of the speaker), there were no published discourses which, for profundity of thought, logical arrangement, eloquence of appeal, and power over the human heart, exceeded in merit those of Dr. McLaren.'"

"I remember, when I was a young student," Dr. McLaren once said, "talking to Thomas Binney, the man that taught me to preach; for he came at the time when the last rolling thunders of Johnsonian eloquence were just dying out of the Dissenting pulpit, and he taught us, as I remember myself once saying to me, 'stand on our hind legs and talk.'"

Dr. McLaren's Career.

Dr. McLaren was born in Glasgow in 1826. In his sixteenth year he decided to become a minister, and entered Stepney College. He was a B. A. before he was twenty, and in his twenty-first year went to Portland Chapel, Southampton, where he remained twelve years. In 1858 he went to Union Chapel, Manchester, and his jubilee as a preacher was celebrated in 1902. He retired from his pulpit in 1903, and went to live at Edinburgh, where he died, at the age of eighty-four. He was made a D.D. of Edinburgh in 1877, and was President of the Baptist Union in 1875 and 1901.

A Pleasing Prognostication.

We have it from Capt. T. Fitzpatrick of the S. S. Portia, who is a keen observer of such matters, that in his estimation there will be an extra good fishery the coming season from St. John's to St. Pierre. The captain bases his theory on the fact that cod is numerous on St. Pierre, Quero, Mizzen and other Banks near, which fact is like a receipt in full for the best fishery along the shore for many years. Abundance of fish on these banks is an unfailing sign of a good shore fishery. The boats at Cape St. Mary's have on shore from 100 to 150 qtls. to date, and the last catches of the boats ran from 40 to 50 qtls. and even 60 qtls. There is plenty of herring at N. E. Arm, Placentia, and 10 days ago one man hauled 2,000 barrels which the fishermen have drawn on ever since and can do for a week to come.

SENT HOME.—The man King, who drifted in here from Sydney a few weeks ago, and who was held by the police and believed to be insane, left here this morning by the Carthaginian for Glasgow. The man had been drinking heavily and this was the cause of his mental trouble. In future if undesirables are sent here from other places they will be returned.
