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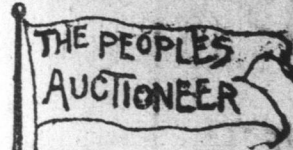

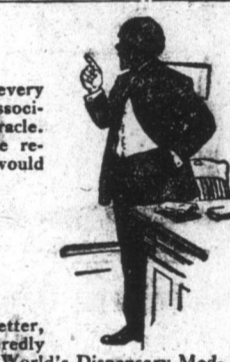

It is clear that Germany consents to the French protectorate over Morocco in return for a treaty which will strictly define her economic rights in that country, and in addition a slice of the Congo.

Exposed to Fourteen Hours' Rainstorm

CHANNEL, This afternoon.
A picnic party, mostly ladies, went out by express yesterday morning to Red Rock. Incoming train from St. John's had orders to stop and pick them up, but owing to some unexplained cause neglected doing so. When headquarters, St. John's, were notified, agent at Port aux Basques was instructed to send out flat car attached to engine for the purpose of bringing picnicers home. This engine method of conveyance was indignantly refused, and rightly so? Does the R. N. Co. imagine that they are dealing with savages? Their action has aroused a strong feeling of resentment against whoever is responsible for the outrage, and close enquiry into the cause of express's failure to stop at Red Rocks should be instituted. After stormy negotiations on the part of those interested, the railway company at length condescended to send out a second class passenger car to bring in the party, which arrived at 11 a.m., having spent fourteen hours exposed to a violent rain storm.

Banker Loses Man.

This morning the banker Arwance, Capt. Cook, arrived here at half past five for the loss of one of her crew. The vessel had been two weeks on the Banks, had fish fairly plentiful and has to date 1,800 qtls. for 7 dories. The vessel had very stormy weather the past week, lost her anchor and 45 fathoms of cable with a complete set of trawls and some other gear. The captain decided to run in here and get some bait, and in doing so a sad accident occurred at 7 this morning when the vessel was 10 miles S. E. of Cape Spear, one of the crew, Daniel Riser, was sent with others to get up a storm sail and was holding on to the thwart block while a high sea ran, when the vessel took a sudden pitch, he was swung out overboard and went into the trough of the sea. All the crew were on deck, and he was hardly gone overboard when a dory with 3 men on board were in the water and were pulling for him with might and main. The vessel was running before the wind at a nine mile clip and the man was left far in the ship's wake in a few minutes. He could not swim, was heavily clad and when the dory reached within 80 yards of him he sank. He was aged 29, single, of Rose Bay, Lunenburg County, and a mother, father, sister and a brother survive him. Capt. Cook telegraphs the clergyman of the place this afternoon to break the sad news to his relatives.

THE LABOR DISPUTE At Crosbie's Premises.

PRESIDENT McGRATH REPLIES TO HON. J. C. CROSBIE'S VERSION.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir—In your journal of yesterday there appeared under the caption of "Mr. Crosbie's Version" his side of the case in relation to the difficulty which exists between him and the Longshoremen's Protective Union. Mr. Crosbie's statement is not correct. It is true that he had some trouble with a member of the Union named Peddle, but not in relation to his work or the manner in which it was done, but it was one of a purely business character. The facts are—Peddle had a contract from Mr. Crosbie to discharge the Lady Napier, she having on board a cargo of coal. While Peddle was engaged at the work of discharging, Mr. Crosbie was anxious to have the work done as quickly as possible, and with that object in view he sent some of his own men on board to assist in discharging. There were 305 tons of coal discharged from the vessel. When Peddle went to Mr. Crosbie's office to get paid the amount of the contract agreed upon, Mr. Crosbie wanted an allowance made for the men which he sent on board to the extent of about 120 tons of coal. Peddle thought this was excessive. Mr. Crosbie contended otherwise and refused to pay Peddle unless a deduction to this extent was made. Peddle

refused to allow such a deduction from his contract and told Mr. Crosbie that if he did not pay him he would be compelled to sue him, he was satisfied to make a deduction but not to that extent. Mr. Crosbie thereupon paid Peddle the amount of his bill. The steamship Rescue came to Mr. Crosbie's premises with a cargo of coal, a contract was made by Mr. Crosbie with Mr. McDonald, stevedore, to discharge the cargo. Mr. Crosbie apparently knowing that Peddle would be employed by McDonald in the doing of the work, told him that he should not employ Peddle. Mr. McDonald told Peddle when he came to look for work that Mr. Crosbie had asked him not to employ him. Peddle then reported to me. I went to Mr. McDonald and asked him why he did not employ Peddle as he had always done, and he informed me that he had been told by Mr. Crosbie not to do so. I then went to Mr. Crosbie to know the reason why he gave orders that Peddle should not be employed, his reply to me was that if I did not get off the premises he would put me in goal. It being a rule of the Union that no union men can be discriminated against, I told the men who were employed by McDonald in discharging the cargo the discrimination had been made use of against Peddle, and when informed of the fact they refused to continue the work of discharging. Peddle was not employed.

The matter has hung fire since.

An American Trawler Seized.

The Marine Department has seized at Louisburg, the American steamer trawler, Argonaut, for a violation of the Treaty of 1818. The vessel was proceeding to home waters and shipped at Louisburg a consignment of fish. The cargo was ordered to be confiscated.

Tension Much Relieved.

PARIS, To-Day.
The tension over the Moroccan situation was somewhat relieved by a doctor, a Customs officer and other quarters both at Berlin and Paris that an agreement was more likely to be reached since the French proposals had been read by the Emperor and the Chancellor. The Foreign Office maintains silence regarding the progress of the negotiations.

Negro Seamen are Destitute.

CARDIFF, To-Day.
Five hundred negro seamen are destitute here and are subsisting on free meals. The increase in wages due to the strike enables ship-owners to get whites and they refuse to employ colored seamen.

The King's Prize, however heavy batteries resulted in a win for the Fourth London, who secured 62 points out of a possible 60, and placed second with 59 per cent.

By 500,000 to 60,000, the Trades Union Congress, now in session, rejected a proposal for the organization of a citizen army.

It contained some clothes for a woman named Mrs. Hayden, who is the mother of the girl. The missing letter was not found, and the value remains well which had disappeared from Mr. Hayden's home was found on the premises. The girl was brought before Magistrate P. S. Just and remanded a week. The police are to-day looking for the stolen letter and its contents.

Boy Reported Missing.

Last night the friends of a boy named Samuel Gardner, of the Battery Road, reported at the police station that he had left his home at 3 in the afternoon and when the report was made at 10 o'clock he had not returned. His parents learned that he was seen on Job's premises during the afternoon, that he had intimated to companions that he intended to stow away on a vessel lying there. Supd. Grimes, Sergt. Mackey and Officer Tucker were detailed to look for him and the latter found the boy loitering about Job's premises and took him to his home.
