We have not, he said, in the se

vice at present men to whom thes duties can be entrusted, because th efficient and capable direction thereo demands trained men, and the train ing necessary for it cannot be of ained in this Colony. If we hope t pe in a position, should the occasion arise, to have capable men to place n charge of these departments w should take time by the forelock an select two young men from the Posta Department and send them to Canada or the United States to study thes branches. It is no reflection upon the Postal staff to-day that none qualified for this work, because th opportunity to qualify themselves i these branches has not been theirs upon the Postal service, but upon th Colony as a whole, if within a year of two hence we are obliged to impo men from the United States, Canad or England to superintend this wor which our men are eapable of doin




