

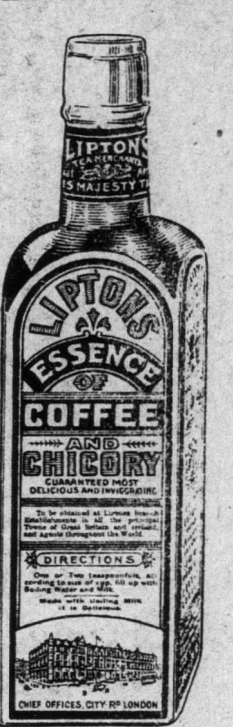

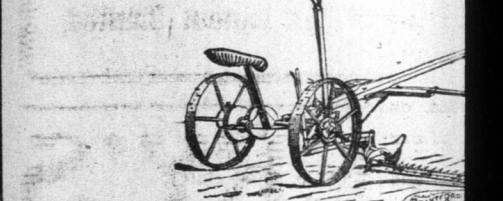

The Evening Chit-Chat

By RUTH CAMERON



Right in our very respectable neighborhood there lives a woman who is a cruelly abused slave. No, not a slave in the old sense, nor a slave in the new sense of "white slaves," nor even a slave to her husband or children. This woman is simply what I call an obsession slave. That is: she's the unhappy and tortured vassal and victim of the obsessions which she herself sets up as masters over herself.

Do I fail to make myself clear? Well, suppose I become concrete. This woman has a very kind and devoted husband. He is occasionally called away on business trips and, on the last trip, his customary bi-weekly letter failed to come on one occasion. His wife at once became obsessed of the idea that he did not love her any longer. She brooded over this idea, amassed evidence to prove it, became absolutely convinced of it, and in the few days in which she did not hear from him, actually worried herself sick. At the end of the week two letters came together; the first had been mislaid by the postal authorities. We had told her all the time that something like this was the cause of the delay, but she was so completely under the domination of her obsessions that she could not use her reason or her common sense.

So much for one example of her slavery. She has other obsessions on many other subjects, and I find her in the enslaved state sadly often.

This woman is an exaggerated case of obsession slavery, but I think a great many of us suffer in lesser degree from this mental disease. For that is what it is. We allow an idea to take possession of us and we become absolutely incapable of using reason on the subject. And that is not healthy or normal. We get an idea that we are going to lose our position; that some dear one no longer loves us; that we are losing our

mental keenness, or our grip on business, or our ability in some direction; that people dislike us or regard us with aversion; and we begin to hunt for evidence to support this idea. And in this kind of hunting one is always sure of bagging plenty of game.

By and by something happens to completely disprove our fears. Our employer gives us an unasked raise; the loved one offers some unusual and unmistakable proof of affection; we demonstrate our mental power or our grip on business or our talent, in some way indisputable even to ourselves; or we are brought face to face with some unexpected proof of our popularity; and then we say, "I'll never be so foolish again." And we are not—until the next time.

What's the cure for this common disease? Well the best cure, as for all diseases, is prevention. Cure it before you have it. Don't let yourself get into this habit of mind. When you find yourself brooding over anything like this, take your mind "by the scruff of the neck," as Arnold Bennett says, and put it on some other subject. Do this a hundred times, if necessary. You will never regret the effort.

"But what if the disease is already started?" some unhappy victim asks. Well, then, administer the same treatment, only more of it. Furthermore, when you have found that one of these obsessions was utterly foolish, write down that fact and keep the document where you can see it when the next attack starts. Don't let your attacks get under way. Nip them in the bud. Again, don't give yourself time to brood. Keep busy working and playing and being happy. When you feel an attack coming on, go out into God's serene outdoors and try to absorb some of its serenity. Take a long walk; try to get your body healthy and your mind will get some of the benefit. Go and call on some cheerful friend who will give you the contagion of his optimism, or visit some one less fortunate than you whose real troubles will shame your imaginary ones.

Selman Makes a Big Hit.

There is the strong intellectual company lawyer who has a sufficiency of professional pride to cast aside the lure of fees to act up to the nobility of his profession. There is the blustering, overbearing and insolent police captain, with the servile sergeant at his heels. Then there is the learned physician, and the society lady, willing to accept the sacrifice of another woman's reputation to shield her own cowardly self, and who has not sufficient strength of character to let her own good instincts lead her. The portrayal of these characters and the strong situations evolved as the plot develops make the play most interesting. We have not dealt with the work of Mr. Joseph Selman and his lady and gentlemen associates in the caste, suffice it to say that the company made a hit and were roundly and frequently applauded. Miss MacKenzie was well received as a soloist. Other opportunities will be afforded for a reference to the members of the company by name as we become better acquainted with their work.

A 24 year old laborer, drunk and disorderly in his mother's house, and (2) assaulting and beating Isabella Martin, was fined \$5 or 14 days on the first charge and \$10 or 30 days on the second.

A 50 year old seaman of Harbor Grace, drunk, was discharged.

Magistrate's Court.

Judgment was given in the case of the Municipal Council vs. J. J. McKay and others, to the effect that the tax must be paid by the promoters of the hockey matches between the St. John's team and the Windsor team.

Several civil matters were heard and disposed of.

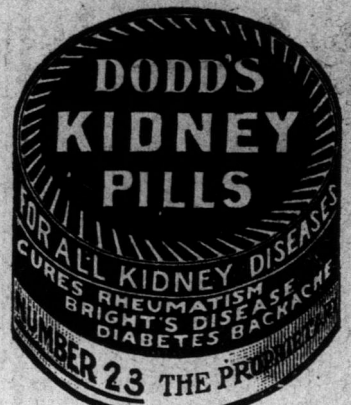

Supreme Court.

IMPORTANT JUDGMENT FILED YESTERDAY.

Nfld. Pine and Pulp Co. vs Anglo Nfld. Development Co.

Yesterday judgment was filed on the appeal from the judgment of Mr. Justice Johnson, who assessed the damages in favour of Nfld. Pine and Pulp Co. for \$5,000 and costs. The judgment on appeal is as follows:—

Therefore we assess the damages at 1,827,845 feet of lumber at \$8.50 per M., amounting in all to \$15,536.63, with costs of same to plaintiff.

The Seal From the Gulf.

The S. S. Seal, Capt. Farquhar, arrived in port last night from the Gulf sealfishery. The ship then managed to get down off the Magdalens and remained off Goose Island shoals in company with the Bloodhound and Viking. By the time they got clear, which was well up in March, the ice was beginning to break up and the young seals were taking to the water. On March 21st the Seal went south of the Magdalens Islands and struck the first patch of harps, securing 3,000 young and 200 old seals. She reports

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
BELFAST, April 8.
The reply from Protestant Ulster to Churchill and the Government's programme of Home Rule was given at several meetings, which began today, and will be continued tomorrow. The chief speaker was Bonar Law, who came here direct from London, and was greeted at the railway station by the largest turnout of Orangemen in the history of the city. Preparations have been made by the Orange faction for the meetings to eclipse both in numbers and enthusiasm the one held by Churchill when he outlined the Home Rule Bill. No disorders were feared, though heavy guards of police have been stationed in the National section of the city to protect property from possible assault. The Nationalist leaders have warned their followers to refrain from interfering with the programme of the Orangemen, explaining that disorder would be used as an argument against the Bill. No troops have been brought into the city but Curragh Camp is held in readiness for any trouble that might arise.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, April 8.
If the surface men's grievances can be settled there seems to be nothing to prevent the resumption of work throughout the coal fields of the United Kingdom. Protests from Yorkshire and Fifeshire miners against the decision of the Federation are not likely to be followed by action. Miners' associations of these countries have already recommended the men to return to work. Railway companies announce early restoration of normal services. Some indication of the ideas in the minds of labor leaders as to the future course of labor struggles was given to-day in a speech by Hartshorn in Wales. He declared the result of the coal strike would be the banding together of coal owners, railway magnates, manufacturers, land owners and capitalists of all kinds to coerce the Government into adopting legislation to prevent the workers from ever again holding up the nation. He declared miners must similarly bind themselves together with transport workers and railway men in preparation for the next fight, which, he said would be of a magnitude never before seen.

NEW YORK, April 8.
The Duke of Connaught and Premier Borden will officially start an aeroplane in an attempted flight across the Atlantic. The machine will start from Glace Bay on August 1st, the first stop being at Newfoundland.

PROVIDENCE, R.I., April 8.
The steamer Ontario, from Baltimore for Boston, was run ashore of Montauk Point, with fire in the hold. The passengers and crew are safe.

LONDON, April 8.
Anti-foreign riots have broken out in the Province of Shen Si, where many Mahomedans have been massacred.

A Tribute to the Commercial Cable Connection

In the course of his interesting speech at the Postal Telegraph dinner last night, Mr. J. T. Meaney dealt with three subjects which are worthy of special note. In referring to the contemplated installation by the Government of the telephone system in outports not served by telegraph, to be operated in conjunction with the Postal Telegraph system, and the possibility in the near future of the Government of the Colony having to take over the operation of the Marconi wireless stations in Newfoundland, he pointed out the necessity of having capable men to assume the duties of supervision of these utilities.

We have not, he said, in the service at present men to whom these duties can be entrusted, because the efficient and capable direction thereof demands trained men, and the training necessary for it cannot be obtained in this Colony. If we hope to be in a position should the occasion arise, to have capable men to place in charge of these departments we should take time by the forelock and select two young men from the Postal Department and send them to Canada or the United States to study these branches. It is no reflection upon the Postal staff to-day that none are qualified for this work, because the opportunity to qualify themselves in these branches has not been theirs; but it will be a reflection, not only upon the Postal service, but upon the Colony as a whole, if within a year or two hence we are obliged to import men from the United States, Canada or England to superintend this work which our men are capable of doing, if given the opportunity to learn.

It was also interesting to hear from a practical telegrapher that the Cuckhold's Cove cable connection is a valuable asset to the Colony, in so far as it is the one practically unfailing medium of communication with the outside world, direct from this city to the Continent of America and to Europe. Unlike the Canso and Heart's Content cable connections, it does not have to depend on long land line communication, which owing to the severity of the storms in this direction is liable to prolonged interruption, cutting us off from telegraphic communication with the outside world for weeks at a time.

In this respect, he pointed out, the Postal holds an enviable position, the advantages of which to the commercial interests of the country could not be overestimated.

This, we may remark, is the cable connection which the late Government procured for the Colony, the terms of the contract for the operation of which were repudiated by the present administration.

Mother and 3 Children Lose Their Lives.

Toronto, March 26.—Amelia Orr and her three children, Willie, aged 8, Mabel, 6 and Margaret, 4 years, were found dead this evening at their home, 28 Sackville Place, having been overcome with gas. All were fully dressed. A stop cock had been removed with a wrench and the gas allowed to escape. James Orr, the husband, who is a blacksmith, says his wife showed signs two years ago of mental weakness and of self-destruction.

The Rosalind should have reached Halifax last night but no word of her doing so has yet been received.

S. W. Coast FISHERY NEWS.

We learn that there has been excellent fishing done during the past week on the South West Coast in the neighbourhood of Burgeo, Ramca and Rose Blanche and that there has been a decided change in the stormy weather existing the week previous which prevented operations. Handliners averaged from two to five quintals daily and trawlers from ten to twelve quintals in the waters around Rose Blanche. Two fishing schooners belonging to Fortune and Belleoram have returned from their first voyage with good fares, and we hear that a couple of other local bankers from that section have already the products of their spring trip under sail.

We are told all the handliners engaged on the fishing grounds mentioned are keeping their winter and spring catch in salt bulk to dispose of to the Gorton Pew Company when their agent visits there.

As already noted she put into Channel on Saturday last and reported for 3,200 and the catches of all the other ships were reported as well. The Seal left Channel on March 10th and working her way down to the Bird Rocks encountered heavy ice. The ship then managed to get down off the Magdalens and remained off Goose Island shoals in company with the Bloodhound and Viking. The next day all three ships moved to the westward and became jammed for a fortnight. By the time they got clear which was well up in March, the ice was beginning to break up and the young seals were taking to the water. On March 31st the Seal went south of the Magdalen Islands and struck the first patch of hawks, securing 3,000 young and 200 old seals. She reports

QUARTERLY REPORT

Of Board of Trade, March 31st, 1912. (Synopsis and Extracts.)

Yesterday the Quarterly Report of the Board of Trade was taken up for discussion. In order to facilitate the work of the Council the quorum was reduced from 7 to 5 as recommended. As to the Resolutions about Customs Bonds passed on February 22nd, last, the Government so far has taken no action.

DUTIES.

"In the past, when reductions in duties have been made, no notice has been given of the intended change, and importers who have had their duties in good faith have found themselves put to considerable loss. The Council has therefore written to the Government, pointing out the injustice of the proceeding and requesting that at least three months' notice should be given when duties are to be reduced thus giving importers a chance to realize stocks upon which the higher duties had been paid."

CHATEL MORTGAGES.

"A great deal of consideration has been given to the laws dealing with the Registration of Mortgages, especially in regard to Chattel or Stock in Trade Mortgages. Representations had been made by the late Council to the Government on the matter, but further inquiry disclosed the necessity for still more drastic alterations in our laws than were at first proposed. Under our present laws a creditor may give preferential security to a particular creditor without the knowledge or consent of his other creditors. The new Stock in Trade Mortgage valid it is only necessary that it shall have been in existence two months before registration. The law does not require that it shall be registered within a specified time after execution, and the consequence is that a general creditor has no means of learning of the existence of a mortgage which in his opinion should be void. The first Resolution forwarded to the Government asked for greater facility in obtaining information from the Registrar's Office, and that a Stock in Trade Mortgage should be registered within 5 days of execution and not become valid until 14 days thereafter. But it will be seen the fraudulent Stock in Trade Mortgage still will be given. It may also be said that every stock in Trade Mortgage eventually becomes an instrument of doubtful probity, although perfectly legitimate in the first instance. The Council has therefore called the attention of the Government to this matter, and requested that our laws shall be amended to prevent, as far as possible, the issuance of preferential Stock in Trade Mortgages, and to facilitate the obtaining of information from the Registrar's Office. The Council recommends the appointment of a Statistical Clerk by the Government and has forwarded a list of statistics which in its opinion should be collected."

HARBOR FIRE BOAT.

"The principal Fire Insurance Companies doing business here, insist that a Fire Boat shall be procured and threaten to raise the rates unless it is done, which might mean additional fire insurance premiums to the amount of \$25,000 to \$50,000 per annum. The cost of the boat is estimated at \$10,000 and the cost of keeping at about \$10,000 per annum. Theoretically, the Municipal Council should be responsible for the protection of the City from fire, but you are aware, the Fire Department is by Statute under the control of the Government. The Municipal Council has no money available for the purpose, and cannot raise money without Legislative permission, and so far, it has proved impossible to get the Government to realize the seriousness of the position. In any case ultimately, citizens will have to pay for the boat, and the Council has suggested that the property which would be protected should be taxed to pay for the service. The area protected would be the South Side, the Dock Premises and the North Side from the South Side of Duckworth St to the Harbor. A very small addition to the rates in this area would be sufficient to cover the cost of protection, and would save a very much heavier tax in increased Fire Insurance. The city being without the protection in addition, the Council is now informed that there will probably be no difficulty in making the required arrangements."

WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

The Council recommends that a special committee shall deal with the difference in the weights and measures of staple articles for general sale. For instance, cattle feeds range in weight from 35 to 45 lbs. per sack. Paints are sold in 25 and 35 Gallon Cans, shot is sold in 25 and 28 lb. bags, nails in 25 and 28 lb. bags and condensed milk is put up in cans of various weights.

FISH EXPORTS.

"The export of codfish from July 1st, 1911, to November 31st, 1912, has been 1,024,946 quintals. Last year the shipments from April 1st to June 30th, were about 125,000 quintals, and the export for the next three months will be about the same. It will indicate a total export of 1,150,000 quintals for the twelve months. The export for the whole year for the year ending June 30th, 1911, 1,502,269 for 1910, and 1,732,387 for 1909."

WINTER FISHERY.

"The Winter Fishery on the South Coast has been good. U. S. vessels have continued to buy haddock and green fish, thus reducing the quantity of fish to be sent to Oporto and the Mediterranean in June and July."

NORWEGIAN FISHERY.

"The Norwegian Fishery to date is \$4,000,000 as against 28,000,000 last year at the same period. The total catch last year was 50,000,000, so that there is every prospect of there being a very large increase in this fishery. The whole increase will not take the form of dried fish, as a large proportion of the catch is marketed in other

To-Day's News.

Special to Evening Telegram. PHILADELPHIA, To-day. Orders were being issued by Union District Inspectors, Shamokin, calling off all repair work on the Schuylkill district after Wednesday, the date set for the conference at Philadelphia. There will be no interference with pump men and workmen needed to prevent damage to property, until after the result of the conference has become known, when it is said they intended to suspend everything in case there is no prospect of an agreement being reached.

AVESNES, France, To-day. Seven women and children were killed following a panic in a concert hall, caused by an outbreak of fire. Fifteen other women and children were injured.

SYDNEY, N.S.W., To-day. Langford, the Nova Scotia colourist and heavyweight, yesterday defeated McVey, coloured, Californian, in a 20 round fight on points.

Mrs. Rossley, Percy Orth, Joe, the formidable Joe Burkhardt, and Bonnie Rossley made a huge success with their new act, The Pierrots Carnival, and received applause in abundance; the costumes beautiful, the pictures good and the music furnished by the Star Orchestra now the strongest orchestra in this city; was all that could be desired. In conclusion we wish Jack and his jolly little wife everything that is good.

It is interesting to learn how far this large fishery is being increased outside of the high prices ruling lately. From Mr. Simonsen we learn that there has been an enormous increase in the loss of business and used in the Norwegian fishery, there being last year 757 of from 15 to 20 tons, each carrying 3 to 4 dorics, as against 136 in 1909. The Council also informs us that the principal increase in the fishery is in places where these motor cutters are used."

U. S. MARKET.

"It is interesting to know that the fish channels in S. S. vessels is being dried cured as we endeavor to make it, but it is sold cured in boxes and packets of various descriptions. The cured fish is not only more hygienic than that which has undergone the vicissitudes of continued spreading and drying, and is vastly more appetizing. It seems probable that Fish of this description would make well in other markets were it introduced."

MEDITERRANEAN MARKETS.

"The Haves and LeMessurier agencies in the Mediterranean, which were started under the aegis of the Board of Trade, have continued to do most useful work. Every fisherman in the Island derives some benefit from these Agencies in the increased value of his fish."

LOBSTER FISHERY.

"The scheme initiated by the Government for the preservation of the Lobster Fishery by purchasing the male lobster and returning it to the water, if faithfully carried out, seems likely to stop the wicked waste which has been going on in that valuable fishery."

H. M. S. ELINOR.

"In the first quarterly Report of last year, mention was made of the work of H. M. Ship, Elinor. The Council wishes to express its appreciation of the very excellent and valuable work which has been done in the accurate charting of the coast of Newfoundland. The Council trusts that the vessel, which is now on the Labrador Coast and also that at least one season shall be devoted to locating off-shore banks which may prove new and valuable fishing grounds."

BOARD AND COUNCIL.

"The Board of Trade has been established now for two and a half years and the Council feels that its existence has been more than justified. The Council regrets to report, however, that the membership is still far short of what it ought to be, and not sufficient to pay its expenses. Every commercial man in the Island should become a member, and should feel assured that the \$10 per annum he subscribes to the Board is among his best investments. As a meeting place for our merchants in the city, it should be most useful. The single-minded aim of each successive Council has been to improve the Island for the benefit of the whole island, giving to that endeavour a great deal of time and study without any personal advantage of any sort."

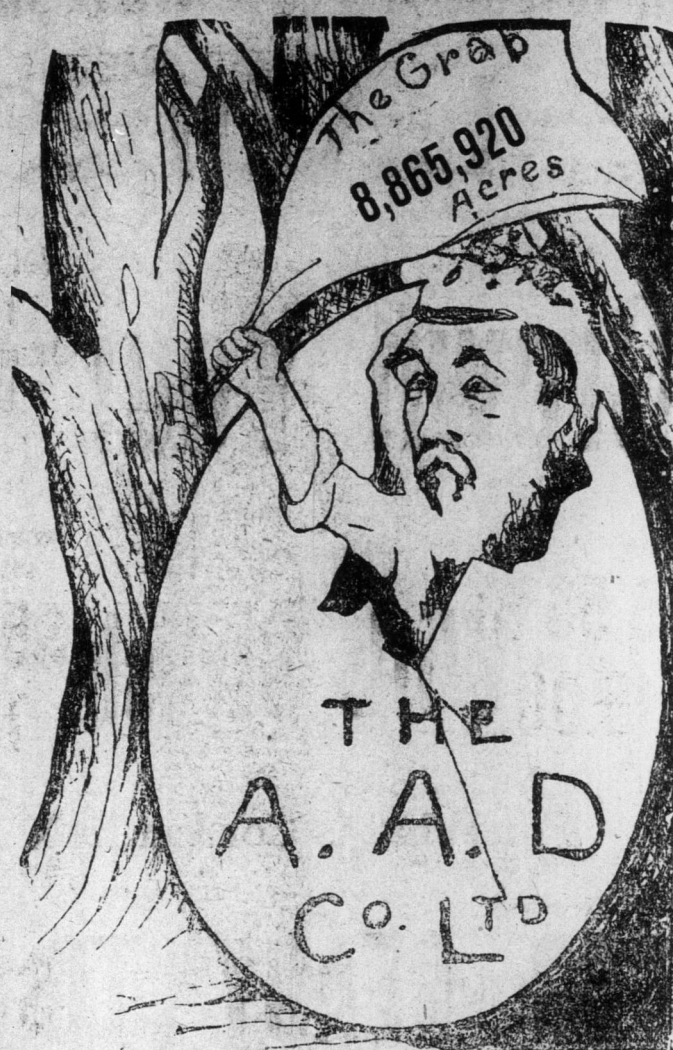

You as leader of this party have a great deal to do and we expect much of you. Already we can hear the sound of

battle in our ears, for glance at the papers to-night and you will see that we are just entering upon the fight. It therefore behoves us to get a gait on and keep our peepers levelled and take in the situation. Don't get excited, say I, there's a lot of time yet for ye to get your powder ready; many's the fine strappin' man will take to himself a wife before the houses get plastered with posters for next election day, and don't you forget it.

You can't deny, says Delaney, as he nearly hauled over the lamp with a cloud of smoke, that the papers look electionary to-night. Why, man alive, the Chronicle got out of the election type that was buried since the last contest, and sure the Herald is out showing what the Sealers' Hospital cost; and by the way did ye read the items in that? Well, if ye didn't, says Delaney, ye ought, for there's barrels of fun in reading these things. Ye will see an item charged to the Government always ends up with thirty-one cents. Nine hundred and sixteen dollars for pans, we'll say and don't forget the thirty-two cents. That's the kind of thing, says Delaney, that shows ye how hard 'tis to get Government pap. You're driven so hard that it comes down to cents, and sometimes they split a copper in two halves when a tender is close. Oh 'tis something fearful, says Delaney; simply heart-rending how these poor men who tendered for the Sealers' Hospital were driven; every item in that list has a tail of odd cents on to it. 'Tis wonderful how they stand it at all, at all. Why if this thing goes on, says Delaney, we'll

have no one going in for Government contracts. Look here, Delaney, said the Cute Man, the older you're getting the foolisher you're looking. Why don't you use your brains? Sure, man alive, what kind of an omdawn would he be who'd be foolish enough to tender for a job from the Government on even dollars without having a few odd cents tacked on? Sure that's all they make out of it, and if they didn't get the 32 or 43 cents, as the case may be, why, man alive, they'd have nothing for themselves. Surely you don't find fault with a contractor who puts in his little bill of say three thousand four hundred and twenty-two dollars having forty cents profit; and it only goes to prove how fine things are getting done around here and how hard it must be for these poor people to make the two ends meet.

I could never understand, says Mrs. Tucker, how it is that for the first couple of years a Government is if we don't hear any grumbling about them worth while, but just as soon as the time draws nigh for another spasm, behold the activity! The first couple of years after the election you can see opposition members and Government lucky ones holding good, fat jobs, trotting along together, smiling sweetly, almost hugging one another. You will see them pig by jowl going to church, or coming out of the Nickel together. They'll meet at the Races and drink sober drinks and puff cigars, play billiards at the club and go to one another's funeral, but just as soon as the clouds begin to gather—just as the man knocks at your door to get your husband's name and find out what he's working at; when the poorly-paid enumerator fumbles with a short piece of lead pencil, 'tis then a change comes o'er the scene. Then said Mrs. Tucker, aspirants for seats in the House go in covays and silek religiously to men of their own party as chums. The old-timer politician who has fought and won and who again saw the votes counted and discovered that he was down and out now polishes himself up a bit in order to attract the attention and win back the esteem of the "free and independent." All Government members and Opposition stand anew to play their parts.

Oh you have the bill by the horns, says Delaney. Politicians mix together and forget old differences for the first two years or so, but you must admit that they have their certain political differences just the same. Be off with you, says Mrs. Tucker. They wouldn't know "political convictions" if they met 'em to a fire. Get in the swim and run along in the glorious tide that leads on to the biggest amount of hard cash; that's the political convictions that we see as a rule in this Island Home of ours. Ye can't wink out of sight the great lesson taught in the two last elections. Just for example we will take the district of Piacentia. Now the people of Piacentia threw up their caps and bowed themselves homage for Bond in the first election; they elected Jackman and his colleagues with a

good majority; they said out plainly and forcibly that they firmly believed that the party led by Bond was the party to save the country. But they find after the election that both parties come in a tie, and when the second election comes off, they go back on their "political convictions" and vote for the other side. Now I'd like for some ancient long-whiskered philosopher to arise and show me where "political convictions" counted with these people. 'Twas simply a case of wanting to be on the Government side for what they could get out of it; simply that, said Mrs. Tucker, and nothing more.

There's a lot in what Mrs. Tucker says, said I, and I'd advise you to take your time before throwing up your hats this time. Never before did ye get a better opportunity to make politics pay ye than at the coming political fight. Don't run into the contest too quickly, for by the look of it now we will have four or five parties in the field, and you know where there is a great deal of rivalry there is always a good chance to get your price. Stand back from the bias a bit and look wise; throw out your chest and look important, and you will be sought after and pampered. Don't run when a big politician beckons to you for the first time. Don't make tracks without having your supper when you get a note from some big fellow of any party. Size him up and see what there is in it for you; pretend to be indifferent, and you'll get your price. Watch them that you see them get good eyesight, and notice how soon they are able to find out the number of your house. You will feel the warm clasp of their well-greased palms many times; they will fall over you and inquire how are all home. Keep cool, play them at their own game, and for once if your life have sense and ask yourself—How much is there in it for me? For we are all sick and tired of hauling men with ropes; all players out from shouldering house-flags tied to knotty pickets; all slewed on one side from hugging torch lights; now let us take a tumble and ask our selves where do we come in? 'Tis the poor foolish fellow with one suit o' clothes that makes enemies for himself; 'tis the man that lugs the draft barrow on the wharf that loses sleep over the policy of a party; 'tis the man who wrestles with a hog'shead o' coal in the cupboard that spends his energy in drumming up votes and waits till two o'clock in the morning for the poll to be declared, while the genteel dandy goes to bed and dreams of a soft job to be had no matter which party goes under. So, there fore, I'd advise ye to take your time. Let them rave about coal areas that will be discovered in the next century; let them bleed for the land o' their birth, as thousands have 'bled' before, but you wait and watch your chance, and when the opportunity ofers, jump in the boat that's going to win. 'There's no other kind of "political conviction" that counts worth a cent in this country, and the man that thinks there is makes the mistake of his life. Don't about to 'loud; keep a dignified air and look wise; pretend you're twice as important as you really are. This do, and then you will reap your reward.

In Defence Of Trinity.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Mr. Editor,—In last Saturday's issue of the Fishermen's Advocate we noticed an item headed "Englee," in which was contained another insolent reference to the Town of Trinity. Now, as we are thoroughbred Trinitarians, we strongly resent such sneering allusions.

In the past the Editor has referred to the business community of Trinity as "grab-balls" and "soreheads," and now his latest as "peddlars."

We contend, sir, that the business people of Trinity are as honourable, straightforward and energetic as any other business people of this Colony, including the all-energetic Editor of the Fishermen's Advocate.

As regards his references to the spur line into Trinity, does not the editor know (if he does not, as an editor, he ought to) that Trinity is the centre of a population of some 4,000 people who inhabit all those settlements extending from the Horse Chops to Bonaventure Head. The people, chiefly fishermen, of these adjacent places visit Trinity daily for transaction of business, therefore the spur line which the editor of the Advocate begrudges Trinity so much will not only benefit the 439 persons of Trinity but all these places besides, to say the least. If the editor knows anything of the geography of Trinity Bay he can soon picture to himself the number of settlements that are in the neighbourhood of Trinity and the people of which, speaking generally, look up and down to Trinity as "his quarters for everything," from a needle to an anchor or a shirt button to a beaver.

If the spur line does not come into Trinity the railway will be of little or no advantage to the people of Trinity and consequently those resident in the places indicated, four or five thousand people will be cut off for ever and ever from the benefits of a railway for which so much money of the Colony is being spent.

We wish to be understood, Mr. Editor, that we are not finding fault with the editor of the Advocate and his work generally or with the residents of Conche with respect to their grievances, but we do not like to see those periodically sneering references to the town and people of Trinity.

The business people of Trinity are not trying to retard the progress of the F. P. U. in any way; rather they are in full sympathy with it and if they do not appear to be so enthusiastic about it as the editor of the Advocate, the reason is obvious—they are too busy minding their own business.

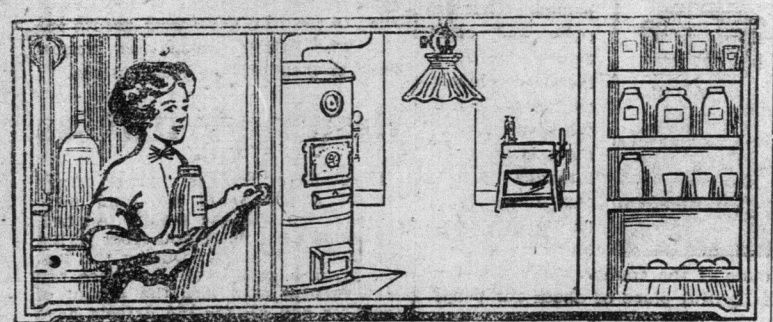
