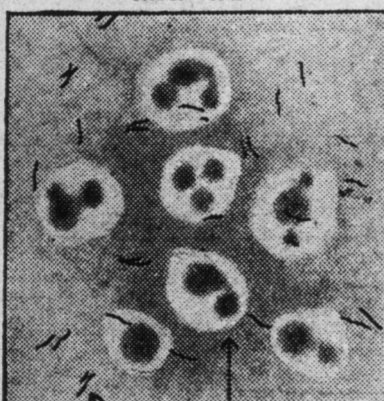

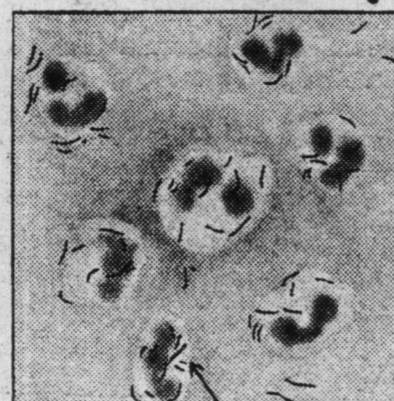

The Intolerance of Tolerance.

By RUTH CAMERON.

Said one of my young friends: "She is so intolerant. There are times when, if she were not so much older than I, I should call her just what I think of her and her narrow views. She has no sympathy with people who think differently from her. I do so hate intolerance."

I wonder how many of us are just like my young friend—possessed of a hatred of intolerance in somebody else.

The tolerant person is the person who "puts up" with everything and everybody. He has his own views; he allows others the same privilege.

The so-called, or perhaps I should say self-called tolerant person, is more often the person who is intolerant of somebody else's intolerance.

The Puritans, resenting the lack of religious tolerance in England fled to America. In their homes one might have expected to find religious tolerance. But there was none. The Puritans seeking religious tolerance for themselves, were, for their part, as

intolerant of others as their own persecutors had been.

The moment we actively resent or actively attempt to remove anybody else's "intolerance," we are simply letting ourselves become intolerant in turn. We attempt to impress our views on them, which is in itself the very essence of intolerance.

It is true of course that there are times when one must be intolerant for one's own good. A community, for instance, that becomes too tolerant of political abuse, would be overrun by grafting executives.

We should be intolerant of injustice, of deceit, of lying and of many things where it is universally agreed intolerance is wise.

But where we need tolerance—real tolerance—is where there is ground for an honest difference of opinion. That you, of a younger generation perhaps, have no use for the "old-fashioned" views of your elders, does not necessarily brand their views as wrong, any more than their intolerance of your "newfangled" views makes them right.

And if you feel inclined to criticize intolerance, first ask yourself if there is any intolerance on our part in doing so.

Buffalo Jones

Off to Lasso Gorillas.—A Lady "Reporter" in the Party.

Colonel "Buffalo" Jones, the famous lion-roper, who in his time has captured with the lasso lions, rhinoceroses, hippopotami, leopards and panthers, is going to try his practiced hand on a new quarry, the gorilla, one of the most ferocious, as it is the least known of animals. The veteran hunter of the Wild West, who has spent his life facing every kind of wild animal with no other weapon save his lasso, is in London preparing for an expedition to rope gorillas in the French Congo. Four years ago he headed an expedition to British East Africa, where lions and rhinoceroses and rhinoceroses were "lassoed" by the party, as Mr. Cherry Kearton's remarkable photographs afterwards showed. The dangers of this expedition can hardly be exaggerated. Though young gorillas have been brought alive to Europe, fully grown gorillas have never been seen alive in captivity. It is the largest of the man-like apes, and when fully grown is about seven feet high and weighs some 700 pounds. It has a fearsome face, the eyes overhung by a bearding ridge of bone; it is covered with a blackish kind of hair, and is known to be extremely strong, savage and morose.

Raids on Native Women.

It has been known to carry off native women to its nest in the trees of the jungle, whence the women never return. Its roar is described by those who have heard it as being terrific—far louder than that of the lion. The Buffalo Jones expedition is taking a graphophone with it to obtain the first "roar-croak" of gorillas. Buffalo Jones has deep-set glittering eyes, as steady and as quick as the eyes of a wild beast, which look out fearlessly above a hawk-like nose. His face is deeply lined and with his straggling grey hair he looks his age, which is high on seventy, but his bodily and mental alertness is that of a man in his prime. The expedition, consisting of Buffalo Jones, Mr. and Mrs. Meas, Mr. Macdonald, and Mr. and Mrs. Spence, leaves Liverpool very shortly for Cape Lopez, in the French Congo. Buffalo Jones introduced us recently to Meas, a typical "roper-in" southerner that and all, with the blood of the Cherokee Indians in his veins.

Household Notes

Needlewomen who suffer from damp hands will find it an excellent plan to rub the palms of the hands occasionally with a solution of borax in a little alcohol. When sewing, keep a sponge saturated with the solution at hand and occasionally squeeze it in the palms of the hands. One's hands can be kept from becoming red by taking precautions. Never expose them to extremes of heat or cold. Avoid tight gloves. Use moderately warm water to wash them. After drying, rub equal parts of lemon juice and glycerine into gloves when dusting or handling ashes.

such as automobile grease, from children's clothes. The greasy portion of cloth is laid in a small basin and the spot covered with kerosene. Let it stand for an hour or so, then rub the cloth between the hands until the greasy spot disappears. To clean a sewing machine, use plenty of kerosene. Fill your oil can with it and oil carefully every working part that you can reach. Then sew rapidly on some useless piece of goods to distribute the oil. Then take a chamois skin, or a soft piece of cloth that will not leave lint, and wipe up all the surplus oil.

Spinach soufflé is made by mixing a cupful of cold, cooked, chopped spinach with the well-beaten yolk of an egg; then stir over the fire until the egg is set. Cool, then fold in the stiffly beaten whites of three eggs. Fill a buttered baking dish or individual soufflé dishes, and bake ten or fifteen minutes. Serve immediately. Carafes can be washed in the following way: Half fill with hot soap-suds, to which add one teaspoon of washing soda. Put in newspaper, torn in small pieces. Let stand one-half hour, shaking occasionally. Empty outside and let stand to dry on side.

When cleaning currants, first run them into a large bowl, and to every pound of currants add a half cup of flour, mix the flour thoroughly through the fruit, and then rub them between the hands until all the stems are rubbed off; then scald, wash in cold water, drain, spread on a pie dish and stand in a cool oven, with the door open, to dry.

Submarine Boats.

Author of "At Good Old Swash." A submarine boat is a boat which dives below the surface of the water and occasionally comes back.

Submarines were invented during the civil war by the confederates and proved to be one of the most devastating of weapons for the Union forces. As fast as enough superior heroic rebels could be gathered together to man a submarine, they would take it down below the surface for a trial trip. Later it would be raised by a derrick and the confederates would kindly report a verdict of accidental death.

Since then submarines have been greatly improved and it is now possible to live in them for whole days, while they are lying on the bottom of the sea. However, in the end the result is usually the same. A great many very brave men have been killed by these awful war machines, but unfortunately they have all been inside the vessels.

The submarine is supposed to slip quietly beneath the surface and to come up later beneath a battleship and blow it several thousand miles past Jerico at one blast. Possibly it may do this some day when there is enough war in the world to allow the boats and a submarine to meet in an unfriendly manner. In the meanwhile, however, the submarine continues to live peacefully for the bottom and to lie there as contentedly as a catfish feeding in the muddy bed of the Missouri River.

The United States owns a large number of submarines which have been far more humane than those of most countries. They travel long distances and do not sink except at the word of command. In the United States, the aeroplane has proved much more fatal to our brave defenders than the submarine, but in foreign nations the self-diving boat is the favorite method of producing quick promotions in the navy.

What is a terrible thing, but not much more terrible than the fear of war, which makes it necessary to stuff a few dozen nery men into a submarine vessel every few months and lay them away to soak in the bottom of the ocean.

Seeley's Guarantee Repudiated.

The Secretary of State for War, Colonel Seeley, made terms with General Gough and his rebellious officers. Those terms were made without the consent of the Ministry. This is clear from Premier Asquith's first statement to the House of Commons, that Cabinet Ministers had carefully abstained from giving officers any assurances. This statement was in direct conflict to the address of General Gough to the officers in which he said he had a written pledge that they would not be employed to force Home Rule on Ulstermen. The Premier was wrong and Gough was right. The Premier stated later in the discussion that his statements to the effect that the officers should return to duty unconditionally were made in good faith, since he was not aware when he made it of Seeley's amendment to the cabinet's memorandum. On the face of it, however, Seeley's statement appears to be harmless in the words themselves, if he is correctly reported, and hurtful only from the circumstances under which they were given, as liable to the interpretation which Gough and Asquith and Grey placed upon them under those circumstances. According to that report, Seeley made the statement, evidently in writing, that the Government had no intention whatever of taking advantage of their control of the army to crush political opposition to the policy or principles of the Home Rule Bill. Such a policy is sound and statesmanlike, and so far as we can gather from the reports of what the Premier and Sir Edward Grey said has not been repudiated. It could not be repudiated by statesmen who had a consciousness of their responsibility. The converse shows how untenable such an attitude would be. It would be monstrous and utterly unconstitutional for a Government supported by parties in Parliament to use the army or the navy, or both, to promote party tactics, and is such a vicious course was adopted, it would merit the disapprobation of all citizens who had the welfare of the country at heart. What was repudiated was something quite different to which the written pledge of the Secretary of War had given colour, in the form of a condition under which the rebellious officers were to continue to serve, and that was that these officers were not to be called upon to enforce Home Rule should it become law. Colonel Seeley is stated to have frankly declared he made a great mistake in giving such a pledge.

Viscount Morley made the attitude of the Government clear in stating that Colonel Seeley's pledge would be withdrawn and General Gough would be notified of what had been done. Sir Edward Grey said the Government was prepared to use force to whatever extent it is required to make the will of the people prevail. He is evidently referring to the time the Home Rule Bill will become law.

The Premier, in referring to the same contingency, is also clear, and emphatic, stating he would not assent

to the claim of any body of men in the service of the Crown to demand assurances of what they should be required to do in circumstances which had not arisen.

While the Government cannot constitutionally use the army or navy as a chess piece in the game of politics, they are within their rights in taking precautions to protect life and property, preserve order, and maintain the law, against any acts of sedition and rebellion, and there can be no doubt that such acts are being perpetrated in the North of Ireland, and that the Carsonites are indulging in lawless acts of conspiracy, sedition and rebellion and are not conducting their opposition in the legitimate way of political opposition, and by doing so they have afforded the Government good grounds to take proper precautions to preserve order. At the same time the Government has been lax in taking such precautions and they have allowed matters to drift until rebellion is in sight. The situation is however and has been most difficult. We do not despair of a compromise yet, and we believe the King has acted wisely and as in duty bound as mediator to find a way out between the opposing political factions on the Home Rule question. The desideratum is Home Rule by consent and not by bayonets, and both parties are sufficiently near to one another to find a way out without a resort to civil war. In regard to the alleged action of the King in regard to the rebellious army officers, we are not inclined to think His Majesty has made any such mistake, especially in view of Premier Asquith's statement exonerating the King and the retention of not only Colonel Seeley in office, but his retention of office himself.

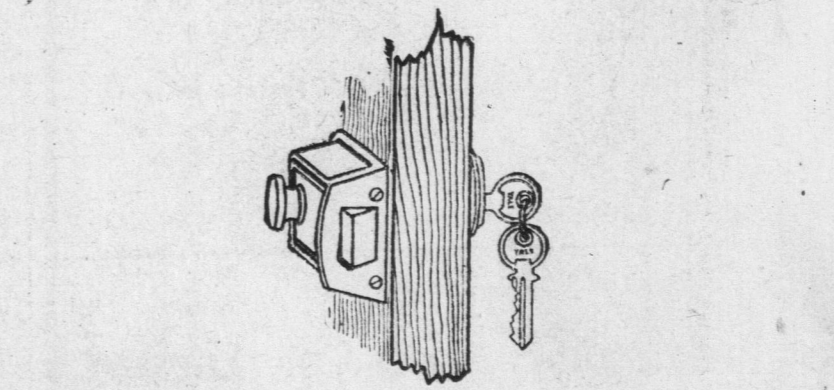

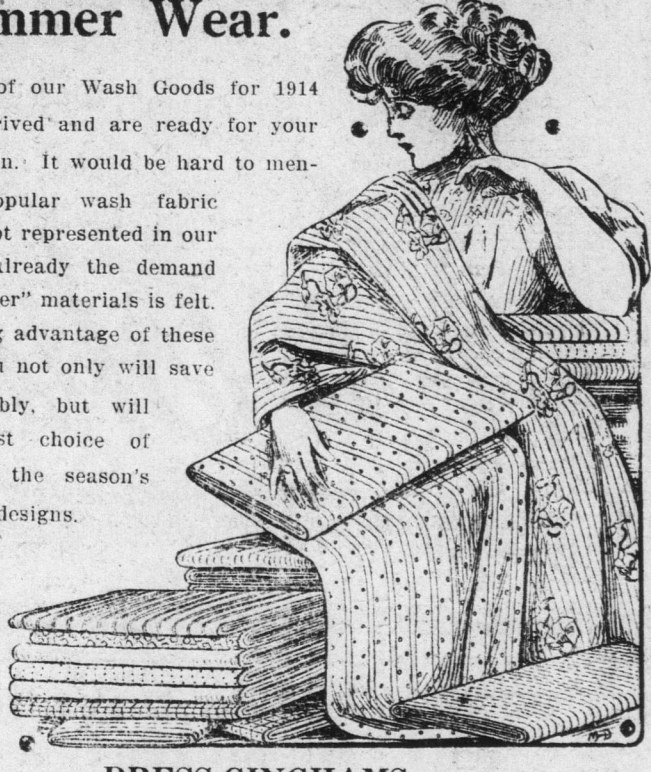

New Invention Makes Sea Safe.

A remarkable invention pregnant with useful possibilities is the wireless long-distance mirror. Its purpose, in brief, is to convey an image in the same manner that sounds are now communicated.

It is a radical improvement on the old-time camera obscura, a structure in which the real image of an object is projected upon a white table or other plane surface. Not only does the new apparatus reflect on a mirror all objects located and all happenings occurring within a much greater area than the camera obscura, but it operates at night.

Just how the machine works has not yet been revealed, but it is known to consist of a web of wires attached to a tall mast, and it is this web which receives the impressions and projects them on the mirror located at the base of the mast.

The principal value of the new apparatus will be in its application to ships. It is expected to prevent collisions with other ships, icebergs, or derelicts by disclosing the whereabouts of such dangers to the lookout long before the vessel comes within striking distance. The image of every object within a radius of two or three miles is thrown on to the mirror, and at night or in fog the value of such an apparatus to the mariner could hardly be overestimated.

It is claimed, too, that the long-distance mirror would prove a valuable aid to armies in time of war. A test was recently made at Vallejo, California, and the instrument was said to accomplish all that had been claimed for it. The night was dark, but a perfect picture of the district within a radius of two miles was clearly shown on the mirror. All the activities of the Maco Island navy yard, railway trains passing up and down the valley, and pedestrians in the city streets were clearly shown.

LONDON, To-day.

The view of the Liberal morning papers is that though yesterday was the blackest day the Government had experienced in its whole existence, now the air has cleared, and the Government is rehabilitated in a stronger position than ever. The Daily News says it may be that the Curragh incident by which the Opposition hoped to destroy the Government Parliament Act and popular liberties at one blow will be found to have been one of the most fortunate episodes for the Government in this prolonged struggle. The express asserts that all general officers commanding divisions throughout England are under orders to report to the War Office to-day. The Morning Post is still insisting on the existence of a plot, and urging Unionists in Parliament to compel the Government to divulge the nature of the verbal instructions given to Paget. It argues that Seeley's real motive and aim was to prevent a disclosure of the plot. The Post believes Asquith refused to accept Seeley's resignation because Lord Morley was also involved. Labor papers are dissatisfied at the official execution of the King. The lobby correspondent of the Daily News says Seeley added the two offending paragraphs just after he had been in conference with the King at Buckingham Palace.

LONDON, To-day.

Never within my long life has there been anything like so critical a position as to-day, declared Sir Charles Tupper, I am satisfied that the Government will be compelled to go to the country, but I doubt exceedingly if they will be able then to carry a majority. One of the greatest objections to the Home Rule Bill apart from the Ulster situation, continued Sir Charles, is that Britain as much as Canada, requires Federal Government, that is a representation of Scotland, Ireland, Wales and England by legislatures dealing with local affairs, while the Parliament at Westminster would deal only with national business. The present Irish Bill destroys that possibility because it gives Ireland what nobody would dream of giving to Scotland or Wales, control of the post office and customs. The passage of the Bill would prove a fatal obstacle to any Bill providing a general Federal scheme for the rest of the Kingdom.

LONDON, To-day.

Lord Morley, of Blackburn, during a speech in the Lords made the important admission that the two un-censored paragraphs added to the Gough letter were drafted by Colonel Seeley, in consultation with himself. The Conservative morning papers commenting on this admission, contend that Morley who holds the office of Lord President of the Council, ought also to resign.

Lives Lost by Laughing.

An accident, said to be the most extraordinary on record, occurred at some oil fields in the Baku district of Russia, on the borders of the Caspian Sea. One of the big "gushers" of wells became choked, and, with a view of blowing it clear, a number of iron drums full of nitro-glycerine were brought down by rail from Derbend, and deposited over night in a large shed, which was used by the men as a sort of canteen.

The steward of this establishment, a Greek named Darlos, opened one of the drums for some reason best known to himself, and "decanted" a small quantity of the dangerous liquid into a long thin glass used for mixing vodka. This he placed on a shelf behind the bar. Shortly afterwards there entered a workman named Borvitch, who was famous for the boisterous hilarity of his manner, and especially for his loud, resonant laughter.

The sight of nitro-glycerine in a vodka tumbler so excited his risibility, that he gave vent to a series of stentorian guffaws. This set the half-filled glass "ringing," and the treacherous contents immediately exploded.

The concussion sufficed, in its turn, to explode the rest of the stuff in the drums, entirely demolishing the shed, and killing five persons, all who were in it at the time. The barman escaped through having gone down into the cellar just previously, whence he distinctly heard the laughing, followed by the musical "ringing" of the thin tumbler and the two explosions.

more generous friends. The best of these was John Pennington Thomasson, formerly M.P. for Bolton, who presented him with several large sums, amounting in one instance to £7,000.

The romantic story of Disraeli and Mrs. Drydges Williams is another case in point. There was a spice of mystery in this which appealed to Disraeli, says the Manchester Courier; the assignations pressed on him by the lady with increasing fervour till he went to meet her, the envelope containing a £1,000 note thrust into his hands, and the beguets at a critical time in his life of the whole of the lady's fortune—all this belongs to the realms of fiction rather than of workaday fact.

The elder Pitt enjoyed two political windfalls. Under the will of that old termagant, Sarah Duchess of Marlborough, he received £10,000 "for the noble defence he made for the support of the laws of England." At a later stage in his career Pitt was left an estate of some £3,000 by Sir William Pynsent, whom he had never met and with whom he had never corresponded.

A Profitable Volcano.

The Republic of San Salvador is the only Government on earth that collects lighthouse fees on account of a volcano that it owns—and without the slightest cost of upkeep.

The volcanic beacon is about eight miles inland from the port of Acajutla, and its pillar of cloud by day and of fire by night is visible for many miles out at sea. It bursts forth every seven minutes, and is just as accurate as any revolving light that warns mariners of danger in any part of the world. Every vessel that puts in at Acajutla has to pay its lighthouse fee. There is no other lighthouse than the volcano, but that is a sufficient excuse for the Government of San Salvador to make the regulation charge for its gratuitous services.

THE GREATER QUESTION.

At this season of the year for Farmers with up-to-date ideas is, what are the best means to use to get the best returns from the land.

Fertilizers must be used liberally if large returns are looked for. There are several good chemical fertilizers which may be recommended, but Sulphate of Ammonia has been proved to give the best returns, and is the most valuable and economical source of Nitrogen for agricultural purposes.

For vegetables, grass, and all leafy crops, about one and a half cwt. per acre is the best quantity to use, and this should be applied when the plant is making its growth, as well as before sowing the seed.

If a liquid manure is preferred, a 1/4 oz. of Sulphate to one gallon of water should be used, and applied once a week for a month. This quantity should not be exceeded.

It is a good plan to reduce the Sulphate to a fine powder, and mix with four or more times its own bulk, for the purpose of diluting the manure, which is very powerful.

For potatoes the following mixture is strongly recommended:
40 lbs. Superphosphate.
25 lbs. Fine bone meal.
10 lbs. Carbonate of Magnesia.
12 lbs. Sulphate of Potash.
21 lbs. SULPHATE OF AMMONIA.

1 cwt.
1 Apply at the rate of 10 to 11 lbs. to 43 square yards.

And many men are just the same; they play some idle, trifling game, and think they're sawing wood; they hate the work that's in demand, the jobs that count they cannot stand, and all their toil's no good.

Fear Revelation Of State Secrets.

Paris, March 17.—All the power of the French Government is being brought to bear to-day to prevent revelation of the state secrets, when Mme. Henriette Caillaux is brought to trial for assassination of Calmette, President Poincare and Premier Doumergue were in conference for several hours and later in the day M. Labori, who has undertaken the defence of Mme. Caillaux was visited by two friends of the Premier. Government officials want Labori to enter a defence of temporary insanity.

Another Cabinet upheaval occurred to-day as a result of the assassination of Gaston Calmette.

Ernest Monis, Minister of Marine resigned and Albert F. Lebrun was provisionally appointed in his stead.

Lebrun held the post as Minister of the Colonies in the Cabinet as organized by Premier Doumergue after Caillaux resigned the portfolio of finance.

Monis' resignation was directly due to the Rochette scandal, which was brought to a head by the murder of Calmette and the accusation that Monis, a colleague of Caillaux, had ordered an adjournment of the trial of Henri Rochette on a charge of swindling.

"Divination" of Radium.

Discovery in a Dust Heap—Electroscope is invaluable.

The successful "divination" of a valuable tube of radium recently in a dust cart about to leave Liverpool Infirmary, England, calls attention to the utility of the electroscopes for radium workers. It was an electroscopes which not only indicated the presence of the radium in the heap of debris but enabled the searchers to concentrate their attention upon one particular bucketful of rubbish.

An electroscopes is a simple piece of apparatus, consisting in principle of two strips of delicate gold foil suspended from an insulated metal rod. In actual practice these pieces of foil are protected from moisture and air currents by a glass case containing a desiccating material. If a small charge of electricity such as may be obtained by rubbing a piece of sealing wax is applied to the rod supporting the gold foil the strips of foil themselves become charged. The charges being similar the leaves repel one another and diverge. In carefully-made instruments these leaves remain divergent until the electrical charge upon them is reduced.

Radium rays are electrical in character. They have an opposite polarity to electrical charges, and the result is that if any of these rays strike a charged electroscopes they neutralize a portion of the charge within the electroscopes and cause the divergent strips of gold foil to fall towards their normal position.

So sensitive is a well-made electroscopes that a "maiche unit"—the Continental standard in radium calculations—is easily recorded by them. The "maiche unit" corresponds to .000,000,0463 milligrams of metal, or 4.63 hundred millionths of a milligram. A milligram is, roughly, one thirty-thousandth of an ounce.

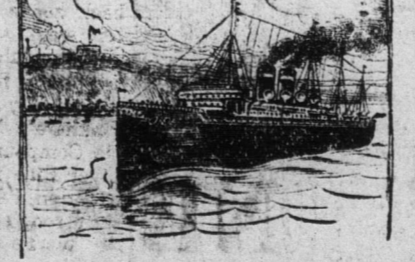

SEELEY'S Guarantee Repudiated.

Was Given Without Consent of Cabinet-- Asquith and Grey Refuse to Make Terms With Officers-- King Criticised in Commons-- Defended by Ministry.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, March 25. The Daily Citizen, labor organ, openly ascribes the crisis to the interference of the King and Court, adding that the King has been interfering all through. For months the Court has been a Conservative Committee, in the activities of which many of the women, headed by Lady Londonderry, have taken an active part, and whoever knows an Army officer, knows his susceptibilities to feminine influence. Fortunately distinguished officers like Field Marshal French and General Paget have no part in the conspiracy, and can be relied upon to do a soldier's duty, should the necessity arise. The Government has displayed weakness, continues the Citizen, apparently because it is trying to cover up somebody's blunder. The Citizen hinted yesterday that Lady Londonderry had actually visited Curragh Camp to influence the officers.

The Times says that evidence has accumulated to confirm reports that the Government's intended coup in Ulster was on a larger scale than the public is aware of, and that a large force was ordered to support the military movement, the order being communicated only when the officers refused to serve. In an editorial the Times acquits Premier Asquith and his more responsible colleagues of any effective share either in the conception or mishandling of the Ulster plot.

The Labor Party members, who throughout the Asquith administration have been criticized by many of the rank and file of their party for seeming to be dolefully chained to their chairs, were in open revolt. They lay on the fact that Tom Mann was sent to prison for six months for inciting strikers to refuse to fire upon strikers when ordered, and demand to be informed as to whether there is one law for aristocrats with commissions, and another for plebeians.

John Redmond, in a statement, declared that the question now is whether the atmosphere of aristocratic London drawing rooms, or the will of the majority of the people should prevail.

The Commons witnessed yesterday afternoon a telling demonstration of how the land lies. It showed where not only Irish Home Rulers and Laborites who made Asquith's majority hold the balance of power in the House, stand, but that many Liberals are opposed to what, from their present information, they consider a surrender to Army officers. The Army Appropriation Bill was under discussion, and Leopold C. Amery moved a resolution for the purpose of criticizing the Government on the ground that it was not entitled to use the Army for party purposes, which is the basis of the Unionist position in the present crisis. A Laborite, John Ward, who was once a dock laborer and at one time a private in the Army, seconded the motion, but from a different point of view. He said that the Conservatives, by approving the rebellion of the officers, have started to smash the British Army. The House, he said, had to decide whether it was going to maintain the discipline of the Army as a neutral force, or whether Parliament, elected by the people, should absolutely, without interference from King or Army, make the rules of the realm. When the speaker uttered in stentorian tones "without interference of King or Army," giving a dramatic pause on the word "King," half the members in the House were on their feet cheering not alone Labour members and Nationalists, but many official members stood and shouted for a considerable time. Parliament has not witnessed such an obviously hostile criticism of the throne in the memory of the oldest member, nor even in the past century.

DUBLIN, March 25. Arriving at Curragh Camp to-day, General Gough, Commander of the Third Cavalry Brigade, had an enthusiastic reception. Addressing the officers he said that he had a written guarantee that they would not be employed to force Home Rule on Ulstermen, but added that if they were ordered there for the protection of life and property, or the preservation of order, it was their ordinary duty and they would undertake it.

LONDON, March 25. The refusal to-day of Premier Asquith to accept the proffered resignation of Colonel Seeley, Secretary of State for War, was followed by a strong speech by the head of the Cabinet, who told the Commons that the Government had taken a firm stand in regard to the position of public servants. He said he would never assent to the claim of any body of men in the service of the Crown to demand from the Government assurances of a hypothetical character as to what should be done in circumstances which had not arisen. It would, he said, be a new claim and would put the Government at the mercy of the military and naval authorities.

The Premier's announcement sent the supporters of the Government wild. They climbed on benches, waving papers and handkerchiefs, to the accompaniment of cheers, which lasted for several minutes.

Premier Asquith indicated in the Commons this afternoon, that he had chosen to have the entire cabinet stand or fall together, when he announced that he would not accept Col. Seeley's resignation. Asquith and other Liberal leaders endeavored in every way possible to answer the charge that King George had interfered in the administration of the Government. The Prime Minister deprecated the "improper attempt to drag the King into conflict." His Majesty has observed at all times every rule that comported with the dignity of his position as a constitutional monarch, said the Premier; and he reprehended the "most unfair, improper and inconsiderate attempts to draw the King's name into the controversy." Premier Asquith stated that in their reply to General Gough, Cabinet Ministers had carefully abstained from giving officers any assurances.

BELFAST, March 25. "Ulster is entirely indifferent as to the resignation of the Secretary of War, or whether any other member of the discredited Asquith Government resign," said Carson here to-day. "The actions of the Government have proved that any half dozen school boys, picked at random, could make a better show at running a country."

There was a clash here between Conservatives and Nationalist crowds early this morning. Several persons, including two women, were injured by stones. Several shots were fired and some arrests were made.

THIS MORNING'S MESSAGES.

LONDON, This Morning. The Government published yesterday, as promised, a statement of its feelings with revolting officers of the third cavalry brigade, and the Commons held another heated disorderly session. Between the documents presented and the various statements drawn from Cabinet Ministers, the vital facts make clear and reveal a comedy or tragedy of errors perpetrated by Col. Seeley and Sir Arthur Paget, commanding the troops in Ireland. Col. Seeley took all the blame upon his own shoulders, and frankly declared he had made a great mistake by giving his written assurance to Gough that the Government must retain its right to use all the force of the Crown in Ireland or elsewhere to maintain order and to support the civil powers in the ordinary execution of their duty, but had no intention whatever of taking advantage of this right in order to crush politics or opposition to the policy or principle of the Home Rule Bill, without the knowledge of the Cabinet and contrary to its policy.

LONDON, This Morning. The Government has withdrawn General Seeley's guarantee, which was announced in the Lords by Viscount Morley; while Sir Edward Grey told the Commons yesterday afternoon the Government's decision would be made known to General Gough to-day. Thus the situation with regard to General Gough and his fifty-nine comrades who sent in resignations, is still in a state of suspense.

LONDON, This Morning. The most startling revelation yesterday was the confirmation of the report that the Government did plan an important demonstration upon Ulster. The First Lord confirmed the reports and said he had ordered the third battery squadron and torpedo flotilla to Irish waters, but explained that when military arrangements had been successfully carried out he countermanded orders by wireless. The explanation was received with jeers by Unionists.

LONDON, This Morning. The blunder General Paget made appears to have been in giving a practical ultimatum to the officers of the cavalry brigade to say whether they would take active service in Ulster or accept dismissal.

LONDON, This Morning. Premier Asquith said his statements that the officers should return to duty unconditionally were in good faith, since he only learned of Seeley's amendment to the Cabinet's memorandum only yesterday afternoon. The Prime Minister made clear the Government's position regarding the Army, declaring he would not assent to the claim of any body of men in the service of the Crown to demand assurances of what they should be required to do in circumstances which had not arisen.

LONDON, This Morning. Sir Edward Grey spoke even more strongly than the Premier. He said the Government was prepared at any moment to use force to whatever extent it is required to make the will of the people prevail. He continued: "This is a contingency which cannot arise for a long time and we will labor to avoid it."

LONDON, This Morning. Much of the oratory in the debate yesterday, consisted of denunciations of the military aristocracy. The Government members were pelted by

to-day's revelations, but there remains very strong and outspoken dissatisfaction with the whole affair among the radicals and laborites, and many think the matter would have been allowed to rest, except for the almost unanimous attack by the Liberal press and the hoastings of the Conservative press over what they speak of as a "Gough victory." All talk of a compromise on the Home Rule Bill is for a time suspended. Conservatives hold that recent events have shown that no compromise is possible except the unconditional exclusion of Ulster; and Liberals say that would not be a compromise, but a surrender.

LONDON, This Morning. Colonel Seeley's transfer to another Cabinet post is predicted, and the announcement and acceptance of General Paget's and Gough's resignations would be no surprise.

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
