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



There has just been issued by the Historical Publishing Company Washington, D.C., a magnificent illustrated history of the construction and builders of the Panama Canal. The editor of this great history is Mr. Ira E. Bennett, with associate editors, John Hays Hammond, celebrated mining engineer; Capt. Philip Andrews, U. S. N.; Rupert Blue, Surg. Gen. U. S. Public Health Service; J. Hampton Moore, Pres. Atlantic Deeper Waterways Ass'n; Patrick J. Lennox, B. A., and William J. Showalter.

The street car conductor, charged with indecently assaulting two little girls, aged 8 and 9 years old, re-spectively, was finally disposed of yesterday evening in the Magistrate's Court. The case was heard in private before Justices of the Peac Hutchings, K.C., and F. J. Mor-

The evidence of the prosecution in ffect was that on the morning of Friday, July 2nd last, the complainants left their homes and boarded a street car to go on an errand for the father of one of them. While en route the defendant, named Noseworthy carried on his outrageous conduct Noseworthy, however, gave a complete denial of the charge and swore that he never even saw the children on the day in question.

The Judges in summing up believed the evidence for the prosecution in its entirety. Their Honors emphasized the heinousness of the offence nd said it was the first time in the istory of the street car service that complaint of such a base character a complaint of such a base character had been heard of; also mentioning the fact that defendant, who was the guardian of the street car for the convenience of the public and the paid guardian over little children when not accompanied by their parents, had only been in the street car service some three or four months. For each charge of assault Noseworthy was convicted and fined \$100 or 3 months imprisonment, making a combined fine of \$200 or 6 months imprisonment; also to furnish two bonds in \$200 each for his future good behaviour or go to jail for an additional three months.




