If the increase were not made so great, if wages were only raised by, say three or four shillings a week all-around, the attempt might achieve its purpose for a brief period. made by the concerns for which they work. With a moderate increase in wages of, say, half a shilling a day, this may be done to some extent. It is not untrue that there are a good many factories earning inordinate returns for their owners, and that if these such, that maids for domestic service, although they are offered good homes and maintain not only their home, but their export business as well. No raising of wages will make the workman create more wealth. All that he can do is to endeavour to force a satisfactory distribution of the wealth that is created, and this is probably being done in Great Britain better than anywhere cise in the world .- Montreal





A cloth can be used only once. Then it is thrown aside. A company over in Relec., Va., buys these rags, and from them by a patent process, recovers 3,500,000 pounds of ink a year. This ink is in four basic colours of black, green, red and orange, which have all passed the severe tests of the Bureau of Engraving for purity and permanency of color.

From these four basic colours this company makes practically all shades of paste and, by the addition of linsed oil and volatile driers, ready mixed paints as well. The company is the sole owner of the patented process by which the color products are recovered and claims to be able to produce paint colors at lower prices than any other manufacturer.—Wall Street Journal. plus ink from the plates used in en-

MADE LITTLE PROGRESS.

Kussians Poured Deluge of Shot and Shell into Enemy

After a Furious Bombardment Which Shattered Miles of the Enemy's Trenches and Caused Havoc in the Ranks of the Tentons, the Czar's Infantry Rushed from the Trenches and Completed the Work of Destruc

London, Oct. 15.—The battle on the Stokhod River, in Volhynia, has broken out anew. The Russians leape from the trenches to the attack yester day morning and before darkness came the fighting had assumed the ferocity that characterized the days

his movement in his usual methodical manner. For nearly forty-eight hours receding the infantry charge the eaviest guns that could be mustered oured a deluge of shot and shell into be enemy's entrenchments. Along the live mile front from Korytniza, north dlong the winding marsh-flanked Stokhod, hardly a foot of the German

and Austrian trench lines escaped immersion in the flood of metal hurled from the Russian artillery.

Caused Great Havoc. The night saw no let up in the terrific bombardment. The guns had obtained the range and the shells burst in great flames from sunset to dawn, the vivid flashes momentarily lighting up the whole countryside and conveying to the gunners some idea of the devastation they were causing to the enemy's works.

devastation they were causing to the enemy's works.

It was not until dawn that the Russian troops, waiting in long, deep rows behind their breastworks ready to spring forward at the word of command, were able to obtain any accurate idea of the destructive effects of the all-night bombardment. The gunners had done their part well—almost too well. Dead Man's Land spread out before their eyes, furrowed its length and breadth with yawning ditches and craters, a few of them so regular as to suggest the handiwork of man. Towering heaps of earth and rock thrown up by exploding shells at intervals over the stretch of ground between the hostile lines gave the appearance of peaceful farm lands dotted with stacks of freshly garnered hay or corn shocks. This was where the gunners had done their work too well, erecting under cover of darkness

Rushed from Trenches.






