



We can readily believe that the Government have actually welcomed the dissensions which have delayed the business of the House because they have delayed also an unpleasant duty which they would fain defer as often

and as long as possible. But there must be no more defer-Matters in the legislature have reached a pass which any decent citizen must find intolerable. The budget stage has not even been reached. After long delay the Estimates were taken in hand, though none of the abuses they contained and which have been so plainly exposed seem to have been corrected. On Tuesday, as on the previous day, practically n ousiness was done. Why? Apparently because the affairs of the country must wait until it is ascertained wheminor patronage can be distributed to suit both parties and make possible a coalition. If both parties could for once put their country before themselves the matter could be settled i an hour. It is a pity the country has not some effective way of asserting itself. There are certain questions to which it imperatively demands an answer, and it is entitled to it. First and foremost is that of an election. We have most regretfully, taken a different view on this matter from that of the Opposi tion in the House, deeming an elec tion at this time a greater evil even than the continuance of the present Government, which is great enough in all conscience. But the Opposition, whether or not they are mistaken, have at least been sincere and stated their views. It is time for the Government to do the same and break the silence which may suit themselves but does not suit the country. public are entitled to know the inten-







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Methodist Conference.

(By Rev. Charles Lench, Conference Reporter.)

Tuesday was a busy day at the Conference, The Layman's Missionary Committee and the Standing Missionary Committee reported, and some lively discussions took place in which the acknowledged debates of the Conference took place. The Conference is anxious to do its best the coming year to reach the objective of \$21,000 for Missions.

The Rev. Mr. Arnup, the Missionary Secretary, whose visit to the city has brought sunshine into the work of the Conference by his sermons, addresses, etc., said good-bye. The Conference placed on record its high appreciation of Mr. Arnup's visit.

The Rev. Mr. Hull also took farewell of the Conference, and like Mr. Arnup, expressed himself as very

The Rev. Dr. Morton, an old St. John's pastor, who served the circuits of George St. and Gower St. some years ago, addressed the Conference. Mr. Morton represented his Department, the Supernumerary Fund. The feeling which tound emphasis from the laymen was to the effect that the time had come to remove the injustice of inadequately proveiding for the needs of the ministers in their old

In the evening session, several important committees got through their reports.

The Lord's Day Observance Committee brought in its report with regard to the sanctity of the Lord's Day. The Laymen's Report.

The Laymen's Report was of great interest and brought forth some live-References were made to the fact

that the Methodists were not properly represented in the Civil Service of the Colony. Over \$24,000 were due the Methodists and many positions in the Civil Service. The Conference in its wisdom decided that the time had come to appoint a vigilance committee to keep the matter before the authorities, and acted accordingly. A long discussion took place concerning the laxity in enforcing the Prohibition Act. The Temperance watch-dogs gave the Conference some marveilous facts regarding medical prescriptions. There must have been many very sick people in the city the last few months, if it is true that "scrips" were issued in such numbers. The resolution embodied the representa-tion of the matter to the legislators

On Patriotic Gambling. The following resolution passed the

"RESOLVED, that the Conference direct the attention of the Department of Justice to the common and frequent violation of the Lottery Act. Even under the name of patriotic purposes this Act is violated as an every day occurrence. It is the opinion of the Conference that our Constabulary force should take this matter vigor-

ously in hand." The Conference deprecated this means of making gain out of the war under the name of patriotism, or making the national distress a medium of graft.

A Patriotic Resolution.

The following resolution shows just where the Conference stands in its attitude towards the Empire's titanic struggle. As every Methodist Parsonage is represented where an available young man was forthcoming, the resolution is more than mere empty sentimentalism:

"WHEREAS, in answer to the call of the nation's needs, which has come to us during the titanic struggle between the various nations, there has been a splendid and inspiring response by the young men of New-foundland; and whereas it is imperative that in justice and loyalty to the brave men who have fallen and those who are still fighting, we maintain our Newfoundland Regiment in full strength on the firing line; and whereas the present system of recruiting is slow, costly and inefficient, and that it is of the essence of democracy that the rights and privileges of citizenship carry with them the obligation of service to the State to the extent of

"BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that this Conference place on record its opinion that the Legislature during this session should enact a law empowering the Government to require the enrollment of all male citizens of military age, and that from ese be selected a sufficient number to fill all vacancies and keep our Regi-ment at full strength and provide the required number; resolved further that we recommend that copies of the resolution be forwarded to His Excel-lency the Governor and to the Prime

The resolution was adopted by a standing vote.
