SCRAWNY SHOULDERS.

If your shoulders are scrawny and show prominent bones, or if the skin is not smooth and satiny as you

DIES AT THE JENSEN CAMP.

There passed peacefully away at the Jensen Camp last evening Corporal Oscar Vaughan, of the 1st. Nfld. Regiment, son of Henry and Mrs. Vaughan, this city. The deceased only returned a short while ago on sick furlough and shortly after entered the Jensen hospital where everything possible was done to relieve him in his sufferings. All hope, however, of recovery had been abandoned at the time he entered the institution. Corporal Vaughan was only in his 26th year, and was among the first to offer his services for King and Country, and while not privileged to lay down his young life on the battle field he has nevertheless died for the cause. The illness which caused his death was brought about through exposure while in the trenches at Gallipoli. Corporal Vaughan was one of four brothers who saw service at the front. The other three are Sergt. Frank, now in the city on furlough, Pte. Herbert, a wounded prisoner of war in Germany, and Pte. Joseph, missing since April 14th. To his sorrowing parents and six brothers and one sister, the Telegram offers deep sympathy. The remains will be laid to rest with full military honors.

We were next taken into custody and sent to a respectful residence, the home of Mr. Samuel Gibbons and was given the best attendance the family could afford. My kind wife and daughter, also to all the people of St. Vincent who we fell in contact with, as they all felt quite in sympathy with us over our occurrence. We all felt quite at home under the hospitality of the Gibbons family. As they were making preparations to take us to St. Mary's, we got a wire from our President, W. F. Coaker, that the s.s. Priestman, Capt. Bartlett, was coming for us, and had not long to wait before we saw her coming, and more to our pleasure Mr.

Samuel Gibbons and sons then made his boat ready and took us and our luggage on board the steamer which meant quite a lot of work for them, especially in the busy season and lots of fish around.

We, the captain and crew of the lost schooner Oriental, wish that little settlement all prosperity and good health may attend them always, and more especially the family who had the care of us to attend to; the old lady and her daughter took the trouble to come on the beach and shake hands with us as we left them, and we wished them good-bye and lots of fish to attend to the coming summer.

The schooner was owned by the U.T.C., and the loss of her will be felt owing to the strenuous work the company is carrying on at Port Union.

Boys and Girls.

As a safeguard which the mother should know about her baby in summer is to see that the food, at regular intervals, is antiseptic, and to keep him clean, and to keep him who is about 8 or 10 months old, at the beginning of summer possible, continue at the September, because even a breast feeding a day each to keep his digestion good, and in case he becomes ill, the breast milk supplemented with two or three cows' milk properly directed in a former series.

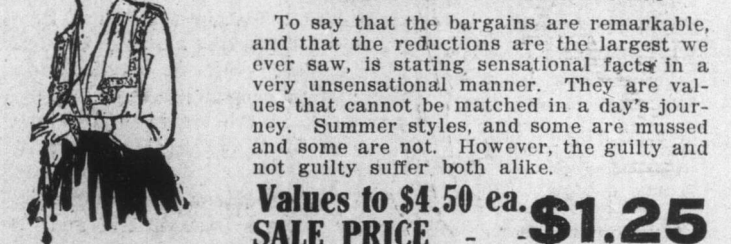

To invite guests to a festive occasion and then receive them in a house all in disorder and with the lights turned low would be an inconceivably rude thing, wouldn't it? You cannot imagine anyone doing it. And yet, not long ago, I was one of the guests at a little anniversary celebration at which our hosts gave us an even more depressing (to me at least) reception than that.

The lights were bright enough and the house was immaculate (as always) and yet the whole home was filled with an atmosphere of gloom. They couldn't wait till their guests were gone. For our host and hostess had fallen out over some matter and hadn't the self control and courtesy to put their quarrel behind them until the guests were gone.

Their animosity towards each other dominated the whole occasion. All our attempts at cheerful and sprightly conversation fell utterly flat. All our efforts to impart an air of festivity to the affair were paralyzed by the noxious gas of their animosity.

And yet we had a miserable time. There were always all about the house, there was music, there were bright lights, there were delicious things to eat, which our hosts had doubtless labored all day, and all the conventional factors of a good time except the all important factor, a pleasant atmosphere.

"The ornaments of a house" someone has said, "are its friends."

Let us add to that,—"and it's atmosphere."

I think one can quickly tell whether the habitual atmosphere of a home is a happy peaceful one or an irritable unhappy atmosphere.

Even when people do not commit the great outrage against hospitality of quarreling in the presence of their guests, I think one can feel a lack in the atmosphere of a home where happiness is not.

Happiness is like sunshine, it makes the barest places pleasant. You can feel the lack of happiness just as you can the lack of sunshine.

How different the atmosphere of a north room where the sun never enters to that of a southern or western room. I think I could tell a north room, blindfolded, by the feel of it.

And so it is with happiness, even when one sees no active manifestation of happiness one can somehow feel the lack of it in the homes where the sunshine of happiness and goodwill is lacking.

We owe our guests the suppression of any private irritabilities, and if we want them to love to come to us, we must give them still more than that,—the atmosphere of a happy home.

War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A. M.

ANOTHER AIR RAID ON ENGLAND

LONDON, July 4. From twelve to fourteen air raiders to-day dropped bombs on Harwich, a seaport town in Essex. It was officially announced to-night that eight persons were killed and 22 others injured. The text of the official statement reads: "A squadron of some twelve to fourteen enemy airplanes attacked Harwich from a northeasterly direction about 7.50 o'clock this morning. A number of bombs were dropped, and latest reports state that eight persons were killed and twenty-two injured. Only slight material damages were caused. Fire was opened from the anti-aircraft defences and the enemy's formation was broken up, although the low-lying clouds rendered the visibility very bad. The raiders also were engaged by our own aircraft from a neighboring station. After dropping three bombs the enemy's squadron turned seaward without attempting to penetrate inland. The whole raid only occupied a few minutes."

There was lively fighting between British and German airplanes during the attacks on Harwich this morning, and only about five minutes elapsed before the defensive aircraft and anti-aircraft guns drove off the invaders. According to late despatches it was a misty morning, but the German machines could be distinguished at intervals when they appeared from behind cloud banks. The Germans travelled at great speed and in close formation, heading first one way then another in an erratic manner. Bombs were dropped in rapid

succession. British airmen immediately under the most adverse conditions intercepted the Germans and broke up their formation. Frustrated in their enterprise the Germans turned towards the sea. Their retreat was marked by a series of duels with the British aviators. One British machine was seen to engage two German. Anti-aircraft guns are believed to have registered some hits, although the clouds prevented the gunners from getting a clear view of their targets. Two of the German machines that took part in the air raid at Harwich were brought down by British naval aircraft and a third machine was damaged, it is officially announced. All the British airmen who engaged the Germans emerged safely from their fighting. The official statement announced the result as follows: "The Vice-Admiral at Dover reports that naval aircraft from Dunkirk intercepted the hostile squadron returning from England after their attack on Harwich this morning. In an engagement a considerable distance from the Belgian coast two hostile machines were brought down in flames, while a third was damaged. Several other machines were attacked with indecisive results. All our machines returned safely."

A late report of the air raid shows casualties increased to 11 killed and 36 injured.

GERMAN BOMBARDMENT.

LONDON, July 4. A German submarine bombarded a port in the Azores. So far as is known, no damage was done by the gun fire.

WEEKLY SHIPPING REPORT.

LONDON, July 4. The weekly shipping summary, issued to-day, shows fifteen British merchant ships of more than 1,500 tons sunk, and five less than this tonnage's eleven fishing vessels were lost. The forecast that the summary of British shipping losses by submarines and mines covering last week would show the smallest number of sinkings in many weeks, were verified by the actual figures. The total of twenty merchant ships sunk compares with 25 the previous week and 32 for each of the two weeks preceding. A probable heavy falling off of tonnage sent to the bottom is emphasized by the fact that only 15 vessels of more than 1,500 tons are now reported sunk. The sinking of 21 vessels in this class was announced last week, 27 the week previous and 22 the week before that. It is not until the report for June 3rd is reached that figures as low as those for the current week are encountered. In the height of the destructive campaign in April 46 large vessels were sunk last week, and 33 another. The total of large and small reached 55 in the week ending April 21st.

BRITISH DESTROYER STRIKES MINE.

LONDON, July 4. An old type British torpedo boat destroyer struck a mine and sank in the North Sea, it was officially announced this morning. There were 18 survivors from the sunken craft.

CHINESE PRESIDENT ESCAPES.

TIENSIN, China, July 4. Li Yuan Hung, the Chinese President, with two attendants escaped

from the Palace at nine o'clock last night and sought refuge in the Japanese Legation. The Japanese, considering the urgency of the case, granted him refuge. No one is allowed to interview the President at his place of refuge.

RIOTING.

LONDON, July 4. Riotous outbreaks were resumed last night at Kattenburg district, says an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Amsterdam. The soldiers were called out, and it is reported three were killed and many wounded.

DETROIT ASKED TO ADOPT SOISSONS.

WASHINGTON, July 4. Detroit is to be asked to adopt the French town of Soissons, which has been subject to so many sieges during the war, and restore it. The French Minister of Fine Arts and his associates on the committee of the French Restoration Fund, telegraphed James Keating, their American representative, suggesting he ask Detroit to adopt Soissons. Keating left Washington to-day for Detroit to make the request. "We are at Soissons," the messages said, "and have just completed a survey of the devastation. Soissons must be adopted at once. There are forty communes dependent upon Soissons that have been absolutely destroyed. The people have neither home, church nor school." Soissons had 20,000 inhabitants at the outbreak of the war.

JAPAN ASKED TO SUPPORT MOVEMENT.

TOKIO, July 4. General Chang Hung, says a despatch from Peking, asked Baron Hayaishi, the Japanese Minister, on June 22nd, whether Japan would support a movement for the restoration of the monarchy in China.

CELEBRATIONS QUIET.

NEW YORK, July 4. A noiseless but patriotic program featured in the celebration of Independence Day in New York. A salute of 45 guns was followed by a salute and unfurling of the flag on the Block House in Central Park, formally opening a patriotic and athletic programme in which band concerts, folk dances and military drills took the place of the noise producer of other years.

HOLLWEG WILL AGAIN AIR HIS ELOQUENCE.

LONDON, July 4. Dr. Von Bethmann Hollweg, the German Chancellor, will deliver an important speech in the Reichstag on Thursday, according to a report received at Copenhagen from Berlin, by the correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Co.

WAR NEWS.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A. M.

GERMAN ATTACKS REPULSED.

PARIS, July 4.
Extremely heavy fighting was in progress all through the night on the Aisne front, resulting in our repulsing the attacking Germans with very heavy losses, the war office announces. The Germans repeatedly hurled large bodies of men against the French, attacking on the whole front from the north of Juy to the east of the California Plateau. The repulse of the enemy was complete.

ARTILLERY ACTIVITY.

LONDON, July 4.
The British official statement issued to-day concerning military operations in Northern France says there is nothing to report except considerable artillery activity on both sides at numerous points of the front.

RUSSIAN UNITS CO-OPERATING.

LONDON, July 4.
The units of four Russian armies are co-operating in the Galician advance, covering a front of about 20 miles. These units with the approval of the Commander-in-Chief are resolving to do or die in a supreme test of Russian manhood. They are called respectively regiments, battalions, companies, batteries and squadrons of "Death." They wear black and red stripes on their cuffs with a "Death's" head on crossed swords.

OFFICIAL.

LONDON, July 3.
An official report from British headquarters in France to-night says: In Ypres region there has been considerable artillery activity on both sides. The enemy raided our trenches this morning southeast of Laventie. Two of our men are missing. Hostile aerial activity has shown marked increase in the past few days. Successful artillery work and bombing raids were carried out yesterday by our airplanes. One Ger-

man airplane was brought down by gun fire within our lines; three more were brought down in air fighting; two others were driven down out of control.

EVACUATING BRZEZANY.

LONDON, July 3.
Austro-German forces are evacuating Brzezany, fifty miles S.E. of Lemberg, the capital of Galicia, says Reuter's despatch from Petrograd. The Russian armies have invaded Brzezany from the northeast, southeast and southwest.

THE RUSSIAN OFFENSIVE.

PETROGRAD, July 3.
In the direction of Zlochoff our offensive continues successfully. Yesterday afternoon after a severe and stubborn battle the Zorasky Regiment occupied Presovee while the gallant troops of the fourth Finnish division and Cheshkoslovatsky Brigade occupied a strongly fortified enemy position on the heights to the west and southwest of the village of Zheroff and the fortified village of Korshiduv. Three lines of the enemy trenches were penetrated. The enemy then retired across the little Stripa. The Finns have taken 1,500 officers and soldiers prisoners, while their captures include four trench mortars, nine machine guns and one bomb thrower. The Cheshkoslovatsky Brigade captured 62 officers and 3,150 soldiers, 15 guns and many machine guns. Many of the captured guns were turned against the enemy. Enemy positions to the west of Hizefuvka were taken. Altogether in Monday's battle in the neighborhood of Zlochoff we took 6,300 prisoners, 21 guns, 16 machine guns, several bomb throwers. Prisoners are continuing to arrive. Southeast of Brzezany the battle continues with less intensity. In Sunday's battle in this region we took prisoners, 53 officers, 2,200 men. Fusiliers reported on the rest of the front and on the Roumanian and Caucasus fronts.

U. S. TRANSPORTS ATTACKED.

WASHINGTON, July 2.
That two vicious attacks were made by U-boats on American transports and convoys carrying the American Expeditionary Force to Europe, was made known to-day in an official is-

sued by Secretary of Navy Daniels, on the occasion of the arrival to-day of the last contingent of General Pershing's forces at a French port. After felicitating the American people on the safe arrival of every fighting man and every ship, the Secretary said the transports bearing our troops were twice attacked by German submarines on the way across. On both occasions U-boats were beaten off with every appearance of loss. One was certainly sunk, and there is reason to believe that the accurate fire of our gunners sent others to the bottom. For purposes of convenience the expedition was divided into contingents, each contingent including troops and a naval escort designed to keep off such raiders as might be met. An ocean rendezvous had also been arranged with American destroyers now operating in European waters in order that the passage of the danger zone might be attended by every possible protection. The first attack took place at 10.30 on the night of June 22. What gives it a peculiar and disturbing significance, our ships were set upon at a point well this side of the rendezvous and in that part of the Atlantic prescribed free from submarines. The attack was made in force, although the night made it impossible to count the number of submarines operating. The high seas convoy circling with their searchlights answered with heavy gun fire. Its accuracy is stated to be proved by the fact that the torpedoes discharged became increasingly scattered and inaccurate. It is not known how many torpedoes were launched, but five were counted as they sped by bow and stern. A second attack was launched a few days later against another contingent. The point of assault was beyond the rendezvous and our destroyers were sailing as a screen between the transports and all harm. The results of the battle were in favor of the American gunners, not alone did the destroyers hold the U-boats at a safe distance, but their speed also resulted in sinking one submarine at least. Grenades were used in firing into the depths, a charge of explosive timed to go off at a certain distance under water. In one instance oil and wreckage covered the surface of the sea after a shot from a destroyer at a periscope and reports make a claim of sinking.

Tuesday afternoon's session of the House was exceptionally brief. The Budget Speech was again detained, owing, it was rumored, to certain doings in inner circles of the political camps with a view to forming a Coalition, but both sides, we hear, could only agree to disagree. The Bills respecting Collie Dogs and Wrecks and Salvage received their third reading and were sent to the Legislative Council for concurrence. Other items on the order paper were deferred and the House adjourned at an early hour until this afternoon.

The Governor on the West Coast.

His Excellency the Governor and party, who are touring the West Coast, spent Monday and Tuesday salmon fishing at LaPolle. Rose Blanche and Channel were visited yesterday and this morning they left Port aux Basques for South Branch where they will spend a few days fishing before returning to the city, which will probably be Monday next. Their Excellencies were given a cordial reception at all the places they visited.

LONDON, To-Day.
The Reuter despatch from Shanghai to-day quotes Vice-President Fang Kwo Chang as indignantly denying the allegation of the Peking edict that he is a pro-Monarchist, and as declaring on the other hand his intention of taking action at the earliest possible moment against the new Peking Government. The military and naval commander at Shanghai, who are strongly Republican, have been bidden to make immediate preparation for such action, adds the despatch. It is anticipated that Tuan Chi Jui, former Premier, will lead the Republican forces against the Capital. All is quiet in this district, although the Chinese display some nervousness. Piece goods auctions have been temporarily suspended.

SAY PRESIDENT ASSASSINATED.
SAN FRANCISCO, To-Day.
A cable received here to-day by the Chinese World newspaper stating that unconfirmed rumours persisting in all sections of Peking were that President Li Yuan Hung had been assassinated and that former high officials of the Republic had declared their allegiance to the Monarchy.

CIVIL WAR IN CHINA.
SAN FRANCISCO, To-Day.
China is in the throes of civil war and a battle is being fought to-day between the troops of the Southern Provinces, fighting for the preservation of the Republic, and the northern forces of the young Emperor, according to a cable received here to-day by the China Nationalist League. The first clash is announced as having occurred yesterday by officials of the League, who claim that the sources of its information are unquestionable. Advices to-day state that President Li Yuan Hung is safe in Peking and Vice-President Tung Knok Jung is directing troop movements in Nanking. According to the despatches the soldiers of President Li in the Chinese capital are steadily gaining ground.

MESOPOTAMIAN CONDITIONS GOOD.
LONDON, To-Day.
An official statement relating to the campaign in Mesopotamia issued to-day reads: "On June 28th a convoy proceeding from Bakiba was at-

tacked by Turkish regulars, but the enemy were driven off with loss. June, July and August being the hottest months of the year, no effort has been spared to render life in the Tigris Valley as bearable as possible. All reports indicate a great improvement for the comfort and health of the troops. The weekly returns of the sick continue to show a decided improvement over the corresponding figures of last year. Some relief may be expected from the northwest winds, which blow usually throughout part of July and August."

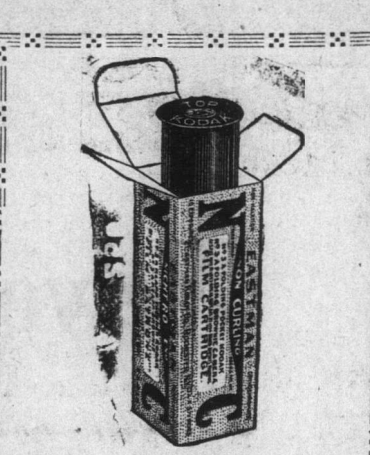
A BIG "IF."
LONDON, To-Day.
Emperor William, according to an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Amsterdam, has decided that all German men who have been made prisoners of war will receive the iron cross on their return home after the war if they can prove they did not surrender voluntarily.

BRITISH OFFICIAL.
LONDON, To-Day.
An official statement from British headquarters in France issued to-night reads: "Early this morning the enemy raided one of our points south of Lens; one of our men is missing. As a result of another raid which the enemy attempted east of Lens some wounded prisoners were left in our hands. Enemy artillery was active north of the Scarpe and in the neighbourhood of Ypres and Messines. The enemy's air activity continues. In air fighting yesterday three enemy machines were driven to the ground and five others were driven down out of control. Another was shot down by our anti-aircraft guns. One of our airplanes failed to return."

GERMANS RETIRE IN GERMAN EAST AFRICA.
LONDON, To-Day.
Under pressure of the British forces advancing from Kilwa, the Germans in German East Africa have evacuated strongly held positions south of the Ngara River, says an official statement issued to-night. The positions extended from Kimamba Hill on the shore of Beaver Hafen to Makangaga, and the Germans retired a distance from seven to nine miles. The official report indicates a general retirement of the enemy forces in the other fields of operations in German East Africa.

SRB BOMBARDS THE AZORES.
POTA DELGADA, Azores, To-Day.
A German submarine bombarded this city at dawn to-day. A girl was killed and several other persons injured. The forts replied to the bombardment.

AUSTRIAN VERSION.
VIENNA, To-Day.
An official from the Austro-Hungarian headquarters to-day reads:

tionary Russia, on the fourth of July, maintained their attempts to break through the Austro-German lines in Eastern Galicia. Cheered by the results of the fighting during the first three days of July, General Brusiloff's men continue their efforts especially against the town of Brzezany and are throwing fresh forces against the Tonton positions. During Sunday and Monday, the first two days of the new drive, the Russians captured 300 officers and 1,800 men; Tuesday and Wednesday probably added several more thousand to the total. "Twenty-nine guns and thirty-three machine guns were taken from the Austro-Germans. Violent artillery duels have been in progress on the Konichy-Ziochhoff sector, on the Stokhod in Volhynia and at Brody on the Galician Volhynian border. In Champagne, on the west front, the German Crown Prince has made another desperate and fruitless effort to break the French lines northwest of Rheims. Attacking in force along an eleven mile front the Germans made especially strong efforts around Cerny and the Allette and against the Calfortie Plateau. The French repulsed all the attacks with losses. After checking the Germans the French took the initiative in a small operation east of Cerny and captured a strong German salient. German attacks on the left bank of the Meuse were repulsed. Raids and patrol engagements have occupied the Germans and British further north. Several Austrian attacks on the Carso south of Gorizia were checked by the Italians, Rome reports.

GETTING READY TO FIGHT.
Jin Tsin Tuan Chi Jui, former Premier, accompanied by Liang Chi Chiao, former Minister of Justice, and Tang Hau Lung, former speaker of the Chinese Assembly, left for Manchian in Chihli Province last night. Large forces of troops have been assembled there, and Tuan Chi Jui will take command of all forces for the overthrow of the Manchus. Sen Chung from the south and Chang Jui Chi from Shantung Province are expected to attack Suchowfu Kiangsu Province. Chang Hung's headquarters immediately.

RUSSIAN TORPEDO BOAT LOST.
PETROGRAD, To-Day.
A Russian torpedo boat of an old type was blown up by a mine in the Black Sea, on June 30th, according to an official statement.

HELPED BEAT OFF SRB.
LISBON, To-Day.
An American transport joined in the firing at the German submarine which bombarded Ponta Delgada in the Azores to-day, says an official announcement by the Portuguese Min-

ister of Marine. The transport, which was discharging coal, aided the land batteries in forcing the submarine to withdraw out of range. This announcement says that the submarine is still off the ports.

ASKS PLACE FOR INDIANS IN WAR.
NEW YORK, To-Day.
At a great patriotic meeting here last night, at which Secretary of War Baker was the principal speaker, Red Fox James Black Foot, an Indian, aroused the audience to enthusiastic cheers when he pleaded that his race be given a place in the war.

PROPORTIONAL REPRESENTATION REJECTED.
LONDON, To-Day.
The Commons, acting yesterday on the Franchise Reform Bill or, as it is officially known, Representation of the People Bill, decided by a vote of 201 to 169 to reject the principle of proportional representation.

BRITISH CAPTURE GROUND.
LONDON, To-Day.
The British made an attack last night southwest of Hollebeke in Belgium, near the Ypres Canal, to-day's official statement says. The British line was advanced on a front of 600 yards. The announcement follows:—Southwest of Hollebeke we advanced our lines slightly on a front of 600 yards. Last night we carried out successful raids in the vicinity of Wietje and Nieuport and captured several prisoners.

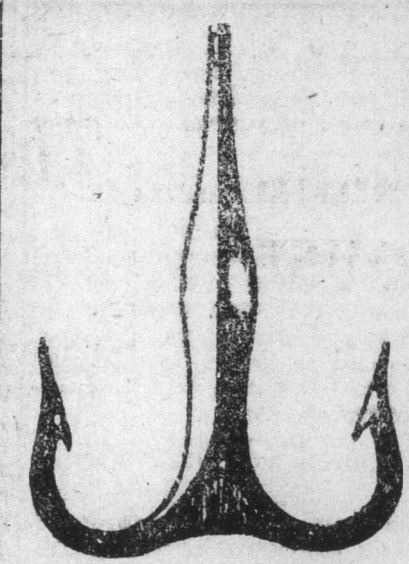
NAVAL AIR RAID.
LONDON, To-Day.
On Tuesday light bombing attacks were carried out by naval air service machines on the airfields at Ghis-telle and Nieunuster, and also on seaplane sheds and a train at Zeauro, says an Admiralty announcement to-day. Several tons of bombs were dropped. All the machines returned safely.

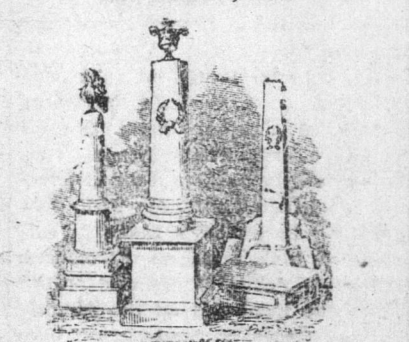

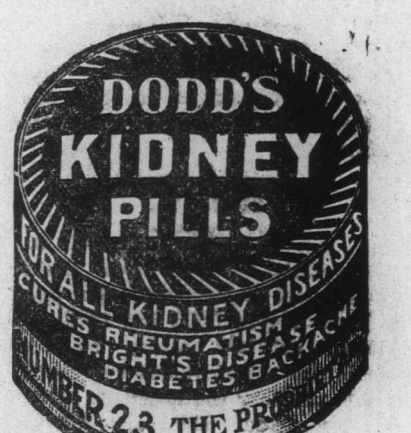
