Trees Which Hate

Trees, says a well-known naturalist, are very like human beings. They have their sympathies and aversions better in clumps, but many are very particular about the company they keep. When they have what they like they flourish. When they have un-

At first sight this seems curious, for whole lot is the yew. No other plant one would naturally imagine that a tree which had an unlimited supply of soil and air and light would have a better change of prospering than another which had to share these necessaries with its neighbours.

The real truth of the matter that a young tree must be protected from the wind. If is it not it gets a set back from which it never recovers.

they flourish. When they have uncongenial neighbours they are stunted and often die.

If you keep your eyes open when walking in the country, you will see for yourself that these remarks are perfectly true. Observe a solitary tree standing alone in an open meadow. It is rarely so fine in size or shape as one which grows in a wood.

But it does not pay to plant a young tree near to one which is already in full growth, and especially is this the case if the older tree be a pine or a Scotch fir. The pine will simply push its roots out and absolutely strangle its younger companion.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

FRAUGHT WITH DIFFICULTIES.

LONDON, May 18. The freedom, with which Lloyd free and Premier Briand are de bating the Silesian situation through newspapers, and the strong word they are using, is causing a great stir ngland. The British public is ac omed to the courteous and smooth hods of the old diplomacy, and the ctacle of a most delicate difference being handled by vigorous public de bate amazes the people. The heads of the two Governments, after their numerous conferences, were expect ed to understand each other. Apparently each has chosen a plan of campaign which he considers most effective against his opponent. M. Briand will have his next work in the French Parliament to morrow. and there is great interest in London as to whether he will maintain the same high key of conversation, which Lloyd George started upon in his recent speech in the House of Commons. 

The Position of the Food Control Board

Food Board has acted in an underhand and unfair manner in disposing of the balance of Sugar on hand after

On May 2nd, over two weeks ago, a circular was sent to all the Sugar dealers as follows:

"The Food Control Board will have etween 2,500 and 2,800 barrels of "Sugar to dispose of on May 20th.
"This is offered to the trade in lots of "50 barrels or over for immediate delivery at ten and a half cents per

"pound, duty paid.
"This price will hold for immediate acceptance and the trade are asked "to apply at once for their require-

"This price will not be affected by "any tariff changes."

NFLD. FOOD CONTROL BOARD. (Immediate delivery meant delivery after May 20th).

As a matter of fact the stock remaining is about 3,500 barrels, owing to decreased consumption since May 2nd. Some firms responded at once with orders, but most of them did nothing, evidently waiting to see if they could import Sugar at a lower price. This price of 101/2 cents was the cost landed of the Food Control Board Sugar. Some firms made tentative offers below this price, but the Food Board would not accept any lower price. Eventually one firm bought what remained unsold. Yesterday other firms, apparently just waking to the fact that after all, the Food Board Sugar may not "hang fire," applied for sugar but had to be told that all the stock had been dis-

The transaction was open and above board. The circular reproduced above was copied in the newspapers, and so became public property. Each and every firm had an equal chance. If they did not avail themselves of the offer it was entirely their own fault. It is evident that the criticism of the Food Board is inspired by vindictiveness rather than a spirit of fair dealing, and this latest charge, just as unfounded as all are, represents a change from Government control to the "jungle" of free trade, in which the business firms are once more in combat with each other. . To repeat. All sugar dealers were offered this sugar. No activity was apparent in the matter for two weeks, and then because the sugar has been bought, some firms now put up a poor mouth as if the Food Board should have looked after their requirements. There is absolutely no doubt whatever that if sugar could be imported at a less price than the Food Board's offer, the sugar owned by the Food Control Board would have been allowed to remain unsold. The sugar business has been returned to the trade in an open, fair and legitimate manner, and it is regrettable that those who did not avail of the opporand blame the Food Board for not interfering in their business.






