

Oueen Fish!

ME HAVE VOICES. OTHERS CAN GIVE ELECTRIC SHOCKS.

Fish have voices! Quite a number are capable of producing loud sounds. The catfish growls like a dog. A type of sunfish is able to emit sounds similar to those produced by the grinding of teeth, while other fish can produce bell-like sounds when swimming near the surface. Still other fish give a bellowing or purring or whistling.

Mr. E. G. Boulenger, in his interesting book, "Queer Fish," says, too. that some fish, such as the electric ray, are capable of giving anyone who touches them a very severe electric shock.

The author tells the story of a fisherman who, having produced a comparatively small living specimen, placed it in a tub of water on the seafront, and displayed a notice informing the public that it was the heaviest fish in the world.

In order to prove the truth of his assertion he invited anyone to try to lift it, a fee of sixpence being charged for each attempt, and half-a-crown returned to the successful competitor. It was not until the fish was thoroughly exhausted with giving shocks that the first half-crown was award-

Sca-Hedgehogs are quaint fish covered with spines. Normally these spines lie flat against the body, but if the fish is attacked it takes in quantities of air and water until it becomes quite spherical in shape. This makes all the spines stick straight out like those of a hedgehog. Another of the strange inhabita of the ocean is the lung-fish. While

in the water it breathes through its gills like any other fish, but in addition it has an air-bladder which can be used as a lung if necessity arises. Several types of lung-fish can remain out of water for months on end. They live in swamps, and as the water dries up in the dry season, bury hemselves, leaving only an air hole



He pointed out that in order to be a genuine Christian, one must possess the missionary spirit, and if such does not exist, then we are greatly lacking, for as he intimated,-"How can we pass on to others that which we know so little of ourselves." There was a ring of enthusiasm in the Rev. Templeton's address, which all would do well to catch:-

"Oh Zion haste, thy mission high fulfilling,
To tell to all the world that God is

RESULTS IN INCREASED YIELDS.

gina barrister. Llewellyn Bratt, who farms two and a half sections of land south of Regina, and Clarence Westbaugher, both of whom tested the new method of cultivation, reported that there was an apparent increase of about fifteen bushels to the acre. The new system was tested out on an acre plot of land similar to the land on which the ordinary methods were employ

Both agree that the new method is not so effective on summer failow land but on the stubble there is a material difference in the yield.

Believing that immense quantities of straw were not meant to be destroyed, Mr. Secord experimented for a few years to find some methods to use the straw profitably. He found that if grain were planted shallow instead of deep in the spring, that the roots would penetrate farther into the ground and secure more nourishment than if planted deep. In some cases the roots formed into a mat on meeting the harder ground.

By covering the seeded ground with straw to a depth of two inches, Mr. Second discovered that it did not pre-

A Big Let of Brandy Smuggled to London

DISTRIBUTED, BUT ALL ARE TRACED AND SEIZED.

London.-The city police and Scot recent Friday and cleared by the consignees on Monday afternoon.

The brandy was skilfully packed to represent cases of boots and shoes. These passed the customs officers without the real nature of the contents being detected. The consignment was brought in by

a cargo steamer, and the greater part was distributed before a hint reached the customs of what was happening. Most of the cases had been taken in lorries to a depot on the outskirts of London. When the Excise officials heard

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


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
