The Intransigente iron-clads have been

efeated by the National squadron. A fight took place on Saturday after noon near Carthagens and lasted about two hours. The insurgent vessels were onsiderably injured, and compelled to retnrn to Carthagena harbour. The Gov ernment squadron consisted of the Al-manza, Vittoria, Carmen and two smal-ler vessels. Admiral Lobez was in com-mand of the Intransigente fleet, number-

ing four vessels. The fight lasted two hours, when the

Intransigente fleet was defeated and driven back to Cartagena, their vessels being badly damaged. The in

being badly damaged. The insurgents showed great spirit, but handled their ships badly, the Numancia at girst having to bear the brant of battle alone. The fire generally was at too long a range, but at the close of the engagement, while the Vittoria was endeavoring to intercept the retrast of insurrectionist frigate Tetuan, broadsides were closely exchanged be-tween these two vessels.


