The Treaty will be known as one "For the reciprocal regulation of Com-merce and Trade between Canada and Games and Fireworks. the United States." Accompanying the draft submitted to the Senate was a message from the President, carnestly commending it to the consideration of that body, but expressing no opinion ab-solutely as to its provisions. sions :--The first and second articles give to the respective countries the right of free fishing and drying and curing fish off cach other's sea coasts. Shell fish are re-served from the operation of the Treaty, as also are the salmon, shad, and other fisheries in the rivers and mouths of riv-ers. The right of sishing conceded to British subjects on the United States -posts does not extend to fisheries situ-

I ying between the canals wherever neces-sary. This work is to be completed by the ist January, 1880. By Article 6 Canada agrees to con-struct on or before the first of January, 1890, the work known as the Caughna-waga Canal, to connect the St. Lawrence with Lake Champlain, with the same sti-pulations as to draught of water and lockage as apply to the existing canals. The Government of the United States agrees to arge upon the State of New York to enlarge, or, if necessary, extend the canal from Whitchall to Albany, to the same extent as the canal lam men-tioned. The improvement of the Hudson River navigation, in the same sense, is also provided for. Article 7 theores open the island coasting trade to the vessels of either contry.






