THE ISLAND PARK

One of the most vital questions to any city should be its public parks; older cities have long since recognized this, and after many years of neglect are attempting to repair the errors of former years by the purchase of large tracts of land at an enormous increase in value.

Had this question been dealt with adequately in the past there is no reason why the cities of the west should not each have a park system, which would be ample for its needs. Such, however, has not been the case, and Calgary would do well to secure a public park before its natural breathing places shall have been absorbed by its commercial life.

It is not only a question of recreation but also of health. Calgary, the metropolis of the Last Great West, growing as it is by leaps and bounds, will, in a few short years, no longer be a city of magnificent distances, with a playground on every side, but will be a congested centre of business activity. Therefore it behoves the citizens to safeguard their rights while they may.

And a definite policy in regard to a park system, which shall be second to none should be immediately inaugurated.

A few acres have been reserved in different portions of the city for park purposes, all being in the original prairie state except Central park, which has been somewhat embellished by the landscape, and hardly serves as more than a promenade ground during a band concert.

As has been said a park is one of the crucial needs of the city, and from its situation and conformation the fact that it is possessed of a huge number of shade bearing trees St. George's park is above all others the most suitable for this purpose. Connected as it will be by means of the bridge which is shortly to be constructed, it possesses within itself the ideal requirements for a public park.

It is neither too near, nor is it too distant; it is not like Central Park, within the city limits and surrounded by residences, but at the same time is within easy reach.

Embraced by historic associations it thereby acquires added interest. Many years ago when Calgary was but a frontier post early settlers and Indians coming down the Blackfoot trail, struck the old trail and crossing the island reached Fort Calgary.

Truly St. George's island is the ideal park for the city, nesting as it does on the bosom of the Bow flanked by cool breezes, even in the extreme heat of summer, it will form a welcome seclusion to ladies and children who wish to escape from the heat and turmoil of the city.

The island is large enough to be laid out as a park, with a grand stand, seats, tennis courts, bathing pools could be made, and fishing piers constructed.

As a pleasant spot for picnics, the scenery is unequalled; the scenery looking west and east up and down the river encompassing the beautiful vista of the Bow Valley, and in the far distance the snow capped peaks of the majestic Rockies is magnificent.

As an asset to the city this park would be of incalculable value, not only because it would prove a boon to the present population but would prove an additional attraction to immigrants, and so increase the prosperity of the Queen Bee of western cities.

Again the Albertan desires to know if Messrs. Alexander & Budd have any water rights upon the Bow River. This question is one which might be of interest to the people of Calgary.

The Medicine Hat News has decided that neither Calgary nor Edmonton is large enough for street railways and with a long experience in the ways of Medicine Hat, this scribe ought to know.

The city of Edmonton is thinking about rescinding the motion making a grant of \$1,000 to Kingston sufferers. They have got as much advertising out of the affair now as they would get by putting up the real coin.

The mayor of Edmonton has ordered the police to move the undesirable out of the city limits, and the underscribes reply that if they get out of the limits they will be either in Saskatchewan or Athabasca Landing.

The coldest day on record in Edmonton, was one last week, and the coldest day in Calgary was that fair April day when Frank Oliver and Peter Talbot sat down and carved the province of Alberta into provincial constituencies.

The following interesting item appears in the latest number of the Kenora News: "Stanley Cup, an old resident of Western Canada, but who has been residing in Montreal and Ottawa for the last three years has again taken up residence in the west. We hope it will be some time before S. Cup decides to return east."

The Hotel Question

Editor Albertan:

I noticed a reference in a recent issue of your paper to the action of the hotel keepers in Calgary in the raising of their usual rates in their several hotels. Now I protest, as one who is directly interested in this action of the hotel keepers.

I think it savors too much of graft or greed on the part of somebody. Who is the cause of this extortionate raise? I suppose the hotel combine is. But who is the individual? It points pretty plainly to Mr. Moodle. What a public benefactor he is getting to be anyway. We all know the hotels are and have been coming money right along. It is no unusual thing to see a hotel proprietor sell out at from \$20,000 to \$70,000 at any time, have a trip east or west, come back and start business anew. Let us glance for a minute at the rates: \$2.00 per day straight, 50 cents per meal, \$7.00 for meal ticket. They want us to pay for the hotel license, the brewery bill, the booze slingers' salary; why the whole thing.

Is there no public benefactor who will erect a large eating house where we shall get good plain food and plenty of it? The hotels certainly deserve a boycott from us. I suppose they think they can get along without us, depending on the travelling public. At any rate they are causing us considerable inconvenience at this season of the year, as we are at present depending on them.

I say, Mr. Editor, how would municipal owned and municipal operated hotels work anyway? It has been shown that this means can be used in supplying other necessities and commodities.

We have not seen that they are raising the wages of waitresses in the hotels, but on the other hand are discharging the waitresses and giving their places to Asiatics, Chinese and Japanese taking the place of our own people in our own country. What a shame.

It is about time people would waken up to see things as they are. At any rate I have wakened up since my hotel rate was doubled and must make a move somewhere.

good reason to believe that some members of the McBride government were participants.
"Where did the money go to?" from R. G. Macpherson.
The minister from B. C. went on to say that there had been a parliamentary investigation in the province, and two reports were made. True the majority report whitewashed the government, but the minority report was a plain and the departure of Mr. Green from public life had followed.
The minister once more referred to the Victoria speculators as "a small band of speculators—male and female." William Alfred Gulliver cast an additional glare of illumination upon these matters. Then Hon. G. Eulas Foster put what he took to be the position of some of the provinces, in regard to federal relationship, into expressive words. He said "servile obedience and alliance" and "subjugated obedience." Justice ended this debate, and those who were most glad to see the end of it were those who had begun it.
Mr. Aylesworth disposed of the Horien contention as ridiculous, and of the Foster speech as suitable for a B. C. stump.
Mr. McIntyre of Strathcona has given notice of a motion restraining all railway passenger rates to three cents per mile "unless after full investigation special permission to do so is given by the Railway Commission."

Concord, N.H., Jan. 30.—Secretary of the United States Treasury Shaw spoke before the New Hampshire board of Trade here this evening on the subject. A foreign market for American labor. In the course of his speech he suggested that the United States establish bonded ports. He said on this point:
"Merchandise can now be produced from imported material in bonded factories. It seems to be safe and wise to carry the logic of this provision one step further, and have bonded or free ports, suppose, instead of a bonded factory we bond a well defined section of land containing if you please several thousand acres. Within this bonded territory all kinds of factories could be built and into this zone all kinds of raw material could be entered without the payment of duty, this port should, of course, contain no dwellings. I would allow free coal and every other element of manufacture, except labor, to be entered free. In other words, this free port should be a great consumer of American labor, the product of which, under the most encouraging conditions, should be for import and export only. And if it were removed from the port for the purpose of domestic consumption, it should pay the same duty as if imported from abroad. I do not see where the American people could be harmed by such a policy and it would result in furnishing employment to those who choose to live beneath our flag, consume our products and work at the American scale of wages."

All New England would be benefited by such a port somewhere on the North Atlantic coast. A similar port should be established in the vicinity of Norfolk and another on the gulf. It will take time to develop the thought, but it is in absolute harmony with the present bonded warehouse, bonded factory and drawback policy, and we have the example in the free ports in Germany."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST.

Homestead Regulations.
Any even number section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 2 and 20, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 100 acres, more or less.
Application for homestead entry or inspection must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent.
An application for entry or inspection made personally at any Sub-Agent's office may be wired to the local Agent, by the Sub-Agent, the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.
In case of "persuasion" the entry will be summarily cancelled and the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim.
An applicant for inspection must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for inspection will be received from an individual until that application has been disposed of.
A homesteader whose entry is in good standing and not liable to cancellation, may subject to approval of the Department, relinquish it to favor of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, if eligible, but to no one else, in filing declaration of abandonment.
Where an entry is summarily cancelled or voluntarily abandoned, subsequent institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for inspection will be entitled to prior right of entry.
Applications for inspection must be in what particulars the homesteader is in default, and if subsequently the statement is found to be incorrect in material particulars, the applicant will lose any prior right of re-entry, should the land become vacant, or if entry has been granted it may be summarily cancelled.
Duties.—A settler is required to perform the conditions under one of the following plans:
(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.
(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such homesteader the requirement as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.
(3) If the settler has his residence upon farming, and owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirement may be satisfied by residence upon such land.
Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.

Coal.—Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected on the gross output.
Quartz.—A free miner's certificate is granted upon payment in advance of \$5 per annum for an individual, and from \$5 to \$10 per annum for the company according to capital.
A free miner, having discovered mineral place, may locate a claim 1,500x1,500 feet.
The cost for recording a claim is \$5. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. If \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon having a survey made and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per acre.
The patent provides for the payment of a royalty of 2 1/2 per cent on the sales.
PLACER. mining claims generally are 100 feet square; entry fee \$5, renewable yearly.
A free miner may obtain two leases to dredge for gold in five miles each for a term of twenty years renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior.
The lessee shall have a dredge in operation within one season from the date of the lease for five miles. Rental, \$10 per annum for each mile of river leased. Royalty at the rate of 2 1/2 per cent collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.

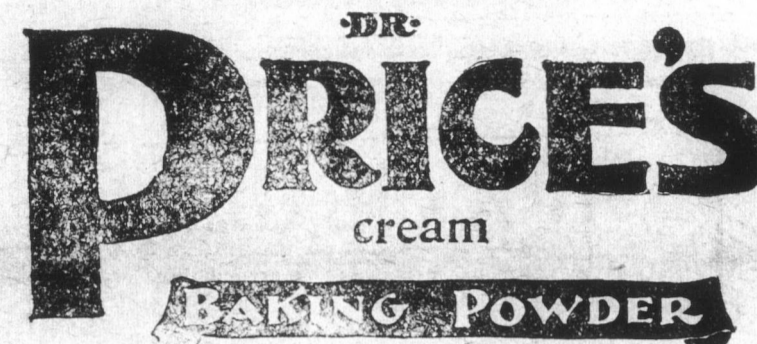

Rev. Messrs Hunter and Crossley Bid Farewell to Friends

**LARGE AUDIENCE;
INTERESTING SERVICE**

Advice to the New Converts.
Thanks to Many Persons

Last evening the farewell scene of Messrs. Crossley and Hunter's revival campaign took place in the Central Methodist church.

Rev. Messrs. Kerby, Patterson, Bishop, Grant, Misener, the adjutant of the Salvation Army and others were supporting the evangelists.

The church began to fill as early as seven o'clock, but the congregation was not the largest that has assembled since the evangelists came to Calgary.

Mr. Crossley addressed the meeting first, contrary to custom. He thanked the ministers for their support, the choir, organist and congregations.

"Stand by your ministers, stand by your converts. Thirteen years from now I hope to return to Calgary and find that none of you have backslid."

"I will now say a few words especially to the new converts. Be trusting Christians, be joyous Christians; don't put yourself in a straight jacket like some long-faced Christians outside Calgary. Be persevering Christians, be exemplary Christians, be steadfast Christians, be life long Christians."

"I have often been asked," said Mr. Hunter, "how is it that you brethren are so successful? I'll tell you. People all over the land are praying for us."

"I thank you all for your kindness. I thank the organist and the choir. I am not a singer, but I will know the notes when I get to heaven. Keep the books that you hold in your hands as a souvenir of Bro. Crossley and myself. May you sing the new song in the sweet by and by."

"I thank the pastors for their help and support. I thank the fathers; they have treated us fairly; they sometimes have their little squibs, but we have been before the public for 30 years and they know what we are. Sometimes some little fellow will let off a little squib, but that doesn't amount to anything."

"I thank the sisters; I thank you friends, I thank the treasurers, they couldn't do a mean thing I think. All expenses will have to be paid before we touch a cent."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST.
Homestead Regulations.
Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 96, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 190 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

"Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

This player leads the field in scoring, among the eastern players, having fourteen goals in three games to his credit.

Amos Huther, the latest outfielder signed by Edmonton, has a great "rep." He was with Beaumont in the Texas league last year and in 72 games batted 279. Beaumont's team has dropped out of league baseball, hence Manager White's luck in securing Amos. Last year in the Texas league, less than half a dozen players batted over .300.—Bulletin.

A special writer of the Medicine Hat Times in commenting upon the Cypress-Calgary intermediate game in Calgary falls into the same error as Rev. Dr. Maclean. The writer says: The Cypress boys went up to Calgary ten days ago, to play the

intermediates. Instead, three or four of the Calgary seniors were put on against them, as acknowledged in the Calgary papers. This may be all very good sport for the team that works the trick, but it is the kind of thing that gives sport the bad name it has. Seniors were available to the Cypress team, but they were never thought of.

Manager Thyme of the Calgary baseball club is doing good work in the far east and is beginning to get the fast ones for the team. He writes Secretary Kirby that he expects to have his team all signed in a few weeks.

The first player signed for the year was John Averhill, a right handed pitcher who is as good as any produced. He played with Haverhill of the New England league in 1905. Last year he played with the Lowell and Ashland teams. He made a good record with both teams. He weighs 175 lbs. and is 5 ft. 9 in. in height. He has great speed and has always made good wherever he has been. He is a very gentlemanly player both on and off the field. His home is in Lynn, Mass.

The second player to sign with the Calgary team was James Wholley, a strong second baseman from Haverhill, Mass., who guarded second base for Grand Rapids one season under the leadership of John Ganzel, one of the greatest baseball leaders of the day. Last season he made a remarkable record for the Laconia, New Hampshire state league, getting .318 against the best slab performers in that league. He fielded .986. He is a very speedy base runner, purloining 48 of them during the season.

Among other first class players who are desirous of playing under Manager Thyme are Catcher Montgomery of Wakefield, Mass.; Kallely, who caught for Fall River, New England state league, last season; Driscoll, of Somerville, Mass., who has been the receiver for Wintthrop in the Maine state league, where he made a good showing. He is six feet tall and weighs 180 lbs. He will without doubt be found upon the Calgary team.

Mr. Thyme is receiving applications every day by the score from good men. He is picking out the best of them.

Boston, Jan. 30—The first international contest between German and American yachts in German waters will be next August, when another series of the so-called "Sonder" type will be sailed at Kiel for a cup offered by the emperor.

Arrangements for the races were perfected today by an interchange of cables between Rear Admiral Barendson, of the Imperial Yacht Club, and Henry Howard, chairman of the German-American race committee of the Eastern Yacht of this city. The races will begin on August 15 and the United States will be represented by three yachts which will be selected by the German-American race committee. The races will be practically a return of

those held last summer at Marblehead, when the American yacht Vim won a cup from the German vessel. The only change in the conditions is that the crews must be all amateurs. Last year one yacht had a paid hand to assist in sail handling.

It is understood that the trial races for the American boats will be held at Marblehead in June, and that quite a delegation of American yachtsmen, besides the nine men constituting the crews of the three yachts, and the race committee will go to Kiel.

9. To provide for the submission of the assessment roll to a committee of the Council of not less than four for examination and report and for the Council equalizing, raising or lowering the assessment or any portion thereof without the formality of a complaint.

10. To provide that in elections for Aldermen no ballot shall be counted unless it discloses a bona fide vote or mark in favor of as many candidates as there are vacancies.

11. To provide that the Returning Officer at election shall appoint Deputy Returning Officer and select Polling Booths.

12. That Council have power to compel the erection of buildings in certain areas to be erected ten feet from the street line.

13. To provide for making supplementary assessment and collector's Roll to include persons coming to the City or starting business after the Assessment Appeal Court has confirmed the original Roll.

14. To amend Charter fixing the date of the first meeting of council to be held on the first legal day of each year.

Assistance from Panama

...New York, Jan. 29—The Panama railroad steamer Advance arrived today from Colon, after landing supplies at Kingston for the earthquake sufferers. The chief of the commissary from the canal zone was in charge of the provisions and tents.

Acute Depression on Stock Market

New York, Jan. 30.—Acute depression developed in the stock market again today and the fall in prices took on threatening proportions in the late trading. The high opening seemed to be largely due to the influence of the quarterly statement of earnings of the United States Steel corporation, which was not published until after the close of yesterday's market. The opening advance of 1/4 in the stock attracted such a pressure of selling orders as effectually demonstrated that eager advantage was taken of the stimulating effect of the report on the demand for the stock to market large holdings. The first price was the highest of the day, and although the stock showed occasional resistance, the pressure of the general market and failure to advance of United States steel was conclusive in shaping sentiment of the whole market.

Successful inroads were made at first on a few prominent stocks, notably Pennsylvania, Erie and Reading. The yielding tendency of these stocks affected the whole market by sympathy.

The fierce raiding tactics of the bears left a large shortage to be covered at the last, and this was the cause of the feverish rallies. Otherwise the market closed unsettled and in disorder.

Bonds are heavy with total sales of a par value of \$1,674,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call.

New Bank Has been Founded

New York, Jan. 30.—The formation of a new national bank to care for business originating with the big copper interests was announced here today. The institution will be named the National Copper Bank of New York, and will be capitalized at \$2,000,000.

TO IMPROVE THE SANTA FE LINE

An Issuance of \$98,000,000 for Extension of Lines

Topeka, Kas., Jan. 30.—The stockholders of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railway here today voted in favor of the issuance of \$98,000,000 in bonds to secure money for improvements and the extension of certain lines.

STILL PLAYING THE NATIONAL GAME

A serious Revolution in San Salvador

San Salvador, Jan. 30.—The government is despatching troops to suppress "the outlaws who have been committing murders in some of the country districts."

Panama, Jan. 30.—It is believed that a serious revolution is pending in Salvador, and that it will probably be headed by General Borahona.

CHICAGO HAS 4,000 CASES OF FEVER

And Diphtheria is Also Raging in the Windy City

Chicago, Jan. 30.—Three hundred and fourteen new cases of scarlet fever were reported here today, a total of 4,000.

Diphtheria cases are increasing. A proclamation by Board of Health Commissioner Whelan calls on people generally to cancel their social engagements for the time being.

BRIBED BY A NEWSPAPER MAN

Tells How He was Instructed With the Body

New York, Jan. 30.—Early Harding, a newspaper reporter, at the examination today of Ald. William S. Clifford (Municipal Ownership League), charged with bribery, told of the alleged arrangement whereby \$6,000 was to be turned over to one David Mann, a friend of Clifford, which sum, it is charged, was to be given to Clifford for equal distribution among fellow leaguers on the board of aldermen, when they should vote for Judge Rufus B. Cowan for the vacant recordership.

OTTAWA ATHLETES ON TRIAL FOR ASSAULT

The Two Smiths and Spittal Charged with Rough House

Ottawa Jan. 30.—Alf. and Harry Smith and Charlie Spittal, of the Ottawa hockey club, appeared in the police court today to answer to charges of assault in connection with the Wanderer-Ottawa hockey match played in Montreal recently.

The case of Harry Smith went over to Feb. 9th, owing to difficulty of securing witnesses, but evidence was put up against the others and they agreed to make voluntary statements this afternoon, on which they will be committed for trial.

Blatchford and Patrick of the Wanderers were two of the most important witnesses for the prosecution, but Patrick did not appear to have seen very much of the alleged hard hitting. Prosecution found much difficulty in getting witnesses to go on with the case.
