Rich Strike In Cassiar

Thirteen Thousand Dollars Brought Out From Hydraulic Property.

Was Taken Out In Twenty Days on Hamfield and Pike's Claim.

Big Returns Expected From Rich Ground In The North-ern District.

A rich strike is reported from Cassiar. It was taken from the rich hydraulic ground being worked by Messrs. Hamfield and J. Warburton Pike, of this city, at the junction of Thibet and Berry creeks.

This large amount of gold, valued at about thirteen thousand dollars, was brought out from the hydraulic property of Cassiar in Northern British Columbia yesterday afternoon by Mr. J. A. Thomson, manager of the Hudson's Bay company, who returned to the city yesterday afternoon by the steamer City of Vancouver.

It was also reported on the arrival of the steamer City of Vancouver by the officers of that vessel that there was a stamped-out new-fund placer in the Cassiar district, but it seems that the stampoutmen probably confused the reports received at Wrangell of Robert Reid's start into the interior in search of some placers found by him and some partners some years ago, and the arrival of the gold brought out by Mr. Thomson, who has just come out from the Cassiar district, has, however, been stamped.

Mr. Thomson brings good news regarding the operation of the hydraulic mine of the big parcel of gold now being worked by him amounting to thirteen thousand dollars in gold, which has been turned over to the provincial assay office at the parliament buildings for assay. It is evidence of the hydraulic property which is being operated there by Messrs. Hamfield and Pike of this city.

According to a conservative estimate the miners at that property on Thibet creek have taken out about fifty thousand dollars in gold for their season's work. As will be remembered, the operators in the district were when their works were obliterated by a large slide, but now that the debris has been cleared away, and operations are favorable—water being plentiful and the hydraulic machinery in good order—it is expected that this season will be a banner one, and as stated, will see fifty thousand dollars in gold.

The hydraulic mine from which this splendid return was taken in the Thibet district is situated at the junction of Berry creek and Thibet creek in the Cassiar district. It is about 108 miles across from Telegraph creek, at the head of streamboat navigation, the property is being worked by Hamfield and Warburton Pike, who first went into the Cassiar district in being the Cassiar Central Railway company. They have a staff of twenty-eight men.

The property is an excellent one, and for about two miles along Thibet creek, connecting to the Hudson's Bay Thibet and Berry creeks and trending in an easterly direction. The creek empties into the North-western. Along the two miles of hydraulic supply of water, there are two hydraulic mines, each of which will produce a head of 330 feet.

Further than having a plentiful supply of water, there is a large amount of property so situated that if the supply would run low at any time an ample amount of water could be obtained by damming the creek at two points, one a mile and a quarter from the workings and the other a quarter of the way from the workings. There is considerable water could be stored.

There are three moles at work on the property. Not one of them is the property well situated as regards to water supply but it is also placed in uniquely favorable circumstances in regard to the disposal of tailings. The bedrock of old channel, which is being worked and which rises like a bench, is high above the present creek's water level. It is quite a simple matter to dispose of the tailings. They are dumped over the bank.

That the work is being carried on with good result is shown by the statement given above, which shows that in less than a month—about twenty days—washing the miners took out in all 737 ounces of gold, which is expected to net \$13,000 for the fortunate miners. Mr. Thomson, who has been in the services to transport the gold to Victoria, and with two Indians packing for him, he made a quick trip to the city by the steamer City of Vancouver, and thence down the Stikine to Wrangell, where he embarked on the steamer City of Vancouver, and arrived at Victoria yesterday afternoon with the gold.

Mr. Thomson, who left Victoria on June 11, to start his official trip to the north and to interior Cassiar, went to Wrangell, where he was met by Mr. Reid and Mr. Lard and returned to Victoria with the gold. He found a severe epidemic of grippe raging in the interior, and many of the white people were also affected, right through from Telegraph creek to Fort Laramie. No one could account for the prevalence of the epidemic but it ravaged were only too apparent.

As for the reported stampout from Wrangell this report probably arose as a result of the stories current there concerning a rich placer in the Cassiar district, which was discovered some years ago by Robert Reid, formerly of Reid & Sylvester, who afterwards returned to the interior, and who is now in the interior. Reid is an old Cassiar miner and while out prospecting with two others he found what he believed to be a rich placer ground. The trio did a little prospecting and then came out for prospectors partners and the old man did not go back. When Mr. Thomson went into the district during June Mr. Reid was a passenger into the interior by the steamer Mount Royal, on route to the scene of the strike. Nothing has since been heard from him, and whether he has found a rich strike remains to be seen.

There has been quite a lot of prospecting done this season in the neighborhood of Dease lake and Dease creek, and much mineral has been both placer and hydraulic. At McNamee creek also there has been much work done. Below the rich property of Hamfield and Pike's on Thibet and Berry creeks, Mr. Reid is also working a property which he expects good results from. On McNamee creek there are a number of Chinamen at work and they seem to be taking out as much this year as in former seasons. A number of the Chinamen have done very well, while on the other hand there are some who have not. A subscription was taken up among the miners to send out two good Chinamen who had been working there for many years, and the Hudson's Bay company gave the two free passage to Wrangell, whence they came by the steamer City of Vancouver.

The Hudson's Bay company has just erected some good premises at Telegraph creek, where a new store, warehouse and wharf was built, and some additions have been made to the staff.

JUDGMENTS ON ELECTION ACT

Decided That Applications to Vote Can Be Taken Outside Province.

The following are the judgments of the Chief Justice and Justices Wilton, Drake and Irving in respect to the declarations by applicants to be placed on the voters' list, where the declarations have been taken outside the province.
