The Queen's Income.

The allowance of £20,000 a year for the privy purse is the carrying out of a commendable generosity with which a great nation treats its sovereign. Every want of the sovereign is already provided for...

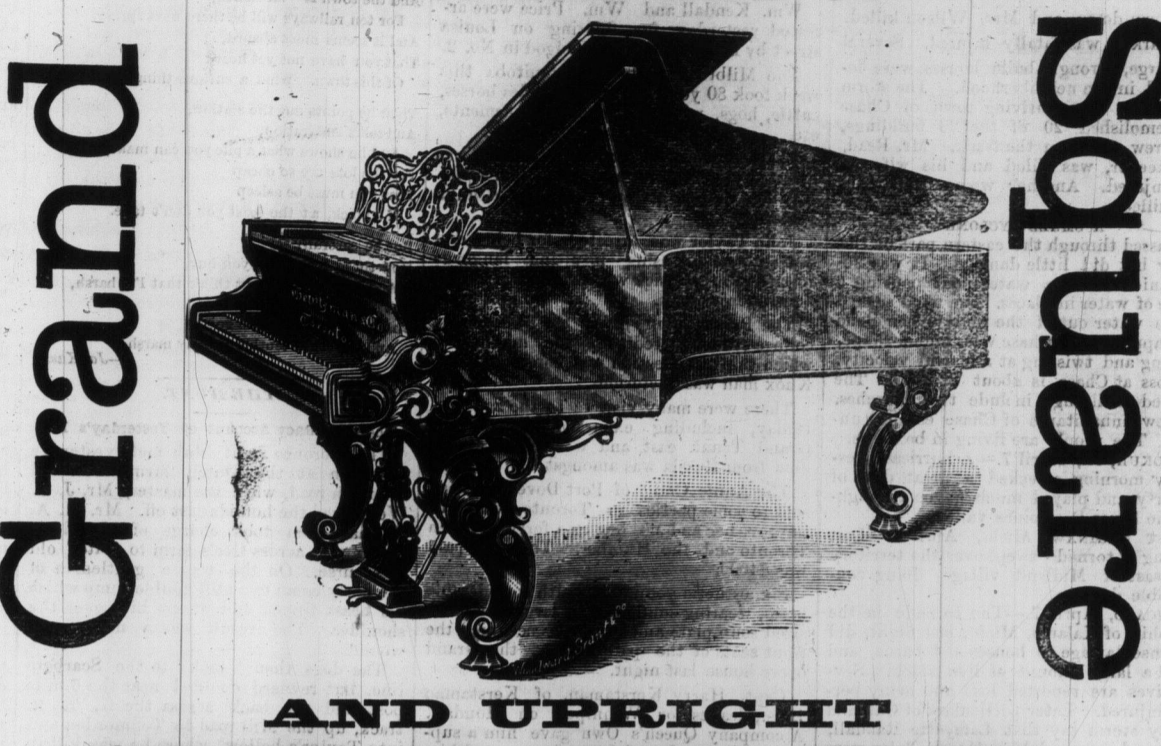
