THE ESPLANADE FIRE BYLAW. Editor World: Dear Sir-After the to each of the losers on building regarding our siding and shingles. To-day inform him that owing to the action of the inform him that owing to the action of the city council in passing this iron and mertar bylaw we were unable to de business with him, as the prescribed cover of mortar is an absurd and practical impossibility. The mortar brilliancy comes from the mode adopted in laying wood shingles, where the nails are driven in center of shingles over a part of the two preceding courses while the mortar is green. Metallic shingles and sliding are fastened by nails at top or sides. In driving nails to draw close to sheeting the mortar would be displaced. If the mortar was allowed to dry it would be worthless, and the iron not being close to sheeting the contraction dry it would be worthless, and the iron not being close to sheeting the contraction and expansion would draw nails. Mortar used under siding, on manufacturing places and elevators the jarring would break it causing it to crumble and run down. Had asbestos felt been demanded (a fireproof material) credit for common sense might have been given. Mortar is unnecessary. Either corrugated or galvanized iron is sufficiently fireproof. If paint were used the lime would destroy it.


