At the same time we do not care to assume the responsibility of advising such an important step as incorporation for the town, under present circumstances.

A good many of the towns of the province, some of them not even as large as this one, have adopted incorporation, and so far as we are aware only one of them became dissatisfied with the change and wished to go back to the old order of things.

That one, if we remember correctly, was Ferrisburgh. There, after a few years' trial of incorporation, petitioned the legislature for an act permitting a return to the first condition of things, which, however, was not done.

It is true that some things can be said in favor of incorporation. It gives a town, or ought to give it, local self-government. It enables the people of any town to have direct and immediate control over the taxes they themselves pay.

Transportation and the Disincentive Curse. Mr. Eron.—Dear Sir.—In a recent issue of your valuable paper I gave some views as to certain disabilities under which the producers of this laboring class are placed.

One Henry J. Fletcher, in the April number of the Forum, told of how the population of all the rural districts of the North-Central States are decreasing in population and how the cities are growing.

The closing days of this century are witnessing no more remarkable phenomenon than the migration of the population, not so much from country to country as from place to place in the same country.

Further on Mr. Fletcher thus expatiates on some of these things we know: "While the larger cities are rapidly absorbing the rural population, the smaller cities are being recruited, not from abroad, but by retired farmers and their families."

Mr. Fletcher affirms, after proceeding from point to point, "Against the multiplied influences constantly operating in favor of the great cities, the country is being depopulated."

How is the village manufacturer to compete with the city manufacturer who gets all the articles of which his products are composed at rates of freight at a profit less than the village manufacturer gets his?

The commission in its report said: "The sense of the country is that the farmer is the small dealer in the country town."

This reasoning and the illustrations are wonderfully applicable to our case. We have an enemy equal to any, slanting the control of all the important transportation routes to and from our valley.

The Household.

Tomatoes are excellent stuffed and baked. Select round tomatoes uniform in size, wash and drain, and without peeling cut off the top, take out the inside, throw away the seeds and chop the remainder with one large onion and a few green peppers. Thicken with fine bread crumbs, add some melted butter and season with salt.

Tomatoes make a desirable dish for a company luncheon when stuffed with meat. Prepare the tomato as in the above receipt. Chop fine any left over cold meat or chicken to make one cupful for six tomatoes; add to it one chopped onion and one tablespoonful of parsley and season with butter, salt and pepper. Mix thoroughly and fill the tomatoes, heating them. Cover them with bread crumbs and put in a pan with one cup of water, six cloves, one bay leaf and a teaspoonful of butter. Bake half an hour, basting several times with the liquid.

Spiced tomatoes make a delicious relish for meats. To seven pounds of peeled tomatoes add five quarts of granulated sugar, one pint of vinegar and one ounce each of whole cloves, cinnamon, allspice and ginger. Put all in the porcelain kettle and place over the fire. Cook slowly until as thick as required. Put in jelly glasses, and when cold cover.

A daily way of serving tomatoes with the chafing dish at a luncheon or Sunday night tea is after the following dressing: Rub to a cream four tablespoonfuls of butter, two teaspoonfuls of powdered sugar, and a generous teaspoonful of ground mustard. Add half a teaspoonful of salt and a pinch of cayenne pepper. Rub into the mixture the pulverized yolks of two hard boiled eggs. Heat four tablespoonfuls of vinegar. Then add it and finally beaten raw eggs. Set the dish containing the mixture in a pan of boiling water and cook very slowly until the consistency of cream. Stir constantly to make it smooth, and set aside to cool. Peel some ripe, firm tomatoes, cut in thick slices and place in the ice box. When it is time to serve them put a tablespoonful of butter into the chafing dish and a layer of the sliced tomatoes, and when hot serve the cream dressing. Place a spoonful of the dressing on the plate with the tomato. The dressing may be used hot or cold.

With Spoon and Cup. A USEFUL TABLE OF MEASURES TO HANG IN THE KITCHEN. The following measures of capacity may be found useful in the kitchen for easy reference: Four even teaspoonful liquid equal one even tablespoonful. Three even teaspoonful dry material equal one even tablespoonful. Sixteen tablespoonful liquid equal one cupful. Twelve tablespoonful dry material equal one cupful. Two cupfuls equal one pint. Four cupfuls equal one quart. Four cupfuls flour equal one quart or one pound. Two cupfuls solid butter equal one pound. Two cupfuls granulated sugar equal one pound. One pint milk or water equals one pound. One dozen eggs should weigh one and one-half pounds. Skim milk is heavier than whole milk and cream is lighter than either, while pure milk is 2 per cent. heavier than water. The following table of proportions is also valuable: One teaspoonful soda to one cupful molasses. One teaspoonful soda to one pint sour milk. Three teaspoonfuls baking powder to one quart flour. One-half cupful yeast or one-quarter cake compressed yeast to one pint liquid. One teaspoonful extract to one loaf plain cake. One teaspoonful salt to two quarts flour. One teaspoonful salt to one quart sour milk. One scant cupful of liquid to one full cup of flour for muffins. One quart of water to each pound of meat and bone for soup stock. Four peppercorns, four cloves, one teaspoonful mixed herbs for each quart of water for soup stock. It is often said of good cooks that "they never measure—they guess." Not so. Long experience has taught them to measure, and measure accurately, by means of that same experience and judgment. This however is a most risky experiment for beginners, whose opinions are still insufficiently furnished with judgment for independent aerial navigation.

Good Bread.

At a bread contest held in an eastern city not long ago, a milling company offered prizes ranging from \$5 to \$100 for the best loaf of bread. The recipe used by the winner of the \$100 was: Three parts of water, one half pint of milk, one tablespoonful of lard, one tablespoonful of sugar, two tablespoonfuls of salt, and one yeast cake. The ingredients were first thoroughly mixed, and then kneaded ten minutes, were raised over night in a covered bread pan. In the morning the dough was kneaded ten minutes and made into four loaves. Three other loaves entered for the contest were awarded \$75 prizes. One of these loaves seems to have been prepared in a somewhat unusual way. The ingredients for the dough were two-thirds milk to one-third water, compressed yeast and a little salt and sugar, and were mixed with enough flour to make a stiff dough. This dough was mixed, kneaded and set to rise at night. When light it was chopped thoroughly with a chopping knife, made into loaves, and set to rise the second time; when this light it was baked forty minutes.

School Manners. Among the educational purposes and projects that such an occasion brings to mind, a word may be interjected on the subject of school manners. It would well for our educators and school trustees to think about imparting to our children some culture in courteousness. Live Stock Notes.

Hens should never be fed so well that when they are given a good crop they will lose a good portion of the time. It is best that a cow should be given a rest every year and not milked continuously, as they will do better if given this chance to recuperate. If your cows get the habit of stopping at night on the dry land in the back end of the pasture, make a road and bridge so they will not be obliged to cross some of the holes. The Nebraska Farmer very aptly says that it is nature's way to permit of no stop-overs on the route travelled by the pig from the farrowing nest to the packing house, and that regular stop-overs are necessary for the highest profit. Feeding the dam is said to be feeding the pig, and the food of the mother should be prepared in view of this fact. What is saying is to be done on the farm seven years in the age that the animal is worth most. If well broken then and never injured in any way the buyer escapes many changes of mishaps, while the seven-year-old horse has fully as many years of effective work as the average of horses bought younger. If kept exclusively on the farm and not fed heavily with grain, a horse may do good work till it is 25 or 28 years old. It is the driving on the road that shortens the years of usefulness of such work, but the nervous system is stimulated unnaturally. For feeding in bulk clover hay is objected to by many farmers because it is liable to be dusty. It is not light in nitrogen that heats very easily if bad weather covers the hay. The clover is rich, and in the barn there is apt to be some heating of clover hay in the morning. Horses are very fond of clover, and will gorge themselves on it so as to be unfit to do hard work. For this reason clover hay should be moistened with water, and bran, and other things, so that it will not heat so much. A few pounds of bran will do much to keep the horses in good condition for working.
