Because of the practical impossibility of egress through the coning tower when it is subjected to an enormous pressure of water, as it would be at the bottom of the sea, it was thought that all in the boat would be lost in a contingency such as has been presented; but experiments made with dogs have proved conclusively to naval officers that the mem bers of the crew could be shot out of the torpedo tube without injury-that is, all could with the exception of one. There is no doubt about it. One man would have to stay behind to work the mechanism in order that his fellows might escape, and thus the question arises, what would become of the last man? 

Broken limbs may be removed and many of the inside limbs which are overlapping the fruiting twigs can be cut off during the Winter as well as in the Spring. The work of pruning should always be done with a sharp knife; in pruning saw from the under-side of the limb first, finishing from the top. This will result in a clean cut and there will be no splintering as would be the case if a heavy limb was cut through from the top. 




