RIOTOUS SCENES IN COMMONS WITH DR. CLARK STORM CENTRE AIR IS FILLED WITH EPITHETS

Speaker Sproule Threatens to Name Red Deer Member For Defying Rules of House and Pandemonium Follows -Premier's Tactful Handling Relieves Situation Almost Unparalleled in Tensity-Opposition Will Continue the Fight, Despite Borden's Warning.

OTTAWA, March 16 .- (Special) .- Scenes of violent disorder, perhaps unparalleled in Canada, and seldom exceeded in the mother parliament, characterized the closing hours of Saturday night's debate on the naval bill in committee of the commons. There was open defiance of the chairman of the committee and of Mr. Speaker himself, who took possession of the house in order to quell the uproar.

Dr. Michael Clark, Liberal member for Red Deer, was "named" by the Speaker and threatened with suspension. Had it not been for the prime minister, who induced Dr. Clark to make an explanation and the Speaker to withdraw his censure, something like a riot might have been precipitated.

The house had been more or less disorderly all evening on both sides of the chamber, but the climax drew near about 9.30, when Mr. Robidoux of Kent, N.B., who was acting as chairman of the committee, rose to his feet apparently to rule upon a question of order which had been taken upon his assuming the chair at 5 o'clock. This point was to the effect that Mr. Robidoux had no authority to preside, having been called to the chair, not by the Speaker, but by Richard Blain of Peel, who preceded him as temporary chairman of the committee

HURLED EPITHETS. When Mr. Robidoux, as chairman, rose to end the protracted discussion, there were loud cries of protest from the opposition benches, and Dr. Pugsley, stepping into the aisle in front of his desk, insisted upon Dr. Neely, member for Humboldt, who had risen at the same time as the chairman, being heard first. In the uproar that followed many members on both sides of the chamber rose to their feet and there was a medley of cries and counter cries. Such terms as "Rebels," "Russian methods," "Shame," "Howling mob," "Rattlesnakes," were hurled back and forth across the

Mr. Speaker Sproule, who a few moments before had entered the chamber in his robes of office, ascended the dais, and commanded order. His voice for the time was lost in the whirlwind of noise. 

NEW YORK, March 16.—Two patients among the first to be treated with the turtle serum of Dr. Friedmann were reported today by physicians who have them under observation to show much improvement. Results were not expected so quickly from the turtle germs. Some of the improvement may be attributed, the doctors suggest, to the psychological effect upon the patients.

Patience on the part of a mistress will often make a girl who seems awkward, or dull, the most valuable servant. The first six months are the hardest for both girl and employer. Even six months is scarcely long enough for the stranger to become acquainted with her new surroundings, the strange family and their customs.

It is the woman who determines to find a girl who seems to have the qualities she likes, is well meaning and honest, and, having secured her, makes up her mind to keep her at least six months, that never has trouble with her help. George Washington's famous rule is a good one for nervous women to remember; he said: "I would not let a servant be more polite than I myself."



CHINESE NATION ONE OF WONDERS

Rev. Dr. Mackenzie Expects Great Things From Clever Orientals.

FINE FUTURE IN STORE


Great Men Have Been Quietly Persevering to Make Improvement.

Rev. Dr. Murdoch Mackenzie before a crowded audience in the Canadian Institute on Saturday evening gave a masterly resume of "Chinese nation, its history and its people." Its geographical position accounts to some extent for its complete isolation from the other nations of the world. It has every variety of climate, and grows every variety of climate, and grows every variety of food necessary for the sustenance of its people—a self-contained nation. The soil is wonderfully fertile, and the Chinese know how to get the most that the earth can produce. It is said that in one province alone there is sufficient coal to supply the entire population of the world for 1000 years: Copper, silver and tin also are found.

The inhabitants number one-quarter of the entire inhabitants of the globe. They live in villages, towns and cities. They are remarkable for their industry and perseverance. Wherever you find him the Chinaman is a busy man. They can match any people for contentment, altho many—are on the verge of starvation. They are genial, remarkably curious, have high ideals of family life, a great reverence for the past. They are a sturdy, virile people, and there is no indication that they are a plaved-out nation.

History of China has yet to be written, and the Chinese themselves know little about it. They do not reason from premises to conclusion, but rather follow custom blindly. Their industry is evidenced by the great wall of China, 1500 miles in length, built 210 0years ago, and 1300 years ago there was an attempt made at a canal 600 miles long up towards the present site of Pekin. The man most reverenced in China is the scholar. Education is highly prized. They have a genius for organization: there are more "guilds" in China than in any other country. The lecturer pointed out that the Chinese must not be judged by the few we see in Canada, who come from only one part of one province of China. These no more represent the Chinese nation than would a habitant from Quebec village represent a typical Canadian. represent the Chinese nation than would a habitant from Quebec village

Food for Thought.
Today savants are "digging up" for us the history of the ancient worlds, but we have in China a nation that was a contemporary of ancient Baby-lon, Assyria, Greece and Rome, of the empires of medieval times, and is a contemporary of the great nations of today. China is the storm centre of Europe today and is giving European statesmen more food for thought than any other nation. The Chinese have in them the makings of a splendid in them the makings of a splendid manhood, and there is every indication that they have a great part to play in the nations yet to be. There is today a wonderful desire for change in the hearts of this people: they are in the throes of a great revolution: they are cutting away from the past and will assimilate all those things that they find worth the consideration. This is due to those great men who have been working on quietly, persehave been working on quietly, perseveringly, with a great price on their head, feeling and believing that a great To Dr. Sen more than to any other China owes her present greatness and her greatness that is to be. It is a matter of regret that so few Chinese students are to be found in our universities as compared to the number enrolled in American institutions but enrolled in American institutions but this is the price England is paying for the odious opium trade forced upon the Chinese; but there is some compensation in the knowledge that in the great universities now being established in China itself, Englishmen will have an opportunity of giving to the new nation the best traditions of the British Empire.

SQUARE FOOT BASIS BEST IN VALUATING PROPERTY

Is More Likely to Work Out Equitably Than in Appraisals Made by Frontage Foot Prices—Can Be no Rigid Rule Set Down, But a General Acceptance of the Square Foot Principle Would Leave Less Room For Inequalities.

It would seem to be about time that Toronto quit buying and selling perty on the front foot basis and got into the way of handling ground the more equitable square foot basis.

Front foot values extended along a block front are really the standard om which the square foot appraisal is made, so that frontage prices will always be a feature of realty trading. But the point is that too much stress s placed on that item of valuation and too little thought given to the area of the land under negotiation. In leasing space in buildings the square foot

of the land under negotiation. In leasing space in buildings the square foot foot lots are not twice as the basis for price.

Two hundred foot lots are not twice as valuable as 100 foot lots, that it in the ordinary practise. But there are people who will find that the last hundred feet of a 200 foot lot can be converted into just as profitable use as the front part. Restaurants, soda counter shops, for instance, are included. Other people will find a fifty foot lot just as valuable to their busices of the construction of a drill hall. Building construction is apparent on every side, on every street. Near the Queen's Hotel, a site for a vaudeville theatre is being cleared on King street east, the big new school and the Methodist Church are nearing completion, and other buildings as well as many houses are under war as a small completion. ness as a 100 foot lot. There are several rules of percentage applied. They do not differ greatly, being founded on the averaged prices obtained in thousands of deals tabulated for the purpose. The table following is that used by the Chicago Board of Review, which is responsible for the final assessments in that city. It should be found valuable in giving some approximate idea of the worth of lots, varying from the average depth. People who sell very deep lots do not always get the price the greater area of their ground warrants, and sometimes the man with the shallow lot gets as much on the vendor of an average lot. And these positions are just as often reversed. The trouble is due to the absence of the recognition of the square foot






