DEATH WAS JUST MISSED

LADY ABERDEEN'S CARRIAGE FALLS INTO THE GATINEAU.

Returning Home to Ridean Hall the Carriage Was Upset Over the River Bank -Her Excellency and Party Were Rescued None the Worse For Their Buck-

Ottawa, April 22.-(Special)-Lady Aberdeen had a narrow escape from what might have been a serious acc dent this afternoon. She was ou driving with one of the staff, fe turning home along the west bank of the Gatineau River, a tributary which enters into the Ottawa about a mile below the city. A few hundred yards north of Gatineau village the road is for a short distance just now covered with flood water, but is in regular use by the farmers and others, There is, however, at that point by the side of the river a large hole, concealed at present by the flood water, and when opposite this hole one of the horses swerved slightly, and immediately the carriage and its occupants were plunged into the water. Fortunately all the occupants of the carriage were extricated, but the horses were drowned. They were a very fine pair of chestnuts, given some years ago by the Governor-General to Her Excellency for her own use. Much thankfulness is naturally expressed at the escape of the Countess and the other occupants of the carriage. Her Excellency, though feeling somewhat the shock occasioned by such an accident, does not appear to have suffered in health, and to-night gave a farewell reception to the members of Parliament at Rideau Hall.





Twenty-eight new families were relieved. For breaking stone 940 orders were issued and 757 men did the necessary work. Until April 1 120 gallons of soup was distributed daily.
