

COURT OF APPEAL.

The Court of Appeal reserved judgment in Stephens v. Molsons Bank.

If Petman v. City of Toronto the appeal is by the city from the judgment of Rose, J., quashing city bylaw No. 2841, providing for certain local improvements on Gladstone-avenue. The judgment also directed the amounts paid as local improvements to be refunded to the parties who paid them. The bylaw was confirmed by 54 Vic. (O.), ch. 82, sec. 12, but the enterprising land owners on the avenue procured the passage of 58 Vic. (O.), ch. 89, sec. 7, which enacts that the prior statute is not to affect any rights which the landowners may have against the city for relief. The bylaw is attached on various legal grounds, the bare statement of which would make an ordinary reader's half stand on end, and they will, it is said, tax to the utmost the ingentity and talent of the city's counsel to meet. The main objection, however, is that the cost of the proposed extension of the avenue was recommended by the Assessment Commissioner at \$14,000, but the actual cost will be \$35,000.

A CASE IN BUSINESS.

Washington, Nov. 12.—Consul-General Penfield reports from Cairo, Egypt, that the cholera outbreak prevailing in Egypt for upwards of a year has now apparently come to an end. Alexandria has been free from cases for a fortnight, and Cairo reports one death since Oct. 1. The total number of deaths in Egypt from the date of the appearance of the scourge to date has been 18 110


