PROPOSED GRAIN ROUTES
A National Line of Transportation via Toronto Becomes the Hot Topic.

CLAIMS OF GEORGIAN BAY TOWNS.

Position of Owen Sound and Collingwood Discussed—Menfordites on the Move—Midland Yet to Speak.

Editor World: The enclosed letter has been written at the instigation of a joint committee of the Town Council and the Board of Trade of Owen Sound, appointed to watch the interests of this town throughout the proposed grain routes. It is respectfully requested by the said committee that this and following letters from the same source upon that much-discussed question be given space in the columns of your valued paper.

OWEN SOUND'S POSITION.

Editor World: No present day question is receiving greater attention from the public mind, the press and the people of Canada than the problem, How shall the grain trade of the Canadian West be kept from falling wholly into the hands of American carriers and American ports? The solution of this question is of the utmost importance not only to the people of this country, but to the people of the world. A Question of Geography.

The question is largely one of geography. Anyone may see at a glance by looking at a map that the proposed route, necessitating as it does, the navigation of two sides of a large, narrow, shallow bay, is extremely circuitous as compared with either the Farry Sound route, the proposed route by canal through Lake Nipissing to the Ottawa River and the proposed route by lines from Georgian Bay ports, such as Collingwood or Owen Sound, to Toronto, and thence to Montreal.

Traffic For All Routes.

The Hon. Mr. Tarte is of opinion that there is, in fact, no one route, but that traffic for all the proposed Canadian routes. This opinion is doubtless based on an intimate and full knowledge of the various routes, and is a very reasonable one. The Proposed Routes.

What the people of Toronto want, and what the people of the ports on the south shore of Georgian Bay want, is a route that will lead to the employment of labor in Toronto and in the other places concerned, and now that the whole problem is up for serious discussion, it is of vital importance that the question of what the absolutely best route from Georgian Bay to Toronto should be earnestly, intelligently, and judicially considered.

Claims of Owen Sound.

The harbor of Owen Sound is situated at the southern limit of the Great Lakes. It is easily accessible in all weathers by the heaviest carriers on the upper lakes, having a uniform depth of 20 feet, even at low water mark. The foundation of the harbor is fine clay, and the water can be easily dredged to a still further depth.

THE GEORGIAN BAY-TORONTO ROUTE.

Interest in the Georgian Bay-Toronto railway project increases. The merits of the scheme are now universally recognized, and we apprehend that little opposition will arise to prevent its being carried into effect. One point greatly in favor of the project is the fact that the Government has abandoned the idea of acquiring the Ottawa and Parry Sound Railway. The extension of the Intercolonial to Parry Sound and the Georgian Bay-Toronto railway project are competitive schemes. It would be reasonable for the Government to purchase the line to Parry Sound and then subsidize a rival route to take away the business of its newly-acquired property. The Parry Sound deal is happily out of the way. The only question before the Government is the desirability of improving the railway facilities between Georgian Bay and Toronto. Moreover, Hon. Mr. Tarte has publicly stated that the Government will aid this project. It remains for the towns and cities directly interested to agree on the route, and on the nature of the improvement to be undertaken. It would be desirable to have the best harbor or harbors on the Georgian Bay. At the present time there are four claimants for the business, viz.: Owen Sound, Collingwood, Meaford and Midland. As far as distance is concerned, there is not a great deal of difference between any of the points of more importance than distance is the facilities of the respective harbors for receiving vessels and sending the traffic. The success of the new route will depend upon its having as its northern terminus a harbor that will receive the largest vessels of the upper lakes. This harbor must be able to accommodate the vessels now run to Chicago, Buffalo, Depot Harbor and every other port on the great lakes. It is just possible that all the four ports above mentioned may be satisfactory in this respect, but the most suitable one can only be decided on after comparing the merits of them all. This new route runs out an estuary as anticipated, it will not be long till there is business enough for all the four ports. The Canadian traffic alone, if it were handled exclusively by Canadian roads, is enough to keep them all busy. The cost of this project is not small. It is estimated that it will cost but comparatively little to connect them all with the proposed short route to Toronto. In order that the traffic can be handled at the lowest possible cost, it was necessary to have a well-constructed railway, with heavy rails and large cars. The facilities at the Toronto end will have to be the most modern. Probably the best location in Toronto for the terminal facilities is along the west side of Ashbridge's Marsh. The elevations should be built out near the eastern channel, the marsh being filled up so as to afford accommodation for the railways and to provide a line of docks from the channel northwards to the foot of Parliament-street or thereabouts. The Don should be kept to the east of these improvements, and made to discharge into Lake Ontario, east of the eastern channel. We would advise the various towns that are interested in the new route to prepare a statement of the merits of their respective harbors and railway connections, and have the same printed and ready for circulation at the forthcoming meeting to be held in Toronto.

CANADIAN COPYRIGHT.

The Confederation Act which united all Canada is superior legislation. It is entirely different and far more important than any ordinary law. It is like the American written constitution adopted by conventions of the people. Our Act is just as valid and constitutional as if it had been adopted by a convention of the people because it was tacitly so adopted. The leading men of all the provinces, who, after long conferences, agreed to it, represented the Canadian people. There was a change only of one word made by the Imperial Parliament. The word Dominion was substituted for the word Kingdom. The Act presents internal evidence of its superior nature. The subject with which it is concerned is so important as to make it superior to ordinary legislation. It constituted a new autonomy, subject only to the Queen. Canadians are not, since 1867, British subjects, and subject to any and every law that the British monarch or the Queen should have enacted and to Canada, there is nothing to prevent her from setting up her court at Ottawa and making it a court of appeal for the Canadian Ministers. It would be the Queen herself instead of the Governor-General.

Then the oath of allegiance given by the Confederation Act is entirely different from that given by previous Acts dealing with Canada. It simply states that the deponent will bear true allegiance to the Queen. The former oath was that the deponent would bear true allegiance to the Sovereign of Great Britain and Ireland and Canada depending on the same. These remarks are absolutely necessary in view of the fact that there is now a tendency in England to diminish the effect of the Dominion Act. This Act gives the Dominion power to legislate on copyright. The fact of its being among the subjects given annually by implication legislation elsewhere. The Imperial Copyright Act applied to Canada before Confederation; but since it could not override legislation on the same subject by the Dominion. To make Imperial laws passed before Confederation still rule in Canada after we are supposed to have received self-government is unjust, and we are entitled to what was intended. It was intended that the Act of Confederation should repeal all previous Acts so far as they applied to Canada.

Under the Imperial Act an English author can sell copyright to an American publisher and "throw Canada in." Under this arrangement Canada is deprived of the book altogether unless the American publisher chooses to publish in Canada. And when he does so puts the work on sale in Canada he puts what price he pleases on it, as no one can publish but himself. "Truly," for instance, cost seventy-

five cents in Toronto and fifteen in Buffalo. Again, a Canadian publisher purchases copyright from an English author under the impression he has the exclusive right to his great surprise he soon finds the Canadian market swamped by a cheap "colonial" edition of the same work.

Only a few years ago a Canadian Copyright Act was passed to remedy this injustice. It was pigeon-holed and suppressed by the English Colonial Secretary in Downing-street. We have also asked the English Government three times to give notice for us so that we can be released from the restrictions imposed by the Berne Convention. These requests have all been disregarded. There was a copyright association formed some time ago, John Ross Robertson, M.P., was a leading spirit. It has not been heard of lately. The Canadian Copyright Act should not be abandoned. It is fair and just to all parties. It provides ample recompense to the author in Canada he does not choose to publish in Canada. It is to be hoped something may be done next session of Parliament.

That old bugaboo, the word "piracy," has lost its terrors. It is obsolete and never had any meaning. One would look for it in some old work on protection. It is not at all warranted in the modern competitive world. When an author sits down to write a book he knows where copyright laws prevail; he knows the market. If the extent of that market will not pay him for the work he can easily turn to some other employment. No one forces him to write. But nothing but pot boilers are ever made by a man who so deliberates. The real author writes because he must, and the last thing he thinks of is the profits. In a new country like Canada, struggling to get education for her people, it is a great injury and injustice to be deprived of reading matter which freedom gives to almost all other countries.

CENSURE ON GENERAL EAGAN

The War Investigating Commission Retained His Typewritten Statement and Explained Why. Washington, Jan. 13.—The War Investigating Commission to-day passed a resolution of censure on General Eagan for the language he used yesterday, when he appeared to answer the charges made against the commissary branch of the army by Major-General Miles, and returned to him the carefully-prepared typewritten statement which he left with the commission after reading it to that body. With its return was sent a letter explaining the reasons for this action and a copy of the resolution passed to-day. Army circles this morning had scarcely recovered from the shock received yesterday by the statement of Commissary General Eagan, in the opinion of the officers, his military without precedent in the military history of the United States. Therefore, there was a possible distinction on the part of the officials to express for publication any opinion of the merits of the case, but it was necessary that the immediate effect would be to accentuate the division of the army into two camps, and thus to injure the chances of an

The inaugural meeting of the Legislation Committee yesterday afternoon breathed the prevalent feeling of distrust of the administration. It had been called to give notice of city legislation to the Legislature and the meeting showed its feelings by two things. First, it passed unanimously and without a word of debate a resolution by Ald. Hallam, "That legislation be sought to amend section 216 of the Municipal Act by striking out sub-section 2 thereof, so that no council may elect a Mayor when the office becomes vacant after July 1 in any year."

Other Legislation Asked. Then, in a singularly radical tone of mind, the committee endorsed the following amended section of the Act so as to provide that each parcel of vacant property shall be liable for the taxes charged against it, and the assessed owner not to be liable to distress on other property for such taxes; also to make this retroactive so as to apply to the returns for 1898 and 1897.

To amend the Assessment Act so that the assessment of street railways, telegraph, telephone, gas and similar companies, for rails, poles, wires, gas pipes, etc., upon the city streets, shall be assessed in one ward, and that the ward in which the head office of such company is situated, and for their fair value.

To amend section 408 and 409 of the Municipal Act so that persons who are not citizens of the city, but who own property in the city, shall be liable for the taxes on such property.

To amend section 7 of the Assessment Act so as to abolish the exemption of places of worship and land used in connection therewith.

To amend the Municipal Act so that persons may vote upon personal property worth \$400 or upwards, well as upon income.
