From now on, every local organization will be governed by this body in matters of general importance, but will at the same time enjoy their trade autonomy. That is, they will have the power to deal alone with all matters pertaining to their own trade particularly. The trades councils will hereafter be known as sectional trades councils, or branches of the main amalgamated council. These sections will be formed of unions engaged in work of a common nature and divided into several Trade Sections.

The sections will be: Building Trades Section. Printing Trades Section, Metal Trades Section (comprising all its estate of the section woodworking Section, Miscellaneous Section (comprising all its estate and Label Section (composing delegates from all locals that have a labor). Each section will have a night upon which they will neet to discuss matters dealing with their own trade only, and have the privilege of electing such officers as they deem advisable to govern the body.

Each local shall send as their representatives to the sectional council their delegates previously appointed to represent them at the head council. The running expenses of the newly formed council shall be defrayed by means of a per capital tax levide on all unions of one cent, payable quarterly.

report, said "It is gratifying to the Directors to be able to announce, in our 20th Annual Report to the shareholders, the results of a successful and profitable year's business. The conditions of the past year are worthy of special mention, for the financial world experienced the reaction that seems to inevitably follow an era of expansion. The shrinkage in the value of all classes of securities has been almost unprecedented and it is therefore with much satisfaction that we are able to announce, notwithstanding these adverse circumstances, one

Louisa-St. School, Whose Pupils Are of All Nations, Emptied in Quick Time.

Louisa-street School is the oldest in the city, having been built in 1852. The old boys of the school will hold their annual at home next Thursday in St. George's Hall. Meanwhile the boys are compiling their reminiscences with historic oratory in prospect. Among survivors of the classes of half a century ago are James Yorston, president of the association; Hugh Yorston, Frank Hillock, who was the first pupil enrolled; W. J. Graham, William Keenan and W. H. Rolston. Frank Hillock, 103 Albert-street, says he attended the first day. The school was then a fourroomed structure, and there were two male and two female teachers. Mr. Hunter, the senior teacher, is long dead. Hugh Yorston of King & Yorston, 31 Elizabeth-street, remembers when there were many pay schools, as they were called, in the city About the time he went to Louisa-street School these were taken over and the teachers were given rank in the public schols Mr Yorston attended one in Coyne's cottage, still standing as 41 Chestnut-street, opposite Osgoodestreet. Mr. Yorston was inclined to think the education of the past superior to the present, especially in writing and history.

Two cottages still standing at Trinity-square and Trinity-lane, formed the nucleus from which the present school has expanded. Several additions to the first building have been made, and the school now has three storeys, with nine rooms, in which eleven teachers are employed. School these were taken over and the

Mrs. Arthurs, the principal, had long experience as a trainer of teachers in the Model School, and has been eight years in Louisa-street. The school as a whole presents perhaps the completest combination that could be found of all the difficult problems which confont the public school system. A very large proportion of the children are foreign, and of 73 admitted last September and October, only ten could speak English. Many of these children are unaccustomed to the amendies of Canadian life, and it takes some time to penetrate the reserve or duliness or
