Fogarty and J. Lee Are Badly Injured—Others Escape With Shaking Up.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 10.—Excitement was added to the races at the Fair Grounds today thru accidents in the second and fifth events. In the second, four jockeys went down when Blackburn stumbled on the backstretch. Jockey Fogarty was badly injured, and it may be several weeks before he can ride again. J. Lee, on Prince Fortunatus, had his leg badly injured and probably will be out of the saddle at least a week. Jockey Herbert, on Flowaway, and Mountain, on Vesta Hill, escaped injury. Wonderful indeed is the activity displayed by the electric syndicate over the power bylaw. The city is being flooded with anonymous literature of various kinds—all equally valueless—designed to convince the citizens that public service corporations are public benefactors. Perhaps it may occur to the recipients of this canned information that an ounce of performance is worth many tons of paper promises.

Common sense is all that is necessary to meet the campaign of the would-be electric barons of Toronto and South Ontario. On the one side of this struggle there is private interest, on the other public right and the common good.

A LONDON BANKER ON THE CRISIS.

In his presidential address to the fellows and members of the Institute of Bankers, Sir Felix Schuster, one of the leading English financial authorities, took on the whole a hopeful view of the business and monetary outlook.

Sir Felix considers present indications point to restriction rather than expansion of trade all over the world. It was apparent, he said, that the development of trade had proceeded at somewhat too rapid a pace and that available capital had not been adequate to meet the demands made simultaneously from so many quarters.

Speaking particularly on the United States crisis, the president, while referring not to say much, remarked that like every other crisis, it had arisen out of over-confidence, brought about by an abnormally prosperous state of affairs. The future had been discounted too rapidly and legitimate enterprise was followed by speculation, and speculation based on credit.

LAND POLICY.

British East Africa is being considerably canvassed just now as a field for home country emigrants. Into the advantages or disadvantages of the highlands of the colony for white settlement, it is not necessary to enter, but certain differences have arisen between the colonial office and the colonists on the subject of land transfer which are not without interest to Canada.

the objection to free transfers of either freehold or leasehold property in a country like East Africa, is to be this: that it encourages people "to acquire and hold land as a speculative counter," and enables "persons of larger capital to acquire such land by purchase, and so amass large estates of which they make but little use."

The land scandals in Canada are undoubtedly due to the system of selling government lands en bloc to private speculators and speculative syndicates who have time and again managed to get hold of large tracts of territory at cheap prices—often below the true market value.

STREET RAILWAY INNOVATIONS.

Whenever the Street Railway Company launches an innovation it is well for the citizens to ask whether it is in the interest of the passengers or in the sole interest of the company.

Should the request to leave by the front door be changed into a rule, then the passengers may well consider if it is not an acute pain to have all the fares collected, regardless of their convenience or inconvenience. This would imply the innocent assumption that there are passengers who desire to beat their way, a sufficient incentive to make any able-bodied passenger assert his right to enter and leave the car as he sees fit.

MR. CUMBERLAND DENIES. Editor World: My attention is drawn to a report in your to-day's issue of a meeting at which I was present, and which is headed, "City May Lose the Old Fort." I made no such statements as are attributed to me, neither the minister nor Mr. Jarvis nor anyone else said the "prospect" was that the transaction would not go thru, and I cannot hold myself responsible for the elaborations reported to have been said by a lady at that meeting.

COURT SHOWS HOSTILITY TO STOESSEL ON TRIAL

His Request for Two Witnesses Abruptly Refused—Some Officers Take His Part.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 10.—Before a brilliant assemblage of his old comrades in arms, Lt.-Gen. Stoessel to-day was placed on trial to answer with his life and reputation for the loss of Port Arthur on Jan. 1, 1905, and in firm tones and, with confident manner the general pleaded not guilty.

The auditorium of the Army and Navy Club, where the trial took place, resembled more a social gathering of officers of high rank than the judges and spectators and witnesses were Gen. Kurapatkin, Gen. Linevitch, Gen. Renssenkamp, Vice-Admiral Wiren and scores of other prominent leaders in the Russo-Japanese war.

There were also present 200 officers and soldiers, who had been at Port Arthur and who to-day were clad in their full dress uniforms, blousing with stars and decorations.

Gen. Stoessel alone was in civilian attire, and this made him conspicuous. He wore proudly around his neck the cordon of the military Order of St. George, which was conferred upon him by the emperor during the siege, and on his breast was pinned the cross of George III, awarded the general for conspicuous bravery in front of the fortress of Ruse.

The other accused officers, Gen. Fock, Reiss and Smirnov, came to the court clad in their uniforms.

The court was convened at noon by Vice-Admiral Douboassoff. He declared it to be the duty of the court to prosecute the trial of the four officers charged with the responsibility of surrendering the fortress on terms dishonorable to the garrison and humiliating to the prestige of Russia.

The entire afternoon was taken up with the reading of the voluminous and detailed indictment.

One of the witnesses showed the attitude of the court to be unfavorable to Stoessel. His personal request that two additional witnesses be called in was dismissed without ceremony.

These witnesses could give evidence of vital importance to Stoessel. One of them, Dr. Rozoff, was chief of the Red Cross within the fortress. At the preliminary hearing, he testified that at the time of the surrender Gen. Stoessel had at his disposal only 800 able-bodied men to defend the hundreds of miles of fortifications, and that the bitter cold winds prevailing at the time made it difficult for the soldiers to even hold their rifles in their hands.

Gen. Naden, the other witnesses examined, is the author of a deposition similar to that of Dr. Rozoff.

To the correspondent of the Associated Press to-day, witnesses with whom he talked, declared the trial to be an insult to Gen. Stoessel and to his army. The defenders of the fortress were being treated as traitors, and their names were being used to enhance the magnitude of the proceedings. Alexieff escaped going on the witness stand with difficulty.

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

NATIVES REVOLT IN ORANGE RIVER COLONY

Wrecked Plant at Vorpsoed Diamond Mine—Murders and Outrages Have Increased.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—An uprising of native blacks occurred in Orange River Colony, when 500 workers at the Vorpsoed diamond mine revolted and wrecked the plant, then taking up arms towards Kroonstad, where there are only twenty police to oppose them.

While Dintuau, the Zulu King, who has time and again incited his people to rebel, with the result that murders and outrages have increased, has surrendered, the authorities here are somewhat alarmed over his reported disaffection among the blacks, and some even assert that the incident recorded may be part of a general rising.

It is said that the blacks have assumed a new attitude towards the British. They regard the white man as inviolable, and they have contempt for the Boer as a fighting man. They are now being urged to be stamped out in three weeks. When it took three years, they began to think a little for themselves, and when the natives were twice as much for their services as the British soldier they argued that they must be considered as of more importance.

RETAIL MERCHANTS' BANQUET

Flour and Feed Section Entertain the Wholesale and Travelers.

One of the most enjoyable and unique banquets of the season was given by the flour and feed section of the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada, to which they invited the wholesale men as their guests.

H. Radcliffe, president, occupied the head of the table, with R. Knowles, first vice-president, W. Cosburn, second vice-president, James Anderson, treasurer, and George Lyons, secretary, on his right and left.

Mr. Radcliffe pointed out that they were the most important addition to the Retail Merchants' Association and were only about four months old, but had already derived many benefits, especially in getting acquainted with one another. He then called on Mr. Meyer, who represented the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada. He said as far as he knew this was the first time in the history of the world that retailers invited wholesalers and their traveling salesmen to a banquet.

He explained the aims and objects of the association, and that it was not to enable the merchants to take advantage of the buying public, but to enable them to give better service. If every merchant belonged to the association, every merchant of the community would be benefited.

To make the retail business more what it ought to be, the merchants must help each other, and not each other, and this can only be done by association work.

Mr. McIntosh urged more confidence and confidence of trade with the time he started in business.

THREW KNIFE AT WIFE.

Albert Stevenson is Found Guilty on a Serious Charge.

Albert Stevenson, charged with wounding to maim his wife, Annie Stevenson, was found guilty of the crime in the sessions yesterday. Owing to the absence of County Crown Attorney Drayton, T. H. Lennox, M.L.A., prosecuted and A. H. Hazard defended Stevenson.

Mrs. Stevenson said that she did not want to live with the prisoner, and attacked her with a knife in the immigration office at the Union Station.

Stevenson swore that his wife had told him that she would live with whom she wished and that he had found her in compromising positions with other men. He only threw a pen-knife at her.

Moses Ellenson of Kingston, charged with obtaining \$2075 from Julius Obolinsky of Toronto under false pretenses, was called in the morning. T. C. Robbette appeared for Ellenson and requested an adjournment for a few days to get a writ from Kingston. This was granted.

Emilio Ficarilla, charged with uttering a forged cheque with intent to defraud the postal authorities, was put in the box just before adjournment. The case will go on to-day.

Privy Council Allows Appeal.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—The privy council has allowed the appeal of McConnell v. Baty, the defendant being to pay costs. Special leave to appeal is granted in Cowan Grain Company, Limited, v. Day, in Yondal v. Toronto & E. C. Lumber Company, the petition was not proceeded with, and was formally dismissed.

MAY SCATTER QUICKLIME OVER BODIES LEFT IN MINE

Pestilence is Feared—Would Destroy Means of Identifying the Dead.

MONAGAH, W. Va., Dec. 10.—The relief work for the victims of the mine disaster is well under way. There is now plenty of food, but there is urgent need of clothing for many families. Cash funds are being raised in many places and instalments are already being forwarded from some points. The coal companies of this district have contributed \$20,000 cash.

Many of the bodies taken out last night were far advanced in decomposition. Some of the bodies that hurriedly were held in the rain. A tent has been erected in the cemetery to be used as a morgue for such bodies as are too far gone to be taken to the bank building.

Health authorities fear an epidemic of fever due to the decaying bodies of the men and the animals and have prepared to enforce heroic measures if it becomes necessary. Quicklime will be taken in the mine and scattered over the bodies if conditions become much worse, and thus the last chance of identification and restoration to relatives for Christian burial will have passed away.

Many of the rescuers have been stricken with illness and it was found necessary to bring a number of recruits here from the George Creek district. The coroner and his assistants, viewing the bodies as they come out, are Chief State Mine Inspector Paul is quoted as saying he believed the explosion had been started by an electric spark from runaway cars in the main entry. A string of these cars was piled up in the entry at the bottom of a slope.

Nearly 150 bodies have been recovered.

70,000 RAILWAYMEN VOTING.

Object is to Secure a Federation of Various Divisions.

BUFFALO, Dec. 10.—The vote now being taken by the 70,000 organized railroad employes east of the Mississippi River is understood by the railroad unions shall unite in one great federation, more than to decide upon a concerted action and the conductors are voting on the amalgamation and the firemen and the engineers are also voting. A concerted demand for higher wages and readjustment of conditions will be made if the federation is accomplished.

The purpose of the proposed federation is to establish uniform conditions all over the country.

BOUGHT A HOUSE FOR HER.

STRAITFORD, Dec. 10.—(Special).—Mrs. Dean, who arrived here from Galt at noon on a visit to her mother, Mrs. Berland, Daly-avenue, had a thrilling experience. Seated in a cab while the driver was checking baggage, the horses started off and dashed thru the main streets with the vehicle swinging from side to side. The horses were caught in time to prevent possible fatality after running many blocks.

Good Crops in Great Britain.

OTTAWA, Dec. 10.—Receipts received at the department of trade and commerce from Great Britain say this year's harvest has been the finest ever gathered. Owing to diminished acreage the total yield has been 23,977, compared with an average for the previous ten years of 22,000. There has been a corresponding increase in yield per acre of other field and root crops.

FOUR ITALIAN WORKMEN KILLED BY EXPLOSION

Accident on the Canadian North-western at Key Harbor—Several Were Slightly Injured.

PARRY SOUND, Dec. 10.—An inquest was held here last night to determine the cause of the death of four Italians, which occurred as the result of an explosion at Key Harbor, last Thursday.

Some eighteen men were working in a rock cut near Key Harbor, on the C.N.O.R. spur line, when a piece of rock, which was rolled down from the face of the cut, exploded, killing three Italians instantly, and wounding some others, one of whom subsequently died.

No one seems to be able to account for the explosion. There had been no dynamite used in the cut for days previous to this explosion, and it was three days before that six batteries and some block holes had been fired.

The names of the dead are: F. Parri, son of the former, C. Claturo, L. Marzono.

All four were buried here. Marzono lived to be brought to the hospital in this place, but died shortly after his arrival.

A brother of the last named, G. Marzano, had a leg broken, and some others were slightly hurt.

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WITNESS' TALE OF MURDER

CONNECTS SOME OTHERS

How Governor Goebel Came to His Death—Ex-State Secretary is Implicated.

GEORGETOWN, Ky., Dec. 10.—Henry E. Youstey, who is under a life sentence for complicity in the assassination of William Goebel, when on the witness stand to-day in the Cabell Powers trial, testified that he had talked with Dr. W. R. Johnson in the latter's office about the killing of Gov. Goebel, and of the purchase by himself of smokeless cartridges in Cincinnati...

Youstey told the plot to kill Goebel. He gave a detailed account of how he had done the shooting upon arriving in Frankfort. Youstey told of placing guns in Powers' office, of raising the window and drawing the curtain, of pointing out Goebel as he approached the capitol, and of seeing Howard aim at Goebel. He then left the room and heard the crack the rifle as he was descending the stairs.

The witness connected Powers directly with the tragedy, by stating that he fixed the door for the entrance of the assassin and approved of the plan. In his evidence he also gave very damaging testimony against the former Governor. Taylor, State Treasurer Day, Superintendent of Public Instruction W. J. Davidson, W. W. H.
