The Germans quite frankly desire an honorable peace. The present attitude of Russia's allies apparently is a bar to this end.

AIR RAIDERS BOMB PADUA THIRTEEN PERSONS KILLED

Large Fleet of Austro-German Machines Attack Open Italian City, Dropping Explosives in Streets

—Nearby Towns Also Assailed.

Headquarters of the Italian Army in Northern Italy, Dec. 30.—A large enemy fleet of airplanes participated in the air raid over the City of Padua, and nearby towns on Friday night, when 13 persons were killed and wounded, the majority of the latter being women. In Padua the bombs fell in public squares, near hotels, clubs and churches, and from the manner in which the raid was carried on unusual barbarism and personal bitterness were shown.

BRITISH AGAIN BEAT TURKS IN PALESTINE

Allenby's Forces Make Considerable Advance on Thirteen Mile Front in Neighborhood of Jerusalem—Pursuit Slow, Owing to Hilly and Broken Nature of Country.

London, Dec. 29.—The British have made another considerable advance in the neighborhood of Jerusalem, the Turks having been beaten back on a front of thirteen miles. The official statement concerning the Palestine campaign tonight says: "General Allenby reports that on Friday his troops continued to drive back the enemy and advance their line to a depth of about two miles on a front of thirteen miles. "The advance has given us the high ground of Ras Arkuh and Es Sufli—four miles from Jerusalem and one mile north of the Jericho road. Anataerram and Kulundia, the last two respectively, east and west of Jerusalem, are five or six miles north of Jerusalem and Beitunia.

125,000 HOMELESS THRU GUATEMALA EARTHQUAKE

Capital of Central American Republic is Laid in Ruins, Many People Killed by Falling Walls and Huge Number Without Shelter.

Washington, Dec. 30.—Guatemala, City, capital of the Central American republic of Guatemala, has been laid in ruins by a series of earthquakes beginning Christmas Day and continuing last night in violent shocks which completed the work of destruction. A cablegram to the navy department today said 125,000 people were in the streets without shelter, and that a number were killed by falling walls.

PETROGRAD FACTORIES SEIZED BY BOLSHEVIKI

Petrograd, Saturday, Dec. 29.—The council of people's commissaries has ordered the confiscation of the factories and all other properties of the Russo-Belgian Company, because its directors on December 28 declared the company to be in a state of liquidation, and declined to submit to the control of the employees.

GERMANS RUN SHORT OF NEWEST AIRCRAFT

Enemy Has Resort to Old Types Owing to Limited Output.

London, Dec. 30.—A despatch to Reuters, Limited, from British headquarters says that the Germans are experiencing difficulty in maintaining efficiency in their air service on the western front. The correspondent says that prisoners are unanimous in saying that the output of new machines is very limited, and that this fact is compelling the employment of old types of aircraft.

PEACE MAKERS PLAN TO FREE WAR CAPTIVES

Delegates at Brest-Litovsk Consent to Resumption of Commerce.

WANT POLISH LIBERTY

Russians Submit Proposal for Evacuation of Occupied Territory.

Brest-Litovsk, Friday, Dec. 27.—Via Berlin and London, Dec. 30.—Provisional agreement on a series of important points, including liberation of war prisoners and resumption of commercial relations, was reached today by the delegates at Brest-Litovsk and the central powers in discussion of issues which, in the event of a general peace, would have to be settled among the nations represented in the negotiations here.

AMERICAN TO REGISTER HALF-MILLION ALIENS

Unnaturalized Germans to Be Tagged and Subjected to Residential and Other Restrictions.

Washington, Dec. 30.—The week of Feb. 4 was set aside by the department of justice today for registration of the half million unnaturalized Germans in the continental United States by police and postmasters in pursuance of President Wilson's alien enemy proclamation declaring this action as a means of minimizing the danger of enemy sympathizers in the United States.

PAN-GERMANS ATTACK PEACE POURPARLERS

Berlin Press Declares Events at Brest-Litovsk Victory for Entente Alliance.

Stockholm, Dec. 30.—The events at Brest-Litovsk, attendant on the peace parleys between the Germans and the Russians, are little to the taste of the pan-German section of the German press, according to a special despatch received here from Berlin.

GEN. VICTOR WILLIAMS REACHES SWITZERLAND

Canadian Officer Arrives at Zurich With Party of British Prisoners.

Zurich, Switzerland, Dec. 30.—(Via Reuters' Ottawa Agency)—A party of British war prisoners has arrived here from Germany, consisting of 54 officers and 554 men. The officers include Brigadier-General Victor Williams of the Canadian expeditionary force. The officers are going to Montreaux and Vevey. The men will be interned at Chateau Doer.

EXCEED FOUR BILLIONS

American Credits to Entente Allies Reach Huge Total

Washington, Dec. 30.—Credits to the allies passed the four billion dollar mark Saturday, when Secretary McAdoo authorized additional loans of \$185,000,000 to Great Britain for January purchases in the United States, \$155,000,000 to France, \$7,500,000 to Belgium and \$1,000,000 to Serbia. Today's total was \$248,500,000, and the total credits to the allies \$4,285,400,000.

KRONSTADT FORT BLOWN UP

London, Dec. 31.—One of the forts at Kronstadt, the naval base near Petrograd, has been blown up by an extremely violent explosion, according to a Petrograd despatch to The Times. There are no details.

BULGARIANS ASSENT TO RUSS PEACE TERMS

Danube Question Taken Up at Special Session—Old Treaties Restored.

Amsterdam, Dec. 30.—The Bulgarian premier, Vaclav Radoslavoff, according to a Sofia despatch, has sent a message to all the provisional prefects to the effect that Bulgaria has accepted the Russian proposal—first, that the war between Bulgaria and Russia be ended; second, that the status quo ante bellum, with respect to commercial treaties and consular and other conventions be re-established; third, regarding the Danube question, that this be decided tomorrow at a plenary meeting of all the delegations.

ADMIRAL JELLICOE BLAMED FOR LOSS OF DESTROYERS

London Public Believe Dismissal From First Sea Lordship Resulted From Destruction of Three of These Craft Near Dutch Coast.

London, Dec. 29.—Three British torpedo boat destroyers were sunk today being struck by torpedoes or hitting a mine off the Dutch coast on the night of December 22, with the loss of 13 officers and 180 men, the admiralty announced today.

Heavy Fighting South of Cambrai, Where Enemy Makes Gains and Maintains Them in Part.

London, Dec. 30.—There was heavy fighting today south of Cambrai. The Germans made a strong attack on a front of about two miles, according to Field Marshal Haig's report from headquarters tonight. They succeeded in gaining a foothold at two points, but later were ejected in part by British counter-attacks. The text of the statement reads:

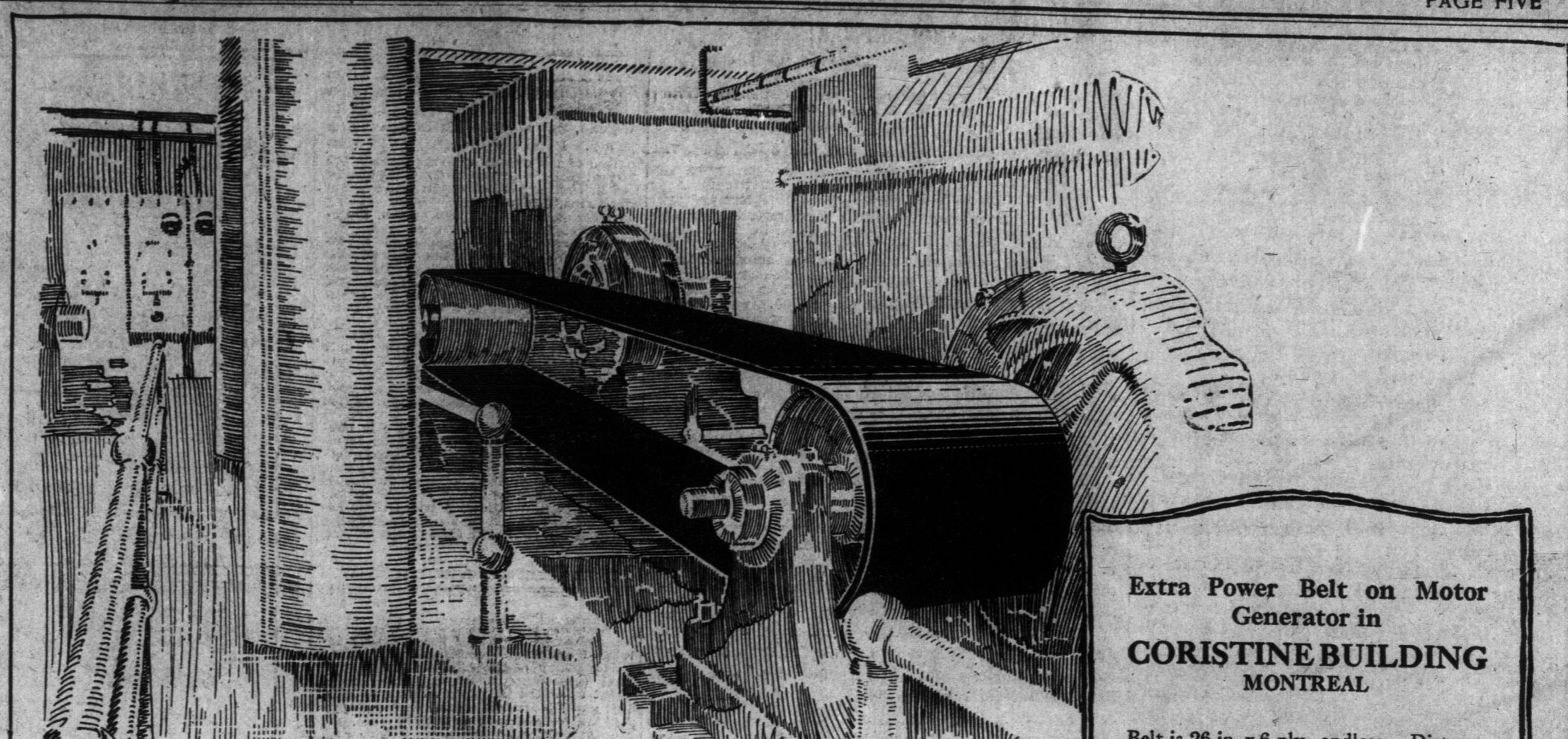
SESSIONS OPEN WEDNESDAY.

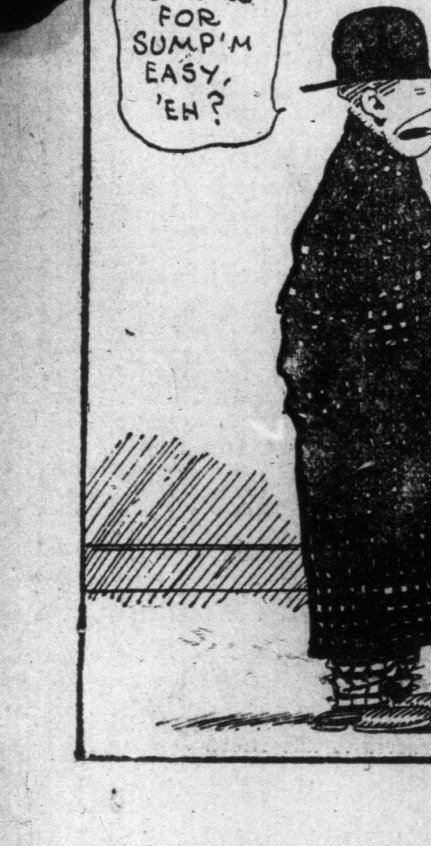

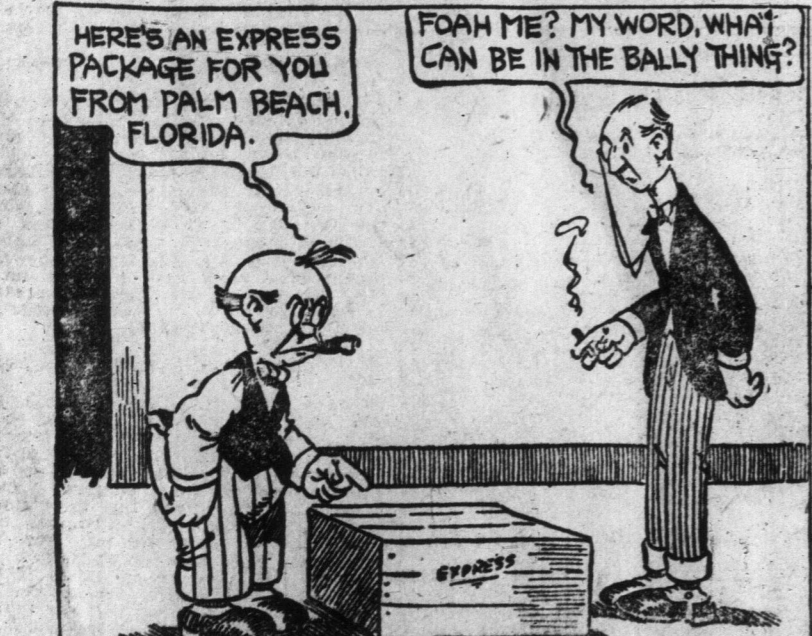

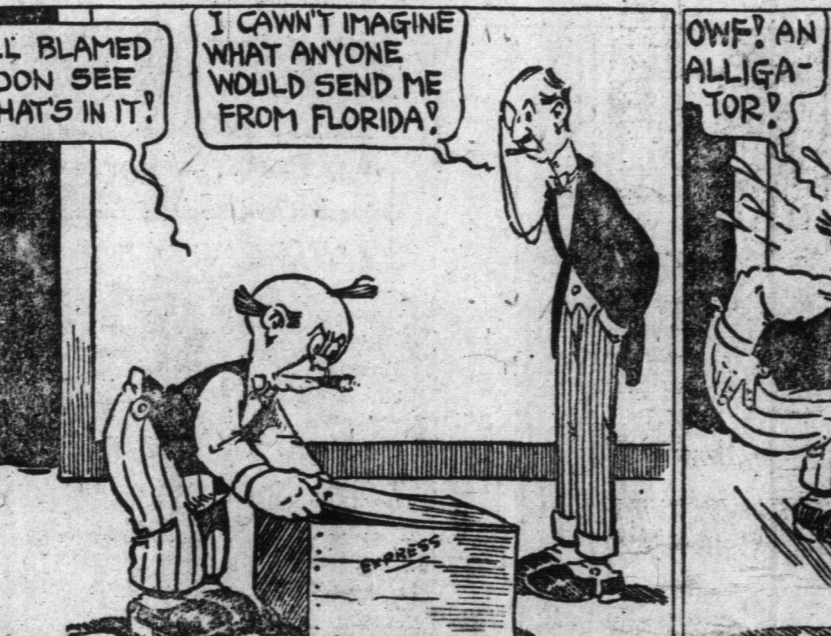
