THE Adjourned Annual Meeting of the Corporation of the Montreal General Hospital, was held in the Governor's Hall of the Institution, on the 12th May, 1858, when the following Annual Report was submitted, read and adopted,—the Hon. John Molson, President, in the chair.

ANNUAL REPORT

Of the Proceedings of the Board of Governors of the Montreal General Hospital, for the year ending the 23rd April, 1858 :—

Mr. President and Gentlemen of the Corporation of the Montreal General Hospital,—

In conformity with the By-Laws of the Corporation, I have now the honor to lay before you the 36th Annual Report of the Proceedings of the Board of Governors, and to submit a concise statement of the Receipts and Expenditures of the Institution, from the 28th April, 1857, to the 23rd April, 1858.

The total Receipts during the year, amounting to £3,057 5s. 3d., have been derived from the following sources :

From this it appears that the Expenditure has exceeded the Income by £70 7s. 6d., a sum which would have been largely increased but for the receipt of arrears of interest to the amount of £265 13s. 11d.

The donations to the Permanent Fund, during the year, have amounted to £472 10s.

From the Medical Report it appears that 966 In-door and 4953 Out-door Patients have participated in the benefits conferred by this Institution during the past twelve months. This is an increase of 33 In-door and 1277 Out-door Patients upon the number of patients of the previous year.

It is my duty to allude to a circumstance of a very painful nature, which not only caused the Governors much anxiety and produced a good deal of excitement in the community, but also gave rise to an unfounded report that some of the officers of the Institution connived at the audacious and disreputable act of stealing the body of a pauper patient from the Dead House of the Hospital. It is gratifying to know, however, that the Committee of Management, after a careful investigation, arrived at the conclusion that no person connected with the Institution had been concerned in the matter. Subsequently, however, and after an investigation had been commenced by the Police Magistrate, the Chairman of the Committee received a letter from two medical students, avowing that they were the sole participators in the act of taking the body, and stating that they had previously given information where it might be found. The body was found at the place named, and was subsequently interred with due decency in the Cemetery.

A rumour prevailed that abstractions similar to this had frequently occurred, and that if the coffins in the vault of the Cemetery were examined, many of them would be found empty. The Committee had no reason whatever to believe that such was the fact; and they now hold the certificate of Mr. Spriggins, the Superintendent of the Cemetery, that he had opened all the coffins which had been brought there from the Hospital during the winter, and that all of the bodies had been undisturbed.

With the view of preventing a similar occurrence in future, a new Dead-house is about being erected, with such arrangements as will effectually fulfil the object contemplated. Before leaving this unpleasant subject, the Governors cannot withhold an expression of regret that in some quarters a style and tone of comment with reference to this Institution should have been adopted, calculated to prejudice the interests of a charity which has for so many years conferred upon the poor of all classes its invaluable offices, and whose management has uniformly secured the approbation of the Legislature as well as of the people.

During the past year the following gentlemen have qualified themselves, by their handsome donations, to become Governors of

the Institution :—David Torrance, Esq., Life Governor; Charles A. Low, and D. Davidson, Esqrs., Annual Governors.

It is much to be desired that many others of our citizens, whose means are adequate, would exhibit their interest in the welfare of this Institution by becoming Governors and taking part in its management and administration.

The annual collection of subscriptions for the past year has been partially made, and the Governors and friends of the Charity are deeply indebted to the following gentlemen for the warm interest they have shown in its prosperity by acting as Collectors:—Robert Muir, W. B. Cumming, Thomas Mussen, E. E. Shelton, Henry Mussen, and P. Devins, Esquires.

The Committee of Management have generally reported favorably to the good conduct of the officers and servants of the Institution.
