

TO THE MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS OF ST. GABRIEL CHURCH.

DEAR BRETHREN,

Through the good hand of our God upon us, during the year 1886, I am able to address you in this Annual Report of the Congregation in a different strain from that which characterized my words to you, through this channel, for several years past.

The Lord hath done great things for us, on account of which we praise His Holy name.

The Centennial year gave us a double Jubilee, indeed. We had a delightful series of fraternal gatherings in our venerable Church in St. Gabriel Street, in the month of March last; and then our way was opened up to us most unexpectedly to enter in and take possession of this beautiful House of Prayer, without the worry and toil and heavy outlay attending the work of building a new Church, to which we have been looking forward for several years.

It was a delightful issue to our anxieties in this connection, when we were enabled to commence our Congregational life here on the 26th of September, 1886, the very next Sabbath after we took farewell of the old edifice in which our fathers and we had worshipped for nigh a Century.

There was a sinking of many hearts on Sabbath evening the 19th of September, 1886; but there was a corresponding uplifting on the evening of the 26th.

It has seldom been the lot of a Congregation to have its difficulties so easily and happily solved as ours have been. There were, indeed, misgivings in some minds as to the wisdom of the step taken in the purchase of this property; but I think all are now fully satisfied that we have been singularly fortunate in securing it, on terms that will not be at all burdensome to our finances.

The success that has immediately followed our removal to these premises has justified the sanguine views of those who took the lead in the movement to acquire the property. And now it remains for us all to put our shoulders to the wheel, and make the best possible use of our advantages of situation and other favorable circumstances, to extend the Congregation's influence in the community.

Let it become a greater power for good than ever before. The first concern of every one of you should be to grow in grace yourselves, and be constant in your waiting upon the Lord in His house, at all the seasons fixed for His worship. A most gratifying improvement has already taken place in this regard; the Lord make it grow. The children have now a recognized place in every morning service; see that they are allowed to take advantage of it. Your second concern should be to see this house filled, and you can all help to secure this most desirable end. Bring the careless and indifferent with you. Invite them to accompany you, and persevere in this until you have succeeded.

We do not desire to take people away from other Christian Churches : that is a poor ambition ; but as we have given freely to other Congregations in by-gone days, there would be no sin in receiving our own freely back again. However, that is not what I wish you to address yourselves to, but to gather in the non-churchgoing whom you may be able to influence. Let each of you single out some family or individual whom you will endeavor to bring with you, that the Master's House may be filled.

It will be matter of fresh gratification to the Congregation that the Trustees have been able to dispose of the old Church property for \$2,790 more than they were able to count on in their negotiations with Mr. Burland. The transaction was finally closed yesterday, the Provincial Government taking over the property.

The Congregation as well as the Trustees gladly recognize the handsome manner in which Mr. Burland has carried out his part of the arrangement entered into in July last, by which we were delivered from the risk of having the property in St. Gabriel Street permanently on our hands, in addition to the new church, and yet were left free to complete the negotiations, going on for a long time, for the sale of the old Church to the Government.

You will all feel the special obligations under which we have been laid by Mr. James Robertson, the respected Chairman of the Board of Trustees, to whose unwearied exertions it is largely owing that matters are with us to-day in so satisfactory a condition.

The picture of the new church, on the cover, represents the edifice completed, with a tower on the north west corner. It would be fitting to mark the close of the first century of Presbyterianism in the city, by some memorial. What could be more suitable than the erection of this tower, in which we might ask the many friends who had an historical connection with the old church in St. Gabriel Street to join?

TWENTIETH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF ST. GABRIEL CHURCH,

For the year ending 31st January, 1887.

The Trustees have now in accordance with the Bye-Laws, at this the Twentieth Annual Meeting of the Congregation of St. Gabriel Church, to present a Report of their proceedings for the past year, and to submit the accounts of revenue and expenditure for inspection.

There remained uncollected for the year, when the Treasurer had to close his books, about \$60, the greater part of which may be confidently expected to come in at an early date, as the ending of the year has probably been overlooked.

The Board would recommend that if possible, for the future, the accounts should be closed on the 31st December in each year, as at one time was the custom.

By a reference to the Revenue furnished to the Congregation at the Meeting on the 18th November, which was based on the returns then at the disposal of the Trustees it appears that though this total \$2770.15 is in excess of the receipts of last year the average of said estimate has not been maintained, especially in the Ordinary Collections, which have fallen off considerably, while no material increase '...as appeared in the Weekly Offerings.

The Members and Adherents of St. Gabriel Church have long been aware that sooner or later they would have to make a change, forced on them by the expansion of the City and the consequent shifting of the centres of population; so, in spite of the attachment which to their honour it may be recorded they felt towards the venerable edifice on St. Gabriel Street with its hallowed associations,-recognising the absolute necessity of action, when the opportunity arrived they have set themselves resolutely to work to build up a new St. Gabriel in a wider field. 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long been ge, forced shifting of ch to their ole edifice nising the they have abriel in a That difficulties should surround such a task should not be wondered at, when its magnitude was considered ; and they even had to contend with uncharitable misrepresentations which were employed to discredit the undertaking.

In carrying out the wishes of the Congregation and removing from their old place of worship, it could hardly be expected but that some expense should be incurred in making so great a change, which no foresight could provide for; but any such expense, though bearing heavily on the church just at this time, is for improvements which are permanent additions to the value of the Church property and fully represent the money laid out.

In the estimate made with a view to adjust revenue and expenditure, it is just possible that the few months' occupation from which the estimate was drawn was not a fair criterion of what the congregation could do; a longer time being probably required for the people thoroughly to realise their position with its increased responsibillties.

The needs of the Church for the ensuing year have been very fairly set forth in the statement submitted to the Special Meeting of the Congregation and printed for reference, and with this information before them they ought to be able to give very valuable aid to the management by their counsel and co-operation, which is most earnestly solicited at this time, especially in view of the near approach of the date when the half-yearly interest is due and which we need hardly say must be met promptly.

The Board respectfully submits that it is the duty of every member and adherent who has the welfare of the church at heart, to carefully examine the various statements and reports which may be laid before them from time to time, and thus render great service to the management by intelligent criticism and advice, which will at all times receive the respectful attention of the Trustees.

During these somewhat trying times, the Trustees have received much kindly consideration from the people of St. Gabriel Church, for which they feel very grateful, fully realising as they do that if any measure of success in building up a prosperous church is to be attained, they must have the strong moral support of the congregation.

At this time they would recommend that to the ordinary schemes of the Church for which collectors are annually appointed, there should be added one as a Building Fund, to which all would have an opportunity of contributing as a special object. This system is said to have worked well and been favorably received in other churches where it was adopted.

The Trustees have much pleasure in reporting that their recommendation has the approval of the Young People of the Church, who give substantial token of the same by voting a handsome donation from the funds of their Association.

The consideration of the propriety of providing some kind of Sinking Fund for the gradual extinction or reduction of the church debt might very properly occupy your attention at this time.

The Secretary then read the minutes of the last Annual Meeting, which were confirmed.

The Report of the Trustees for the past year, also the Treasurer's Statement of Accounts, Receipts and Disbursements, duly audited, were presented.

"That the Report now read be received, adopted, and printed for the information of the Congregation." Carried.

"That this Meeting recogizing that the past year has been one of the most eventful in the history of the Congregation, and that the Lord has vouchsafed special tokens of His favour to us, desires to record its thanks to all the Office-bearers, and Associations as well as individual members of the Church, for their zealous, harmonious and vigorous co-operation in accomplishing the vast amount of special work that has been done during the year." Carried unanimously.

"That the warmest thanks of the Congregation are due, and are now tendered to the Treasurer, Mr. T. Graham, for the time and labor he has bestowed on the performance of the arduous duties of his office." Carried.

Moved by Mr. J. R. Bain, seconded by Mr. George Pringle, "That Messrs. Wm. Foulis and R. McCulloch be appointed Auditors for the ensuing year." Carried.

Moved by Mr. A. Watt, seconded by Mr. J. M. Farquhar,

"That the Congregation desires at this time to record its thanks to the members of the Choir, for the unwearied and cheerful manner in which they have done their part in the Service, during the past year, and especially to Mr. Bain, under whose skilful leadership, they have made such excellent progress." Carried.

"That this Meeting confirm the action of the Trustees, in electing Mr. A, Watt, to fill the place on the Board, made vacant by the resignation of Mr. Haldimand." Carried.

"That as recommended in the Annual Report, this Congregation now constitutes a Building Fund as one of the schemes of the Church, for which contributions may be solicited with the other objects." Carried.

ABSTRACT OF ANNUAL REPORT OF SABBATH SCHOOL.

"The year just closed has been an eventful one for the Sabbath School, as well as for the Church proper in all its varied interests. The old edifice in St. Gabriel street, although it did not furnish many facilities for carrying on Sunday School work, was associated with the training of many generations of young people in the principles of Divine Truth. Certainly, for seventy years, there had been a Sabbath School in operation in the old Church. It was, therefore, a crisis in the history of this department of our ecclesiastical agencies when it was resolved, as it was suddenly, on the 29th of August, 1886, to close the school in St. Gabriel street, and open it in the new edifice. the Sunday School was, as it often has been, the pioneer of the Church, for as yet no service had been held by us in this building. Now that we are in the midst of a populous English speaking community, and have ordinary facilities for Sunday-School work, we hope to have as good a School in the future as any of the Churches in the City."
