The following is an extract from a letter recently received from the wife of an army officer in India:—"Our home was simply swarming with millions of mosquitoes last hot weather, and after burning a handful, or tin, of the powder on an open stove and shutting up the entire room, thousands literally fell down on the floors and tables. In the drawing room alone we had a white felt rug which became black in a few hours, the insects by hundreds laying dead on it."

Letter From President J. A. Likely Relative to the Transcontinental Railway

Matter

Methods adopted by some people (in good faith, no doubt), in addressing mail, the job is no light one. Nevertheless, but very few complaints of non-delivery or even delays of mail matter have been made. In this regard conditions are greatly in contrast to those existing in the case of the First Contingent on Salisbury Plain.

If one would follow the route of a letter, parcel or peper, after it reaches. England, he would realize that the delivery is exceptionally rapid. The mail is first sorted in the general post office and then turned over to the Canadian G. P. O. for distribution. Here it is divided and forwarded, some to other places where there may be Canadians stationed. Then comes the sorting into camps and distributing mail, if their friends would put a full and correct address on all packages of mail matter. This should include regimental number, rank, name, company (battery or squadron), brigade and camp. It is reasonable to suppose that an average of at least one letter per man arrives every mail, and this, together with the sivalanche of newspapers and parcels, makes the distribution of mail something that requires consideration and time.


