British Cabinet Is Expected To Decide Policy On Mine Strike Today

GENEVA, June 14.—Brazil has resigned from the League of Nations. Notification of this step, received by cable today from Foreign Minister Pacheco at Rio Janeiro, created consternation in League circles. The withdrawal follows her earlier act in resigning from the League Council because of the refusal of worst flood in 36 years. New \$100,000 Building Will be Occupied During Next Term

CAMPBELLTON, June 13-Campbellton's new \$100,000 composite High School building is rapidly nearing completion and it is now estimated by those in charge of the construction of this fine building that all interior finishing and other work will be completed in about three weeks. This will bring the value of school property in this town up very close to a \$300,000 total.

Good progress has been made in the erection of the new building, construction having been begun late last summer and the cornerstone was laid last autumn by Lieut.-Governor Todd at an impressive ceremony attended by all the leading educationalists in this part of the province, including Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works. LARGE STRUCTURE

The new High School which is admirably situated on an eminence near the corner of Andrew and Arran streets, is a brick structure of conspicuous size, being 146 feet by 80 feet overall, these measurements including two wings which will facilitate the day lighting of classrooms at each end of the building. DETAILS

The building is three storeys in height and will, with three rooms to be used by the vocational classes, contain 16 separate rooms in all. On the south side of the building is the assembly hall with spacious stage and balcony measuring 60x40 feet. All the appointments and fixtures are thoroughly modern and every facility will be at hand for properly carrying out the curri-

ern and every facility will be at hand for properly carrying out the curriculum of modern composite High School work.

The finishing throughout the building, it is interesting to note, is of native birch, all the lumber having been cut in the north shore district and prepared here. The entire flooring is of maple, also cut here.

The building will be ready for occupancy at the opening of the fall term. The school is being constructed by the J. & D. A. Harquail Co., Ltd., while the plumbing and heating equipment was installed by Messrs. Bradley and Walsh, also of Campbellton.

Description of this new building the total value of the town's three schools will be well over the quarter million mark, while the revenue of \$60,000 for last year may be even larger this year when the appropriations are announced.
