Having over-come the local authorities, the resis-tance from five central authorities has to be dealt with-namely, the Extra-ordinary Commission for Combating Counter Revolutions (Tche-Ka), the People's Commission for Foreign Af-fairs, the Ministry of Interior, the Min-istry of Public Works (Babkrim) and, lastly, the customs authorities. All who give information as to the location of any objects are liable to be threat-ened with severe penalties. Diamonds and precious stones were, by agreement, handed over in lieu of gold; but apart from the difference in valuation, a sufficiently difficult matter to assess, many of the stones offered were found to be false.
