### NEW HOME OF KAISER TWELVE-ROOM HOUSE

The former emperor has not yet seen "The House of Doorn," but it is anticipated in Amerongen that he will soon pay a visit to Doorn.

Although the deeds for the sale of "The House of Doorn" were signed only last Friday at Amerongen by the Baroness van Heemstra de Beaufort, the owner of the estate and the ex-emperor's secretary, von Isleman, former Empress Augusta Victoria decided in favor of the purchase early in August when she made a visit to Doorn.

The house, though rich in history and imposing in appearance, has only twelve rooms, in addition to small chambers for servants. From the main highway tramrooms, in addition to small chambers for servants. From the main highway tramline, which is only 200 yards away, a view of the house, in the midst of a grove, is presented to all passersby. The front of the house is accessible only through the gatekeeper's lodge. Fronting the building is a rose garden and a park filled with stone-benched shady nooks and a stagnant pond filled with water lilies. The ivy-covered building resembles an old English country house.

The House of Doorn was finished in 1356 and was fitted out in order to serve for the Knights of St. Martin. It was damaged in the strife in following years and was rebuilt in the seventeenth century. The estate once consisted of 800 acres, but it is said that only about sixty acres were included in the sale to William Hohenzollern. The price has not been stated.

An ancient prophecy, too, has been helped in its fulliment, for almost 700 years ago the amous Thomas the Rhymer uttered hese words, which ever since have been juoted in the southeast of Scotland:

"Tyde what may betyde,
"Haig shall be Haig of Bemersyde."

This Thomas the Rhymer was an import at man in his day—landed gentleman of Tweedside, as well as poet and prophet. His estate was not far from Bemersyde, which is three and a half miles east of Melrose. Thomas the Rhymer was witness to an undated charter of Petrus de Haga of Bermersyde, and the best authorities refer it o somewhere toward the close of the hirteenth century. Therein the prophet named "Thomas Rhymer de Erciline." Ercildune is now Earlston, on the Leader, about two miles from its notion with the Tweed.

Earl Haig, it has to be explained, is mself not from Berwickshire, or "The erse," the old home of his ancestors, it is a native of Fifeshire, it ancient "Kingdom of Fife," lying a the north shore of the Firth of Forth rid washed on the east by the North ea. 

Haig, the eights Baron, fought with the Scottish army, which defeated an English force under the Earl of Northumberland at Sark in 1449. He also assisted the Earl of Angus in breaking the power of James, Earl of Douglas, in 1445. William Haig, tenth Laird of Bemerysde, fell at Flodden in 1518. His son, Robert Haig, had a command in the army under the Regent Arran, which engaged the English near Ancrum in 1544. He captured Lord Evers, an English leader, and as a reward for this exploit he obtained a discharge of all the duties due by his family to the Crown. The great-grandson of this Baron, James Haig, fourteenth Laird of Bemersyde, had eight sons, the four eldest of whom were killed in the service of the Elector Palatinate, King of Bohemia, in 1629 and 1630. David Haig, the fifth son, carried on the line of the family and was succeeded by his son, Anthony Haig, who was an officer in the service of Sweden. After this the soldiers from Bemersyde seem to have been few and far between. From Petrus de Haga until the last proprietor in lineal descent, the Lairds of Bemersyde numbered nineteen. Now, after a break of fifty or sixty years there is once more in Scotland a Haig of Bemersyde, the first of a new, and, let us hope, a long line.


Bemersyde is set amid the fairest scenery in all the Scottish borderland, a region redolent of poetry, song and warlike tradition. The ancestral home of the Haigs is the oldest inhabited house in this part of the Valley of the Tweed. To Sir Walter Scott there seemed "almost a wizard spell" hanging over Bemersyde. There the great Wizard of the North spent many happy hours with the Haigs of his day, the last of the direct line. Sir Walter's last visit was with Turner, the painter, in 1831. Turner made a sketch of Bemersyde on that occasion. In the foreground of the pieture are Scott and Lockhart, and stand-

ing near by is Miss Haig.

From the crest of Bemersyde Hill there is a glorious prospect. It was Sir Walter's favorite view:

"Where fair Tweed flows round holy Melrose And Eildon slopes to the plain."
