FORECASTS PROGRESS ALONG EDUCATIONAL LINES

The report of Dr. W. S. Carter, chief

The report of Dr. W. S. Carter, chief superintendent of education to be presented to the board of education today forecasts advanced education in agricultural and technical lines. The report speaks of the appointment of R. P. Steeves of Sussex as director of elementary agriculture and outlined the work connected with the position. It is expected, he said, that in conjunction with the various women's institutes throughout the province, elementary domestic science will be introduced into the country schools among the female pupils and the study of agriculture will be provided for the boys. He believed that the recommendations contained in the report of the technical commission would be adopted by parliament and that they will take effect in somewhat the same dianner as the agricultural grants. While the country schools will devote particular attention to agriculture, the city schools will devote their attention to some form of hand work, leading up to the manual training work, and domestic science. The school of agriculture at Woodstock is already under way and it is expected that the one proposed for Sussex will soon be undertaken. The report also referred to the addition which is being made to Normal School to relieve the congestion. The new ell will provide room for the model school and also for the manual training depart.
