That is the Tale That Times Cable Brings Today From England

Carnegie Said to Have Acted For Britain and United States in Conference with Kaiser — Peace of The World Would Be Assured

(Times Special Cable) London, Eng., June 18.—It was said today on the best authority that the conference of Andrew Carnegie with the Emperor of Germany on Monday had far more international significance than generally is supposed.

HARD LABOR FOR SUFFRAGETTES; MAY STARVE IF THEY WISH

London, June 17—Six of the most prominent leaders of the militant suffragettes organization and one of their male supporters, were today found guilty, at the Central Court, of conspiracy to commit malicious damage to property. The trial had lasted several days.

Justice Phillimore passed sentences as follows: Miss Annie Kenney, eighteen months. Mrs. Beatrice Saunders, fifteen months. Miss Harriet Kerr, twelve months. Miss Rachel Barrett, nine months. Miss Agnes Lake and Miss Laura Lennox, six months each.

Edwin Clayton, the chemist, twenty-one months. All the prisoners were committed to the third division which entails hard labor. Each defendant was ordered to pay one-seventh of the cost of the prosecution and were bound over to keep the peace for a year after the period of imprisonment.

Whatever the motives of the prisoners had been, Judge Phillimore said that he must treat them as persons who had done a very serious injury to public peace and who must be restrained from doing further mischief and must to some extent at least be deterred from passing sentence, he said.

"One of the counsel, has suggested that the time for leniency has passed and I do not think you will meet with quite the same treatment as have the others. I am bound to add that if the home secretary consults me, as he often consults a judge, I shall take upon myself the responsibility of saying to him that the suffragettes among you at any rate, should not be let out of prison under any circumstances."

"When we shall die together," exclaimed Miss Kenney. The Judge—"If you, in the words of our great poet, violate the great canon, the everlasting has fixed against self-slaughter you will have to reconcile such action with your conscience."

Daily Hints For the Cook

COFFEE GINGERBREAD. Coffee gingerbread without eggs. One cup molasses, one cup sugar, half cup butter, one cup coffee, one square chocolate dissolved in a little water, three and a half cups pastry flour, one teaspoon of soda, one teaspoon of cinnamon, two teaspoons of vanilla and half teaspoon of ginger. This amount makes a large sheet of gingerbread.

ORANGE PUDDING. Peel and cut five oranges into thin slices, taking out the seeds. Pour over them a coffee cup of fine white sugar. Let a pint of milk get boiling hot by setting it in a pot of boiling water. Add the yolks of three eggs well beaten, one with a little cold milk; stir all the time. As soon as thickened pour over the fruit. Beat the whites to a stiff froth, adding a tablespoon of sugar, and spread over the top of frosting. Set it in the oven for a few minutes to harden. This pudding is best eaten cold.

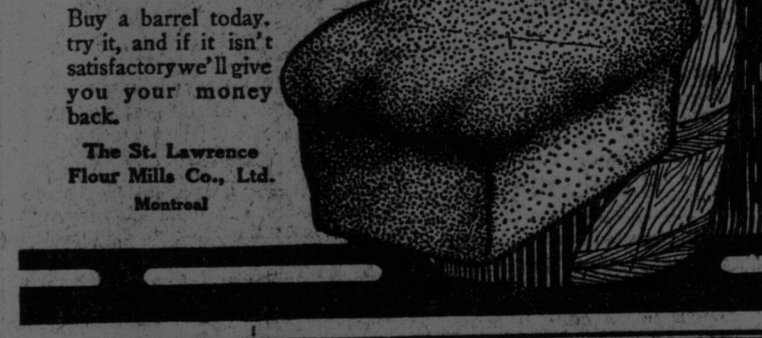

Will Introduce Agriculture And Engineering

GOVERNMENT WILL AID

Graduating Exercises Yesterday—The Prize Winners—Corner Stone Laid

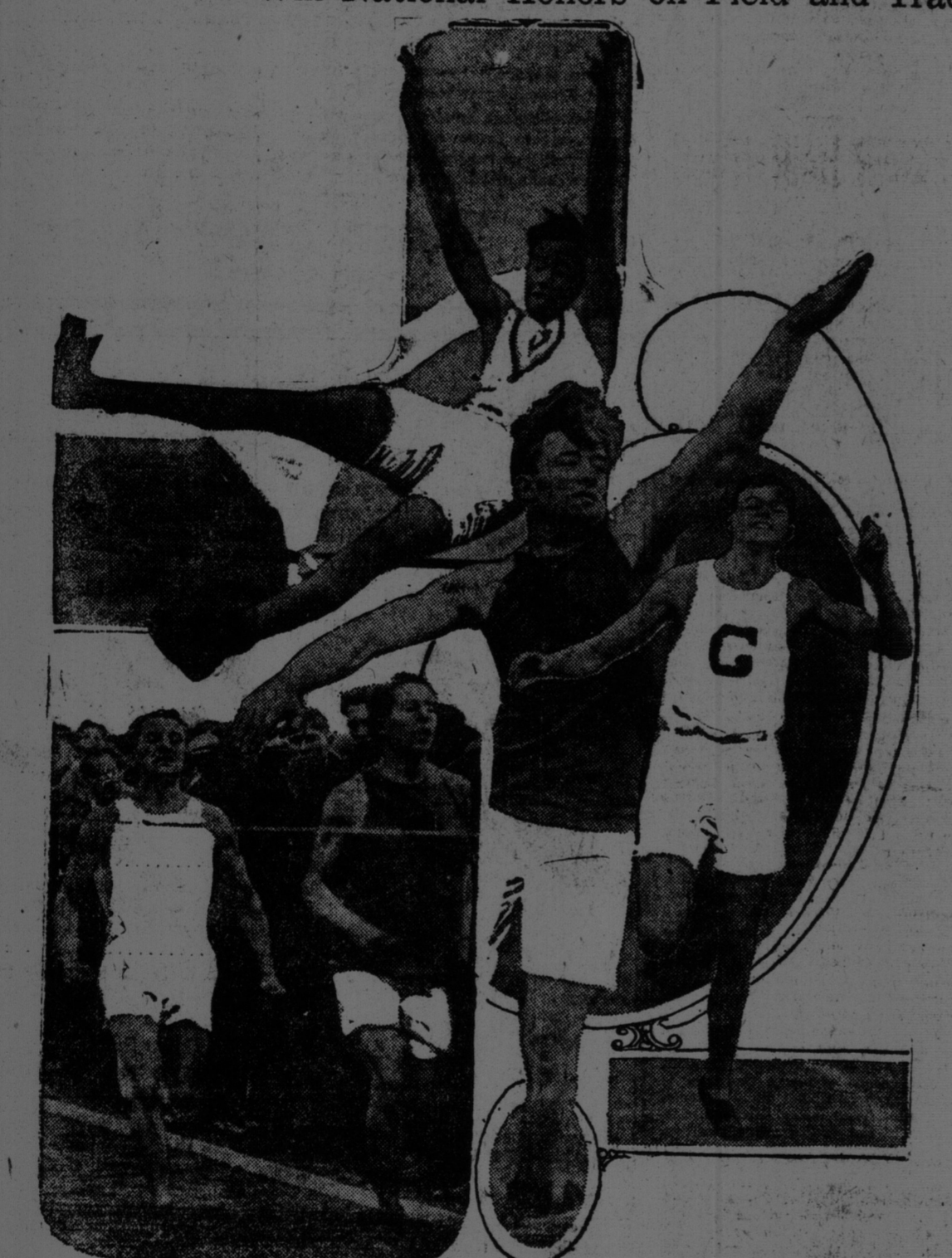

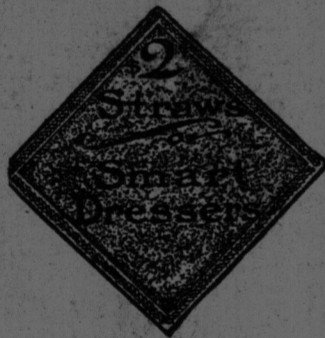

FORMER ST. JOHN MAN DEAD IN CLEVELAND IN HIS HUNDRETH YEAR

Jared Hepburn Was Well Known
Block Maker Here and Member
of Old Volunteer Fire Company

Jared Hepburn, a former resident of this city, died on Monday in Cleveland, Ohio, in the one hundredth year of his age. Despite his great age, Mr. Hepburn had enjoyed the full use of all his faculties and was in excellent health until recently. He was born in St. John on December 14, 1814, and resided here for many years. While the wooden ship building industry was flourishing he conducted a block-making establishment in this city, and after this business dwindled he removed to Wisconsin. Several years ago he moved to Cleveland, Ohio, to reside with his daughter, Mrs. James Thayer, at whose home his death occurred.

Mr. Hepburn is survived by four sons—Charles, of Eau Claire, Wis.; Doctor Jared, Doctor William and Doctor Alexander, of Chicago; three daughters, Mrs. Thayer, of Cleveland; Mrs. Frank Hartsman, of Chicago, and Mrs. Angus Cameron, of St. John, and a large number of grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

During his younger days, Mr. Hepburn was widely known in St. John, and some of the older residents will still remember him as an active Mason. In the days when the old volunteer fire company existed, he was prominent in that organization, which included Blaine and a few other members still survive.

The funeral will take place at his former home in Eau Claire, Wisconsin.

TEN MONTHS IN JAIL OR PAY FINES OF \$64

That is Choice For Hartley Howe
—Two Wives Charge Hus-
bands With Assault

Fines amounting to \$64 or a term of ten months in jail was the penalty handed out to Hartley Howe in the police court this morning by Magistrate Ritchie for drunkenness, resisting and profanity. He was fined \$8 or two months for drunkenness, \$8 or two months for profanity and \$48 or six months for resisting and striking the policeman. The magistrate said that he hoped this would teach a lesson to all those who feel inclined to resist an officer of the law.

The complainant told of the alleged assault and also said she saw the prisoner take the watch. Philip Bushan and Enoch Carves, charged with fighting at the foot of Sydney street on last Sunday, both pleaded not guilty. Louis Jones gave evidence and said the two gentlemen just had an argument and they clinched but he said he saw no blows struck. They were remanded.

The cases against dog owners for not procuring licenses were continued but the majority of those summoned had since procured licenses and their names were checked off by the records kept at city hall which were brought to court for that purpose.

Three men charged with drunkenness were fined \$8 or two months, one was remanded and a fine of \$8 or thirty days in jail was struck against another. A woman, found drunk in the Red Head road, was remanded.
