Every woman wedding, or wedded to an Indian, should take note of the decision just rendered by the Italian court of fina sppeal. As everyone is aware, divorce does not exist in Italy, and the dozen or so of bills that have been presented to the national legislature, with the object of placing a divorce law on the statute book, have been defeated by overwhelm-

of placing a divorce law on the statue book, have been defeated by overwhelming majorities.

The consequence has been that whenever an Italian subject desired release from matrimonial bonds, either a legal demicile, or else naturalization, would be sought and obtained in France, Switzerland or Germany, where divorce is easy. After having obtained in one of those countries a decree of divorce, the parties returned to Italy, and resumed their Italian domicile or nationality, as the case might be. Moreover, they thereupon contracted other marriages in Italy. This has been done without let or hindrance hitherto; but henceforth it will be impossible. Some time ago Count Carlo Guicciardini, quarrielled violently with his wife, a daughter of Senator Poreno, envoy of the Argentine Republic at Rome, owing to her objection to his attentions to the excrown-Princess of Saxony. Finally they made up their minds to secure naturalization in Hungary, and immediately afterwards a Hungarian divorce. He thereupon returned to Italy and, wishing to recover possession of his child, which had been awarded to him by the Hungarian tribunal but had been retained by the mother, who

### Daily Hints For the Cook

ENGLISH WORCESTERSHIRE SAUCE. SAUCE.

Best vinegar, 2 pints, sheerry wine 1 pint, powdered allspice 2 drams, powdered cloves 1 dram, powdered black pepper 1 dram, powdered ginger 1 dram, powdered capsicum 1 dram, powdered mustard 2 ounces, salt 2 ounces, shallots, bruised, 2 ounces, moist brown sugar 8 ounces, tamarinds 4 ounces, curry powder 1 ounce.

Do not use stock powdered spices, but crush them in a mortar immediately before use. Let all the ingredients simmer for one hour in the vinegar, adding more vinegar to keep to the original volume; vinegar to keep to the original volume then add the sherry, and, if desired, little burnt sugar to color, and let stand for a week in a closed vessel; then strain

One quart of small onions, 2 quarts of small cucumbers, 1 large or 2 small cauliflowers, in small pieces, and all put in strong salt water over night. In the morning rinse and boil in vinegar until tender. Mix ½ pound of best ground mustard and 1 ounce of best salad oil with enough vinegar to make it smooth. Stir with the cut vegetables while they are boiling hot. Just before taking from the fire add 1 even tablespoon of red pepper. Put in bottles or cans.






