MORE TROOPS TO BORDER OF MEXICO

More Than Mere Manoeuvres In Mobilization In Texas

INTEREST IN LONDON

Mexican Minister There Says It Means Co-operation With Diaz In Putting Down Insurrection

Washington, March 8.—Several thousand more troops will be ordered to the Mexican frontier. These orders are now being prepared and probably will be issued tonight.

Washington, March 8.—Whether or not the concentration of a fourth of the standing army along the Mexican border is merely an extensive manoeuvre, many persons here familiar with political conditions in Mexico regard the action of the United States at this particular time as likely to have an important bearing on future events in Mexico.

Persistent reports have reached this city that a change in the cabinet of President Diaz soon will be made, and the state department also has been so informed. In these changes the United States government is keenly interested. Apart from any moral effect on the treatment accorded American interests in the present disorders, it is suggested that the military demonstration of the United States, whether successful or not, may have a potential influence on the political crisis in Mexico.

Interest in London London, March 8.—The mobilization of an American army at the Mexican border has excited great interest on the part of London politicians and commercial interests, but all are still in the dark as to whether the movement is for political or purely military reasons.

The foreign office denies that the British government suggested the action taken by Washington, but these officials speak in such diplomatic terms that their statements are not necessarily convincing.

Excitement in Mexico Mexico City, March 8.—If U. S. soldiers had actually invaded Mexico and were now marching on the capital, no greater excitement could be apparent than that shown today over the massing of a United States army upon the Mexican frontier.

The master of the Fenarth agreed to reship any new men, any of the discharged seamen and some of them, it is believed, will do so though this will not relieve them from forfeiture of pay.

TWO MONTHS ON TOUR OF WESTERN CANADA AND STATES

Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Hanington Home Again—St. John People Met and Heart of

F. E. Hanington, the popular I. C. R. ticket agent here, accompanied by his wife, returned home from the Boston express last night after an eight weeks' trip through western Canada and the western states. The trip was a most successful one, and during that time visited Montreal, Winnipeg, Vancouver, Victoria, Portland, Ore., San Francisco, Salt Lake City, Denver, Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, New York and Boston. Mr. Hanington was greatly impressed with the western cities, everything was booming and everybody looked prosperous. They spent three weeks in Los Angeles and certainly enjoyed the time there.

While in Vancouver they drove out to the C. P. R. farm which Col. Markham formerly of this city, it is manager. The colonel was glad to see them and entertained them royally. There are about 270 men employed on the farm and it is certainly a busy place. Col. Markham was enjoying the best of health.

Mr. Hanington said he met many St. John men in the west and on the whole they seemed to be getting along well. They did not see J. N. Harvey in Vancouver as he happened to be away in Victoria on a business trip. They visited the stores, however, and it is one of the best in Vancouver. Victoria and Vancouver impressed the visitors as being the most lively and prosperous looking cities in the west although nearly all the others appear to be thriving.

When asked if he had any intention of moving west, Mr. Hanington replied: "I must not. I am sure that the west is good for me." He will resume his duties in the depot about the first of the week.

The residents of the capital received assurance yesterday from General Cosío that the United States contemplates nothing further than mimic warfare on their own soil for the purpose of manoeuvres, but this did not curtail the excitement, nor did his declaration that President Diaz is not sick, quiet the disquieting reports.

Mexican flags were everywhere displayed. Knots of excited men gathered in the streets denouncing the "Gringos." The government took stern measures to preserve quiet, and the streets were patrolled by soldiers and squads of rurales.

The absence of United States Ambassador Wilson is taken here in the north who immediately departs upon the approach of Mexican troops, re-assembling in the distant districts. Mexico can protect the lives and property of foreigners with new soldiers.

Statements published in London newspapers that the United States is mobilizing troops as the result of demands made by Great Britain received no confirmation in official circles today. The British government, so far, has announced no course of action.

EAGER FOR CHANCE TO VOTE OUT HAZEN GOVERNMENT

FOR LOCAL OPTION TRIAL OF LIBEL ACTION

Opposition Caucus Has Reports From All Over Province

BENTLEY IS CHAIRMAN

First Party Meeting of Session Was Held Today—Tirade of Abuse by Sprout in House And Some Things It Has Recalled

(Special to Times) Fredericton, Mar. 8.—The opposition caucus had the first meeting this morning and the only absentees were Hon. Mr. Laflamme and Mr. Currie who are detained by illness.

Arrangements for the session were made and there was shown much determination to pursue a vigorous criticism of the government's course and a thorough inspection of the public accounts. Mr. Bentley, of St. John county, was chosen chairman of the caucus. Reports from all over the province showed the eagerness of the electors for an opportunity to condemn the acts of the present administration.

P. M. Sprout paid a clear price for his restoration to party favor by the speech that he made last night. Few men can be found in any legislative assembly who would consent to undertake such a task of involved descending to such depths of abuse as have never yet been heard in the halls of the New Brunswick legislature. His abuse of newspapers and newspaper correspondents may well excite the members of the opposition because he was the member for Kings who has often in the past been a centre piece. He has never denied the press for giving the views of the temperance bodies of Kings and for stating their views of him as a representative and of the appointment of a committee from the temperance federation calling for his resignation as a member of the house.

It was the man whom the government chose to be the spokesman of the opposition that surprised the house last evening. At one moment he denounced the members of the late government as guilty of dishonesty, as pillagers and plotting them even as next to murderers and in another moment he was praising his leader to the skies and, as it were, placing the chaplet of knighthood upon his brow. Mr. Sprout might well be answered in the same line as he has chosen but there is no one who would consent to so violate parliamentary decorum. Material is not lacking in the past history of the late government to support the government's case. It has been the subject of favorable comment that no opposition member has sought to take advantage of that for political effect in the house.

The temptation to depart from this line of conduct at the present time, however, is great but the reputation of the opposition leader and the members for being gentlemen in debate is dear to them and few will care to undertake a task that will bring such objectionable matter.

REFUGEE TO WORK IN PRISON JUTE MILL

She was later identified as Mrs. James Slater who had been actively identified with the church for years. She had been stricken with paralysis and died last night.

HALIFAX AND INTERCOLONIAL

Board of Management a n d Engineer to Meet Citizens Re Terminal Improvements

(Canadian Press) Halifax, N. S., March 8.—The members of the board of government railway management and John Kennedy, consulting engineer of Montreal, are to arrive in Halifax on Saturday morning and will meet the board of trade and citizens representing shipping interests.

Some time ago, at the request of the railway management, Mr. Kennedy made an examination of the railway terminal pier and facilities here and his report was made to the railway board. It is expected that Mr. Kennedy's plans for improvement will be made known at the conference on Saturday.

DEFENCE CLAIMS IT IS BLACKMAIL

Proceedings in Case Where It Was Contended Weak Minded Man a Signed Away Valuable Estate

(Canadian Press) Dublin, March 8.—Proceedings were resumed today in the matter of the petition of E. Corcoran to have his father, Edward Corcoran, adjudged insane. The elder Corcoran is said, because of weak mental condition, to have signed away to American lawyers, a large part of an estate inherited from his cousin, John Sullivan, of Seattle, and valued to have been worth \$1,250,000. The son testified that in December 1900, a lawyer named Wright called on his father with reference to the Sullivan inheritance. Subsequently the lawyer took him to Cork, where, before the American consul, he signed a deed giving Wright half his inheritance.

Child Fatally Burned

St. John's, Q. Mar. 8.—(Canadian Press) The five-year-old daughter of Jean Baptiste Menard, caught fire while playing with matches, and was fatally burned. Her father, trying to extinguish the flames was terribly burned and may die.

THE PETITION FOR EARLY CLOSING OF STORES AND THE MERCHANTS WHO SIGN IT

The petition from a large number of merchants in the city in favor of an early closing hour, which was adopted by the common council and for which a bill has been presented before the local legislature at Fredericton, was brought up at the meeting of the house of assembly yesterday, but as there were none of the signers of the petition present, the matter was postponed to the meeting of the house on Saturday, and closed at 7 o'clock in the evening, every day of the week, except Saturday, and remain closed until 7 o'clock a.m. of following day. The provisions are not to apply to days preceding Good Friday, Victoria Day, Dominion Day or Thanksgiving Day, or to the last three weeks of December of each year. The provisions are not to apply to Fridays for merchants who close their stores on Saturdays at 1 o'clock.

RINGING, MASTERLY SPEECH ON RECIPROCITY BY SIR WILFRID

Crowded Galleries and Deeply Attentive House Hear Liberal Chieftain Shatter Absurd Contentions of the Tories

Reciprocity Boon to Canada and the Empire—The Annexation Bogey Placed at Doors of Its Makers

Ottawa, March 7.—In a speech of telling force, logic and broad vision, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in the course of this afternoon's address to the House of Commons, showed it was the economic wisdom of the reciprocity agreement in its effect upon the enlarged prosperity of Canada.

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
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

MAY REVOLUTIONIZE BUILDING OF SHIPS

Vessel Being Constructed on The Clyde Has New Features

London, Mar. 5.—It is announced by the Liverpool Courier that a vessel being constructed for a continental line will revolutionize shipping. Messrs Barclay, Curle & Company, shipbuilders on the Clyde, are constructing this vessel which will be of 5000 tons gross and have a speed of twelve knots. Internal combustion engines have already been fitted to small boats, such as yachts and trawlers; but this is said to be the first occasion on which internal combustion engines will be fitted to a vessel of such large dimensions.

The engines will be of the Diesel type and will require but 100 tons of crude petroleum which can be obtained at a price varying from thirty-four shillings to forty shillings a ton, and will do the work of 300 tons of coal. It is further pointed out that only half of the usual engine and boiler space will be required, in addition to which it will be possible to dispense with about 70 per cent of the usual number of stokers. Perhaps the most striking feature of all will be the absence of funnels, which will not be necessary owing to the use of coal being dispensed with.

THE SUSPENSION BRIDGE

Unsafe Condition Hinted at in Inquiries by Mr. Lowell—Government's Reply Will Be Anxiously Awaited

Fredericton, March 7.—Mr. Lowell, in the house today, gave notice of inquiries into the suspension bridge at St. John, and the government's reply will be awaited with no little interest. The questions inquired into are:—

1. Has the government caused any examination of the suspension bridge at St. John to be made for the purpose of testing or estimating the sufficiency of the cables which support the structure? If so, when was such examination made, by whom was it made, and did such examination extend to any other parts of the bridge, and if so to what parts?
2. Is it not true that during winter storms the margin of safety indicated by the strength of the cables supporting the bridge is much less than the margin of safety required and dangerously near the breaking point?
3. Is not the wearing motion of the bridge, as at present caused by a heavy abutment? Is not its lateral stiffening insufficient?
4. Are not some of the anchor chains of the bridge so severely weakened by rust and from other causes as to be of uncertain strength? Are not certain parts of the iron work of the bridge, especially the anchorages, exposed to strains which are excessive and greater than that regarded as the breaking limit? Are not some of the anchorages so weakened that they will likely give way under a strain less than that which is now being applied?
5. Are there not cracks visible in certain portions of the anchor beams? Is not the repair work in good condition? Do the government consider all the anchorages of the bridge to be in good condition?
6. Is not the government aware that the margin of safety of the bridge, as a whole, is smaller than the margin of safety demanded?
7. Has not the government been notified by the report of a specially detailed engineer that no considerable loads should be allowed upon the bridge during a heavy wind? If any such information has been received has the public been notified of the danger? Is the government unaware that the public has been continuously using the bridge under conditions alleged by the report of the specially detailed engineer to be unsafe? Why has such report been concealed from the public?

IN THE LEGISLATURE

Something of F. M. Sproul and His Speech—Vigorous Address of Mr. Copp—St. John Bills

Fredericton, March 7.—It was a surprise to the house and galleries tonight, when Fred M. Sproul began his reply to Mr. Copp with a bitter attack upon the ex-Surveyor General, Hon. Frank Sweeney, based upon the report of the latter's speech in Westminster in the London Times, a report that was distinctly denied on Friday last by the member for Westmorland. In spite of this Mr. Sproul made his attack and resurrected the tragic death of the late deputy surveyor general, and in the most dramatic fashion pictured the horror of that event, as it occurred three years ago.

Since last Friday Mr. Sproul has been busy preparing a tirade of abuse against the Telegraph and Times and Carleton Sentinel, which newspapers, he said, were principally concerned in misrepresenting the government.

Mr. Sproul was interrupted in his abuse of Mr. Sweeney by that gentleman, who again said he had been misrepresented and misquoted. Mr. Sproul refused to accept the statement of the ex-surveyor general, and was sharply called to order by the speaker, who insisted that he must do so and with the worst possible grace the member for Kings did so and then returned to the attack upon the Liberal newspapers.

Sproul's vigorous abuse of the opposition press showed how tender he was in regard to many of the current statements of his political connection in Kings. There is a feeling in the house that he was the last man to make such an attack, for no member has been treated with greater consideration by the press of the country than he has. Opportunities have not been lacking to bring Sproul into the limelight of public opinion and his failure to acknowledge the leniency of the newspapers will not probably be forgotten.

Mr. Copp's continuation of his speech was devoted to showing how miserably the government had carried out their promises, how they had laid aside the planks in their platform and forgotten what they were elected to do.

He was clear and explicit in his exposure of the deficits upon the Central Road, which had increased from \$200,000 in 1906 to over \$1,000,000 last year, while the business of the road had increased from \$40,000 to over \$200,000.

His references to the good selection made by the Liberals in Kings and his declaration that it was the theory of the government when the Albert Southern rails were allowed to be removed to see that every creditor was protected, was warmly applauded by the opposition.

In masterly fashion he showed how from Oct. 23, 1908, to Oct. 31, 1909, \$1,000,000 had been spent on bridges by the Hazen government without a tender being asked for. He did not believe the Chief Commissioner Morriay realized the position members supporting the government were placing him in. He said a frequent answer to opposition charges, was a reference to the former administration. The old administration was denied and this government must be judged by its own acts and not by those of its predecessors.

Mr. Wilson presented the petition of the city of St. John in favor of a bill empowering the city to conduct a plebiscite on the question of introducing a commission plan of government in that city.

THE MISPEG MILL

Incorrect Statements Made Regarding the Water Privileges and Other Matters

The Globe last evening printed what purported to be an interview with an engineer whose name was not given. This man was quoted as saying that George McAvity "had told the city the present water works which were built by the late government, had operated the mill for nine months of the year."

Mr. McAvity said yesterday that he had not made any such statement. On the contrary, because of low water in the mill which would not run in winter, it never was found practicable to operate the mill for nine months continually.

The Globe's article might create the impression that there is some danger of legal entanglements over the water privilege. Mr. Copp attaches no value to the water power, and it has been pointed out repeatedly that an agreement could readily be made which would free the city from any claims in future in connection with the use of the water.

As for the removal of the machinery, if after a reasonable trial of a year or two it was found that conditions were such that the mill could not be operated successfully, the occupants would naturally want to remove valuable machinery, which they own, and if they do so the building and everything else would revert to the city.

Mrs. Melber Faces Charge in Albany Court—Poured Acid Down Throat When He Asked For Drink

The same afternoon a prepossessing little woman stepped up to claim a trunk on the depot platform at Rochester and she was arrested charged with the murder.

CAPT. WILLIAM SWATRIDGE IS DEAD IN STATES

Mariner Who Sailed Out of Here for Years in the Days of the Sailing Vessel and Later in Steamers

Captain William Swatridge, well known here among shipping people, having sailed out of this port for many years, died at his home in Brooklyn, N. Y., on Monday. Word came to Mrs. Edwin J. Fritz of 118 Ludlow street, West End, and other than the bare announcement of his death nothing has been received. The news was a great shock to his relatives and friends here as there had been no intimation that he had been in any way but good health.

Born in Bristol, England, about sixty-five years ago, Captain Swatridge came to St. John as a young man. He sailed vessels for many years for the late Oliver Inney of this city and also for Wm. Thomson & Co. He was early in command of the bark Maiden City, owned by the late Mr. Emery, and also the ship Oliver Emery. Captain Swatridge also sailed the bark Kathadin and Birnam Wood and the ship Canara for Messrs. Wm. Thomson & Co. Following his success with the sailers, Messrs Thomson placed him in command of the Battle liner Cheronia. He left the steamer and was ashore here for about a year. About six years ago he removed to Brooklyn and since had been adjuter for Stewart & Co., marine insurance underwriters of New York, his work taking him all along the Atlantic coast. About two years ago he went to New Orleans to bring to New York a steamer captured by the American government while on a filibustering expedition to one of the South American republics.

Beside his wife, who was Miss Catherine Osborne, daughter of the late James Osborne of St. Martins, he is survived by two sons, William O. Swatridge, who saw service during the South African war with the Canadian contingent from St. John, and Roy Swatridge, both of Brooklyn.

Mrs. Edwin J. Fritz, of West St. John and Mrs. Cudlip Miller of St. Martins were sisters-in-law, being sisters of Mrs. Swatridge. Captain Swatridge and his family visited here only last summer.

IMPOSTER AGAIN MAKES THE ROUNDS

Woman Seeking Aid for "Sick Daughter." Subject of Warning From Associated Charities—An Incident of Yesterday

The public are warned against a woman who is now going about the city soliciting clothing and money, ostensibly for a sick daughter, but who, is an imposter, according to Mrs. G. H. Hall, secretary of the Associated Charities, whose knowledge of this class is most extensive.

Yesterday, this woman called upon a well known lady, charitable minded and solicited clothing for her daughter who, she said, was 20 years old, and was suffering from cancer and she wanted to send her to Nova Scotia for treatment. The woman was very comfortably dressed. She gave a name and an address in Marsh road. She said that she was able to work but her daughter was not. The lady offered to give her work and intended also to give her some clothes, but as soon as she was offered the work she began to make excuses. She said she would have to return to her child. The lady suggested that she might as well be working as walking around the streets in either case she would be away from the child, and finally the woman said she would be back in half an hour, that she had to go down the street to see someone. But she did not return.

From her appearance it seemed that she had several skirts on, supposed to have been picked up from other visits and put on to carry the more easily.

When the woman was described to Mrs. Hall, she said she had no doubt it was a woman who had given the board a great deal of trouble. She had come here from Springhill and for several years had been imposing on the public with stories of various kinds that were calculated to obtain money. She was known by the names of Mrs. Daniel Murphy, Mrs. Debra Murphy, Mrs. Wilson, Mrs. Dixon and others, being very versatile in the matter of names. She had given addresses in the Marsh road, Moore street, Erin street and other places.

The sick daughter, Mrs. Hall said, was a fiction. Sometimes she was suffering from cancer and sometimes from other ailments, and on one or two occasions the story was that the daughter was dead and the woman wanted money for the funeral expenses. Needless to say, the daughter was very much alive, in fact there were two daughters, one a widow and the other a girl.

The woman, Mrs. Hall said, was a scandalous fraud and it was a shame to allow her to go about soliciting money which she was well able to earn, while there were plenty of deserving poor people who needed help but were not complaining. There had been a lot of real genuine suffering, a great want of work and much sickness, and had been a very hard winter for many of the poor in St. John.

LESSEE OF TOLLS IN MARKET PUTS IN CLAIM FOR DAMAGES

Attorney for Roy W. Potts Writes to Common Council—Other Matters For The Meeting Today

Among the communications sent to the common council for this afternoon is one from Amos A. Wilson, K.C., on behalf of Roy W. Potts, lessee of the market tolls, stating that Mr. Potts has already suffered large damage by quantities of goods having been turned out of the market, and that he has claim damages from the city in consequence.

Edward Kelly has an application to be appointed a harbor pilot.

The Trades and Labor Council have a request that the union labels be placed on all city printing.

A petition from the lessees of butchers' stalls in the market, protesting against an increase in rental, has been sent in.

The Crosby Molasses Co. Ltd., have another communication with reference to a request for a lease of lots between Broad and Britain streets. This application was turned down by the council not long ago on the ground that this land might be needed for improvements at Courtney Bay.

With the present communication there is a letter from Hon. Wm. Fugate, minister of public works, and Louis Coste, C. E., stating that the leasing of the lots will not interfere with the proposed development of Courtney Bay.

One of the new matters likely to receive consideration is a resolution for the establishment of a public playground under municipal supervision.

Ald. Hayes will move for the issue of \$53,000 in debentures, the bills and by-laws committee will submit drafts of bills which they judge essential to draw up, and the reports of the various boards will come in for more or less discussion.
