Daily Hints For the Cook

Beef Stew
 Get three pounds of the shin. Cut the marrow all out and try in iron frying pan. Wash and wipe dry the meat and cook in fat until well browned on all sides.
 Then put all into deep kettle and keep well covered with water until meat is well done. Take out, remove bone and set meat aside.
 Into stock in kettle put eight potatoes cut into pieces, four onions sliced. Season well with salt and pepper. When nearly done turn in one can of tomatoes, cook until potatoes are thoroughly cooked, then thicken with tablespoon and a half of four mixed smooth in tablespoon of butter. Cook a few minutes and remove from fire. Take all the small pieces of meat and put in the stew and save the nice even slices for another meal to be eaten cold instead of putting it all in the stew.

MILK DEALERS TO FIGHT THE COMBINE

St. John faces a serious situation regarding the milk supply. According to the retail dealers one local concern has made an effort to control the entire supply of milk shipped to St. John and has secured enough contracts from the farmers to seriously limit the quantity available for the local dairymen.
 A meeting of the milk dealers was held last evening and they decided to fight. Their statement of the case is that if they are forced to buy through the "Combine" they will have to pay ten to twelve cents more per can, they pay this price they must raise the price charged the consumer from eight cents to nine or ten. In addition to this they will be unable to guarantee a milk.
 As they could recoup themselves if extra price would not affect their pockets, but it is for the protection their customers and for the purpose keeping the price to a reasonable level and making sure of the quality of the milk they sell that they are fighting. Until they can get in touch with other sources of supplies it may be necessary for them to cut down the quantity of milk supplied to each customer.

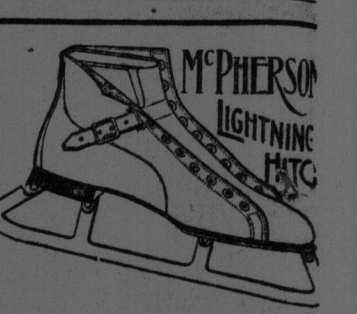

HOME TO FIND HIS WIFE AND BABE DEAD

Worcester Nightworker's Awful Discovery — Woman Stricken, Turns on Gas in Fall

Worcester, Dec. 12.—Returning after his night's work as a boiler tender in the South Works of the American Steel and Wire Company at 6.30 a. m. Joseph Wray of 190 Vernon street entered his home to find his wife, aged 34 and his baby daughter, Wainfred, aged seventeen months, dead from gas poisoning, and the deadly fumes pouring from an open gas jet into their bedroom.

Stunned by his horrible discovery and almost overcome by the escaping gas, Mr. Wray had difficulty in summoning assistance from the other two families that live in the house.

The police ambulance was summoned and Dr. Richard J. Shanahan worked over the victims with a pulmonary for nearly two hours but they had been dead some time.

The conditions indicated that Mrs. Wray suffered a cerebral hemorrhage as she was turning out the gas light in the bedroom preparatory to retiring for the night. Her body was found on the floor, crumpled in a heap, with the right arm extended toward the jet. The appearance of the body indicated that she suffered a shock as she reached for the jet to extinguish the light and fell striking the gas cock in such a way that she opened it after shutting off the flame.

The fumes filled the room and, besides finishing the work in such a way that she opened the bedroom door, he was struck by the over powering odor of escaping gas and then discovered his dead wife and baby.

When Mr. Wray reached home his wife was not on hand to meet him as usual, and he found the rear door locked. He tapped on the window of a bedroom occupied by two other children, Harold, aged four and Ethel, aged three. Harold opened the door for him.

The lad immediately went back to bed and Mr. Wray continued through the kitchen and the living room into the front of the house to arouse his wife. As he opened the bedroom door, he was struck by the over powering odor of escaping gas and then discovered his dead wife and baby.

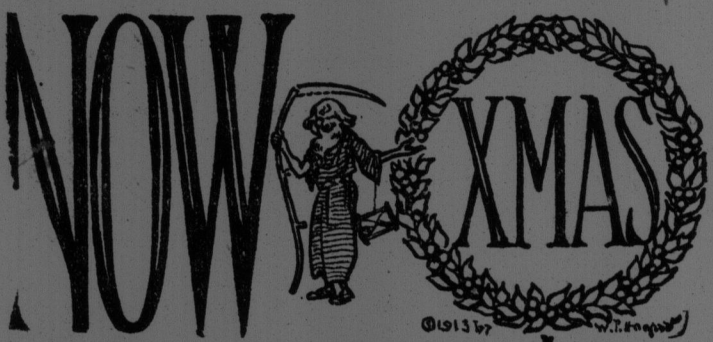

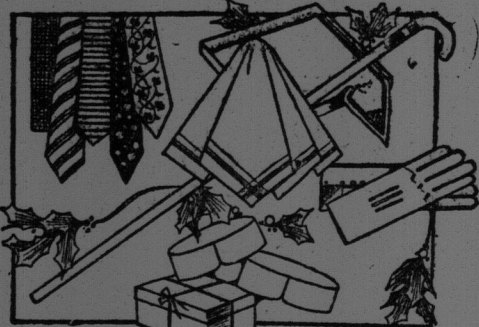

WOMAN KILLED; BROTHER IS

HURT BY TRAIN BOUND HERE

Mrs. Charles Daisey and her brother, Hollis Bruce, were struck by the Maine Central locomotive drawing the St. John train, due at Bangor early on Wednesday, at a railroad crossing three miles below Winn, Me. Mrs. Daisey was killed and Bruce received a compound fracture of the leg.

Mrs. Daisey had been visiting relatives below Winn and, together with her brother, started to drive into town. It is difficult to see the approach of a train on the crossing where the accident occurred and it is supposed that neither of them heard it approaching. Bruce saw the locomotive looming up just before the crash and started to whip his horse with the hope of clearing the engine. But he was too late and the locomotive struck the carriage. Mrs. Daisey was dead when they reached her and Bruce was found to have a broken leg.

CONDITIONS SEEM

TO BE BETTER NOW

Winter Outlook More Hopeful in The Matter of Employment in St. John

From present indications it would seem that the matter of employment among the laboring men of the city will not be so serious this winter as it was last year, and that a greater decrease will be apparent in the numbers of those not working, at least those who want to work. There are several reasons which might be applied to this condition of affairs, but there are two which stand out more prominently than the others—the fact that the weather conditions this fall have been such that a great deal of the work which has been going on all summer has been continued up to date, and there has been more building and more of the other activities than usual to give employment to a large number of laboring men.

In conversation with a Times' reporter yesterday, Adjutant Cummings of the Salvation Army, said that the prospects for the coming winter were brighter than they were last year. Of the number of men who were out of work at the present time, but a very small percentage were local men, the great majority being those who have come here from outside points. In almost all the cases of our own men, he said, the reason of their being out of work was not so much the fact that there was not sufficient work offering, but rather their own lack of energy in getting after it. "Of course," said Adjutant Cummings, "it is hard at the present time to judge what the conditions will be later on in the season, and although they appear very good now, they may prove a little harder later, although there is nothing to warrant it now."

"As far as our work among the needy is concerned, we have a more difficult time in the month of February, as that is the month we find comes hardest on our working classes. The public of St. John is exceedingly generous in their contributions for this work, but the bulk of the donations come about Christmas time, and they are usually exhausted when February hard times come, and for this reason, as well as for the reason that the month comes hardest on the men themselves, our work is much more difficult then during the early part of the winter."

MORE REVENUE FROM

BUILDINGS CITY OWNS

Commissioner McLellan Getting Rentals up to What He Thinks Proper

The city buildings account will make rather different figures next year by the time Commissioner McLellan gets the rentals from the various buildings, he said yesterday. For years no rental for the use of the city hall was charged against any of the departments and there was no income from which to create a sinking fund to retire the \$60,000 bonds issued by the city last year for the reason that the buildings for rent of the city building and next year he will get \$2000.

The old Gazetteer-city hall, which formerly showed an income of about \$100 produced \$200 last year and will do as well in 1914. Instead of no revenue the city will have from \$200 to \$1,200 from the exhibition buildings for 1918. The revenue from the market buildings also shows an increase and will be larger. Altogether the city's building fund will be in better shape next year than ever before.

STREET CAR NOW

MAKES THE LOOP

Out the Westmorland Road Across to One Mile House; In Marsh Road

The whole new loop of the St. John street railway from Cooper's corner to Kane's corner, thence to the One Mile House and in the Marsh road again to Cooper's corner, was put into operation for the first time yesterday. For the last month or two the branch from Haymarket square to Kane's corner and return has been in operation, one round trip being completed every ten minutes, making connection with every car in both directions on the Haymarket square branch. Under the new arrangements, however, with the cars running all the way around the loop, connections will be made only with every other trip of the Haymarket square cars, the round trip being made in twenty minutes. The car is now running out to Kane's corner, along Russell street to the One Mile House and in the Marsh Road to Haymarket square.

IMPORT XMAS TREES

Bringing Them Into St. John From Up River

During the last few years it has become more difficult in the woods surrounding the city to procure a Christmas tree to please the fancy. Formerly it was quite an ordinary event for the oldest boy of the household, or the father to take his axe and go to almost any part of the woods bordering the city and find a nicely rounded and well-balanced tree. Each year the hunt to the woods takes him farther from the city, and even then it may be necessary to fell a fairly large tree and cut its top. Not so very long ago the woods seem unusual for a shipment of small spruce trees to be made to the city from a point several miles outside Public Landing for instance. Yet just this week a North End dealer received a large shipment to be offered for sale for Christmas use, and the demand for them has shown that many prefer to buy rather than try to find trees which might suit their fancy within a convenient distance of the city.

FORT HOWE PROJECT IS POPULAR; GREAT SUCCESS ATTENDS THE WOMEN'S CANADIAN CLUB MEETING

The view from Fort Howe, looking seaward and towards Red Head beyond Courtenay Bay. It is planned to convert the hill into a beautiful park, and near its summit will be erected a memorial to Lady La Tour.

Fort Howe Evening, under the auspices of the Women's Canadian Club, a gathering which had been pleasantly anticipated for several days past by those interested in promoting the work of transforming the old landmark into a beautiful spot, was both successful and enjoyable. The York Theatre last evening was crowded by a fully representative body of citizens who had come, in response to the invitation of the club, to hear about the old fort, its history and its romantic associations, and facts showing how desirable it is from every standpoint, to preserve and improve it, as a public park, for the enjoyment of the people of St. John and tourists and others who visit us.

Major Studholme was born near Dublin in 1740, and at the age of seventeen came to Halifax as a member of the 73rd Regiment of Foot. Four years later, in 1761, he was given command of a small detachment at Fort Frederick, at the mouth of the St. John. The site is now known as the Old Fort. Studholme remained here until 1764 or later.

In 1774 he retired for a time from active service. When the American Revolution broke out, however, he tendered his services, and in 1777 assisted in driving the rebels, not only from Fort Cumberland, but from the St. John river. In November, 1777, he was sent from Halifax to establish a fort at St. John. He brought with him a blockhouse and fifty men, and at first thought of restoring Fort Frederick, but finally chose the lofty eminence overlooking the whole harbor. Here the blockhouse was erected and the place named Fort Howe, in honor of the commander of the British forces in America.

Major Studholme had a good deal to do with pacifying the Indians, and bringing about the treaty which was signed with great ceremony in presence of the Indian chiefs, Indian Agents, and other notable persons. When the Loyalists came, Major Studholme welcomed them, and gave very material assistance in getting them settled upon their lands. He was made a member of Governor Carleton's first council, and received a large grant of land in Kings county, which is now the parish of Studholme. He retired from active service, took up his abode there, and died in October, 1792, at the comparatively early age of 61 years. His remains were interred on the summit of the hill which forms the western side of the Kennebec valley, on his own estate, just above the village of Apogee. No monument marks the grave, and its exact location is unknown.

Mr. Belding noted the fact that, during the period of the revolution, the Major Studholme made St. John an important link in the line of communication between Halifax and Quebec, as well as between Quebec and New York. Runners were constantly on the move between St. John and Quebec, and General Haldimand at Quebec of the surrender of General Cornwallis, as early as 1783, St. John was regarded by the people of Halifax as an important mail port.

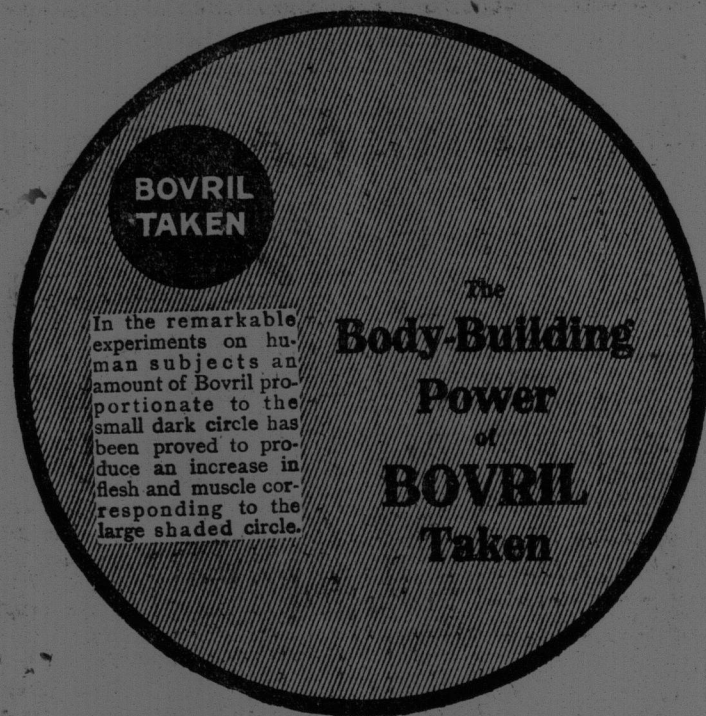

Halifax, Dec. 12.—The Maritime Commercial Travellers Association met to-night and elected the following officers: President, William J. The membership of the association is 1,367 of which 700 are registered at Halifax, and 667 at St. John. The association lost thirteen members by death during the year. The total resources of the association now amount to \$97,782.05.

COST OF LIVING STILL SOARING

Department of Labor Issues Bulletin Showing How Prices Have Increased.

Ottawa, Dec. 12.—The labor department today issued the following bulletin: "The department of labor index number of wholesale prices stood at 128.4 for November, as compared with 128.4 in October and 126.9 in November, 1912. The increase was due to advances in the prices of grains and feedstuffs, cattle, beef, sheep, dairy products (especially eggs), and fresh vegetables. These increases, however, were somewhat offset by declines in flour, glucose, honey, rice, cotton, and silk, coke, iron, iron pipe, linseed oil, resin and raw rubber. The level was higher than a year ago in animals, and meats, dairy products, textiles, hides, leathers, boots and shoes, lumber, miscellaneous building materials, furniture and crockery. A lower level than last year appeared in grains and feedstuffs, fish and paints, and oils. Fruits and vegetables were slightly higher, but miscellaneous groceries were somewhat lower than last year.

The feature of the month in retail prices was the advance in eggs, but the movement was also upward in butter, potatoes, coal, milk, and prunes. Beef, veal, and mutton advanced in some localities, but fresh pork and lard declined in a number of Canadian cities.

According to a bulletin issued by the department of labor, there were only seven trade disputes during November, 1913, a favorable showing in comparison with October, when there were nine in existence, and also with November, 1912, in which month twenty-five were recorded.

There was, however, an increase in the number of working days lost over the previous month, the figures being 89,000 for November, 1913, and 70,700 during October.

They make New Brunswick appear as the most illiterate province in Canada. He says this is due to the fact that the school age is six years in this province, while in other provinces it is five. This province is also without kindergarten, and the census enumerators apparently classified as illiterates all children not attending school.

The proposal of the Canadian Pacific has resulted in a protest from President Tregillus, who says the farmers will insist on an equal interest of the three railroads.

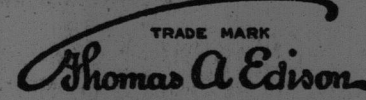

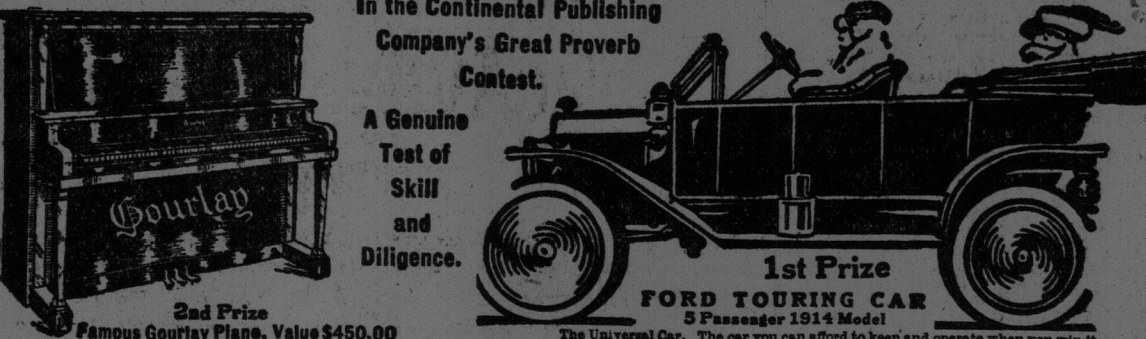

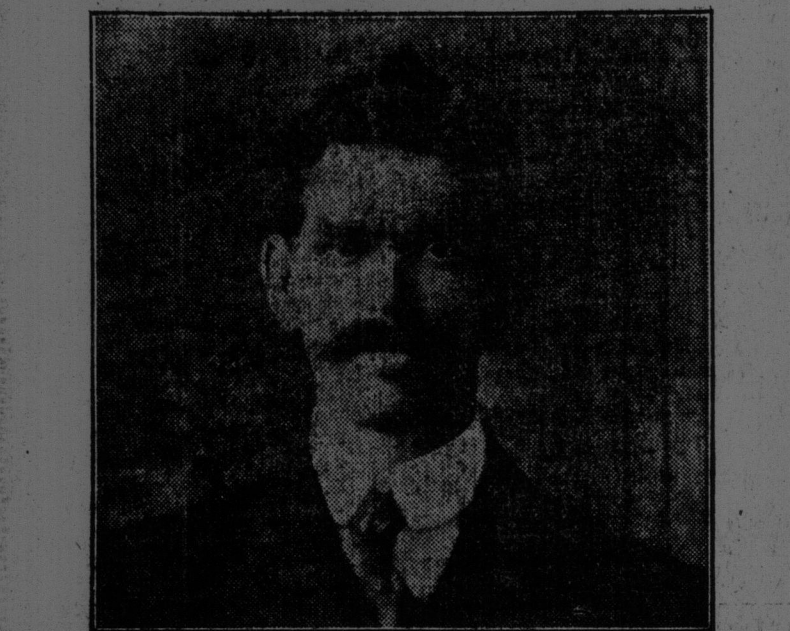

touched the fringe of his life, and it would take hours to tell of his after career. It was wonderful, appalling, to think that one man could accomplish so much. From a poor peasant boy he reached almost the highest position in the realm. He published 74 books, magazines and pamphlets; he crossed swords with kings and statesmen; he was imprisoned for giving expression to his views; he fought the battles of the poor and downtrodden, and in his day was maligned and persecuted. But when he died all the world, friends and foes, acknowledged his greatness. The London Times pronounced him the most extraordinary Englishman of his age, and called him "The last of the Saxons." The Morning Chronicle declared that he was the most powerful writer that England ever produced, and the Standard acknowledged that he was the first political writer of his age, wholly without a rival since the days of Swift. Of him Elliott, the poet, wrote:

"Yes, let the wild flowers wed his grave,
That bees may murmur near,
When 'er his last home bend the brave,
And say, 'A MAN lies here.'"

"For Britons honor Cobett's name,
Though rashly oft he spoke;
And none can scorn, and few will blame,
The low-laid heart of oak."

And what shall I more say? For time fails in which to tell of his greatness. He was a planet, which in its impetuous rush touched for a time a rugged hill in this city by the sea. Fort Howe is to become transformed. It has witnessed many changes in the march of years. It saw the stirring events surrounding old Fort L'Anse-au-Loup, and the struggle for the grip of empire; it watched the Loyalists land upon these shores and behind a city grow strong and prosperous at its feet. It will behold greater changes in the years to come, for St. John is destined to become the Liverpool of Canada, the city where the Old and the New Worlds meet. Crowned and crested with the glory of flowers, trees and avenues, Fort Howe will smile her benediction upon the City of the Loyalists. But amid all the historic interests of this old hill none will appeal more to the hearts of future generations than its association with the famous William Cobett, and the beautiful maiden of the washbasin.

Mr. Justice Landry then spoke a few words in favor of the desired object, and in appreciation of the efforts of the club. Mayor Frink also spoke, and assured those present that the city would cooperate in every way to ensure the success of the undertaking.

During the evening a small but select orchestra of ladies played selections and Mrs. L. M. Curren sang very acceptably. Views of Fort Howe and its surroundings, as they were and are, were thrown upon the screen and capably explained by W. H. Golding. On the stage were scenic views appropriate to the occasion. The National Anthem was then sung, and the audience dispersed after a very pleasant evening.

ated with her, the proposed memorial to St. John's first heroine, Lady LaTour, would first be a reconstructed part. Also that the height that crowns our city, the site of old Fort Howe, may be reserved as a park and recreation ground for young and old. New cities have so many parks and recreation grounds that it should be the greatest pity in the world if this beautiful, historic place should fall into the hands of speculators, and be gradually over-run with tenement houses.

The speaker fully endorsed Mr. Belding's suggestion that some memorial to the regiment whose names are worthy of the name of Lady LaTour, should be placed upon the summit that overlooks the scene in which they lived and died in centuries past.

Dr. Raymond then briefly referred to the circumstances attending the erection of Fort Howe by Studholme in 1777, and related many incidents connected with the garrison life. He referred particularly to the period when the 54th Regiment was stationed there. Among those in the regiment whose names are worthy of note are Lord Edward Fitzgerald, Major of the Regiment, Captain William Balfour, Sergeant William Cobett, and Mark Needham. Lord Edward Fitzgerald's remarkable history and tragic end were narrated. Captain Balfour commanded the guard of honor that welcomed Colonel Thomas Carleton on his arrival in November, 1784. A quarter of a century later Balfour had risen to the rank of major general, and at the time of his death in 1811 was adjutant general of the government of the province. Mark Needham was a soldier who had been born in the regiment, in which his father had served before him, and was killed in battle near the close of the Revolutionary war. Needham himself attained the rank of quartermaster. His son, the Hon. W. H. Murray, was mayor of the city, and afterwards prominent as a member of the legislature.

Dr. Raymond referred to other regiments that succeeded were in garrison at Fort Howe. These included the 1st New Brunswick Regiment, raised within the province; the 104th Regiment, which gained distinction in the war of 1812; the 8th or King's Regiment, and several others. Of these the 104th was recruited mainly from the British prisons. Floggings were so frequent at Fort Howe that the 104th was sometimes termed the 109 and worst. The commander said that they were everything that was bad except bad soldiers. There were some fine officers in the corps, and whenever opportunity offered the soldiers fought like demons. Two deserters from this regiment, upon being held up by a resident of Musquash named Barnabus Tilton, shot the poor farmer and escaped to the borders where they were apprehended. On their return they were court-martialed, sentenced to death and hanged on Gallows Hill, the rock ridge that overlooks the railway station. The last British regiment in garrison at Fort Howe was the 74th, commanded by the Hon. Sir R. Le Poer Trench. This was also the first regiment in the new barracks erected at Lower Cove, about the year 1822. The last we hear of the old garrison buildings on Fort Howe is the sale of the materials of which they were built—windows, doors, timbers, brick, etc., by public auction in March, 1823. The battery of guns, however, still remained in position. The old guns during the first half century of St. John's history, often caused the surrounding heights to reverberate. They spoke on every anniversary on state occasions. They welcomed to our shores the spring, summer and autumn fleets of the Royal Navy. In 1783, they welcomed our first governor on the 21st of November, 1784. On the 21st of August, 1785, they welcomed the popular governor, Sir Howard Douglas in 1828.

At the close of Archbishop Raymond's address, T. H. Estabrook proposed the following resolution: Resolved, That this public meeting of citizens, under the auspices of the Women's Canadian Club, expresses its most hearty approval of the proposal to rescue the historic site of Fort Howe from its present state of neglect, and convert it into a public park.

At comparatively small expense this bold, historic mountain of rock can be made one of the most picturesque and inspiring spots of any of the many historic places in Canada. Fort Howe as it is today will soon be submerged in the commercial growth of our city, and the important part it played in the early history of our country will be forgotten and forgotten; but Fort Howe, preserved, beautified, cared for, and surrounded, as we hope, by a tower commemorating the brave Lady LaTour and overlooking the scene of her heroic defence of Fort LaTour, will be a place of historic interest and pleasure for untold generations to come.

As the property belongs to the crown it seems to come naturally under the care of the dominion parks branch of the Department of the Interior, which has been charged by the federal government with the duty of reclaiming and preserving the important historic places of our country, and as the history of Fort Howe is so important to the Dominion of Canada, it is the duty of the Dominion of Canada to take the matter in charge that they send copies of the addresses and a report of the proceedings of this meeting to Her Majesty's Minister of the Interior, Hon. J. D. Hazen, Hon. Wm. Pugsby and J. B. Harbin, commissioner of the dominion parks branch of the Department of the Interior.
