And we, the undersigned electors and residents of the said Parish of Nelson, do hereby severally make oath and say as follows:—

That, as a matter of fact, John P. Burchill of the Parish of Nelson aforesaid was duly qualified to be nominated and was actually and duly nominated as a Candidate for the office of County Councillor for said Parish at the annual election held in and for said Parish on Tuesday, 26th October last, being the 4th Tuesday in October 1880.

That Thomas Ambrose, the uncle of Thomas Flett, hereinafter named, was the Chairman of district No. 1 in the said Parish of Nelson on the occasion of the said election and, in our opinion, improperly returned Allan M. Saunders and Thomas Flett as the Candidates elected. Because we say, as regards the said Allan M. THE CANADA TEMPERANCE ACT. Coun. A. Adams moved, Whereas the second part of the Canada Temperance Act has been adopted by the electors of the County of Northumberland, and whereas the Governor General in Council has been pleased to issue Proclamation dated 4th day of November, declaring that the afore-said Act shall be in force and take effect said Act shall be in force and take effect in the aforesaid County of Northumber-land, upon, from, and after the day on which the annual or semi-annual licenses for the sale of spirituous liquors now in force in the said County will expire, pro-vided such day be not less than ninety days from the day of the date thereof, and if it be less, then on the like day in the following year.
