PROF. BELL IS NOW A DOCTOR OF SCIENCE

Honorary Degree Conferred by Oxford University

Recipient Becomes Reminiscent in London and Speaks of His Inventions and

His Aims.

LONDON, May 4—Professor Alexander Graham Bell was delighted when the found that her has been dependent the behouting dependency and perfect within the behouting dependency and the behouting

Becoming reminiscent about his other infentions, Prof. Bell said that although everybody knew him as the inventor of the telephone, nobody outside a limited circle knew him as the inventor of anything else. He was surprised to learn that his invention of 1880, the photophone, by means of which speech is transmitted by a beam of 1880, the photophone, by means of which speech is transmitted by a beam of light, is unknown in England, except to scientists, although it was used in Germany to establish communication between lighthouses and the shore.

Prof. Bell recalled with amusement how, in connection with the invention of the photophone, he was attacked for having claimed to have invented something which never entered his head. He said he deposited, in 1880, in the Smithsonian Institute a sealed package detailing his discoveries, and, this becoming known, led to the announcement that he claimed to have discovered how to see by telegraph. Numbers of people in America and England claimed priority of discovery, as, by the way, they did of the telephone. Scientific papers in the United States and England, as well as newspapers, warred against him. DIVORCES IN MICHIGAN BREAK ALL RECORDS

Secretary of State Reports 3,189 in Year, a "Sad Commentary."

LANSING, Mich., May 4—Divorce statistics compiled by the secretary of state's department for 1906, show that 3,189 decrees were granted during the year, an increase of 389 over 1905.

This is the greatest number returned in Michigan for any years since the registration of divorces began in 1867.

This corresponds to a rate of 2.05 persons divorced per 1,000 population, and is about one-eighth of the marriage rate for the year. The bulletin says:



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
