IT COST \$4,367

To Close the School for the Deaf and Dumb.

Public Accounts Committee Go Over Some Amazing Bills—The Ministers Criticized.

FREDERICTON, April 18.—The committee on public accounts at their session this morning covered considerable ground and managed to get through some hundred pages of the report.

The Deaf and Dumb Institution investigation, which the province was called upon to shoulder, took out of the provincial revenue, \$4,367.30.

The item unforecast expenditures presents some interesting reading. It just cost New Brunswick \$5,247.09 for 1903 for expenses that neither the attorney general nor provincial secretary were able to see last session.

On examination of the visit of Transvaal delegates to St. John it was found \$100.42 was paid for the board of four delegates, while horse hire came to \$25. These expenses were admitted pretty high, but it was not stated whether champagne is included in the bill of fare or not.

In passing the unforecast expenditures, Mr. Smith said it is a pity that the amount these ministers get every year one way and another for attending conferences, looking after claims and travelling expenses.

Mr. Glover then quoted several figures to illustrate how much the province was advancing in New Zealand.

STILL PREPARING.

Japan Is Now Landing Troops in Korea.

SERIOUS DEFECT FOUND.

Anglo-French Treaty Must Be Changed in Its Provisions Affecting Newfoundland Fisheries.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., April 18.—The text of the Anglo-French colonial treaty has not yet been published here, but a serious defect has been pointed out which the colonial government is trying to have corrected.

The second clause of the French shore arrangement obliges French and British fishermen to fish in the waters of the Gulf of St. Lawrence. This clause, if enforced, would make the condition of Newfoundland fishermen worse than before, because they would be prevented from fishing during six months of the year.

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LOCAL LEGISLATURE

FREDERICTON, April 22.—Mr. Fleming's speech on the budget continued.

I will now refer briefly to the estimates of receipts and expenditures for the current year. I refer to the receipts first. I find that the expectation is that \$78,000 will be derived from territorial revenue more than former years.

Now I claim that the government is estimating all wrong. Take the estimated expenditure for the year. The estimate for the executive department is \$1,100,000.

Then again, take the item of printing. The estimate for the year is \$12,000, while last year the expenditure was \$14,321.

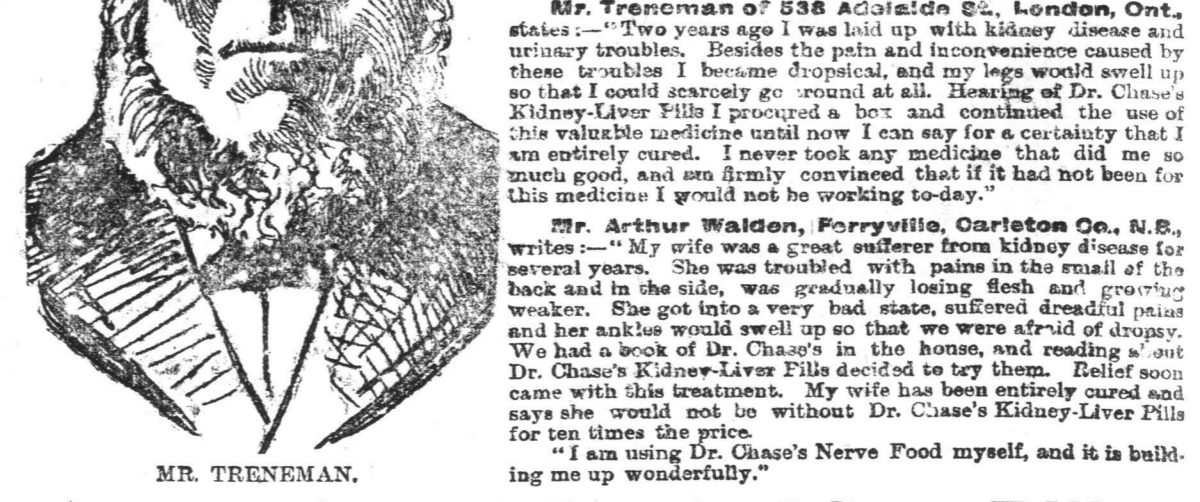

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PARLIAMENT.

OTTAWA, April 14.—The greater part of the afternoon was devoted to a discussion of rules of order, precipitated by the leader of the opposition, who in a gentlemanly way criticized the ruling of Mr. Speaker yesterday.

Borden's forceful presentation of these cases was plausibly met by Laurier, but his followers, Minister Mulock especially, lost their heads and indulged in remarks more or less unparliamentary. It was an interesting discussion to the members with regard to the internal economy of the house, but not one of moment to the country at large.

Mulock retorted: "Was this policy put before the electors of Guyaboro?" "Cowan answered in the affirmative," answered Gushybor. (Terrific opposition cheers.) So had several Ontario ridings.

At five o'clock, Cowan (liberal) resumed the debate on the G. T. P. resolution, speaking almost exclusively from the standpoint of the G. T. P. in enmity to the C. P. R. It was the talk of an advocate rather than a representative of the people.

Cowan's speech was a dramatic appeal to the electorate of Ontario in half of the Grand Trunk, in denunciation of the Canadian Pacific, and was in line with the sectional tactics the government is pursuing in this debate to dodge the main issue.

At nine o'clock, Porter, conservative, took the floor, replying to Cowan in a calm and collected manner. He was mentioning him on his musical voice and staccato poses, but reminding the audience that he had not offered one argument in his speech.

Porter closed at 11:10 and Frank Oliver moved adjournment of debate. House then rose.
