Berlin, Jan. 29.—The action of the University of Heidelberg in revoking the degree of Doctor of Philosophy granted to the student more than a year ago has revealed the existence of a diploma institute in Berlin, called "diploma mills," but assistance in preparing the necessary thesis for obtaining a degree. A candidate is naturally supposed to base his thesis upon original research, but in the case of the Heidelberg student whose Ph. 


