Rev. Joseph McLeod, D. D., Corresponding Secretary, submitted the following report:

BRO. MODERATOR AND BRETHREN:

So far as can be, from the data furnished in the reports of the churches to their respective District Meetings, and the reports of ministers, this report aims to make clear "the state of religion" in the Free Baptist denomination in New Brunswick. Difficulties, such as have met all who have had this duty to do, are still met, though in a steadily, if not rapidly, decreasing degree. Perhaps there will come a time when the returns from the churches will be full and accurate, and when even ministers will observe the rule which requires them to report. Let us hope.

CHURCHES.—Reports were made to the District Meetings this year by one hundred and seven (107) churches, eleven less than

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reported last year. The number of churches reported in each District was: First District, 6; Second District, 21; Third District, 13; Fourth District, 16; Fifth District, 16; Sixth District, 23; Seventh District, 12.

If the enrolment of churches as given by the District Meetings in 1897 was correct, there should now be one hundred and fifty-six (156) churches in the Conference, forty-nine of which have not been heard from this year. A score of them have been silent several years.

The reported churches have 8,539 members. Estimating the unreported membership on the basis of last year, the total membership of the churches at this date is 12,352.

Thirty-one (31) churches report additions of members aggregating 271; thirty-one (31) churches report losses aggregating 137; forty-five churches either report no change in membership, or say nothing about it.

Among the reported gains and losses were 57 transfers of members from and to Free Baptist churches, which do not effect the total membership; four members were expelled; 25 members were dismissed to join other denominations; and twenty-four members were received from other denominations.

All the Districts but two had net gains; the First District had no change of membership; the Fourth District had a net loss of five members.

BAPTISMS.—The number of baptisms reported is one hundred and ninety-six (196)—41 less than last year. The baptisms are reported from thirty-one (31) churches, and from Districts as follows: Second District, 23; Third, 46; Fourth, 9; Fifth, 46; Sixth, 34; Seventh, 38.

The net gain for the year is 134—the same as last year.

MINISTERS.—During the year two ministers died—Rev. E. B. Gray and Rev. Thos. Connor. These brethren beloved had finished their work, and rejoiced that they were called home. Suitable reference to their lives and labours will be made part of the Conference record during this session. One brother—S. J. Case—was ordained according to instructions given its Executive by Conference at the last session. The ordination took place in St. John, West, June 27th last. Revs. C. F. Rideout, W. R. Reud, W. C. Kierstead, E. S. Parker and S. J. Case are out of the Province—Bro. Rideout owing to poor health, Bro. Reud because of Mrs. Reud's health, Bro. Keirstead pursuing his studies at the Chicago University, Bro. Parker pursuing his studies at Bates College, and Bro. Case teaching in the New Hampton, N. H.

Institute (Free Baptist). Rev. A. H. McLeod, having completed his Divinity course, has returned to the Province and is again engaged in the work.

The number of ordained ministers now on the Conference roll is forty-three. Of these, twenty-eight (28) have been doing pastoral work. Rev. Jos. Noble has, for several years, visited the churches in various parts of the Province as he has had opportunity. Though now past four score and five, he has been kept in good health and been able to minister to many people to their profit and with comfort to himself.

Rev. H. Hartt has visited churches in the First and Second Districts. Rev. I. D. Harvey is pastor at Whitehead. Rev. J. S. Jones is in feeble health, and unable to do any ministerial work.

The licentiates are M. L. Gregg and J. H. Puddington, licensed by Conference; and E. W. Kirkpatrick, Fletcher Knollin, A. Rideout, H. Ferguson, E. A. Saunders, E. H. Cochrane, J. C. Wilson and G. Douglas Milbury, licensed by District Meetings. Brethren Knollin, Rideout, Saunders, Kirkpatrick and Milbury are now at school—the first two at the New Brunswick University, the other three at Cobb Divinity School. Some of these licentiates have done pastoral work the whole year, and others nearly the whole year—as will be seen further on in this report. The others did work during the summer vacation.

PASTORS.—Of the reported churches ninety-six (96) had pastoral care. Several churches not reported have also had pastors. The pastors, the churches they served, and the number of members in each pastorate are set forth in the following:

First District.—There are fifteen churches in this district, six of which reported to the District Meeting. There was no pastor in the district during the year. Revs. J. Noble, J. B. Daggett and L. A. Fenwick gave as much care to the churches as they could. Rev. T. S. Vanwart visited the Tobique River churches. During the summer Licentiate W. O. Kierstead visited the churches in Bath pastorate, and held special meetings at Lower Perth, Victoria County, with good results. Licentiate H. Manzer, under direction of the Home Mission Executive, spent the summer with the Tobique churches.

Rev. E. S. Parker spent several weeks with the Grand Manan churches before Rev. A. H. McLeod became pastor. Campbellello was supplied during the summer by Licentiate Saunders; and Beaver Harbour by Licentiate Wilson.

Six pastors have one church each ; three have three churches each ; seven have four churches each ; six have five churches each ; four have six churches each ; one has seven churches.

MINISTERS' REPORTS.—Something of the work of some of the pastors, and of the condition of the churches in their charge is shown in the reports they have made according to the rule of Conference (See Year Book 1896) Twenty-six ministers' reports have been received. Summaries of them follow :

Rev. John Perry has had the same field as last year, viz. Rockland, Mt. Pleasant, Knowlesville and Gordonsville. The churches are doing fairly well. He has preached three times each Sunday. Held special meetings last winter at Mt. Pleasant; the church was revived, one was baptized. Have good congregations, and very good meetings. There are no trials among the church members. I have resigned, and do not know who will take charge of the pastorate.

Rev. G. A. Hartley, D. D., has spent another year in Carleton. He reports thus : "Immediately after last Conference, I resumed regular work, feeling much improved in health, and have continued to care for the church during the year. It has been a good year. I have preached twice each Sabbath, and attended

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all the mid-week prayer meetings, and the weekly meetings of the Christian Endeavor Society, with much comfort to my own soul, and so far as I can judge, with as good acceptance to the church and congregation as during any previous years of the forty-two years of my pastorate. The congregations have been good. Souls have been saved. Twenty-one young converts have been baptized, and twenty-three members added to the church. It has been a year of love and prosperity. The spiritual life of the church has been deepened and all our temporal affairs are in a healthful condition. The Sunday school is large and well officered, and has an efficient staff of teachers. The Christian Endeavor Society is making steady progress and is helpful to the church work in all departments. The Junior Endeavor Society is large, and is full of promise."

Rev. J. T. Parsons has spent his ninth year as pastor at Marysville and Penniac. He reports the year as one of "encouraging success. The preaching and other services have been regularly held, with a good attendance. The ordinances have been administered. During the Spring the Lord gave us a revival, strengthening His people and restoring some and converting some. Eight were baptized and eleven were added to the Marysville church. Marysville has a large Sunday school with devoted and efficient officers and teachers. The A. C. F. Society is active and useful; and we have a large staff of loyal, consecrated church workers, who are united and reliable, staying up the pastor's hands, and carrying forward the work of God. The outlook is encouraging. My pastoral relation with these churches ends now."

Rev. J. N. Barnes is closing his third year as pastor of the Stanley and Bloomfield churches. He says: "They have been years of hard work in the face of many discouragements. But the labour has not been in vain. God has been with us. This year has been the best of the three. A number have found the Saviour and have been baptized and added to the churches. The churches are not yet as I could wish, but they are in a better condition than they were. I am now about leaving, and I hope the Lord may direct the right man to this field."

Rev. T. S. Vanwart had no pastoral engagement during the year. He did some home mission work at Tobique, and preached throughout the year as opportunity afforded.

Rev. C. T. Phillips is completing his first year as pastor of the Waterloo Street church, St. John. He reports that "the work is going on fairly well. There are some changes for the

better. The church building has been renovated. Special meetings were held during the winter, seven were baptized and added to the church. The prayer meetings, C. E. Society and Sabbath school are all doing their work very well."

Rev. J. W. Clarke says of his first year at Woodstock that "it has been a good year and a busy one. The congregations have been good. The condition of the church spiritually, and otherwise, is satisfactory. During the winter there were several conversions. Seventeen were added to the church by baptism, and two by letter. The C. E. Society continues to do good work. It is a great benefit to the young people and to the church. The Sunday-school is good, the superintendent and teachers are efficient and painstaking." He preaches once a fortnight at South Wakefield. The church there is small, but a good congregation assembles, many of them take part after the sermon, and we always have a good meeting. They, also, have a good Sunday-school.

Rev. J. J. Barnes ministered to the Waterville pastorate. He reports: "There has not been the marked revival interest hoped for, yet good has been done in seed sowing, the fruitage of which I hope some one may gather soon. Seven were added to the Third Tier church and three to Waterville church. All the meetings have been regularly maintained, including four conferences each month, and three preaching services each Sunday. The Sabbath Schools and mid-week prayer meetings are well sustained. The church building at Lindsay was extensively repaired and improved. Special meetings were held in three churches."

Rev. B. H. Nobles is closing his eighth year as pastor at Sussex. "Looking over the year," he sees "a decided gain along all lines of work. The present year has been one of the best. The church has been strengthened, numerically, financially and spiritually; the people are united in the work and are interested in all the denominational enterprises. There is room for improvement, and we are determined by the blessing of God to do more next year."

Rev. W. H. Perry reports his "second year with the Hampstead pastorate. It has been a pleasant and profitable year. The Lord blessed us with revivals at Hibernia, ten were baptized. There was revival also at Upper Hampstead, seven were baptized. In the other churches seed has been sown that we trust will bear fruit to the glory of God. The churches have asked me to remain their pastor another year, and I have consented to do so."

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Rev. Gideon Swim reports that "for five months of the year he was under the direction of the H. M. Executive. Three months of that time he was in special meetings with the following churches—Upper Gagetown, Campobello, Beaver Harbour, Oromocto and Rusagornis. In these places the good seed was sown, in the confidence that God will give the increase." For two months he supplied the Moncton and Dover pastorate. He has also supplied other churches as opportunity has offered. Two weeks were spent in Canning, N. S. On the Millstream pastorate he baptized eleven persons. He expects, if the way opens, to take a pastorate after Conference.

Rev. C. B. Lewis has just completed his second year as pastor of the Lincoln-Rusiagornis pastorate. He reports that there was no special revival, but, he says, "they were enabled to 'hold the fort,' which sometimes means more than achieving victories under other circumstances. While the spiritual condition is not as good as is desirable, we have been conscious of the divine presence and help; and trust the seed sown may be fruitful."

Rev. F. C. Hartley has continued pastor of the Fredericton church. "During the year the regular work of the church and its auxiliaries has been maintained with good results. Six persons have been baptized and two others have been received into the church experience. Spiritually and financially the church is in good condition. The Sunday School, Christian Endeavor and Woman's Mission Society are doing good work. The outlook is hopeful."

Rev. H. A. Bonnell, immediately after last Conference, spent three weeks at Beaver Harbor; then one Sabbath at Bellisle, a few days at Hibernia with Bro. W. H. Perry in special work, and two Sabbaths with Millstream churches. The last of December he went by direction of the Home Mission Executive to Carpenter. Later he made engagements for the remainder of the year with that pastorate. He reports having held "special meetings at the Narrows and Perry's Point, without seeing great results." He thinks the field should have home mission aid for a time. Besides preaching at the churches, he has a preaching appointment in the Hall at Cody Station, near which there are several Free Baptist families. He has been asked to remain another year as pastor, and will probably do so.

Rev. D. Long, of Victoria Street church, St. John, reports: "We are getting along fairly well. The interest in all departments of the work of the church shows an advance. Special

meetings were held during the winter, and a number added to the church. The church building has been improved."

Rev. Abram Perry has spent his eleventh year with the Salisbury pastorate. He reports having "conducted twenty-two regular services every four weeks. The spiritual condition of the churches is not as uniform as I would wish. Financially they are doing more than their regular work, this year they have paid one-third of the price of their parsonage. I have decided to remain another year."

Rev. S. J. Perry had charge of two pastorates. He held "special meetings at Upper Hainesville which resulted in seventeen being added to the church, fifteen of them by baptism. Two were added by baptism to the Staples Settlement church."

Rev. J. B. Daggett has completed three years in charge of the Hartland pastorate. He says: "The work during the year has been well sustained, both spiritually and financially. Regular preaching services have been held each Lord's day; prayer and conference meetings show marked strengthening of spiritual life among the faithful. There has not been as much done for the salvation of the unconverted as is desirable, yet some have been brought to Christ. The Hartland church enjoyed a season of revival. The pastorate has built a parsonage, which the pastor occupies, located at Hartland. A pleasant and commodious house is now assured God's servants who shall come this way. The Newburg church building has been advanced towards completion. I will remain another year here."

Rev. E. S. Parker, who is again at college, reports that he spent three months in the Fall and Winter at Grand Manan. He was with each of the three churches four weeks, "holding services every night but Saturday, and preaching three times each Sabbath." At North Head and Seal Cove continuous storms interfered somewhat with the meetings, but good was done. "At Grand Harbour there was a blessed awakening. Fourteen were added to the church." At Seal Cove one was baptized. Bro. Parker expects to finish his course at Bates College next Spring, and shall hope to return to Canada next year."

Rev. D. Patterson has not been a pastor this year, but has not been idle. His report that "after Conference he went to Carpenter, and held special meetings two weeks. The Lord blessed the work; the church was strengthened numerically and spiritually; six were baptized and united with the church; others took part in the work, and others made a start in the professed Christian life. He went to Southampton pastorate the last of

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February and remained there until April 5th. The Lord requires of our people there a single hearted, forward, consecrated, business-like taking up of Christian work. The inheritance of labour is yet with our people there." He has received a call from that pastorate, and "will go there if it can be made practicable." He spent two Sabbaths at Kempt, N. S., by invitation. During other parts of the year he has "preached as opportunity served, both in our own churches and at other places, as supply and independent missionary."

Rev. A. J. Prosser reports his work in the Penobsquis pastorate as somewhat uneventful. The churches are moving along in the regular way. Several weeks of special work was engaged in but scarcely any revival experienced. At Newtown the church has been steadily increasing in its support and membership, seven having been added this year. At Dutch Valley there has, for years, been a decrease by deaths and removals, with no one coming in to take their places. Yet the brethren are holding on, and next year intend, with the other churches of the pastorate, to increase their support for the ministry. Harmony prevails in all the churches."

Rev. S. J. Case, who is still at New Hampton, N. H., reports that "the year has been one of progress." His "work has been chiefly with the young life that surrounds" him. He has preached on the Sabbath as occasion has offered. Through the month of August he supplied the Free Baptist church in St. John west, and at present is engaged to supply the Free Baptist church at New Hampton, N. H., which work he expects to continue through the winter. The work is very pleasant and gives much encouragement." While not present at Conference in person, his "prayers and sympathies are with the brethren in their annual session."

Licentiate M. L. Gregg closes his second year as pastor at Gibson. "It has been a year of blessing and of steady progress. The church members are coming to understand what our possibilities are in the town. No special meetings have been held this year. Fifteen have been added to the church. Several others were converted, some of whom joined other churches. The pastor has been well assisted by the C. E. Society, which has done excellent work, and has already pledged itself to do better work for next year. The Sunday School is growing in numbers and interest. During the last weeks of June and the first week in July, I visited the Tobique and preached at the following places—Upper Kent (twice), Lower Perth, Rowena, Arthurette,

Long Island, Dow's Flat, Riley Brook. I was impressed with the kindness of the people and the possibilities of the field."

Licentiate J. H. Puddington reports the Brown's Flat-Westfield pastorate as enjoying an advancing interest. The congregations are good in all the churches. He has been asked to remain another year and will do so.

Licentiate W. E. Kirkpatrick, who is now at the Bible Training School, in connection with Cobb Divinity School, reports his work in the Upper Gagetown-Geary pastorate. He preached three times every Sunday, with few exceptions. A few special meetings at Greenfield helped the church. The interest in the churches is fair, but not what it should be. Properly cared for "the pastorate could be made nearly self-supporting."

Licentiate G. Douglas Milbury reports that he spent the summer vacation under direction of the Home Mission Executive, at Knowlesville and places adjacent. At Knowlesville there was revival and seven were added to the church by baptism. He is now at Cobb Divinity School.

FINANCIAL.—The following table shows the contributions for all purposes as reported by one hundred and seven churches :

Of the money in this table \$749.23 was raised by the Young People's Societies—\$355.06 being devoted to local church support, \$147.55 to missions, \$95.12 to the Students' Fund, and \$150.50 to other purposes. Of the \$1021.90 in the "other purposes" column \$450.00 was for the India Famine Fund.

BUILDINGS, ETC.—A new parsonage has been completed at Hartland and is now occupied by the pastor. A site for a parsonage has been secured at Fredericton Junction.

Several church buildings have been improved at considerable expense. Debts of churches have been reduced. The reported expenditure for these purposes is \$4157.28. The estimated value of the church property reported is \$155,625.

SOME AVERAGES.—The contributions show an average of \$3.95 per resident member of the churches reported. The averages by districts are as follows :

The average per resident member for salaries of pastors is \$2.32 ; for Home Missions, 4½ cents ; for Foreign Missions, 7½ cents ; for Conference Fund, 8 cents ; for Students' Fund, 2½ cents ; for Aged and Sick Ministers' Fund, about one-half cent.

The payments for Home Missions were made by fifty-one churches, with 3,023 resident members—an average of nine cents per resident.

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For Foreign Missions by fifty-two (52) churches, with 3,414 residents—an average of thirteen cents per resident.

For Conference Fund by seventy-nine (79) churches, with 4,771 residents—an average of ten cents per resident.

For Students' Fund by fourteen (14) churches, with 1,653 residents—an average of nine cents per resident.

For Aged Ministers' Fund by twelve (12) churches, with 721 residents—an average of four and two-thirds cents per resident.

Fifty-six (56) churches, with 3,000 resident members, contribute nothing to home missions; fifty-five (55) churches, with 2,609 residents, nothing to Foreign Missions; twenty-eight (28) churches, with 1,252 residents, nothing to Conference Fund; ninety-three (93) churches, with 4,370 residents, nothing to Students' Fund; ninety-five (95) churches, with 5,302 residents, nothing to the Aged Ministers' Fund.

The foregoing figures and averages have to do only with the reported churches. The unreported churches, presumably, contribute little or nothing to the objects named.

The highest average contribution per resident in any church is \$20.84, in a Second District church; the lowest is 16 cents in a Sixth District church. The highest in each district is as follows:

First District, \$6.30; Second District, \$20.84; Third District, \$7.80; Fourth District, \$14.06; Fifth District, \$5.73; Sixth District, \$13.90; Seventh District, \$8.42.

The financial strength of thirty-two (32) churches is reported increased; thirty-four (34) are reported unchanged; seven (7) are reported weaker; and the others say nothing about their financial condition.

Thirty-three (33) churches are increasing in support of church work; thirty-four (34) are not increasing. Sixteen (16) churches are increasing in support of general denominational work; thirty-nine (39) are not increasing. The others make no report as to these things.

Thirty-five (35) churches report that all their resident members contribute to their support; twenty-two (22) say "nearly all" contribute; seventeen (17) say three-fourths; five (5) say two-thirds; six (6) say one-half; two (2) say one-third; two (2) say one-fourth; the others make no report on this point.

Five (5) churches contribute to all Conference purposes; many churches contribute to nearly all purposes; ten (10) contribute only to local support; and three (3) reports contain no statement of support of anything.

PREACHING.—Eight (8) churches have preaching twice every Sunday; twenty-four (24), once every Sunday; one (1), three times a month; fifty-eight (58), fortnightly; nine (9) monthly; three (3), "occasionally;" four (4) do not report as to preaching.

CONFERENCES.—Ninety-one (91) churches report monthly conferences regularly held, four of them on Sundays; one has conference irregularly; and fifteen make no report. The aggregate of the average attendance monthly at the reported conferences is 1,272, which is about twenty per cent of the resident membership.

THE LORD'S SUPPER.—Sixty-two (62) churches report observing the Lord's Supper. It is observed by fifteen (15) churches monthly; by four (4) bi-monthly; by twelve (12) quarterly; by eight (8) half-yearly; by nine (9) once a year; by fourteen (14) "occasionally." Forty-five (45) churches do not report as to this ordinance.

PRAYER MEETINGS.—Ninety-four churches report regular prayer-meetings. Of these forty-eight (48) are mid-week meetings; twenty-five (25) are on Sunday; six (6) are fortnightly on Sunday; twenty (20) are Y. P. Society meetings. The aggregate average attendance at these meetings, 1092, being about eighteen per cent of the resident membership.

MISSIONARY MEETINGS.—Twenty-one (21) churches report missionary prayer meetings, and other missionary meetings. Those meetings are, chiefly, those held by the Women's Missionary Societies and Y. P. Societies. Missionary sermons have been preached in forty-five (45) churches.

Twenty Young People's Societies are reported. Seventeen of them are reported as having good effect on church life.

NON-RESIDENTS.—Seventeen of the churches are reported endeavoring to keep in communication with non-resident members. The results are stated thus: Six (6), "very good;" one (1), "fair;" two (2), "not satisfactory;" one (1), "poor."

REVIVALS.—Twenty-two (22) churches had revivals during the year. Fourteen (14) churches had their last revival in 1899; ten churches in 1898; nine, in 1897; eight, in 1896; seven, in 1895; three, in 1894; two, in 1893; one, in 1885.

Thirty-three (33) churches report gain in spiritual life; nine (9) report loss; twenty-four (24) report no change.

CONCLUSION.—The foregoing are the facts—tabulated and grouped in various forms to show, so far as possible, what the churches have been doing—so showing what their life has been. "By their fruits ye shall know them." It is for the Conference

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to say whether the showing is satisfactory—whether it reveals a condition of spiritual health and vigor in the body.

In providing for the future of the denomination the Conference will need to have under review every department of the work in every part of the field. Many things may well engage serious attention.

But the one thing—the all-embracing need, to which your Secretary would direct special attention, is the need of a great spiritual revival. For many years there has not been, in any branch of the Christian church, revival of great extent and power. Zion languishes. The people go astray and perish. The enemies of the Lord laugh at the impotence of His church. "Is there not a cause?"

Nearing the opening of the twentieth century, many branches of the Church of God are marking the event by great undertakings in money-raising for Christian purposes. Large success is attending these endeavors. This body, unhappily, has not shared in these undertakings. Some of the denominations are aiming, also, at a great quickening of spiritual life. Than this, no greeting of the new century by the Church of Christ could be so fitting, nor so full of promise for his kingdom. If we would share in this there must be humble and earnest seeking unto God. To this end the appointment of a special season of humiliation and prayer is suggested. "If my people which are called by my name, will humble themselves, and pray, seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways, then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sins, and will heal their land."

Your Committee note with pleasure the greater number of schools reporting this year. While we have not yet nearly a full report, we think there is cause for rejoicing that ten schools, nearly a thousand scholars and sixty teachers are reported over last year, and this, we feel, was the outcome of vigorous discussion of this branch of our work at last Conference. Let us not think of resting until the thirty or more unreported schools are brought into line, and we can bring in a report that will show our strength along this line.

There is an increase in evergreen schools—sixty-three—as to fifty-five last year.

The volumes in our library have increased to 7,255, or 1,500 in excess of last year.

There were \$3,161.00 raised for the purpose of carrying on this work during the year, nearly six hundred dollars in excess of last year; also five hundred dollars increase in value of school property.

The total number of reported conversions is 129, this also in excess of last year. And can our labors be thought to be in vain when so many young men and women are being brought into the Master's vineyard and being fitted for His service?

There are 30 schools using books, 20 schools using papers, and 19 using both books and papers; while 79 schools use lesson helps, and 40 report pastoral assistance.

We notice, in conclusion, the call from many superintendents all over the field for teachers. Let us all fervently pray for God's blessing upon those already engaged in breaking the bread of life to the children, asking Him to send laborers into His vineyard, and with one of old may we hear the call and responding say, "Here am I, send me."

Your Secretary would like to bring the following before this Conference, and while not embodied in the report proper is in this same connection. First, it was hoped to bring a much more complete report before Conference this year, and plans were made to that effect, but owing to the fact that so many of the reports were delayed until the last day or two before Conference no time was left to gather the missing reports. One whole district failed to get any report in at all, and for that particular district the report was made from such information as could be gathered and the balance approximated. Again, very many reports are made

in such shape as to convey no information. For instance, the number of scholars enrolled being asked for, some one says, none enrolled at all but we have a good many attending (now how many do you think?). Again, regarding amount collected, one reporting says, a great deal was raised. But a matter which the Conference might and, I think, should remedy, is the wide difference in forms sent out. There were at least three different kinds of report forms used this year. Take the item "volumes added to library," the forms sent to the first or second district do not ask this question, so they cannot fill them in. The primary department was not allotted a space on forms used in the 5th, 6th or 7th districts, consequently they are blank.

The percentage of children in attendance was not asked on reports used by the 4th, 5th or 7th districts. Consequently the reports could not be uniform if they were all properly filled and so returned.

These facts are brought to your notice, not to find fault, but to help to remedy a fault which may not have come to notice of Conference, and will assist materially in making a more complete report possible in the future, and thus be of advantage to the next incumbent of this office.

Rev. C. T. Phillips, Corresponding Secretary of the Foreign Mission Executive submitted the following report :

To make bricks without straw or clay is no more impossible than to make a report without something to report. A prominent Foreign Missionary worker, representing a sister denomination, told me the other day "that the Free Baptists of New Brunswick were doing nothing in missions, almost nothing at all." I had two regrets when I heard the statement. The first was that my friend had stated a fact; the second regret was that he was so well informed.

I am sorry that we seem to sorrow more that our failures are known than for the failures themselves. That we have done so little for Foreign Missions ought to be regretted by every church and church member; that it is regretted by many, we do not doubt. The sincerity of our penitence will be shown by our future attitude towards Foreign Missions. The spiritual life of the home churches is sustained by their connection with Foreign Missions. A dying church is a church that has never engaged in foreign missionary work, or has neglected or given up the work. Neither man nor church can retain spiritual life while disobeying the imperative command, "Go and preach the Gospel to every creature." Personally, or by proxy, every child of God *will go* when the command is given. To receive we must give, to cease to work is to cease to live. That artist was a Christian philosopher who, painting the picture of a dying church, painted no church with crumbling walls, and broken windows, and dismantled roof, but a beautiful church with lofty spire, frescoed walls, and rich memorial windows; and then he painted the foreign missionary box covered with cobwebs, and the spiders weaving their webs over the treasury, undisturbed by the gifts of any contributor. An empty foreign missionary treasury indicates meagre offerings for the home mission treasury.

That the Free Baptists of New Brunswick can do more than they have been doing, cannot be, and will not be, denied. That they are not willing to do more, your Secretary does not believe. Let two missionaries offer themselves for the foreign field, in addition to the one supported by our sisters, and the missionary elect to be supported by the young people of our churches, and the money for their support will be forthcoming. Who is there who has so little faith as to doubt it for one moment?

Since we met in general conference last year, the heart of Canada has been touched as it never was before. The Empire has again had her baptism of blood. England did not ask and

did not need the help of her colonial sons; they wanted our sympathy and moral support. But Canada was not satisfied, and could not be satisfied, with writing eloquent phrases and courtly rhetoric, worth little more than the parchment upon which they were written. She wanted to show her love for the mother-land in a stronger, better way, and so she sent her sons, and there is not a mother whose boy sleeps on the veldt who would not send another, if he were needed, to sleep beside him.

Think of the long, dreary sea voyage to the southern seas, the long marches, the sultry days, the frosty nights; the ever-watchful enemy behind his covert of rocks; Death watching everywhere for his prey.

How does the discomforts of the modern missionary compare with the discomforts of the South African soldier? With the exception of the Chinese mission of the present year, the missionary's life is leafy June, the soldier's is bleak November.

There is not a church represented here to-day or a home that has not, or would not, supply soldiers for the Queen. Is there a church or home represented here to-day that is not ready to furnish, if needed, soldiers of the King, ready to march anywhere at His bidding?

We are glad that the work of our sisters is prospering, and that the young people of our churches, the Christian Endeavorers, have, in answer to their prayers, a sister at a preparatory school who will enter the foreign field as soon as her home studies are completed.

At a meeting of the Foreign Mission Executive at the close of the Conference last year, \$500.00 was voted to Rev. Dr. Given, Treasurer of the Free Baptist Foreign Missionary Board. Your Secretary has not been informed as to its expenditure.

Another year in denominational work has passed and it becomes the duty of your Executive of Home Missions to place before you a summary of the work which has been done.

The Executive has held four meetings during the year : one at Carleton, one at Woodstock, one at Fredericton and one at Hampstead.

The Executive at the beginning of the year felt very much the need of missionary labour in our field, and as Mr. Swim expressed himself to the Executive as being specially directed of the Lord to take up the work for the year, his services were engaged. Bro. Swim laboured under the direction of the Board for a period of five months, at the following places : Upper Gagetown, Wilson's Beach, Beaver Harbor, Erb Settlement, Oromocto, Rusagornis, Moncton, Dover and Taylor Village.

While the earnest and faithful labours of Bro. Swim did not result in any large in-gathering, we feel that his work has been productive of much good in maintaining the work in pastorless fields and sowing the seed of truth for future harvest.

Your Board also had under consideration the aiding of the weaker pastorates, and while we have not been able to make all the grants asked for, we have exercised our best judgment in disbursing the limited means at our disposal.

In the First District there has been no settled pastor during the year, a condition of affairs very much regretted by your Board, especially in consideration of the fact that this is the most promising field for denominational extension.

Your Board endeavored to secure the services of Bro. D. Patterson for the Tobique pastorate, failing in this it secured the services of Bro. T. S. Vanwart for one month. He also paid a visit to North Lake, in the Third District. In his report of the work on Tobique he speaks strongly of the need and importance of this section, saying "that it claims our immediate and constant care."

Bro. M. L. Gregg paid a brief visit to Tobique which was highly appreciated by the churches. Bro. H. Manzer of the U. N. B. has laboured with them since the closing of the college year, and judging from his reports appears encouraged with his labours.

Bro. H. Hart was given a mission to the California Church. He reports his mission as helpful to the people, although not all he desired, on account of unfavorable weather.

The Bath pastorate has received what assistance could be given it. Bro. Jos. Noble spent as much of his time as he could on this field, his labours being appreciated by the people and helpful to the cause. As opportunity offered labour was given by Bros. Daggett, Rideout and Fenwick, until the close of

the college year, when Bro. W. O. Keirstead was sent to Bath pastorate under direction of the Board. His labours were highly esteemed by the people. He held special meetings at Lower Perth, and as a result 8 were baptized and 13 received into the Church. At Upper Kent he was instrumental in liquidating the small debt that was on the church.

In the Second District the only missionary work done by the Board was by Bro. G. Douglas Milbury, on the remote sections of the Rockland pastorate. He reports having laboured at Beaufort, Foreston, Cloverdale, Main Stream and Knowlesville. At Knowlesville some special work was done, and 8 were baptized, and two others professed faith in Christ, and they hope will soon be baptized; 9 were added to the church.

In the Third District Bro. Fletcher Knollin of the U. N. B. spent the summer with the churches of the Southampton pastorate. His work was highly regarded by the churches under his care.

A grant was made to the Stanley-Bloomfield pastorate, of which Mr. J. N. Barnes has had pastoral care. He reports the year as the best since he came on the field. He held special meetings, assisted by Bro. Gregg, at Cross Creek, 4 were baptized and 6 were added to the church. At Bloomfield 6 were baptized and received into the church.

In the Fourth District Bro. W. E. Kirkpatrick, on the Upper Gagetown field, received a small grant. Lincoln pastorate also received a small grant; Rev. C. B. Lewis, pastor. The following churches in this district received assistance from Bro. Swim: Upper Gagetown, Oromocto and Rusagornis.

In the Fifth District a grant was made to the Belleisle Bay field, which has had the pastoral care of Rev. T. O. DeWitt. He had special work on his field, which resulted in 23 being baptized and 25 added to the churches. A grant was made to the Kingston church, which has had the pastoral care of Rev. L. A. Cosman.

In the Sixth District Bro. B. H. Nobles received a grant for work in connection with Moncton church. Moncton was kept supplied as well as possible under the care of the Board, having had the services of Revs. Long, Phillips and Nobles, and Licentiate R. Ferguson. Bro. Swim supplied Moncton, Dover and Taylor Village, for two months under the direction of the Board. Bro. Allen Rideout also spent about two and a half months on this field, and reports having enjoyed the work and that the congregations were good.

In the Seventh District Bro. Saunders was sent to Wilson's Beach for the summer. Bro. J. C. Wilson laboured with the Church at Beaver Harbor for the summer. He reports the meetings helpful and the church building remodeled. A small grant was made to the Fairhaven Church, of the Deer Island pastorate. Your Board also have made a grant to the Rev. A. W. Currie, of McAdam Junction.

We feel that the year's work has been fairly satisfactory, although not all that we could desire. Much work has been done, the results of which are not immediately apparent, but which, no doubt, in the Master's own time, will bear precious fruit. As for the future it should be ours to seek earnestly and prayerfully the will of God, and having found that, with deep consecration and firm determination go forward, trusting in His strength for its accomplishment.

Minutes of Monday afternoon's session read and approved.

Rev. Joseph McLeod, D. D., from Committee on Temperance, submitted the following report :

By their Church Covenant Free Baptists are pledged against the use of and the traffic in intoxicating liquors. By repeated resolutions of Conference they are unequivocally committed to the strongest opposition to the liquor traffic, and to the support of all movements and measures for the prohibition of the traffic. We now reaffirm, and if possible, with increased emphasis, the

frequently stated antagonism of this body of Christian people to the iniquitous traffic; and repeat the declaration that it is the duty, and should be the purpose, of every church and every individual member of the denomination to unceasingly oppose and strive to overthrow "the gigantic crime of crimes."

Last year the Conference put itself on record in disapproval of the action of the Government of Canada in disregarding the mandate of the electorate in the prohibition plebiscite. The action of Parliament, at its last session, in declaring that a prohibitory law should not now be enacted, merits the strong condemnation of Christian voters; and this Conference hereby condemns such action as a misrepresentation of the will of the electorate.

It is useless to deny that, in the action of the Government and Parliament, the prohibition movement has received a severe blow. Not a few temperance people have been much depressed. The liquor traffic men have been correspondingly elated. But none who have at heart the deliverance of the country from the great curse of the legalized drink traffic must allow themselves to be turned aside from the work. If out of the reverses they have suffered, prohibitionists learn to be united, they may be nearer an important victory than they think. We are at a time when prohibitionists should make this the first question in determining their political action.

We approve of the platform of the Maritime Prohibition Association, which aims to have prohibitionists elected in every constituency, and which seeks to do this by working in the party caucuses for the nomination of suitable candidates; and we suggest the appointment of two delegates to attend the next meeting of the association.

We endorse the statement of the Dominion Alliance that as "the Government and Parliament have united to sustain the liquor traffic, in defiance of the people's wishes, and in violation of what the public had accepted as an agreement that the traffic would be outlawed," it is the duty of Christian electors "to unite in an effort to make such changes in their representation in the House of Commons as will ensure the embodiment in law of the prohibition which has been endorsed at the polls." "The prohibition question is of more importance than any of the other political issues of the day, and patriotic citizens should earnestly work together, regardless of mere partizan considerations, to secure the election of those who will stand by the right and by the people, and to defeat those who have treated this great move-

ment with so much hostility and contempt." The men of the liquor traffic are united, and support only such parliamentary candidates as they can trust to further their interests. Christian citizens need to be equally united, and support only such candidates as represent their views and purposes concerning the liquor traffic—its utter destruction. When they are so united their wishes will be respected, and righteous laws concerning the liquor traffic will take the place of the present wicked laws.

We recommend that more attention be given to temperance teaching and work in our churches:

(1) That at least one Sunday in the year be observed especially as Temperance Sunday;

(2) That our Sabbath schools more carefully teach temperance truth, and that pledge signing by the children be faithfully attended to;

(3) That we all more than ever endeavor, by the use of every means in our power, to bring about speedily the delegatization of the traffic which, more than anything else, is the determined enemy of the homes of the country.

MODERATOR,—In submitting to this Conference another annual report, your Board of Managers is pleased to be able to say that the business affairs of the Conference entrusted to the Board have been attended to in the usual careful way. The investments and rate of interest remain about as last year. The Treasurer's account will give a detailed statement of the finances. There has been no need of calling the Board together during the year, and of course nothing more than the ordinary routine business has been done. We think the general financial outlook of the denomination, as represented by such property as church buildings and parsonages, is healthful and encouraging. Old meeting houses that served well their generation have been enlarged and rebuilt, and in some places replaced by new, more comfortable and larger edifices. Communities that have found it difficult to secure a satisfactory pastor on account of having no house for the pastor's family to occupy, have built, and are building, comfortable parsonages ; a fact that must be gratifying to all who wish our Zion well, and especially helpful to those particular congregations. We hope this building spirit will spread until no pastorate in the Conference will be deprived of a pastor on account of having no home for the minister and his family. Good comfortable houses for the people to worship in, and good comfortable homes for the pastor's family, are important factors in making churches more efficient.

To the Free Baptist Conference assembled at Hampstead, greeting:

DEAR BRETHREN,—At the meeting of the Maritime Baptist Convention, held in Halifax August last, Hon. H. R. Emmerson, Rev. J. D. Freeman and the undersigned were appointed a Committee to bear to you the fraternal greetings of our body.

In communication with my brethren of the committee, neither of whom could arrange to be present at your present sessions, I was requested by them to present our greetings, it being expected that I could enjoy the privilege of meeting with you. I am sorry that I can not, owing to circumstances beyond my control, and so will seek to discharge what is more a privilege than duty in a few written lines, though I would much prefer being present and speaking what is in my heart to say to you.

Permit me first to say the communication sent us through our dear brother, Dr. McLeod, was most heartily appreciated, and the kind things said in his letter are cordially reciprocated by us.

We rejoice with you in the prosperity which is yours. And we pray that in days to come yet greater things may be accomplished through you. We thank God for the spirit of brotherliness now existing between our two denominations, and we would be glad, if in the Providence of God such could be, that the Baptist bodies of the Maritime Provinces might be yet more closely united, engaging as one in advancing the kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ. While in the past, under somewhat different names, but yet substantially one in principles, we have, thanks to our God, accomplished much; the age in which we live is of such a trend in its religious requirements, that with one name—as one strong denomination, we could accomplish more.

This subject of closer union which has engaged our thought, now for years, ought still to be carefully and prayerfully considered, and if the "Captain of the Lord's host" would lead us into closer relationship, we ought to gladly follow.

I hope the Presence of the Master will be signally felt by you in all your present sessions; that in your praises and prayers He may, through the Holy Spirit, give you great spiritual uplifts; that in your deliberations, in planning and executing, in seeking to enlarge your work, that wisdom from above may be graciously given you.

For you and for our own body, we pray that the twentieth century may witness triumphs won by us, under Jesus' leadership, grander than any in the past. Our history in the nineteenth century should intensify our faith in God and fire our souls with zeal for Him and His cause. We are still convinced that the old gospel is God's power unto salvation to every one that believes; and our duty is as binding as ever to preach it—to preach it in faith, telling its blessed truths with joy, presenting its offers of Grace, not shunning to speak of the ruin following its rejection. May your ministers be clothed with Power; may your churches be beacon lights, and in Heaven may we find that God has crowned what here in grace he has begun.

Again expressing the hope that your present Conference may be blessed to you, and through you a blessing to others,

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PUBLIC MEETING.

Opened at 3 p. m. on Monday, by singing "Far, Far Away." President, Mrs. J. S. Smith, in the chair. Reading of Scripture by Mrs. A. E. Slipp. Psalms 2nd and 115th. Prayer by Mrs. C. T. Phillips. Singing by the Choir. Address by the President.

Address of welcome by Miss Augusta Slipp as follows :

Beloved President and members of the Woman's Missionary Society and friends :

Our church has often been the rallying ground of large assemblies and mighty interest, but none more interesting nor important than the convocation of earnest, consecrated women gathered here today, having for their aim the advancement of the Redeemer's kingdom over the whole earth. A more than ordinary interest gathers around this meeting—it is more than a simple anniversary—this our twenty-fifth annual meeting marks an epoch in the history of our Woman's Missionary Society, and it is fitting that this event should be celebrated in this, one of the oldest churches in the Free Baptist denomination; and as our Missionary Society has been enlarging its borders all these years, we would be glad to give you, if it were possible, an enlarged welcome. And, my dear sisters, we do give you a hearty welcome to our church and bid you welcome to our homes.

To our old friends who early realized the enslaved condition of pagan women and their need of the gospel and assisted in the organization of this society, and all these years have prayed and labored for its advancement, we say WELCOME.

To our new friends, representatives of auxiliaries, whose hearts have but recently been fired with the missionary spirit, we say WELCOME. We welcome you in the name of the Free Baptist women of Hampstead, whose hearts are, and ever will be, we trust, warm and true to Christ, His cause and His people. We welcome you in the name of pagan women who even at this present moment are crying with outstretched hands and mournful voices, "Send us the gospel faster, faster, ye who dwell in Christian lands."

We welcome you in the name of our missionary, Miss Gaunce, who is toiling patiently, hopefully, forgetful of difficulties, loneliness or weariness, because she knows that a band of Christian women are holding her up in the arms of faith and prayer.

We welcome you in the name of the Master whose ye are and whom ye serve, and who has been present in every little monthly meeting during the year, verifying the promise, "where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them."

If it be asked what trophies the Society can show for its twenty-five years' work, the reply must be made—not in any spirit of self-congratulation, but as a glad testimony to the power of God's free Spirit working through sinful men—that God has signally honored the work of his people in connection with this society in its fields of labor, and given us noble women to carry the gospel to the heathen. Should we not bring today a glad note of thanksgiving for the record of the past, and gather also whatever help for the future its experience has brought us, regarding it as but a foundation on which to build better and higher things in the time to come, and let us each one resolve as a thankoffering to God for the mercies of the past to give this year more of our time, our influence, our money, and, above all, our prayers to this woman's work for woman. Let us strive to live in the spirit of obedience to our Lord's command, "Go ye and teach all nations."

Spurgeon said "nothing so enlarged and expanded the human soul as an active interest in foreign missions, and I am sure I speak the experience of many before me as well as my own when I say, it has been good for us to be active members of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. Through faith in our precious Saviour we are bound together in the bonds of love and the enjoyment of the priceless blessings of hope and peace. "God be merciful unto us and bless us and cause his face to shine upon us"—not that we may be, in all our surroundings, happy and comfortable, but that "Thy way may be known upon earth, Thy saving health among all nations."

When we think of the magnitude of the work to which the church of Christ is called our hearts fail us. Then our Lord says unto us "Fear not," "ye are a little flock but ye shall inherit the earth." It is the good pleasure of the Father to give you the Kingdom. "Our Redeemer is strong, the Lord of Hosts is His name."

If we have faith to grasp our master's words we will believe that every missionary meeting is a fountain of the most restless and far-reaching influences which are at work in our world. All the forces and obstacles of the work appear as nothing to those

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whose faith is true and strong. God has committed the Gospel to His church and said, "Carry this into all the world and to every creature," while he alone opens the doors and makes our work successful. He says unto us, "Be faithful," "Be not weary." Every land has opened its gates for the gospel. The railways and canals are built, the steamship lines are established to take the missionaries of the cross to the darkest places of the earth in a few weeks from the time we say "Good-bye" to them.

O shall we not pray that the day of the Lord's power may come, and all His people be made willing servants, that the gifts may be rendered to their righteous owner, and the desert be made to blossom as the rose. We remember that God has said "The earth shall be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the Lord as the waters cover the sea." All the ends of the earth shall see the salvation of our God.

Whenever our duty is placed before us, we may be influenced by the Holy Spirit to answer as did Paul when the revelation of his life work was made to him by the Saviour at Damascus, "I was not disobedient to the heavenly vision." Only those who seek on the instant and ever afterward to know and to do the Lord's will, have truly entered upon the duties and the joys of a Christian life. The grand and all-essential point is to do the very work which God gives us to perform, and to occupy the very post to which He appoints us.

We, as members of this Society, are entering to-day upon a new year. We would welcome it reverently, for each day that God grants to us is a gift, a privilege, a talent to use in His service. Oh, may the Gracious Spirit help us to take each as it comes to us, and fill the moments with thoughts and works for Jesus; and may we realize as never before the pressing claims of the unchristianized nations upon us. I would like to-day that we all should set our faces towards the wilderness—that great "waste howling wilderness in which one thousand millions of our race are wandering in darkness and the shadow of death, without hope, being 'without God in the world.'"

And now let every heart be uplifted to the God of assemblies that we may receive power—power to will, to do, to suffer—power to wait or to work, always looking for and expecting that day, when we and those whom He has given us from heathen lands shall be right royally welcomed to the great loving heart of Christ—to the many mansioned home, to the church triumphant, the great multitude which no man can number—who have been

redeemed out of every nation and kindred and people, and we shall unite in ascribing "Glory, wisdom, thanksgiving, honor, power and might, unto our God for ever and ever."

Mrs. J. Wesley Clarke responded as follows :

MADAM PRESIDENT,—The pleasant duty of responding to the address of welcome has been assigned to me. I feel sure that I express the feelings of every sister present in saying that we are pleased to greet each other again in our annual meeting.

That we are also pleased to receive and accept the hearty welcome extended to us by the Hampstead Society.

As a Missionary Society we feel that our work is that to which all Christians are called. Christian life is missionary life, and though all are not called to go into heathen lands, yet all are called either to go or send the message of Christ's love to the millions who are yet in heathen darkness. All those who have the Gospel should take a deep interest in sending it to those who are without it.

May our interest in the missionaries be deepened, and our zeal for the extension of Christ's kingdom increase as we listen to the reports which will be read at this meeting. May our hearts be poured out in prayer to God for all who are at work in the Master's vineyard, and especially for our own dear Miss Gaunce.

We believe that God is with us and that the Holy Spirit will lead us in all our deliberations.

In conclusion, Madam President, allow me to say again that we all highly appreciate the kindly words and cordial welcome given us by our Sister on behalf of the Hampstead Society.

Address by the President, as follows :

These annual gatherings might quite properly be termed the parade ground for review. As we look over the events which have transpired the world over during the year, our hearts should be filled with the deepest gratitude, our faith strengthened, and our souls stirred to know that the Lord is so manifestly apparent on "our side."

As a society, our object has been to send the gospel to the far away eastern lands, and perhaps at no time since our organization has our attention been called so continuously to those lands as during the past year. There was the dreadful famine in India with all its attendant horror, calling for sympathy and aid, which we are glad to know was so willingly, and we hope

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so generously extended. Then came the call for volunteers for South Africa, for soldiers of the Queen to fight for the flag we all so much love; from all over this fair Canada of ours, the responses came so grandly, loyally and willingly that it must at least have won our admiration. It even came so closely as to touch some of our own members.

Then came the Chinese affair whose atrocities to the missionary workers in that domain makes the heart sick, and we turn away with a sigh. How long, O! Lord, how long, before these people will learn of Thee. With all this unrest among the nations, may it not be, that the guiding hand of our God is so manipulating affairs that the wrath of man will yet be made to praise Him, and open more widely the doors, and ensure greater security to the lives of the messengers of Salvation, thereby proving quite clearly that, God moves in a mysterious way, his wonders to perform. While the call for "Soldiers of the Queen" has been so nobly responded to, what about the call for "Soldiers of the Cross." Has there been any response? We are happy to say, yes! While we have prayed so often for more workers, yet there seemed to be none to answer, that our hearts almost fainted, but to-day we have the glad satisfaction to know that one our young sisters has heeded the call and has said "Here am I, send me." It has touched the hearts of some of our members more keenly than was ever anticipated, yet we trust Grace will be given them sufficient to say, "Thy will be done."

In this great missionary effort our personal effort consists very largely in praying and paying. I have already intimated that some success has attended our prayers, and I think the reports of the different secretaries and treasurers will show quite a satisfactory advance along the line of paying.

In conclusion, what can I say that would even suggest a ray of encouragement to the tired and almost discouraged workers all over our denominational field. Good is the Word of the Lord. So I will select one promise in the many contained in that Word. "Be not weary in well-doing for in due season ye shall reap if ye faint not," hoping it will inspire our hearts so as to prosecute our work with new vigor and greater zeal than ever in our history. As our soldier boys faced the enemy, so bravely, endured the hardships of the campaign so willingly, and fought so heroically and carried the flag of her gracious Majesty to such a triumphant success, so should we continue to march and fight, and, if needs be, endure hardness as good soldiers of the "King of kings."

Let us then fresh courage take, and toil on till the Master

calls "Come home"; then how grandly and triumphantly we shall march up the shining way to the strains of heavenly music and cast our trophies at his feet and "Crown Him Lord of all."

The Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. C. W. Weyman, gave a synopsis of the year's work.

MADAME PRESIDENT AND SISTERS,—How quickly the years go by! Another one has passed swiftly away, and it is ours to pause and review what we have been trying to do in this department of the Master's work. The missionaries in the Indian field, in their annual report, tell of the sunshine and the cloud, the hopeful signs and the causes of discouragement; but amidst it all the movement is surely onward. One of their number writes: "Surrounded by famine and pestilence and idolatry, we can say: missions pay; God is ever present, keeping watch over his own. He leadeth us, and in His name there is sure victory." The different departments of the work are being vigorously prosecuted, considering the limited number of workers and the means at their disposal. Our own missionary, Sister Gaunce, is toiling away, performing faithfully and efficiently the numerous and varied duties that come to her in her care of Sinclair orphanage, the Bible women, the Hindoo girls school, and the work at Uganda. During the year her health has been fairly good, yet the many and varied cares must be very trying in that climate to one so conscientious in the performance of every duty. Rachel Das, one of the older girls, and one who has been very helpful to Miss Gaunce in her care of the orphanage, etc., has recently married and gone with her husband to reside in the Punjab. I shall not speak further of the work in India, but let Miss Gaunce tell you in her own words of the work during the year. She says: "As we look back over the course of the year, the prevailing note in our minds and hearts must be one of gratitude and praise to God for his unchanging faithfulness and preserving care; for, while grim and gaunt famine has been raging over a large portion of this land, we in this division of India have been spared all its evils and miseries. The year has seen few changes in the work. Nearly all my time is given to the orphanage. At present there are forty girls, the youngest of which is not yet two years old. During the year one married and another returned to her home. The girls rise early; the little ones are dressed and sent to kindergarten, while the others set to work cleaning and sweeping until seven o'clock. At seven o'clock we have prayers, followed by

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study until nine o'clock. Then they bathe, breakfast, and go to school. At four o'clock school is dismissed. Then in order follows sweeping of house and yard, recreation and dinner. At seven o'clock prayers, followed by study until nine o'clock, when they are sent to their house and shut in for the night.

"Each girl has her regular turn at cooking, washing, cleaning and bringing water. There is a large tank in the compound, and all the water for cooking, bathing and washing is obtained from it. The general health of the institution is good. Even itch, which again and again persisted in appearing, seems to have found a lack of proper nourishment and has disappeared. The girls make their own clothes, and two have from the sale of lace, made in their leisure, earned sufficient to clothe them for the year. Three out of the forty girls are teachers. Annie, the eldest, has charge of the junior sewing class in connection with the Christian girls' school. Another is in charge of primary class in same school, while the third teaches in the kindergarten. During the year three have been baptized and joined the church, and another has been accepted as candidate for baptism, and (D. V.) this coming Sunday will receive the ordinance and be admitted into the Church.

"May the Holy Spirit reveal Christ to each member of the orphanage, so that their lives may shine in this land of darkness for Him.

"Besides my work in orphanage, have a Hindoo girls school about four miles out of Balasore. This year I have not been able to give it much attention. The teacher is a Hindoo, but not averse to teaching the catechism and life of Christ. So far, have been pleased with the interest he takes in his work. Once per week the Bible women come to me for a lesson. We are this year studying the second quarter of Blakeslee's lessons of The Life of Christ. I much enjoy this hour of Bible study with them, for in imparting knowledge have myself been benefitted. Four of the seven women engaged in Bible work are supported by New Brunswick. During the cold season they were sent in different directions out in the country. Ujurda received in all about three months work. The women report an interest in the work. Some new villages have this year been entered; the Word was gladly listened to, and an earnest invitation given to come again. In some of the Hindu houses regularly visited they have prayers.

"Dear sisters, pray for your Bible women, viz.: Miriam, Adjudy, Marie and Jamna, and also remember the women and

Hindu homes, who are secret believers of Christ, the World's Saviour.

"Since yearly meeting, Ujurda has been without a regular pastor. The Christians meet together for prayers, and on Sunday in the Sunday-school. During the cold season I made several trips out to this village, and, as soon as travelling will permit, shall send two Bible women out to help and encourage them. One of the Christian women there frequently writes me about the condition of prayer-meetings and Sunday-school, and as to the health of the community.

"I have repeatedly tried to get a suitable man and his wife for this place, but have not been successful. Perhaps it is necessary for their discipline that they should for a time be left alone. Continue to pray for the work and people of this village. How they need your prayers!"

Beside the work under Miss Gaunce's direction, a grant of fifty dollars was made by the Society to the Dorcas Smith Widows' Home, a work projected by our dear Sister Smith in her last days, also a work in which Sister Hooper was deeply interested and helpful. This home is located in Balasore, and is under the direction of Miss Scott. Eleven widows and six children have been inmates of the home since it was first opened.

During the year God has especially honored two of our most devoted workers, Sisters Hartley and Hartt, in calling their daughters for work in the foreign field. Miss Gertrude Hartley has been chosen as the foreign missionary of our Young People's Society, and Miss Flora Hartt, who goes out to foreign service under the Congregational Church Mission Band, of Boston, United States. I would that Sister Hartt had gone out as a missionary from our Society, but since it has been otherwise ordered, we bid her God-speed in her noble work, and assure her she will have an interest in our prayers.

Dear sisters, let me earnestly urge you to pray daily during the coming year for our dear missionary, Sister Gaunce, and our two young sisters who have consecrated their lives to this sacred work.

Home Work.—Last year an unrestricted grant of one hundred dollars was made to the Conference Home Mission Executive, also a grant of fifty dollars was made to the same board, with the request that it be expended in the first district, especial mention being made of the Tobique region. Thus we are yearly coming nearer our ideal—a missionary in the home field. A

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small grant was also made to "our column," and to the Committee on Missionary Literature. This, as I have before stated, is one of the most necessary and fruitful parts of our work. I am sure our Committee on Literature are doing good work, a work that is much needed and that will bear fruit an hundred fold.

Our column is invaluable to us as a society. I feel and know that many of us have neglected our duty to it in the past. Let me earnestly beg of you, sisters, during the coming year to remember with your help, your sympathy and your prayers, our column and its editor, our sister who has for so many years, week after week, done the work so faithfully and so well. Let each sister during the year contribute something to the column, making it what it should be—the connecting link between our local societies and the medium of our thoughts and plans for the work.

Dear sisters, your Secretary has helped you thus to review the past year's work. To my mind the most pressing need of our Society is more missionaries. We could easily, I believe, support a man and his wife. God so loved us that he gave His only begotten Son. Are we withholding our most precious gifts—our sons and our daughters?

"I gave; I gave my life for thee,

What hast thou given to me?"

The Home Secretary, Mrs. H. Hartt, read her report, as follows:

MADAME PRESIDENT.—Another year has passed away and now we pause to look back upon its history. In most respects the reports from our district secretaries are encouraging, although we feel that nearly as much has not been accomplished as should have been, especially in the work of educating the children. Only a few Mission Bands are reported, whereas there should be one in each of our churches. More funds have been raised than during any preceding year.

First District.—From this section comes no report, but we learn from the treasurer's report that \$24.50 have been paid.

Second District.—True to its record this society is the banner district. Woodstock comes to the front with a larger con-

tribution than either the first, fourth or fifth districts, viz., \$75.00. Among its members are some very competent and enthusiastic workers. Regular meetings are maintained. It also has a flourishing mission band under the care of Miss Vanwart. It raised fifteen dollars, five of which was given to our society. Hartland society has thirteen members, holds regular meetings; gave \$18.47. Pembroke has eight members, holds monthly meetings; gave \$12.00. Rockland gave \$3.00. Lower Brighton has sixteen members; gave \$21.15. Knowlesville raised by subscription \$9.60. Third Tier raised by subscription \$25.75, ten dollars was for Home Missions, to be spent by the district secretary. Upper Waterville has eighteen members, an increase of seven during the year; gave \$21.85; this society united with Third Tier in holding monthly meetings. They held an entertainment for children; to instruct them on Missions, Mite Boxes were distributed among them, which no doubt will swell the amount next year. Windsor, per Mite Box, 70 cents. Gordonsville gave \$1.00; Upper Brighton, \$2.00; Knoxford, \$7.10; Charleston, \$4.00; Lindsay, \$4.35; Victoria, \$19.15; Somerville, \$3.20; Tracy's Mills, \$26.49; Connell raised \$20.25, \$1.15 of which went to Home Missions, \$5.00 for the support of an orphan was given by the young people; collection at public meeting, \$4.00. Total, \$282.17.

Third District.—In this society three less auxiliaries are heard from than last year, viz., Keswick, Stanley and Kingsley. Fredericton holds monthly meetings and contributes \$42.52; Marysville holds monthly meetings and sends \$25.00; Gibson sends 15.70; Southampton sends \$6.00; Upper Hainesville gave \$7.20; Bloomfield \$2.00, children's concert \$6.30, total \$8.30; Cross Creek gives \$9.15, \$5.15 of which was raised by the Sunday-school for a native preacher; Mrs. William Whynot \$5.00; total \$118.87.

Fourth District.—The secretary of this society writes that the reports from the auxiliaries are rather discouraging, and some have failed to report at all. Fredericton Junction has six members, holds no meetings, sends \$14.50; Blissville society sends \$14.00; Patterson Settlement \$6.95; Rusiagornis gives \$5.50; Tracey Station \$4.75; Clarendon \$3.55; Mill Settlement \$3.25; Three Tree Creek \$2.70; Lincoln \$1.00; Mrs. T. McMulkin \$1.00; Mrs. Thos. Bridges \$2.00; collection \$3.42; total \$62.62.

Fifth District.—The secretary of this society expresses a regret that this year has not been a more successful one, but trust that it is the resolve of each one to be more faithful and devoted

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in the coming year. Narrows society contributes \$5.00, its secretary writes, "that the society is more firmly established in the affections of the people, and is a recognized power for good in the community; they hold regular monthly meetings, which have not only been productive of good in that especial work, but has become a rallying centre for greater activity in all departments of church work." This would be the experience of every church where the Mission cause is properly worked up. Perry's Point and Cody's church makes annual collections, raised \$8.80; Brown's Flat \$5.00; Central Hampstead holds several missionary meetings during the year, raised \$12.50; Shannon contributed \$2.70; The Sisters at Carpenter have re-organized and are much encouraged, raised \$8.60; Hibernia \$11.60; half collection at public meeting \$3.75; total \$58.55.

Sixth District.—In this society eighteen auxiliaries are reported. Sussex gave \$40.25; Cornhill holds monthly meetings, gave \$24.50; Lower Millstream gave \$22.00, \$6.50 of which was given by the Mission Band; Newton Mountain holds prayer meetings and one public meeting, gave \$14.60; Midland \$13.40; Penobsquis \$12.50; Coverdale \$9.25; Dover \$9.00; Petitcodiac \$9.00; Apohaqui \$6.50; Taylor Village \$6.50; Snider Mountain \$6.25; Millstream Mountain has a Mission band of twelve members, gave \$6.00; Lower Ridge \$5.80; Moncton \$5.25; Dutch Valley \$4.70; Graves Settlement \$1.80; Norton \$9.25; Long Point \$0.00; Erb Settlement \$0.00; half collection \$2.36; total \$208.01.

Seventh District.—A most encouraging report comes from the secretary of this society. Each auxiliary contributes more than last year. This is as it should be. Grand Harbour has thirteen members; gave \$10.45. Castalia gave \$4.75, collected by two Christian girls. North Head has a membership of fourteen; sends \$25.00. Wilson's Beach has a membership of nineteen, holds prayer once in two weeks; gave \$33.35. The auxiliary at Beaver Harbour was resuscitated, has nine members and gave \$15.35. St. John holds monthly meetings, and missionary meetings in the church, at which collections were taken; it has a membership of thirty-four; Mrs. J. S. Smith's Sunday-school class \$2.00, Primary class \$3.52, collections \$4.32, contributed 76 cents; total \$44.50. Victoria Street, St. John, gave \$32.65, \$5.95 of which was raised by Mite Boxes. St. John (West) has a membership of twenty-four, and raised during the year \$52.00. The year just closed has been one of the best in the history of this society. The meetings have been helpful and interesting. Programmes have been arranged and sent to all the members.

Many interesting papers have been prepared and read; Bible readings given, and talks on various phases of Foreign Missions. Several new members have been added. One who joined early in the year has heard the call to leave home and friends for active service in India, and has loyally given himself to the Master's service. The Junior Endeavor section of this church has worked lovingly and faithfully during the year; \$14.00 was given by the Juniors, ten of which was sent to the Widows' Home, and four dollars paid on Miss Barnes' salary; four dollars of the money paid by this society went to Home Missions. The report of this society is given in full with the hope it will become an object lesson to other churches. Total raised by this district, \$240.66.

Total raised by all the districts, \$995.38. How little has been accomplished in comparison with what might have been, should make us each hide our heads in shame. The question comes: How shall we create a missionary enthusiasm among the masses? The answer to this is by the dissemination of missionary literature. We cannot expect people to be interested in what they know nothing about. The cheap printed page is a most powerful weapon, and, as a Society, we should spend more money in distributing missionary information in this form among the churches until the members are interested enough to buy for themselves. Then, too, the duty of enlargement should claim our most serious attention, standing, as we do, upon the threshold of a new century. "Lengthen the cords and strengthen the stakes, that the whole human family may come within the gospel tent" is God's plan, and we are placed here to carry it out. Everyone is responsible in this matter. If we are not a source of strength, we are a source of weakness, and leave greater burdens for others. Let us individually be more zealous in our work. Let us pray earnestly for more missionaries. Let us give more generously. "Freely ye have received, freely give." "The silver and the gold is mine," saith the Lord, and He will surely require His own with usury. God grant that the incoming year may see us visited with a tidal wave of missionary enthusiasm, and that the effects may be felt by some of the countless millions crying in darkness and despair. They say:

O break our night
And bring us life and light;
We perish while you tarry here,
O hear our prayer.

Meetings of Board, October 6th, 3 p. m. President in the chair. Prayer was offered by the President, followed by others. "Blest be the Tie that Binds" was sung, after which the Scripture lesson was read, followed by a few earnest remarks from the President.

The Roll was called, showing twelve members present: Mrs. J. S. Smith, President; Mrs. H. Hartt, Mrs. McKinnon, Mrs. C. W. Weyman, Vice-Presidents; Mrs. Vince, Treasurer; Mrs. Fenwick, Auditor; Board of Managers—Mrs. Long, Mrs. Phillips, Mrs. J. J. Barnes, Miss J. Weyman, Mrs. E. Dunfield, Mrs. J. N. Barnes.

The minutes of previous session were read. The Corresponding Secretary's report was read, also a letter from Miss Gaunce explaining the needs of the work.

Rev. F. C. Hartley, delegate to the United Society of Young People, of U. S., presented the following report :

MR. PRESIDENT—After consultation among the members of the Executive and others interested in our work, it was decided that I should this year attend the annual meeting of the United Society of Free Baptist Young People, of the United States. The Corresponding Secretary presented his report :

MR. PRESIDENT AND FELLOW WORKERS,—The year just closed has, I think, been one of quiet prosperity among our societies. Not being in a position to personally visit many of the societies, I cannot give very definite information ; but judging from the reports received by me, I think that, with possibly one or two exceptions, our societies are becoming to be firmly established, and are making themselves felt as a strong factor in the spiritual and temporal affairs of the Church and denomination.

With the new impetus and special encouragement coming to us—result of this League meeting, and the setting before us of a definite and worthy object for prayer and effort, it is hoped, that next year may be the very best in our history.

During the year I have endeavored to do the duties of the office as best I could. A letter of Christian greeting was sent the Free Baptist Young People's Society of Nova Scotia ; also considerable correspondence was had with the Rev. G. Humlin and Dr. Given in reference to the vote of one thousand dollars for improvement of Balasore compound. Mr. Hamlin's last

letter will make interesting reading for foreign missionary service. This matter was finally arranged and the Treasurer instructed to forward to Dr. Given the money.

As directed by the League last session, I have endeavored to supply the societies with good and helpful literature. I think this has been helpful, and suggest that in future the Secretary be instructed to keep on hand such literature as may be helpful in the organization of new societies and the encouragement of those already established.

So far as has come to my notice, there have been organized during the year three new societies—Lambert's Cove, Bald Hill and Southampton; also one junior society at Gibson. I am sorry to say that a number of societies failing to report last year have also failed to report this year. If this signifies that the societies have ceased to exist, it is indeed an occasion for sincere regret.

The letter of self-denial was issued as usual and addressed to each society. The correspondence of the office has been carried on as promptly as possible.

I would like to say just a word in reference to our work in the future. I believe God is opening before us splendid opportunities for work, and I believe, too, that our young people are fully prepared to respond to the call of God. Three years ago, at Woodstock, we went before the Lord with a definite plea, and now God seems to be answering that call. He has given us the opportunity of at least helping in the preparation of a young life that is to be offered in His service in the land of spiritual darkness. If this responsibility and trust is to be assumed, it can only be by the concurrence of the societies represented here. The present is a critical time in our history. We are now called upon to show whether we want what we said when we asked God for one of our own to represent us in mission work.

If we will be true to the limited responsibility that comes to us now, we will thus prepare ourselves for the larger trust He will surely give us in the near future.

In our Society work it seems to me there offers a large opportunity for helpfulness in the organization and development of the junior work. There are but a few places where work among the children might not profitably be engaged in. The great difficulty seems to be inadequate supervision. A good leader or superintendent is in this matter an imperative necessity. But surely, young friends, there is some one in each society with sufficient consecration and ability to undertake this work.

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Standing as we do to-day before the future, thick set with beckoning, what are we to do? What but follow the example of the faith heroes and noble men of old and "go forward."
