Yesterday, while drunk, he broke up a wheelbarrow and set the pieces on fire and in five or six minutes the house would have been burnt to the ground; he threw a dish of water on it; he generally loads the gun with large shots.

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Shipping Notes. The bark Hesperus (of St. Andrews, N. B.), Waycott master, at New York 23d inst., 13 days from Havana, reports: Had fine weather up to the 23d inst.; when off Havana experienced a severe gale from S.E., lasting 12 hours, during which time vessel sprung a leak and made water at the rate of 3000 strokes an hour; on the 17th the weather moderated; the leak increasing vessel obliged to throw overboard 80 boxes of sugar to lighten the vessel; had been 8 days north of Havana.

The schooner Francis (of this port), McLaughlin master, at New York 22d inst., 13 days from Cardenas, with sugar, reports: On the 15th inst., off Havana, experienced a severe gale, commencing at 3 P.M. and veering round to N.W., lasting 12 hours; lost and split sails; had been six days north of Havana.

The bark Arava Gouly (of Yarmouth, N. S.), Bent, master, at New York 21st inst., 52 days from Glasgow, reports: Passed through Pentland Firth March 3; March 21, 44 29, Feb. 24, had a heavy gale from N.W., in which lost fore-yard; 25th, lat. 45 10, lon. 42 34, had a heavy sea, in which lost lower mizzenmast and foretopmaststaysail; shipped several heavy seas, which did some slight damage; crossed the Banks April 5, in lat. 41 30; since had westerly winds and foggy weather.

The S. S. Cassella (of the Anchor Line), sails from Glasgow on the 29th inst., with the Kinrosshire colonists, for this port, having waited several days for passengers.

The bark N. K. Clements, from London for Boston, which put into Foyal on the 1st January, with damage, sailed again for her port of destination on the 29th ult.

The schooner Abbie Perkins—Captain Perkins, of the schooner Abbie Perkins, of Parrboro, N. S., from New York for London with a cargo of naphtha, benzolized and gas oil, reports: Left New York Feb. 25, at 2 p. m., with Mr. W. W. moderate breeze; proceeded on her voyage as above stated, nothing particular occurring until March 18, when we believe that a cork burst in the hold. On April 3, at 10.30 a. m., tide of the time high wind weather dull and foggy, wind W. by S. light, ship steering E. by N., running up Channel, when she suddenly exploded, and the vessel was immediately in flames fore and aft. I was below at the time standing up in the cabin. Two of the hands were in the cabin with me. I was above on deck by the shock. I immediately got the boat out and escaped, the ship burning throughout. The explosion took place about 10 miles S. W. of the Boat place, for River Platte at high rates, and 5 miles. She hoove to and we rowed up to her, and they took us on board. She was the Challenger, of Southampton, Huges, master, who landed us at Saconby, where she was on fire and the crew were badly burnt.

Narrowing the Intercolonial Railway Gauge.—Diverce-Costigan Controversy. OTTAWA, April 25. Yesterday afternoon was spent in discussing a resolution to change the gauge of the Intercolonial Railway to 4 ft. 8 1/2 inches. After recess the debate was resumed and resolution adopted.

The House works on Saturday till six o'clock. Yesterday Mr. Costigan withdrew from the Kent County election committee because it was attempted to be proved that the recognition was bad. The House directed him to be in his place to-day to explain.

Lo's Opera House. Burgess and Wilson, in their songs and dances, did not create a favorable impression on the audience last evening. The singing of Miss Poiner and Harry Blanchard was good, and deservedly applauded. Christie and Collins also performed their several parts creditably, but it was the absence of Pate Lee, who was announced as being indisposed, the performance was not so good as expected.

At 2 o'clock yesterday the case of Thomas Falconer vs. Athane Seymour was taken up. H. C. McConaghe, Esq., for the plaintiff and Dr. Barker for the defendant. This is an action on a disputed account. The plaintiff wishing to recover the amount and the defendant who is a lumberman, claiming that he has not received credit for lumber delivered. It was being going on since yesterday and was not finished when the court adjourned at 10 o'clock. Judge, jury and lawyers seem completely tired out, though the lawyers still are able to dispute on points that seem most trivial.
