The Catholic Appeal Dismissed. Mr. Parkin telegraphs us from London that the appeal against the constitutionality of the Common Schools Act of New Brunswick has been dismissed with costs by the Privy Council.

This motion was seconded by Mr. Gilliespie, and passed unanimously. The President read a letter from the Halifax Chamber of Commerce, expressing regret that their delegates could not be present, and extending the hospitality of the city to any of the Board who should visit them.

Mr. Fry then called attention to the Pilotage Act, and especially the responsibility of punishing pilots under the 71st section. In England this was under the direction of the Trinity Board, and for any offence pilots could be easily punished.

The delegates from the National Board of Trade entered the room and were introduced by the President (Charlottetown) moved, and R. Marshall (King's County) seconded, a motion inviting the delegates to take seats at the Board, and according them the privilege of debate.

T. C. Henry (Portland, Me.) responded in a short and well chosen speech, speaking in high terms of the treatment they had received since their arrival in St. John, and paying compliments to the Board.

Mr. Elder of St. John moved the following resolution: That this Board recognize its frequently expressed opinion in favor of a treaty of reciprocity between the United States and Canada.

Mr. Elder supported his resolution in a speech, claiming that the treaty was an injustice to Canada. He said it was prejudicial to Canada in several different ways. The extension of Maritime rights are not equal.

Mr. Gillespie (Toronto) thought that to speak on this subject, on this Treaty that had been sprung upon the country, how one man could represent the varied interests of Canada was at a loss to see. He had no political interest in speaking as he did.

A communication was read from Dan Wiman & Co., informing the Board that the following agents of theirs in the Dominion would accept service in any suits: J. W. Johnston, Montreal; W. C. Mathews, Toronto; Williams, Hamilton; and A. P. Rolph, St. John.

The President informed the Board that the President Fry was in the room, and asked that he be granted the privilege of the floor so that he might bring two important matters before the Board. It was granted, unanimously, and Mr. Fry, on rising, was loudly cheered.

Mr. Dougall (Montreal) rose as second to Mr. Elder's motion. He did not think our manufacturers would oppose the treaty if there were reciprocal advantages offered by it. But to admit American manufactured goods at a low duty, and leave ours to face a heavy duty, was wrong in principle and unjust in practice.

Mr. Gregory (Hamilton) announced himself as a representative from the Manchester of Canada. He knew of no manufacturer in that place who was in favor of the Treaty. It would interfere very much with some of our manufactures, especially with those manufactured under American patents.

Mr. Fry (Quebec) asked a fair discussion of the Treaty on business principles. He could not see that any such great benefit would be derived from it. He thought it should be required that the interest, as others better acquainted with that branch of the subject would do that.

Mr. Dobell (Quebec) made a few general remarks, asking that a decision be at once arrived at. On the question of American patents interfering with our manufactures he disagreed with others who had spoken.

Mr. Walsman (London) thought the treaty was all wrong and no better. He had been struck with the fact that not a manufacturer, ship owner or ship builder is satisfied with the treaty. It was made, so far as Canada is concerned, in the interests of the farmers of Ontario.

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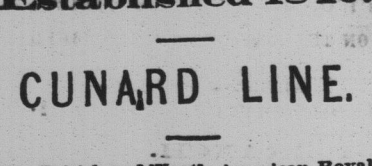
