# DEMAND FOR THE COLLEGE AND ITS GROWTH FROM THE START.

The great need felt by loyal Protestant Churchmen for a regular and certain supply of true-hearted clergymen to carry on effectually the work of our Church in accordance with those Reformation principles on which it is based, resulted in 1877 in the establishment of Wycliffe College.

1877

One teacher met in a room in St. James' School-house seven young men who then agreed to give themselves to the Work of the Ministry.

1882.-

As an outcome of the meeting in this "Upper Chamber," in 1879, Wycliffe College was incorporated, and in 1882 the **first structure**, then thought sufficiently capacious to answer all our needs was opened.

1891.-

1891 finds completed our present building on Hoskin Ave., with its chapel and largely increased accommodation, ready for occupation when the October Term begins. This has cost \$67,000, and we enter the building free of debt.

#### BUILDINGS

From a borrowed room we have come to a splendid building fully equipped for all the purposes of a Theological College, in close proximity to the national university, the University of Toronto, all the advantages of which, by affiliation, our Students enjoy.

#### MEN.

From seven men the numbers that have been admitted to the benefits of the College have ran up to one hundred and nineteen. Of these fifty-four have been duly admitted to Holy Orders, and are now in many parts of the world carrying on the work.

After due testing twenty of those who entered have ceased to continue in attendance, the Council having determined that when a lack of fitness from any reason is shewn the attendance of the student ceases.

Forty-five will be ready for lectures when the College opens in October next.

#### MONEY .-

We commenced with nothing—we have paid \$67,000 for our new building and necessary equipments, and we have now an endowment of \$93,000 yielding \$5,500 a year; and in addition to this a subscription list of yearly contributions amounting to over \$8,000 a year.

#### LIBRARY.

We began without a volume and now have a library of 8,000 volumes, containing many useful books of great value to the Students.

#### PROFESSORS. -

We began with one Teacher and now have four Professors.

# RESOURCES

We have now but the sum of \$93,000 as permanent endowment, bringing us an income of \$5,500 a year, we confidently appeal to the liberality of the loyal sons of the Church to make up this amount to \$150,000.

Those who prefer to make yearly payments can aid us by generously subscribing to our ANNUAL MAINTENANCE FUND, to raise it from \$8,000 to \$9500.

# THE OUTLOOK

The demand for Wycliffe is stronger now than ever, true-hearted Churchmen are beginning everywhere to sympathise with us and support our work.

Our means must increase as the number of students applying for entrance increases, as we do not wish even to turn away one who is fit for the work. All that is necessary now, is that **every one** who feels the importance of this work will first pray constantly that God's richest blessing may rest upon its every department, and then prove their prayer is real by giving of what He has bestowed, to the education of a spiritually-minded Ministry for the extension of His Church and Kingdom.

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#### THE ORIGIN AND POSITION

OF

# WYCLIFFE COLLEGE.

WYCLIFFE COLLEGE originated in the prayerful deliberations of Clergymen and Laymen in the Diocese of Toronto, deeply impressed with the conviction that in an efficient and faithful ministry lie the strength and the hope of the Church; and that therefore provision must be made to secure the education and training of theological students in the definite principles of evangelical truth, as well as to give them a thorough general and liberal education. Hence the work and methods of Wycliffe College are based upon two distinctive positions; one more external though important—affiliation with the Provincial University; the other, internal and vital—distinctive evangelical teaching.

#### AFFILIATION WITH THE UNIVERSITY OF TORONTO.

The University comprises Faculties of Arts, Law, and Medicine. It is a non-denominational, although Christian, institution, leaving all Theological study to be pursued in the Divinity Schools, belonging to the different Christian Churches, which carry out their respective systems of Theological training in affiliation with the University, and in connection with University College, to which their students resort for their studies in Arts. By the Act of the Ontario Legislature which came into operation in 1888, Wyoliffe College, which had been previously affiliated to the University by Statute, was constituted a confederated college of the University of Toronto, and from this connection it derives important advantages.

Every inducement is offered to the Students of Wycliffe to take a complete University course; and in cases where this is impossible, they can still avail themselves of the opportunities which the University affords, for instruction in Languages, Philosophy, and other departments of study.

The Students of Wycliffe College also enjoy the advantages of association with the large body of Students in attendance upon University College and the other Theological Colleges. This is of no small consequence. It is of great value to Theological Students to receive their education where they can commingle with those amongst whom their life work is to be carried on, and can be stimulated by contact with men of various communions and callings.

A third benefit derived from connection with the University lies in this very practical consideration that all the resources of Wycliffe College can be devoted to the advancement of Theological learning, while for the general literary training the unrivalled resources of the University are utilized.

#### DISTINCTIVE EVANGELICAL TEACHING.

Distinctive Evangelical teaching in Theology forms the second great principle which underlies the work of Wycliffe College. Canon Blakeney, author of a well-known work on the Prayer-Book, has stated that:—"He believed the great ignorance of the truths of the Reformation which existed, was due to the fact that those important branches of knowledge had been overlooked in our educational establishments,—that even our Universities had failed to supply an adequate course of Theological study for our Divinity Students."

Distinctive Evangelical Theology teaches that Holy Scripture is the only authoritative rule of faith; that sinners are justified solely by the merits of Christ, and salvation is God's free gift; that the ministry is a body of pastors whose chief work is to unfold the Scriptures and to testify of Christ, and not an order of sacrificing priests without whose intervention there can be no union with Christ and no certainty of salvation. The work of Wycliffe Callege is based upon the conviction that in an efficient Theological School there must be clear and decided teaching in relation to these great fundamental principles of the Gospel.

#### DIVINITY DEGREES CONFERRED AT WYCLIFFE.

Under the Canon of the Provincial Synod, adopted in 1891, and by legislation since obtained, the various Universities and Colleges of the Church of England in Canada, have formed a joint Board of Examiners for Divinity Degrees and the Metropolitan of Canada has been appointed a corporation sole with power to grant such degrees.

In accordance with this the necessary examinations for degrees in Divinity are held at Wycliffe College and candidates after the passing of these examinations in their course will have such degrees conferred upon them at Wycliffe College, by the Principal or other representative of the College acting for the Metropolitan.

#### EQUIPMENT OF THE COLLEGE.

The work of the College, which was known at first as the Protestant Episcopal Divinity School, was begun in a very modest way in the year 1877, in the School-house of St. James's Cathedral.

In 1882 the original College Street building, to the south of University College, was completed and occupied, and in 1885 was almost doubled in size by the addition of a handsome library, with dormitories overhead and refectory below.

Even this building proved inadequate for the growing needs of the work, so it was sold for hospital purposes, and the foundation of the present commodious building was laid in the Spring of 1890. This new building which will be formally opened in October of the present year, is beautifully situated in Queen's Park, on Hoskin Avenue, a short distance to the north-east of University College.

It contains rooms for forty-four students, lecture-rooms, library, chapel, housekeeper's quarters and residences for the Principal and the Dean, and is in every way well equipped for its work.

The Library contains at present about 8,000 volumes and receives additions as rapidly as the funds permit. The rooms of the students are suitably furnished; and every provision made for their health and comfort. The generosity of benefactors has provided a number of Bursaries available for those needing this assistance. The College would be greatly strengthened by further benefactions for this purpose. The teaching work of the College is carried on by a staff of four theological professors. Great stress is laid upon the practical work in the city and in country missions as a means of training, which is carried on under the supervision of the Professor of Practical Theology.

#### THE SITUATION OF THE COLLEGE.

In such a city as Toronto, with many earnest laymen, and especially with many clergymen of theological attainments and experience, means of enriching and strengthening the work of the College are provided, unequalled elsewhere in Canada. There are also in Toronto so many Christian

workers, and so many departments of Christian work that the students have many opportunities for gaining a practical acquaintance with the various methods pursued, and must receive both stimulus and enrichment from this contact.

The College is not local in character, but is intended to provide for the education of men from and for all parts of the Dominion. The territory is vast and the opportunity ripe. The Great North-West is rapidly filling up with a population of which a great part are members of the Church of England. So far we have failed to provide adequately for the spiritual wants of these people; and not only there, but in the older parts of the Dominion, men of earnest piety and Evangelical principles are greatly negded.

The graduates are working from end to end of the Dominion of Canada and some beyond it, while the demand for them is far in excess of what the College can at present supply.

THE DISTINCTIVE PRINCIPLES of this College, which are the basis of the instruction given, are:—

THE BIBLE, THE SOLE RULE OF FAITH; in opposition to the error that would make the Bible and tradition the joint rule of faith.

"Holy Scriptures containeth all things necessary to salvation, so that whatsoever is not read therein, nor may be proved thereby, is not to be required of any man, that it should be believed as an article of the faith, or be thought requisite or necessary to salvation."—Article VI.

2. JUSTIFICATION BY FAITH IN CHRIST ALONE; in opposition to the sacramentarian system.

"We are accounted righteous before God, only for the merit of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ by faith; and not for our own works or deservings. Wherefore, that we are justified by faith only, is a most wholesome doctrine and full of comfort, as it is more largely expressed in the Homily of Justification."—Article XI.

"The Sacraments were not ordained of Christ to be gazed upon or to be carried about; but that we should duly use them. And in

such only as worthily receive the same [that is, with a lively and steadfast faith in Christ our Saviour.'—Communion Service] they have a wholesome effect or operation; but they that receive them unworthily purchase to themselves damnation, as St. Paul saith."—Article XX V.

 THE SOLE AND EXCLUSIVE PRIESTHOOD OF JESUS CHRIST, in opposition to the assumption which would convert Christ's ministers into an order of sacrificing and mediating priests (lep θs).

"The only priests under the Gospel, designated as such in the New Testament, are the saints, the members of the Christian Brotherhood. As individuals, all Christians are priests alike." "The most exalted office in the Church, the highest gift in the Spirit, conveyed no sacerdotal right which was not enjoyed by the humblest member of the Christian community."—Lightfoot, Bishop of Durham.

"The word priest, as used in the Prayer Book, is synonymous with, and is but a contraction of, Presbyter."—Bishop McIlvaine.

4. THE REAL PRESENCE OF CHRIST BY FAITH IN THE HEARTS OF WORTHY RECIPIENTS OF THE HOLY COMMUNION; in opposition to the figment of His presence corporeally or spiritually on the communion table, under the form of bread and wine, after the consecration of the elements.

"No adoration is intended, or ought to be done, either unto the sacramental bread or wine, there bodily received, or unto any Corporal presence of Christ's natural Flesh and Blood;....the natural Body and Blood of our Saviour Christ are in Heaven and not here."

—(Note at end of Communion Service.)

"If a man...by any other just impediment do not receive the Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood, the Curate shall instruct him if he do truly repent him of his sins, and steadfastly believe that Jesus Christ hath suffered death upon the Cross for him, and shed His Blood for his redemption, earnestly remembering the benefits he hath thereby, and giving Him hearty thanks theretor, he doth eat and drink the Body and Blood of our Saviour Christ profitably to his soul's health, although he do not receive the Sacrament with his mouth."—(Rubrie in Communion of the Sick.)

"The Body of Christ is given, taken, and eaten, in the Supper only after an heavenly and spiritual manner. And the means whereby the Body of Christ is received and eaten in the Supper is faith.

—Article XXVIII.

5. THE CHURCH OF CHRIST is "the Holy Catholic Church."—(Creed.) "The Holy Church Universal."—(Prayer for Church Militant and Lilany.) "The mystical body of Christ, which is the blessed company of all faithful people."—Communion Service.

"The true Church is an universal congregation or fellowship of God's faithful and elect people, built upon the foundation of the Apostles and Prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the head corner stone."—Homily for Whitsunday.

"Before all sermons, lectures, and homilies, the preachers and ministers shall move the people to join with them in prayer in this form or to this effect, as briefly and conveniently as they may. 'Ye shall pray for Christ's Holy Catholic Church, that is, for the whole congregation of Christian people dispersed throughout the whole world, and especially for the Churches of England, Scotland, and Ireland, "—Canon X V.

- 6. "The Visible Church (visibilis ecclesia) of Christ is a congregation of faithful men, in which the pure word of God is preached, and the sacraments be duly administered according to Christ's ordinance, in all those things that of necessity are requisite to the same."—Article XIX.
- 7. AN HISTORICAL EPISCOPATE, traceable to Apostolic direction, as conducive to the well-being, but not necessary to the being, of the Church; in opposition to the dogma of a tactual succession, "a fiction," asserts Dean Alford, "of which I find in the New Testament no trace."

# SECTION I.

# Conditions of Admission.

- 1. At the discretion of the Council Candidates may be admitted to this College, who shall produce a certificate, signed by three members of the Church of England, in good standing, one of whom at least must be a clergyman, testifying to the good moral and religious character of the applicant, and to such disposition and habits on his part as may render him apt and meet to exercise the ministry of the Church of England.
- 2. All applications for information as to the College, or for admission to the course of study, must be made in writing to the College Registrar.
- 3. Candidates for admission must undergo such examination as the Council may prescribe as to their spiritual and literary fitness for the work of the Ministry.
- 4. Regular Students of the College are (a) Graduates in Arts of some recognized University; or (b) Matriculated Students of the University of Toronto.
- 5. Regular Students, not Graduates, are required to pass the Matriculation Examination of the University of Toronto. The subjects prescribed for this examination, are as follows:

Note.—All Candidates for Junior Matriculation must take the Pass Subjects of Latin, Mathematics, English, History and Geography, and one of the following groups: (a) Greek; (b) French and German; (c) French and either Physics or Chemistry; (d) German and either Physics or Chemistry.

N. B.—The Greek option is recommended to intending Theological Students. For the options in groups b, c, and d, see the Curriculum of the University of Toronto.

# ENGLISH.

1. Composition:—Nothing but an essay will be required; this shall be dealt with rather as a test of the candidate's power of English Composition than as a proof of his knowledge of the subject written upon. Legible writing and correct spelling and punctuation will be regarded as indispensable, and special attention will be paid to the structure of sentences and paragraphs. The examiner will allow a choice of subjects, some of which must be based on the following selections, with which the candidate is expected to familiarize himself by careful reading:—

- Grammar and Rhetoric:—The examination will be chiefly on passages not prescribed. A liberal choice of questions will be allowed to the candidate.

N.B.—The system of counting the work of the term in the annual results, which is being inaugurated in the University of Toronto, is adopted at Wycliffe College.

Certain marks will be given for regular attendance at lectures, and for the writing of essays, etc., through the term, on the work accomplished.

In the several branches of the department of Practical Theology, the term work will be counted as fifty per cent. and the annual examination as fifty per cent. of the total. In the other departments the term work will be valued at twenty-five per cent. and the annual examination at seventy-five per cent. of total.

being persons of mature age, practical experience, and special aptitude. They must pass such an examination as shall shew that they are fully able to enter upon the course prescribed. Such students take the course of four years as set forth in the annexed synopsis; except that the first year need not be taken by those who produce evidence satisfactory to the Council that they have taken work which is fully equivalent:—

First Year .... Latin; Elements of Greek Testament Grammar and Vocabulary, with Harper and Weidner's Manual; English; History; one of the three Sciences—Chemistry, Biology, Geology of the First Year in Arts; Biblical Theology of the New Testament; Rhetoric.

Second, Third, and The same work prescribed in A for Matriculated Students, with the addition of Rhetoric in the second year.

2. Alterations are being made in the Curriculum of the University whereby Hebrew may be substituted for certain other subjects in each year of the pass course, where such options are given Hebrew is strongly recommended.

3. A Candidate for examination in any year in the course who has failed in not more than two subjects of the examination, may be allowed to present himself at the next ensuing October Supplemental Examination on the subject or subjects only in which he has so failed. No candidate shall be allowed to enter upon the next succeeding year of course, until he has passed at the Supplemental Examination in the subject or subjects in which he has failed.

4. No deviation from these regulations will be allowed except by petition to the Council.

#### SECTION V.

# Theological Options.

Wycliffe College being in affiliation with the University of Toronto, every inducement is held out to students to proceed to a degree in that institution. By a recently enacted statute, subjects taught in Wycliffe and other Theological Colleges, viz., Biblical Greek; Biblical Literature; Church History; and Apologetics are allowed as Options

in the University of Toronto in the Third and Fourth Years. The following excerpts from the curriculum of the University of Toronto explain in detail the options allowed:

# PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION AND EXAMINATIONS FOR DEGREES IN DIVINITY.

The Preliminary Examination for Holy Orders, which will be accepted *pro tanto* by all the Bishops of this Ecclesiastical Province at their Ordination Examinations is conducted yearly by the Provincial Board of Examiners.

The examination in 1891 will begin on Tuesday, October 6th. The date for 1892 is not yet settled.

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The examination for students of Wycliffe College will be held in the College Library on the dates fixed.

Students of Wycliffe intending to write must send their applications, blank forms for which can be obtained through the Registrar of the College, not later than April 1st in each year.

Candidates who obtain at least 33 per cent. of the aggregate marks in this examination shall be held to have passed the examination, and such candidates shall be entitled to receive from the Board of Examiners a certificate of having passed the subjects of examination. Such certificate shall authorize the holder after ordination to wear a black stuff hood with a border of crimson stuff two inches wide, on payment of

Candidates for the degree of B.D., who produce a certificate from the Board of Examiners of having obtained at least 50 per cent. of the marks in the Preliminary Examination for candidates for Holy Orders conducted by the Board (paper No. 3 not being compulsory), shall be exempted from the first examination for the degree of B.D.

#### DEGREES IN DIVINITY.

For particulars as to examinations for Degrees in Divinity to be conferred in Wycliffe College see synopsis, to be obtained from the Registrar of Wycliffe College or from the Secretary of the Board of Examiners.

# SECTION VII.

#### Prizes.

In order to obtain any of these prizes the Candidate must rank in Class I in the examination on the department or subject for which the prize is given, as well as in the prize work prescribed. These conditions being fulfilled the prize will be awarded to the student writing the best essay, or, where no essay is prescribed, taking the highest place in the special examination.

No student can be awarded more than two prizes in his year, and no student can obtain the same prize more than once during his course.

All essays must be sent to the Registrar not later than April 1st in each year.

#### SECTION VIII.

# The Keeping of Terms.

- 1. In the course, each year comprises two terms :
  - 1. Michaelmas Term—From October 1st to December 23rd (inclusive).
- 2. Easter Term-From January 8th to May 10th (inclusive).
- 2. Every student is required to present himself punctually at the beginning of each Term.
- 3. For necessary absence during Term, previous permission from the Principal or Dean must be obtained.
- 4. Every Student entitled to it, shall receive at the end of the Term from the Lecturer whose lectures he has attended, a certificate of his having been regular in attendance, and of his having passed all his examinations.
- 5. Examinations shall be passed at the end of each Term or during the Term, at the discretion of the Professor or Lecturer, on the work that has preceded that Examination. At the close of the Easter Term Examinations on the work of the Academic year will be held jointly by Examiners appointed by the Council, and the Professors and Lecturers of the College.
- 6. No Student can be advanced to an upper year until he has passed the Examinations and obtained the certificates of the previous year.
- 7. Every regular Student who has passed all the required Examinations to the satisfaction of the Faculty will receive the Diploma of the College.
- 8. Every Student shall engage in the work of the Students' Mission Society, and other practical work, under the direction of the Professor of Practical Theology, and the Dean of the College.

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#### SECTION IX.

# Regulations for Resident Students.

- 1. The Resident Students are under the immediate charge of the Dean.
- 2. All Students not resident in Toronto, are required to live in the College Building. The cost of living in the College Building is \$4 per week.
- 3. Graduates of the College, and Graduates and Undergraduates of the University of Toronto, may be admitted as Residents, at the discretion of the Dean, to any rooms not required by Students.
- 4. Spirituous liquors are not allowed in the College Building, unless prescribed by a physician for medical purposes.
- 5. All Resident Students are required regularly to attend morning and evening service. Students are required to attend the Suuday service in the College Library, unless exempted from so doing by being engaged in Mission work,
- 6. No Student shall be absent from the College after the doors are closed, except by permission of the Dean.
- 7. Students are required to wear the College gown during the College services, at lectures and in the refectory.
- 8. The first morning bell shall be rung at 7 a.m. Morning Prayer at 7.40 a.m. Breakfast at 8 a.m. Dinner at 1 p.m. Tea at 6.30 p.m. Evening Prayer at 7 p.m. Doors close at 10 p.m.

## SECTION X.

#### Bursaries and Loans.

#### REGULATIONS.

- I. There are ten Bursaries of \$120 each per annum, renewable from year to year during the Academic Course of the Beneficiary, at the discretion of the Executive Committee.
- II. Bursaries shall be awarded upon the conditions hereinafter stated. Failure to comply with the conditions required will involve the forfeiture of the Bursary.

III. Provision has been made for extending loans to students under certain prescribed conditions, whenever the applicant himself prefers to receive assistance in this form, or whenever the Executive Committee judge it expedient, and the funds of the College permit it.

IV. Sums of money not exceeding \$120 per annum may be loaned to students who comply with the necessary conditions to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee. No interest shall be charged upon these loans, and they shall be repayable on such terms as the Committee shall arrange.

V. All applications for Bursaries or for Loans shall be referred to the Executive Committee, appointed annually by the Council.

VI. In the case of every application for a Bursary or for a Loan, it shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to make thorough and careful enquiry, in order to ascertain, first, that the applicant is worthy of the assistance he seeks; and, secondly, that his financial circumstances are such that, without this assistance, he is unable to proceed with his studies.

VII. In all cases the holder of a Bursary or of a Loan shall be upon probation during his first term in residence; and it shall be understood that the grant of a Bursary or of a Loan may be discontined at the end of the term, if the Beneficiary be found inefficient or unworthy.

VIII. A Bursary or a Loan shall be payable in three instalments; the first at the close of the Michaelmas Term; the second before Easter, and the third at the close of the Academic year.

IX. In the event of the Beneficiary abandoning his studies before entering the Ministry, he will be required to repay the amount he has received.

X. The applicant is expected to be in hearty and practical sympathy with Evangelical Truth as opposed to the errors of Sacerdotalism on the one hand, and of Rationalism on the other. The Council feel that for applicants to accept the aid with other views and feelings, would be as dishonest in them as it would be for the Council to use for some different purpose the money entrusted to them for Evangelical Education.

XI. The applicant is required to bring satisfactory testimonials, stating that he is a suitable person to receive aid from the Council in preparing for the sacred Ministry, and also, that without such aid he is unable to pursue his studies.

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XII. The applicant is required to fill up, sign, and transmit to the College Registrar a form of application for Bursaries or Loans, which form may be had upon application in person or by writing to Registrar.

XIII. No Student shall hold a Bursary or Loan in any academic year unless he has passed the full examinations of the College or of the University immediately preceding such year.

# STUDENTS' MISSION SOCIETY.

This Society has been in operation under the patronage of the different Bishops, in whose Dioceses work has been undertaken since November, 1881, and its work since that time has been very satisfactory. The object of the Society is to open up new Missions, and to keep open old ones which are unable to maintain a resident clergyman; and a valuable feature of its work is, that it is made a means for the education in practical parochial orginzation and work, of men who are preparing for the ministry, and thus enables them to enter upon their ministerial labours, when their College course is completed, with some knowledge of what its duties are.
