

Montreal, June 13.—At Monday afternoon's session of the Presby terian general assembly, Principal Patrick in presenting the report of the committee on union with other churches, recapitulated the steps taken to this end since origin of the movement. The union movement had two sources, first the Presby-terian Church was responsible for the initial steps, and the great Methodist Church for the next step. He then proceeded to detail what had been done in the matter since the close of the last assembly, reviewing the correspondence that had passed with the Baptist and Anglican churches

So far as Baptist unions concerned it might be said that they were ready to meet a joint committee representing the Presby-terian, Methodist and Congregation-al churches to consider the forma-tion of a federal union, and sub-committees had been appointed to meet the committees of the unions of the Maritime Provinces and Outstice and Quebec. As regards the Anglican church the bishops' replies were in most friendly terms, but it had been found impossible to appoint delegates to meet with the joint committee.

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


